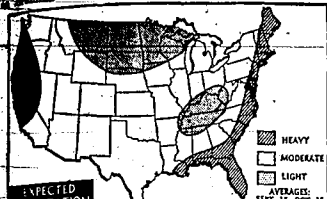

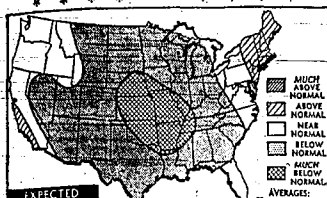

### Actor Frank Fay, 62, Dies

SANTA MONICA, Calif., Sept. 28 (AP)—Frank Fay, 62, former Broadway vaudeville comedian and radio star, died last night. Death came at 11:55 p.m. in St. John's hospital while he was semi-conscious. A spokesman said Fay had spoken a few words to his nurse five minutes prior to his death. The nurse and a doctor were at his side.

A spokesman said the actor suffered from an internal rupture of the abdominal aorta. He entered the hospital last August.

Born in San Francisco Nov. 17, 1898, Fay made his stage debut at 8 with part in "Que Vadis" in Chicago.

His greatest success came in the '40s when he made a side-splitting comeback in the Pygmy prize-winning Broadway hit, "Harvey."

### Members of Historical Society Tour Pioneer Trail

### More Than 125 People Tour Sites of Oregon Trail In Glenns Ferry Area

More than 125 members of the Twin Falls County Historical society and their friends Sunday toured the sites of the Overland Stage company of Glenns Ferry and in the direction they could see the pioneer three island crossing of Snake river. Almost 122 years ago to the day five other people had stood on the same spot and looked at the same islands. They had crossed them only a short time before. They drove there in a wagon, the first one to continue on and reach Fort Boise. They were Marcus Whitman, a 32-year-old Presbyterian minister, physician and pioneer; his wife, Narcissa, 28 years old; the Rev. Henry Spaulding and his wife, and W. H. Gray. The year was 1835. This historic point was one of several stops made Sunday by the society group on a field tour of the area to see first hand the old trails—trapper, packers, Oregon, freight and stage—which abound in the district. This modern day trail group was led by Frank C. Clarke, Glenns Ferry pioneer and trails

author, assisted by O. A. Carson, Twin Falls residents present. Clarke pointed out that both the Whitman party and the Fremont group passed but a few miles from the location of that community. Other points visited in this locally near Glenns Ferry included the Glenn ranch north of town. In the meadow of this ranch the pioneers rested and watered stock after making the Three Island crossing. Another visitation point was the Herron

reservoir, the second to be constructed in the area and but a short distance from the Fremont trail in the canyon above. The tour concluded at the famed Cold Springs ranch now owned by Gilbert C. Walker. The ranch is located some 15 miles northwest of Glenns Ferry and once was the site of the Cold Springs stage station of the Overland Stage company. Clarke pointed out the original site of the station as the group neared the ranch headquarters house. Mr. and Mrs. Walker, who celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary on Sunday Sept. 24, however, when Mrs. Walker died his body was exhumed and taken to Mountain Home and both are buried in the cemetery there. days of the ranch. He said he was born on the ranch in a log cabin which formerly stood in a meadow below the present home. His father, Charles H. Walker, had been a station agent supervisor for Overland Stage line and was born in Danville, Ky., about 1830. He fought on the side of the South in the war between the states. His mother was born in England about 1817. In his capacity as agent and accompanied by his wife, the elder Walker worked at various stations including such famous ones as Ketchikan, Ullah, and Humboldt, Wells, New Wells, Nev. He also supervised and had visited many times the Deeset station, located on the cliff overlooking Rock Creek just northwest of the Twin Falls city limits. When he came to Cold Springs, he filed on the land. Later he and two sons, Gilbert Walker and the late Paul H. Walker went into the timber and bought the property above the stage station site. This property included the present home which was built by Gus Glenn after which Glenns Ferry was named and purchased from a man named Standfield. When the elder Walker died he was buried on the home place. Later, however, when Mrs. Walker died his body was exhumed and taken to Mountain Home and both are buried in the cemetery there. With Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert

Walker as guides, the four members were escorted through the old home, the main portion of which was built in 1876. The rock walls, 18 inches thick, were erected without a foundation of a gravel bed. Mud, mixed with horse and deer hair, was used as mortar to hold the rocks in place. They have shown no deterioration to the present day. The original rock home, known as "the fort," served as a haven for settlers in case of Indian attacks which never materialized. A large bell was mounted on top of the house to ring out the alarm if necessary. At one time a well, now covered, was dug in the corner of the house where a bedroom is now located. The bell serves as an ornament above a cold water spring in the backyard. Among historic articles displayed by Mr. and Mrs. Walker was a 50 caliber pistol which was carried by his father throughout the time he was fighting in the Civil war. The tour had originally been scheduled for late in August but hot weather caused those in charge to postpone it until September. As a result ideal weather prevailed. Arrangements for the trek were completed over a period of more than six weeks by Helen Porterfield, Twin Falls, program chairman; Wayne Walker, Buhl, assistant program chairman, and Mrs. Hugh Boone, Twin Falls.

