John A. McCone Picked To Replace Allen Dulles As New U.S. CIA Chief



John A. McCone, veteran of the defense department and atomic energy commission, was named today to replace Allen Dulles when he steps down as CIA director next month. The announcement was made by President Kennedy from Newport, R. I., where he is spending a week's vacation.

NEWPORT, R. I., Sept. 27 (UPI)—President Kennedy announced today that Allan W. Dulles will step down next month after eight years of cold war service as chief of the central intelligence agency. He picked John A. McCone, Republican veteran of the defense department and atomic energy commission, to replace Dulles. Kennedy praised Dulles for "courageous and selfless public service. Dulles in turn called McCone, the last AEC administrator, as "the ideal choice" to head this nation's super-secret intelligence operations. In the final two years of his quiet direction of security operations, Dulles had come under both Democratic and Republican attacks. The CIA's role in the ill-fated Cuban landing of last April and the CIA's involvement in the abortive Kennedy conference in 1960, Kennedy interrupted a 1960-1961 vacation here and summoned Dulles to the White House for private talks followed by his public personal announcement of the changeover.

Stormy '62 Congress Is Expected; Session Ends

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (UPI)—Leaders of the 87th congress agreed today that President Kennedy's program faces far tougher going in election-year 1962 than in the "honeymoon" session of his new administration. Congress adjourned for the year at 6:21 a.m. (EDT) with the senate raging at house tactics on the final bill—and with Republicans and Democrats arguing over the "accomplishments" or "failures" of the first session. But members of both parties agreed that these squabbles would be minor compared to the fireworks of war as plans next year when Kennedy sends the election-minded legislators a series of controversial proposals.

U.S. Underestimates Reds, Speaker Says

"The threat of communism is real and greatly underestimated by most people today," declared Dr. Frank Schick, professor of political science at the University of Utah, during the luncheon meeting held prior to the closing session Tuesday of a two-day nurses health mobilization workshop at the Turf club. Dr. Schick reviewed the countries taken over by communism and pointed out their differences from this country. He mentioned that England, France and the Latin American countries are "illiterate shabby" and "backward" and that agitators who stress American hate. He urged that we do "everything" to get away with price fixing, strikes, recessions and inactivity of basing our salvation on education and being unwilling to provide for it.

Snake River Water Level Lower Again

IDAHO FALLS, Sept. 27 (AP)—Greater reservoirs which provide irrigation water for the Snake river plains hold about 120,000 fewer acre-feet of water than they did a year ago, Watermaster H. C. Eagle reported today.

In a report near the end of the irrigation season, he said the water stored in six reservoirs was valued at 443,200 acre-feet, compared with 574,160 acre-feet in the same reservoirs a year ago. He listed these figures: Jackson lake, 4,470 acre-feet this year; Pallas lake, 271,000 and 29,000; Henrys lake, 38,000 and 45,700; Island Park, 13,000 and 14,500; American Falls, 52,370 and 108,000; Lake Walcott, 54,500 and 34,260.

Tuberculosis Drug Proven As Protector

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—Isoniazid, a drug used to treat tuberculosis, has proven 80 per cent effective in preventing the disease among people who have been in contact with newly discovered tuberculosis cases.

Reporting this yesterday, Surgeon General Luther L. Terry of the public health service said the data was "evidence that the household contacts of newly discovered cases of tuberculosis can be protected at a time when their risk is highest."

The 80 per cent figure of effectiveness was shown in preliminary results of a study involving 25,000 household contacts of Isoniazid and the other half received dummy tablets.

Terry said the people in the study would be observed several more years to see if the protection continues.

PTA in Area Has Talk by Irish Pupil

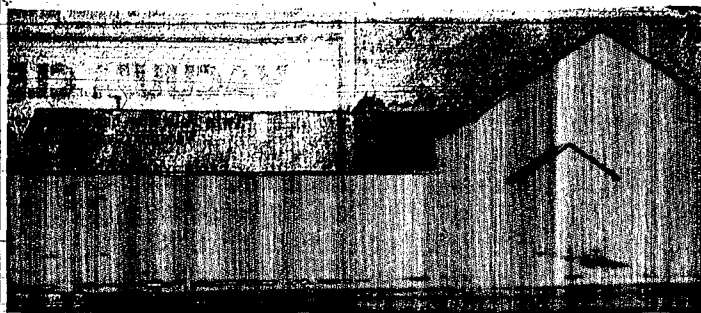

Models to Be Featured By Chevrolet

From a styling standpoint, the new Chevrolet reflects the standard Chevy styling, although the Chevrolet and Corvair will feature a number of appearance changes, the company says.

The new standard Chevrolet features a "crisp, tailored look" and a new metal grill work. The 1962 models have a new bumper and ornamentation, as well as new exterior colors. The General Motors division asserts.

The firm notes a number of mechanical changes and modifications in the 1962 line.

These are a new 321 cubic inch V8 engine, a new weight-saving power steering, automatic transmission and tire with advanced two-ply design.

The new V8 engine is rated at 150 horsepower. It replaces the 135 cubic-inch engine, except for use in heavy trucks. The perfect V8 engine is the 348, Chevrolet contends, but fuel economy and engine operating efficiency both are improved.

The redesigned powerplant will be used with the new V8 engine and both the four- and six-cylinder engines of the Chevy II.

