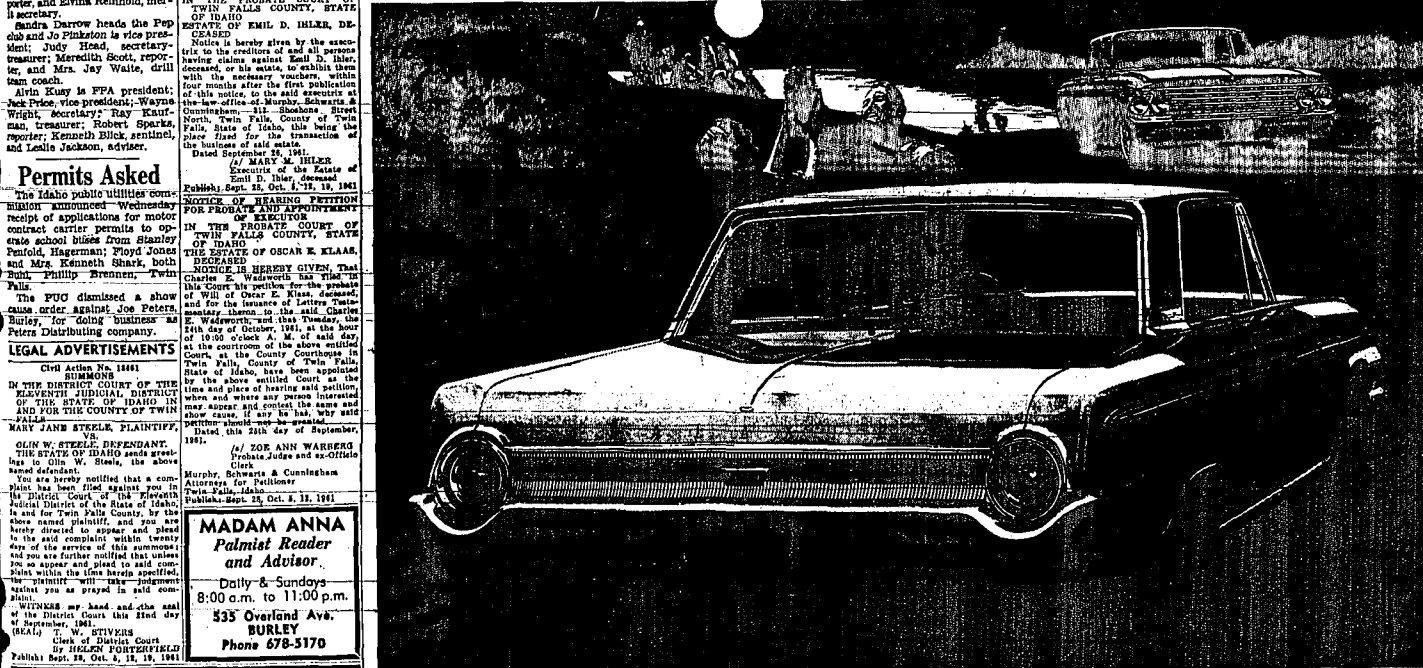

Reds' Threat Great Idaho Confab Told

SUN VALLEY, Sept. 28 (AP)—A University of Utah political science professor here today said that the communist challenge really exists and is growing daily. Dr. W. S. Schick, in an address to the Northwest National Association of Statewide Training Councils, said the United States is in a "critical" position. He said the communist infiltration is a "major threat" to the American system. He said that Western Europe, which already has a large degree of socialism, then would find it difficult to join the communist bloc.

Bz-z-z

MALIBU, Calif., Sept. 28 (AP)—The first public demonstration of a jet-propelled rocket engine in space travel, was held yesterday. Scientists at Hughes Aircraft company's research laboratory put through its paces a small model rocket engine for less than a pound of thrust. They called it the ultimate "Bz-z-z" rocket. The engine, one that some day could send space craft hurtling at two million miles per hour. Engineers obtain their thrust by ejecting a stream of tiny subatomic particles—ions and electrons. The thrust is weak, but continuous. In space, where there is no resistance to propulsion, the tiny force would gradually accelerate a rocket to fantastic speeds.

State Slowly Fencing Off More Roads

BOISE, Sept. 28 (AP)—Idaho is gradually fencing off its highway system from motorists. About 100 miles of roads are now fenced, described as a hazard in high speed travel. But it still says it is considering to fence more of its roads. The fences will be removed completely. "There isn't any question," says George Bennett, state highway engineer, "but that the presence of cattle near unprotected highways is a menace." "But the problem of how to deal with it is a real one. It would cost us about five million dollars simply to fence the portion of the state highway system which now lacks fences. And that wouldn't be effective unless we were able, also, to provide cattle guards at high-speed crossings and drive entrances."