### School Vote Is Approved By Trustees

Voters in the Sept. 18 \$235,000 school bond election were canvassed Monday night at a special meeting of the Twin Falls school board. Final tabulation showed that 3,347 votes were cast for the school bond and 832 were cast against the question. These were the same figures reported in the Times-News after the election. The vote was 78 per cent in favor of the bond, a two-thirds majority being required for passage. A formal resolution by the trustees declared the election approved issuance of bonds. The board decided to add one or more school buses to the 19 now serving the school district. General re-roofing of the buses was cited as reason for the increase. Guy Erned England showed a petition signed by parents residing on or near Falls avenue asking for school bus service. Trustees questioned whether the area is outside the one and a half mile radius from Harrison school required for bus service. No action was taken on the petition.

### South Leaders Praise Speech

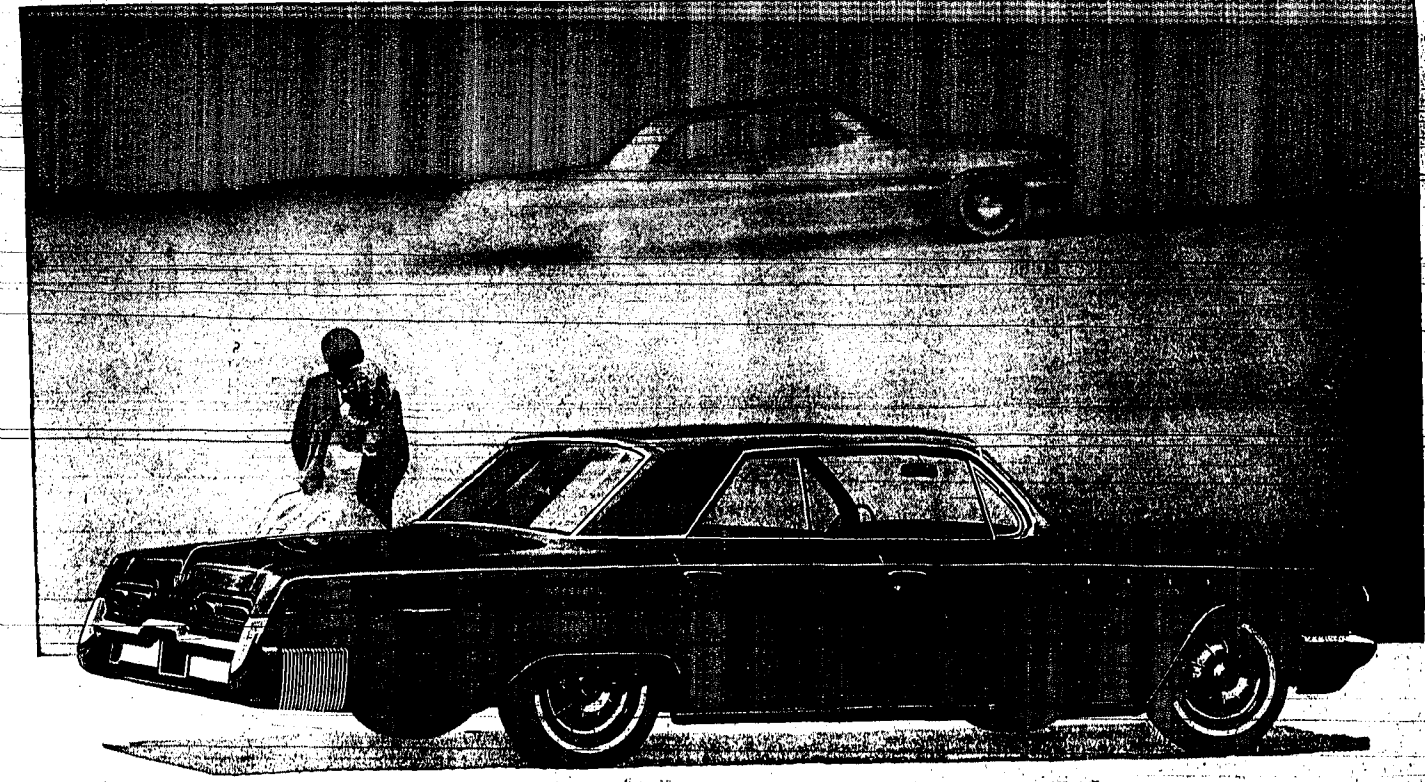

### Sport Series Stressed for '62 Chrysler

Chrysler's 1962 models which are new in design, improved in performance and unchanged in size, are on the new '62 with emphasis on the auto maker's slogan.

