# Russ Reaffirms Hope for Talks In Nehru Letter

MOSCOW, Sept. 22 (AP)—Premier Khrushchev said today the Soviet Union is ready to negotiate any time, any place to insure peace. But he told Prime Minister Nehru of India, in a letter, the talks which the so-called non-aligned nations proposed between him and President Kennedy should be part of a wider scheme devoted to drawing up a German peace treaty. The Soviet premier tied the question of a German peace treaty and the situation in West Berlin to universal and complete disarmament.

He said these two questions are linked and must be solved simultaneously. Khrushchev was replying to a letter the recent Belgrade, Yugoslavia, conference of 25 non-aligned nations sent him. He said specifically for a meeting of the Soviet premier and the U.S. President, it was decided to be by Nehru and Premier Khrushchev of Ghana. Khrushchev's letter, as reported by the Soviet news agency, said the "threat of war has never perhaps been as great in the postwar period as it is now."

He said, "Intensifying military preparations in every country," he said, "has therefore been compelled to take measures to strengthen its security."

Berlin Premier Khrushchev said today war over Germany would inevitably lead to a nuclear world catastrophe. His words came in a message to the opening session of the communist-dominated world disarmament meeting. Two hundred delegates from 40 countries are taking part in the East Berlin meeting for a German peace treaty and a peaceful solution of the Berlin problem.

First frost of the season was reported through most of Magic Valley Friday with two inches of snow falling Thursday night at Ketchum. Hailey also had an early season snowstorm, but all snow on the Wood River valley floor had melted by Friday noon. Some snow still remained Friday on the higher elevations. It was 25 degrees at Hailey Thursday night, one degree above the 24 low for the season which was recorded Wednesday night. It also was 25 degrees at Galena store, 25 miles north of Ketchum.

In other Magic Valley towns gardens were damaged by the frost and lowest temperatures of the fall were recorded. Jerome reported 24 degrees and Burley 21 while Gooding recorded a low of 13 degrees.

In Twin Falls the bureau of entomology reported 30 degrees as the official low Thursday night. # World Leader for U.N. Post Needed Soon, Rusk Avers

NEW YORK, Sept. 22 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk called on the United Nations general assembly today to name "an outstanding world leader" to take over the powers of U.N. secretary-general temporarily. In a statement prepared for a speech he is making here later today, Rusk declared, "Events cannot permit doubt and indecision in the leadership of the United Nations." He declared that the "must move rapidly to fill the void" created by the death of Dag Hammarskjold.

Rusk's statement was released about two hours before his formal delivery at a luncheon meeting of the Foreign Press association. The move was obviously aimed at trying to stir up a powerful drive in the United Nations assembly to name a world leader to the appointment of a new U.N. chief executive.

Rusk and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko discussed the U.N. leadership crisis in a 4 1/2-hour meeting yesterday afternoon. Most of their time, however, was spent on the Berlin crisis.

It appeared following their talks that Gromyko would like Rusk to intend to insist on the appointment of a three-man directorate to take over Hammarskjold's duties. He is reportedly opposed to any kind of any temporary arrangement, diplomats said.

Thus, while the Berlin crisis carries a greater danger of a U.S. dispute presents a more immediate and direct challenge to the United States and the leadership role it seeks to play in the United Nations.

# Quick Call Promised If Emergency Rises

WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (AP)—President Kennedy told leaders of both parties today he would contact them promptly if the international situation requires action after congress adjourns. Republican and Democratic leaders of both houses and the Senate are expected to be in the White House just before departing on a trip that would take him to the United Nations for a speech on Monday.

Both Senate Democratic Leader Hubert H. Humphrey and Republican Leader Everett M. Dirksen of Illinois said there was general agreement that the president would be contacted within 24 hours. Dirksen said that would apply to all members of congress who have returned to their homes.

Dirksen reported that Kennedy's only comment on former President Dwight D. Eisenhower's speech making the Democratic administration a "diner in Chicago" was "it was quite a dinner in Chicago."

Eisenhower delivered his latest criticism of the Kennedy administration to date at a dinner honoring Dirksen in Chicago last Saturday night.

Dirksen said he would be back to breakfast before taking off for his summer home at Hyannis Port, Massachusetts, on Sunday. President Manuel Prado of Peru.