Total Loss Mounts to Near 7 Million In Mysterious Series of Art Thefts

PALERMO, Sicily, Sept. 28 (AP)—Known losses in a rash of major art thefts since the summer of 1945 soared toward the seven-million-dollar mark with a Sicilian nobleman disclosed this week as the latest victim. The prizes went the mysterious way of U. S., British and French troops.

Probe of Ship Blaze Opened

C., Sept. 28 (AP)—The coast guard today began an investigation into what caused a fire that engulfed a 600-foot tanker in a spectacular blaze that threatened much of the waterfront here Monday night. The danger of further fire outbreaks and the port was reopened on a restricted basis. The blaze on the tanker, owned Potomac of jet aviation touched off a fire that engulfed the vessel. The tanker continued burning more than 24 hours after the tanker was wrecked by terrific explosions Monday night. The blazed tanker itself, nothing more than a charred hulk of steel, was towed away from the port channel at the mouth of the Neuse river, very close to an aviation fuel supply terminal.

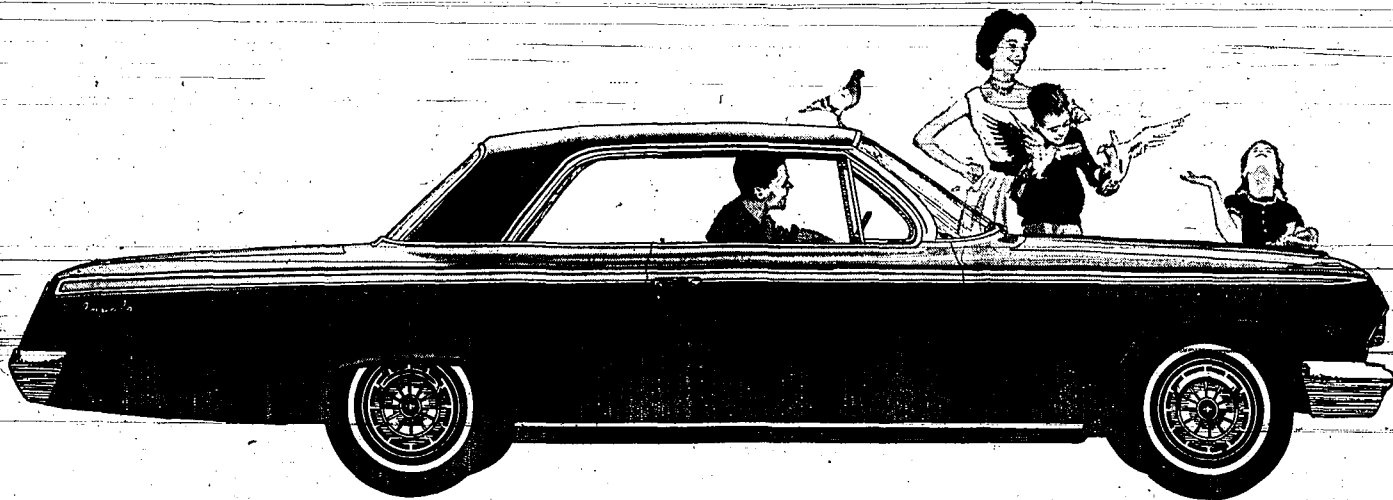

New Luxury Imperial for '62 Unveiled

The new Imperial retains its traditional 120-horsepower base, but features "new styling and significant engineering improvements," according to G. C. Briggs, corporate vice president and general manager of the Chrysler - Plymouth division, Chrysler Corporation.

The new luxury auto will go on display in dealer showrooms throughout the country Thursday, Sept. 28.

Improvements touted by the firm include more passenger room in the front compartment, a new, more compact and more powerful transmission, new power brakes, sealed front-end lubrication and "a variety of rich and colorful interior fabrics."

Power plant for the Imperial is a 418 cubic inch, 160-horsepower V8 engine.

Six models are offered by Imperial in 1962: The two-door Southampton hardtop in the Custom and Crown line; four-door hardtop in the Custom, Crown and LeBaron, and a convertible in the Crown line.

Additional front-compartment passenger room is the result of introduction of a new, smaller automatic transmission which replaces the old manual shift transmission in use since 1957. Height and width of the transmission has been measurably reduced, says Chrysler.

Improved power braking is obtained with a new vacuum unit providing better maximum power assist, the company claims. Adjustments between pedal and power unit have been maintained, thereby ensuring even greater consistency of operation.

Exterior colors are better, reports the auto maker, with only single-tone body color treatment available. Of 17 available colors, 12 are shades including a tone dubbed "Emberly Red."

Interior interiors have new fabric and color schemes. Wood trim predominate in door panels and seats. Fabrics have a "luxurious feel in appearance and superior feel in use," says Chrysler.

Interior's free-standing headlamps, introduced last year, accent the front area of the car. New, nacelle-type free-standing tailpipes mounted on each rear fender give "styling continuity in the tradition of past gleaming styling Imperial tailpipes," the maker contends.