"There will be no junior edition of Chrysler," says C. E. Sorenson, president of Chrysler Corp., in a statement. "The new models are the result of a policy of continuous improvement during the 1962 model year. We gained in sales by introducing the policy in the cars that have an additional number of sound engineering improvements."

Sorenson said the most important change in the Chrysler line-up is the expansion of the 300 line of high performance cars, which has become available in a lower price range. There also will be a new carrying on the new 300 limited production models.

Chrysler '60s will be available in a choice of three engine ratings up to 280 horsepower. In production will be a 405-horsepower short ram induction engine.

Improvements in all three engines — New Yorker, 300 and Newport — include a new compact transmission, engine valves which provide better cooling, surge choke operation, quietness, a new, quieter starting motor, lubricant-sealed chassis tuning, and more efficient power braking system, the company said.

Chrysler offers 15 models in 1962. The Newport series features a two-door hardtop, convertible, four-door sedan, four-door hardtop and a six- and nine-passenger four-door hardtop station wagon. The New Yorker is offered as a four-door sedan, a four-door hardtop and a six and eight-passenger four-door hardtop station wagon. The 300 H will be offered as a convertible and two-door hardtop.

Chrysler contends 1962 engines it offers the widest choice of engines in its history: 205 horsepower 361 cubic inch V8 with a two-barrel carburetor to a 380-horsepower, 413 cubic inch V8 with twin four barrel carburetors.

Chrysler has introduced a light-weight automatic transmission, to replace the TorqueFlite transmission used on Chrysler cars since 1957. Complete with torque converter, the new transmission weighs approximately 80 pounds less than its predecessor.

It reduced size makes possible a lower and narrower transmission tunnel, thereby increasing passenger room, the company says.

Other mechanical improvements include a new transmission oil filter which increases oil change interval to 32,000 miles, a change interval that has increased from 2,000 to 4,000 miles, and prelubricated and factory sealed fittings, making it possible to drive 100 miles on a green major chassis point lubrication, according to the company.

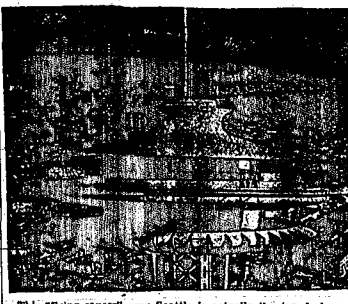

### Cautious Optimism Is Felt For Ending Berlin Crisis

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Sept. 26 (AP)—There was a feeling of cautious optimism here today concerning the possibility of an eventual solution of the Berlin crisis on terms short of war. It was a fragile mood which could be dispelled easily by one warlike statement on either side of the iron curtain or a single incident along the tense East-West border in Germany.

It stemmed not from any single development but reflected a combination of circumstances which have removed some of the small of gunpowder from the air during the past few days.

Indications from Moscow, relayed by Belgian Deputy Premier and Foreign Minister Paul-Henri Spaak, that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev may be willing to ease his terms for negotiating the explosive issue.

Trial balloons in Berlin and Washington hinting at greater "flexibility" in the U. S. attitude toward dealing with communist East Germany.

President Kennedy's emphasis, in his address to the United Nations, on the many possibilities to a peaceful settlement if Russia will talk on terms of "mutual respect and concern for the rights of others."

The President's warning that the allies would use nuclear weapons if necessary to defend their position in and access to West Berlin asked out the hard core of the East-West negotiations. Secretary of State Dean Rusk beyond that he left a broad field for negotiation. "We are not committed to any rigid formula."

Secretary of State Dean Rusk hopes within a couple of days to have a clearer idea as to whether full-scale East-West negotiations on Berlin and Germany would be fruitful. He expects on Wednesday to hold his second conference on the subject with Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko.

By that time Gromyko should have the Khrushchev's reactions to his report on his four and one-half-hour session with Rusk last Thursday.

British Foreign Secretary Lord Home held his own Berlin crisis conference with Gromyko late yesterday at the Park Avenue headquarters of the British delegation to the United Nations.

