TUCKER'S NATIONAL 'Remember Those Tranquil Days of Hitler?' WHIRLIGIG

By J. F. TERROST WASHINGTON—While Gov. Nelson Rockefeller rehearses his presidential ambitions in New York and Richard Nixon keeps the Democratic edge in California, the long-haired candidate has his eye on another pair of Republicans...

One, of course, is the sun-tanned senator from Arizona, Barry Goldwater. The second is the rumpled, ex-Marine candidate from Maryland, Secretary James Mitchell. Since politics is a human science, these two might just might wind up with the presidential office of the 1964 governing races.

To do it, they will help from two unwitting helpmates: Mayor Robert Wagner, New York, who raked up a surprising Democratic primary victory over Tammany hallion and former GOP Gov. Goodwin Knight, California, who says he will run again this year, Nixon or no...

MORNING LINE-UP—Here's the form sheet, and the ending is no more unbelievable than Lyndon Johnson, ending up as John Kennedy's vice president last year.

On the surface, Rockefeller would seem to have New York lined up for a big governorship majority next year. The factions and feuds of the Democratic majority battle in New York City...

But this reckoning without President Kennedy's interest in keeping New York secure for his own reelection bid in 1964. So he will help the Democratic candidate, Rockefeller, who had disclaimed enough to be proclaimed if the Democrats badly but substantial enough to be claimed by Nixon.

Kennedy scored impressively in the GOP areas of New York state last fall and clinched his victory in New York City where the Democrats normally battle in larger cities...

NIXON'S POSITION—In California, the smart money assumes Nixon will run and that he will defeat Gov. Edmund G. Brown handily. But two sticky attacks...

Nixon might not run, a development that would raise eyebrows here and would call for a new script. Discouraging this notion, however, it is obvious Nixon must announce his intentions quickly...

MEANWHILE, back at the ranch, Goldwater can't get on the air, coming his efforts to conservative words of Goldwater. He is in position to capitalize on any tumbles by Rockefeller and Nixon...

RAISING STARS—Mitchell seems destined to rock politically by winning the New Jersey gubernatorial election. Gov. Robert Meyner is unable to run after eight years in office.

Mitchell is respected in major labor circles. What he lacks in appeal for conservatives, the more he has in appeal for liberals. A Catholic, he could be just the man to lure back the Republican share of the religious vote...

Given the long odds, could there be a Goldwater-Nixon ticket? It would be no stranger than the JFK and LBJ ticket.

Fallout From Russ A-Tests Due Sometime Next Spring

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP)—Scientists expect most of the fallout from the Soviet atomic tests to settle on the East Coast by next spring.

The Soviet atomic tests, which began in February, will not be surprising if next spring's fallout sets a new record. The present mark was set by the Russians in 1958.

What Dr. Lester Machin of the weather bureau calls "the greatest fallout ever recorded" occurred in March, April, May and June of 1958. It came from the Soviet tests that started in March.

This year's Russian tests started a month earlier and continued at a pace which threatened to surpass the 1958 rate.

What humanity will suffer from this radioactive contamination imposed upon it by Russia is not known. Science so far has been unable to detect and measure whatever damage is done to man by low radiation doses such as those normally associated with world-wide test fallout.

This radiation is equal to the disappearing point compared with the instantaneous radiation from an exploding bomb or that from quickly descending "local fallout."

Local fallout in wartime could spray a few miles down wind from the explosion, radiation exposure amounting in an hour to thousands of times the dosage received from test fallout over a period of years.

The Soviet test fallout in the spring of 1960 increased by about 50 per cent the amount of strontium 90 deposited on the United States by all previous nuclear, Russian and British tests.

The 1961 Russian tests, if they prove comparable to those of October 1959, could build up strontium 90 contamination of the United States by 30 per cent above present levels.

Scientists are not agreed whether fallout—strontium 90—can cause cancer in animals. It may also cause cancer in a wild bird.

Another long-lasting product of bomb tests, cesium 137, is more widely distributed in the atmosphere and so can subject the reproductive organs to radiation.

There may or may not be a dose level below which strontium 90 can do no bodily harm. Scientists are not agreed whether it is safe to eat a wild bird.