During the week-end at Hyannis Port, Kennedy will polish the speech he is to deliver to the United Nations general assembly Monday.

Dirksen predicted one of the last hurdles to adjustment agreement on foreign aid spending would be cleared with an appropriation that will be "most unassailable" after only about 200 million dollars if involved in dispute between members of the state-house conference committee.

N. security chief in Hammarskjold's plane, said today that medical examination of the bodies "so far has shown no wounds" and that no bullet holes were found in the wreckage.

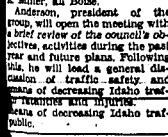

"And this is not meant to be a criticism of human nature, but a statement of fact, which does not have anything to do with the truth and nothing reality straight in the eye."

### Cut in Sugar Quotas Eyed By Freeman

**WASHINGTON, Sept. 22 (U.P.)**—Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman announced yesterday he is considering fixing the 1962 domestic sugar consumption at 4.6 billion pounds, a 10 percent cut from the 5.1 billion pounds of 1961.

Freeman also announced in a statement that he is considering the establishment of domestic marketing and import quotas totaling \$115 million for the first six months of 1961.

As was the case this year and past, Freeman would like to have no share in the U.S. market during this six month period. Until an embargo was imposed on Cuban shipments last year, that country had been the largest supplier of U.S. sugar.

Freeman would like to see these actions under a sugar act which directs his department to control marketing of sugar to stabilize prices and supplies in the interest of both consumers and domestic producers.

The supply quotas proposed would apply to the first half of 1962. The sugar act expires June 30. However, congress will be asked by the administration to extend the legislation with possible changes next year.

Final decisions on the consumption level and quotas will be made by the end of the year.

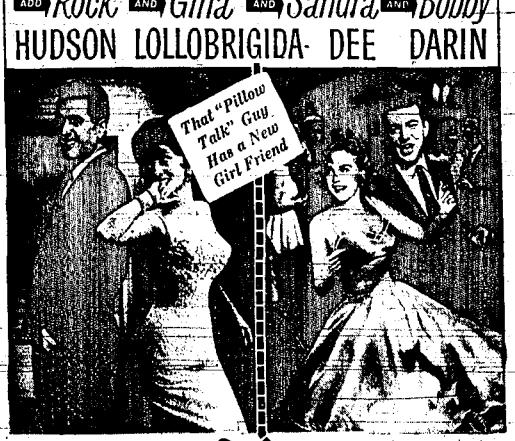

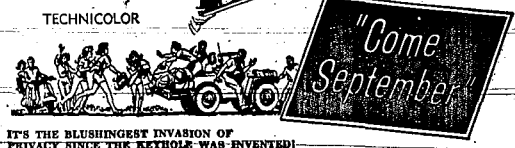

### Role of Government in Agriculture Is Criticized in T.F. by Farm Economist

A former board member of the Minneapolis Grain Exchange who stopped in Twin Falls for one day recently criticized the government's role in agriculture today but scoffed during the interview, at the idea that the farmer lives under a system of rigid controls.

"The farmer really doesn't live under government controls at all," said Dr. O. B. Jensen, St. Paul, Minn., who once headed the department of agricultural economics, University of Minnesota, and also served on the presidential advisory council to Ezra Taft Benson, former USDA secretary. He said he does not think that under present government programs...

Dr. Jensen said he would like to see the government out of agriculture entirely, but he didn't see how this could be done without agriculture itself suffering.

On the current wheat program, and those who supported it, Dr. Jensen said Congress and the USDA never will begin to solve the surplus problem. He said he recognizes the fact there are different kinds of wheat raised in the United States, some more in surplus, some more in demand, and some always in demand.

"The idea of cutting indiscriminately all wheat 10 per cent, as under the new program, without taking cognizance of the demands on different varieties is an absurdity," said the economist.

Dr. Jensen said that farmers can double their indebtedness on a \$2 billion loan and still keep out of trouble.

### Furniture Remodeling Is Fun if Done Right

Furniture refinishing is a fun project, especially when you've acquired some "antiques" to see and see its beauty restored little by little.

A comfortable, well-ventilated area is helpful to the success of the refinishing project. A barn or garage is ideal, but a spot outdoors in cooler weather eliminates mess and hazards of inflammable materials.