Lord Home, in a 46-minute talk with the Russian official, reinforced Rusk's earlier warning that the West would not negotiate on the narrow terms proposed by Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev—a peace treaty with

# Finley Continues Feud With Writer

**KANSAS CITY, Sept. 26 (AP)—Charles O. Finley, owner of the Kansas City Athletics, has asked baseball commissioner Ford Frick to withdraw an apology Frick made to Ernie Mehl, sports editor of the Kansas City Star, "both personally and in the name of baseball."**

**Finley made the request in a 20-page letter addressed to Frick and dated Sept. 5. The Athletics' office said Monday that copies of the letter were distributed to season ticket holders and people on a mailing list supplied by the Chamber of Commerce.**

**Finley accused Frick of failing to investigate before making the apology and suggested that under the major league agreement the commissioner should have taken action against Mehl. The apology stemmed from Finley's action in publicly making a "poison pen award" to Mehl after the sports editor had written several articles criticizing Finley's handling of the baseball club.**

**The incident occurred at the start of a doubleheader at Municipal Stadium here Aug. 20. On Aug. 23 Frick told the Associated Press in New York: "Such things do not belong in baseball and I called Mehl this morning and apologized to him, both personally and in the name of baseball."**

**Frick said he had asked Finley for a full report on the incident. In a covering letter sent to season ticket holders and members of the Chamber of Commerce mailing list, and dated Sept. 21, Finley said: "I met last Thursday with Mr. Frick for two hours in Chicago, at which time he stated to me that he did not apologize personally to Mr. Mehl. Mr. Frick further stated that since the press had quoted him as apologizing personally to Mr. Mehl, that he would take steps to correct this misunderstanding."**

**Finley wrote Frick: "If any damage was done to baseball it was done by Mr. Mehl. He is the one who is responsible for the damage to baseball. Integrity, veracity and general ability of a major league club owner. My 'suggestion' thought that the appropriate action in this situation might well have been dictated by... the major league agreement, which clearly permits the commissioner to take steps against persons other than league members and players whose conduct adversely affects the game of baseball..."**

**"If any apology is due, it should come to me, because I have done no more wrong than have myself been the victim of one of the most serious attacks in baseball history."**

**In New York, Frick refused to comment on whether he had apologized to Mehl. Regarding his talk with Finley, the commissioner said: "I told him it was all right to tell the side of the story to Kansas City but that the rest of the ballpark was in bad taste and not to be condoned."**

# Lopez to Return As Sox Manager; Trades Expected

**CHICAGO, Sept. 26 (AP)—Al Lopez signed Monday to pilot the Chicago White Sox for another year, despite having one of the worst seasons of his managerial career. His salary was announced but reportedly it is near \$50,000. Until the Sox finished third last year, Lopez never had managed a team lower than second place. This year the Sox will finish fourth but this doesn't dishearten Lopez.**

**"Sure, I'm disappointed—in our club's performance, but I don't think it means we don't have a good club," he said.**

**"Wholesale trades? I wouldn't say that, but I think we have good trading material."**

**Lopez, the only manager to crack New York Yankee supremacy since 1949, with pennants winners at Cleveland in 1954 and Chicago in 1959, is going to shoot for the flag in 1958.**

**"Why not?" says the patient manager. "We have an excellent nucleus."**

**Three strong-arm pitchers, several proven stars and a few youngsters comprise the nucleus which Lopez and recently named general manager Ed Short believe will pull the Sox back into pennant contention.**

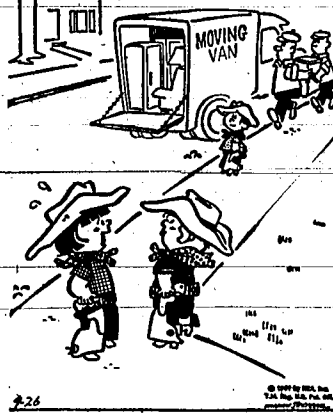

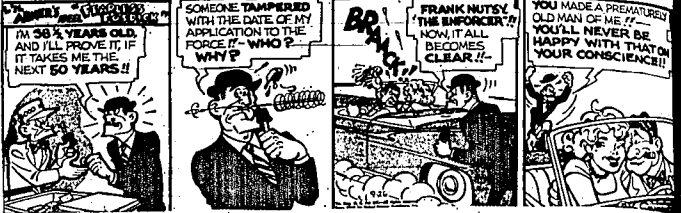

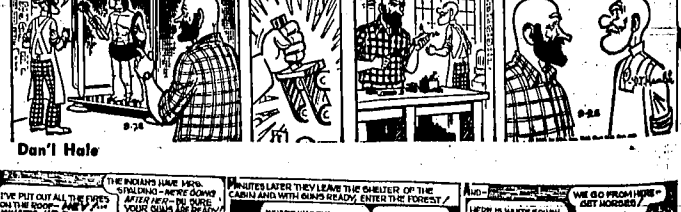