But most biologists believe no amount of radiation is too small to cause mutations in the cells that hit the cells of heredity. From the standpoint of man as a species, this is the worst menace

New Formula Considered to Guide Christian Unity Move

A new and dramatic formula is being considered to guide the movement toward Christian unity.

It would make a believer at home in any church anywhere, no matter what his denomination, without necessitating organizational merger.

The provisions, drawn up at the proposed general assembly of the World Council of Churches in New Delhi, India.

Up to now, the council has not guided the kind of interdenominational unity it advocates—whether an undefined spiritual goodwill, structural merger, or wider cooperation, all of which have figured in the movement.

"The time is coming, and now is when the recognized fathers of men must decide to fish or cut bait on this issue," says the Rev. Dr. J. Robert Nelson, a U. S. Methodist member of the commission that drafted the proposed new formula.

It would commit all churches holding the "one apostolic faith," preaching the same gospel and sharing the same bread "to full communion, including the development of each other's baptism and ministry in every local community.

It also would commit the various churches to speak together when necessary, and to recognize their unity to all churches containing Christ in all ages and places.

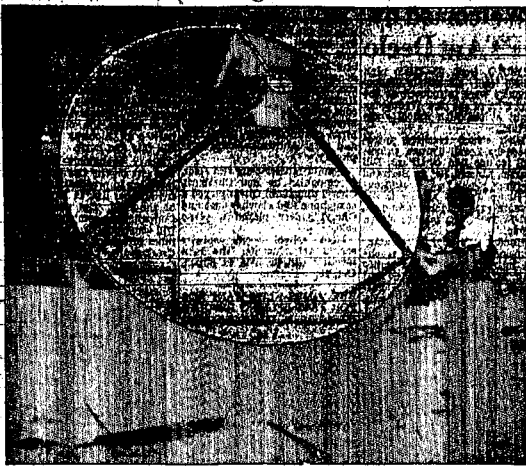

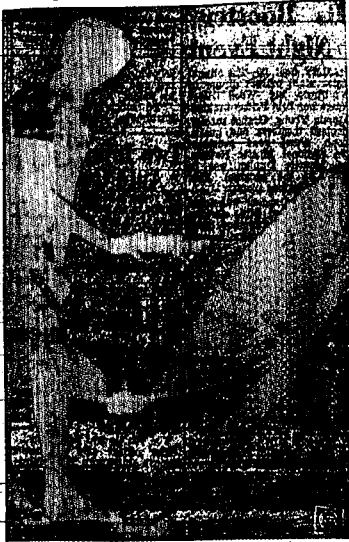

What's Cooking? Solar Power for Cooking, Electrical Power

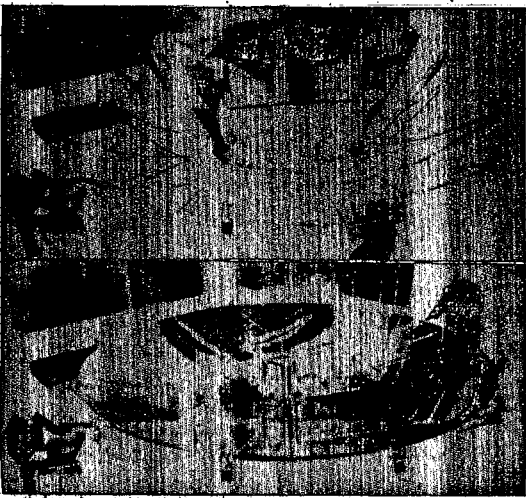


Sun energy for electric plants.

Tapping the sun's energy to solve humanity's ever-increasing need for power and heat is a project receiving increasing attention from researchers. The rotating sun reflector, shown above, concentrates enough heat at its focal point—handle of the umbrella-like device—to cook without other fuel. This latest solar stove was shown at the U. N. food and agriculture organization conference in Rome. Electricity manufactured from the energy of the sun, at left, above, is purpose of this solar-electric power plant. Eight-foot saucer-shaped mirror focuses 840 degrees of heat on the thermoelectric generator positioned above the mirror, resulting in 20 watts of useful power. The device promises relatively inexpensive power plants for underdeveloped lands. At left, shown in folded and unfolded positions, is a "space flower" which could be packed in nose of a rocket during a trip into space. Unfolded, it would focus the sun's heat for generating electricity to power the instruments in a satellite.