Seven days and seven nights is the usual formula on shellac and steel wool. Alternates between the two until you have a glossy steel-like surface. After the surface seems well rubbed down the shine is applied by a coat of linseed oil mixed with powdered rottenstone.

# Cement, Concrete, Mortar—Facts You'll Need to Use Them

There's a difference between cement and concrete although many people use the terms interchangeably.

Both contain Portland cement, sand and water. Concrete is a mixture of Portland cement, sand, water and gravel.

Cement is best for painting, for surfacing a leak or concrete wall, or for holding together fragments.

Concrete is used for foundations and floors, sidewalks, driveways and walls.

Measure for Shovel  
Mortar — a third term you'll

run across — is Portland cement, sand and hydrated lime. The lime keeps the mixture from setting too fast, makes it easier to use.

If you are using small amounts, cement can be premixed, concrete and mortar.

For larger jobs purchase the individual ingredients and mix them yourself. Measurements are always given in terms of cubic feet. A bag of Portland cement contains one cubic foot. A measuring box will be an aid in measuring the other material. Four boards fastened together to make a square 12 inches on all sides and 1/2 inch deep will do the work accurately.

Measure carefully. After you've worked with concrete for a while you'll be able to measure the ingredients by the shovel. But in the beginning, measure everything accurately.

Mix dry ingredients first. A concrete floor, drive or sidewalk is best if you must work on dirt. Cover it with tar paper or some other smooth, heavy covering. Or work up the mixture in a wheelbarrow.

It's too wet. If space refuse to fill with mixture when it is troweled, then the mixture is too dry.

Concrete must be poured within a half hour of the time it is mixed. Once it's poured, level the mixture with a strike board — a straight edge board that is held against the top of the form. Slide it along so the concrete will be left level with the top of the form. When the film of water is gone from the surface smooth with a wood float. For a very smooth surface use a steel trowel after the wood float. Don't use the steel trowel if you want a slightly rough, non-slip surface.

## Trim Repair Bills; Check Before Call

UREANA, Ill., Sept. 22 (AP)—Before you call for estimates on trim or other laundry equipment, double-check the equipment. Mrs. Ethel Stapp, University of Illinois home economics instructor, says she may be overlooking a simple cause of trouble.

Check whether the electric plug is in the wall correctly. If you have a gas dryer, be sure the gas is on and the pilot is lit. Is there a hot line on the dryer breaker? Are both water faucets turned on for the washer? Are hoses free of kinks?

Are washers and dryers set on washers, especially, check motor-protection reset button. Is the lid for door thermal device closed? Also be certain drain hoses and hot trap are clean and in place. Check the vent duct. Is the vent duct clear? If you have a condenser-type dryer, is the fan-out turned on?

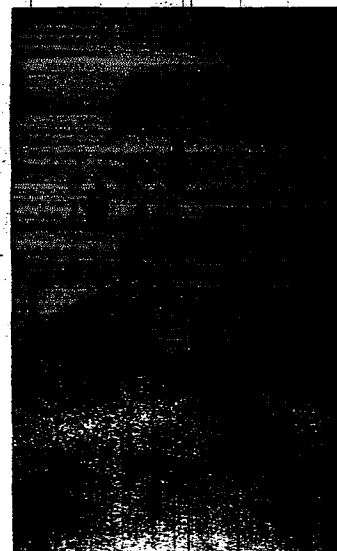

### Gutter Systems Need Proper Care

If you think that gutters and downspouts are unimportant, so far as periodic maintenance is concerned, remember that the investment in gutters for a single home may run several hundred dollars.

If you think that you can do without them should they rust and fall apart, consider the foundation plantings around your house that would be ruined and the possible danger to foundation and basement.

With a little periodic work all gutters will last a long time. Stainless steel, copper, aluminum and galvanized metal are the materials you are likely to encounter, although the first two are not very common today. If you were to replace them, steel and copper would cost the most and the others would follow.

Respective to Best: The most expensive material is also the best. But even the cheapest, galvanized metal, will last a lifetime if properly installed and cared for.

To make the gutters last they must be kept clean. The debris; be coated on the inside with an asphalt-soluble paint; be painted on the outside, insulating against rust. And water does not collect, and is fastened with materials made of the same metal.