Extensive use of aluminum saves 85 pounds of weight.

The new tires give improved fuel economy, and the new V8 engine retaining load-carrying ability, strength and durability of four-ply tires, the company claims.

Heads and built-in front seat belt anchors are standard equipment on all 1962 Chevrolet. A limited slip differential and air-conditioning also are available throughout the line of 22 passenger car models.

Continental Is Styled as 'Luxury Car'

Lincoln's Continental continues its "classic styling theme" in the 1962 models, but has added a series of luxury appointments and mechanical reliability features, the Ford Motor company announces.

"Change for the sake of change will not be characteristic of this luxury automobile," Ben D. Mills, Ford vice president and general manager of the Lincoln-Mercury division stated. "Instead of a different looking car each year, our goal is to make changes which will help us build as perfect a luxury automobile as possible."

Continental's styling continues to be enhanced in 1962 in the front by a new grille, a reshaped bumper and repositioned headlights set slightly forward. The rear grille-type design matches the new front grille, the company explains. From the side, the only appearance changes are the use of narrow band white sidewall tires and new wheel covers.

The company explains many engineering refinements are the result of Continental's mechanical reliability program. These include a new water-heated automatic shocker-rubber-coated-power window motors for rust resistance. Improved brakes and newly designed pistons for quieter engine operation.

To guard against rust, 250 pounds of galvanized steel are used in areas of the unitized body exposed to salt and moisture. The lower half of the body is dipped in a rust proofing paint at the assembly plant.

The new auto uses 23 per cent more sound deadening material in the floor area and the front according to the maker. Cables and hose openings are sprayed with a sealer and a spring-steel rear engine support absorbs vibrations from the driveline.

Car maintenance has been reduced by use of a two-year anti-rust in the radiator in addition to the 6,000-mile oil change and the 30,000-mile lubrication-free front suspension and steering built into the 1961 models, the manufacturer says.

Other improvements include a long-life front wheel alignment set at the factory, larger rear shock absorbers, was-impregnated liners for rear leaf springs and a plastic filler in the gas tank which keeps impurities from the fuel line, plus safety belt anchors for easy installation of seat belts.

The Lincoln Continental continues its 24,000-mile or two-year warranty, the manufacturer says. This enables dealers to offer their customers free replacement, including labor, of any part except tires or tubes defective in material or workmanship. Normal maintenance and routine repairs remain as excluded.

Ready To Construct Power Lines

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The Interior Department yesterday said it will speed construction of the basic backbone transmission lines needed to transmit Colorado river storage project power.

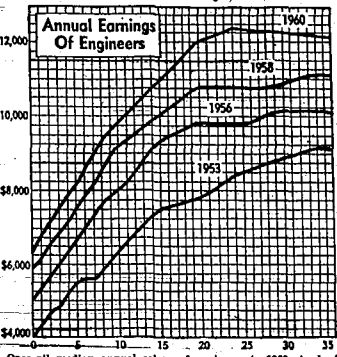
Interior issued the statement a few hours after congress approved a compromise bill which provides for federal construction of the transmission lines unless the secretary of the Interior finds it necessary and enters into agreements with private utilities.

"At the same time," Udall continued, "we will carry out the recommendation of the congress and conduct negotiations with all power suppliers in the West with respect to interconnections and wheeling delivery agreements between the basic backbone lines which are in the national interest and provide mutual advantage to all parties concerned."

Udall said that the fundamental dispute has been over the fact that both public agencies and private power companies will cooperate with the department to work out a transmission plan that will insure the economic growth of the Colorado basin, and promote the health of the entire power industry.

"The public works appropriation bill includes \$13,878,000 for lines to carry power from the upper Colorado dam."

Braking Altered For DC8 Planes

WASHINGTON, Sept. 27 (AP)—The Federal aviation agency (FAA) yesterday ordered all U.S. airlines flying DC8 jetliners to use new procedures for emergency runway landing in case of hydraulic failure.

The order followed several recent incidents in which DC8s without hydraulic brake fluid reversed off runways when pilots attempted to stop them, mostly by reversing their engines.

The FAA warned DC8 operators not to go into reverse thrust until all wheels are firmly on the ground. The agency also advised that the outboard engines not be reversed until crews are sure the inboard engine braking thrust is taking hold smoothly.

Pilots were cautioned further to check certain warning indicators before trying to reverse engines.

Put the fruit bars in school or factory lunch box, or serve for lunch or dinner at home. Top with a scoop of ice cream for festive affairs. For future use, make an extra batch, wrap in foil and store in the freezer.

Wheat Germ Fruit Nut Bars
 1/2 cup sifted all-purpose flour
 1/2 teaspoon baking powder
 1/2 teaspoon sugar
 1/2 teaspoon cinnamon
 1 cup (packed) lump-free brown sugar
 1 cup melted shortening or margarine
 1/2 cup honey
 1/2 cup chopped walnuts or pecans
 1/4 cup chopped mixed candied fruits

Confectioners' sugar if desired
 Sift together the flour, baking powder, salt and cinnamon. Stir in brown sugar and wheat germ. Beat eggs, shortening or oil and honey together well. Gradually add dry ingredients and mix well after each addition. Put in oven (350 degrees F.) until done, about 30 minutes. Cool on rack out into bars 2 1/2 inches long and 1 1/2 inches wide. Serve plain or with confectioners' sugar sifted over top.