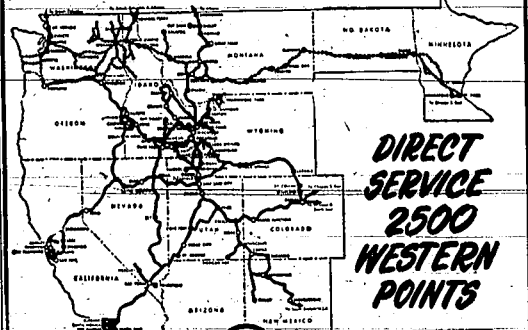

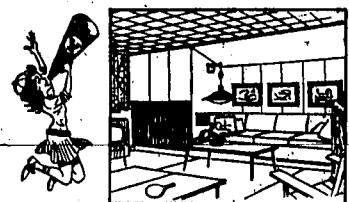

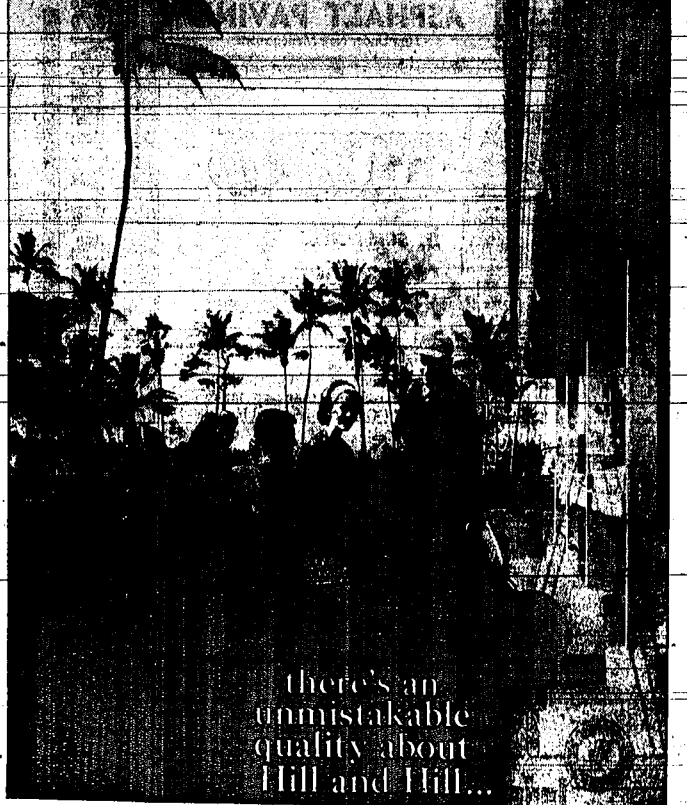

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP)—The Senate Saturday gave final congressional approval to a two-year extension of the Mexican farm labor program.

The measure, approved 41 to 37, now goes to the White House for President Kennedy's signature.

The legislation would extend until Dec. 31, 1963, the program permitting the importation of Mexican farm laborers.

It would tighten up the program by stipulating that the Mexicans could be used only for seasonal labor and only if American workers were not available.

The Senate approved the bill after a two-day fight over efforts to restore a provision that would require braceros be paid 10 per cent of the average farm wages in the state where they are employed.

This feature was in the original Senate bill but was knocked out by Senate-house conferees.

Indict Russia For A-Tests, Solon Urges

WASHINGTON, Sept. 25 (AP)—Assistant senate Democratic leader Hubert H. Humphrey has urged that Russia be indicted before the United Nations for resuming fallout-producing nuclear tests.

Humphrey said yesterday the United States or some other nation should indict the Soviet Union for a "flagrant violation of human rights and the purpose of the U.N. charter."

"These nuclear tests in the atmosphere are a threat to the health and well-being of people and nations," he said in a radio interview.

"Aggression today is not just the movement of armies across borders. Aggression can be the flow of radioactive debris in the atmosphere."

Humphrey predicted that Russia would set off a dramatic "blast" to end its current test series and then "insist that every-one stop testing."

Such a fallout-producing explosion, detonated in an area where radioactive debris would fall heavily on America, he said, "could be an act of aggression upon the United States."

"And we ought to be saying that," he added. "We ought to be developing our legal case around this, because I think it is going to happen."