Check Metal: If you use metal, make certain that it is the same metal the gutters are made of. If you use any of the plastic metals (aluminum, steel, etc.) again make certain that the metals match.

Check Holes: Be sure to check the gutters while the weather is still warm. Not only is it easier, but gutters should be put in shape before winter. Gutters can be made of canvas, burlap, or roofing combined with layers of asphalt paint. Or you can use some of the modern glass fibers and resins often sold for auto body repair.

Use Wire Break: When you check the gutters, take along a wire brush to clear away twigs, leaves, snot and other dirt. Gutters are loose re-nail them. Carefully fit the shingle under which the hanger is fastened. All the old nail holes and cover the new nail head with asphalt paint.

Check the Box: The box type are fastened by driving spikes through the front of the gutter into the back board at the rear. Sometimes re-nailing is called for. Check the board at the back of the gutter to see that it isn't split.



### Mud Room Helps Keep Room Clean

One housewife has offered a solution to the problem of keeping the home clean when children come in from playing.

She suggests that the home should include a room in the basement or at the rear entrance where the children may be cleaned up in clothes and all. This room would be an over-sized shower cabinet with a number of fittings that spray water from all directions.

A mud room is simply another bathroom at the rear entrance of the home or in the basement. If the entrance to the basement is through the back door, the room could be located in the garage.

In addition to keeping the children clean, the mud room also helps to prevent dirt from being tracked into the house.

**Shoes Going to Take Off Pounds**

By WALTER LOGAN  
**NEW YORK, Sept. 22**—Men's clothes over the years have grown increasingly lighter in weight to the point where suit, shirt, tie, belt, undershirt and socks weigh only three pounds. Heavy wing-tip brogue shoes are the exception.

Three pounds is a job of leather and American shoe manufacturers have tried to make the many million food pounds of energy were being wasted each year by men plodding around the country in heavy shoes. Now they have changed that.

The National Shoe Institute, which represents the American manufacturers, reports the trend this fall is for a lighter weight, often in the same traditional styles, but with styling concepts borrowed freely from England's famous bootmakers.

The Institute's Lynn Farnol reports these major trends:

- A trimmer and slimmer look achieved through a tapered but not pointed toe, elastic around the top to hug the foot, and a classic goring beneath the tongue or on side panels of alpins to eliminate gaps and make them sit snugly.
- A high rising tongue on slip-

ons to give an unbroken expanse of leather — the look of safety shoe. Some of these "high rising" shoes are perfectly plain, but there also is considerable use of a perforated bit — the old goring little — to achieve the same effect.

- Leather wing-tip brogues. The perforations, heart or diamond shaped, are made in the leather of the forepart rather than in a super-imposed shell. Cordovans also have undergone a transformation — they are now light and flexible.

— "Square toes." They aren't really square but are slightly more square than usual and were first shown by such famous London bootmakers as McAfee, Tusek and Peale brothers. A variation is the "oblique chisel" in which the squared-off toe slopes back slightly from the big toe to give a more natural shape.

Farnol also comments on the growing use of the patent leather Edwardian pump, especially by college students, worn with or without formal evening wear.

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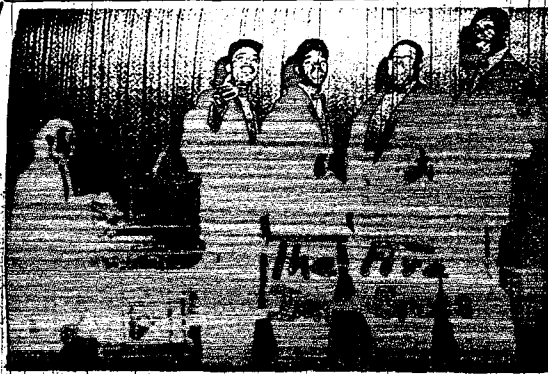

For book shelves that expand as the student's library grows, consider the hanging variety. They also eliminate the need for stooping to see titles or get at

books on the bottom shelf.

The newest hanging shelves, available finished or unfinished, look into hutch-like dots on vertical metal rods attached to the wall. The rods hold six to eight shelves which can be adjusted one at a time, as needed.

Lighting engineers say the best lamps for the bedroom study are wall-mounted fixtures that swing out to throw light on the desk or reading corner from directly overhead. The same fixtures make for comfortable reading in bed.