"Adding a new touch of elegance" announces the company, "is a circular hood ornament in the form of a stylized eagle in sculptured metal mounted at the center of the leading edge of the hood. The hood metal drops down to divide fine-lined horizontal metal work in the newly-styled grill. The grill is framed on three sides by wide chrome moldings, and flanked on either side by the twin headlamps."

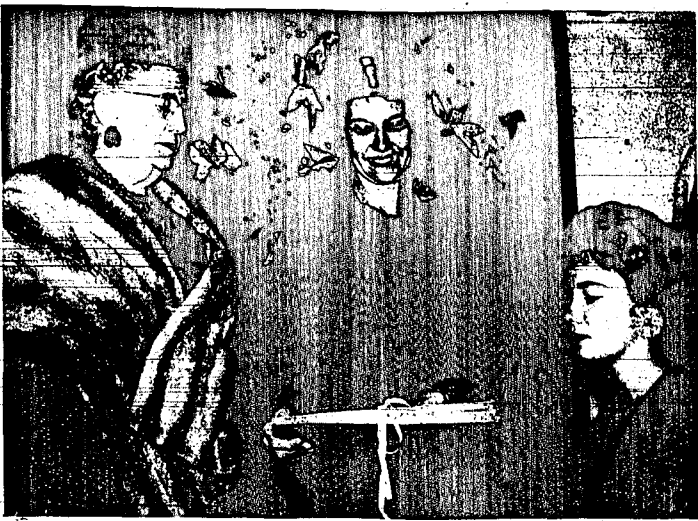

Adenauer or No Deal Party Says

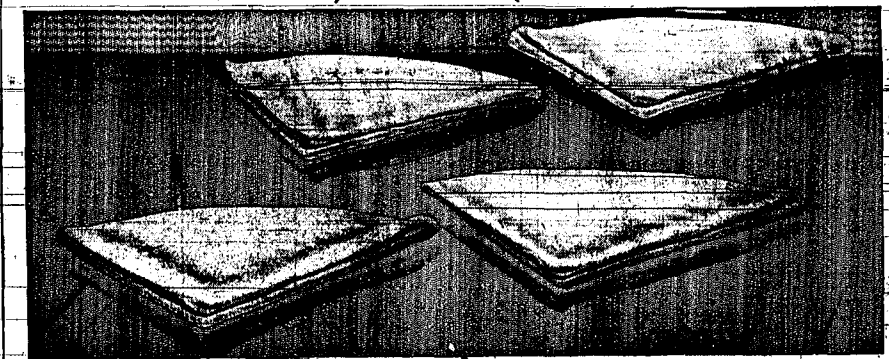

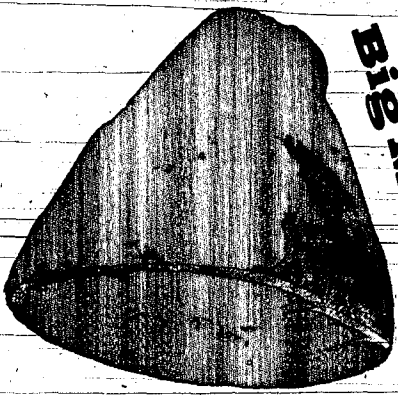

Up Education Quality, Save Money, Researcher Outlines

WASHINGTON, Sept. 28 (U)—Reading work for lagging students is a real breakthrough in the quality of public education could save the taxpayers millions of dollars a year, an official of the National Education association said yesterday.

Sam M. Lambert, director of the NEA's research division, said there are two obvious ways in which the schools could give the public more for its education dollar.

Let the brightest 15 to 20 percent of ninth graders complete their high school work in three years instead of four—a saving of roughly 200 million dollars for this group alone, and—

That is the way we organized back at the turn of the century, and we haven't changed much since," he said.

Studies have indicated, he said, that intensive remedial reading programs can move a pupil one full grade ahead in reading ability in one summer. Even if the lagging student needs three such summers of instruction, he said, such a program would more than pay for itself.

He suggested that all prospective teachers take four years of general education with some exposure to every field of human knowledge—including physics, chemistry and mathematics.

This would be followed by two solid years of what and how to teach.

Eggs are up a penny or so a dozen in some areas, but still still priced attractively.

Legs of lamb and veal also are featured items in parts of the East and Midwest, while fish features include scallops, seafile and perch fillets.

A fair variety of fresh fruits and vegetables are on tap in produce departments, offering the crop-

thrifty shopper a number of attractive buys.

Cabbage, onions and potatoes head the list of outstanding buys with the latter two especially attractive where they're available from nearby fields.

Sweet corn and tomatoes are still priced attractively.

Other plentiful items are carrots, endive, escarole, rutabagas, snap beans, sweet potatoes, celery, peppers, squash, cucumbers, beets, cauliflower, eggplant, mushrooms, radishes, spinach, parsnips and turnips. Lettuce bounced up into the fairly expensive category this week. Broccoli and parsley also are more costly.

Lemons and a wide variety of grapes are tops among fruit bargains. Pimp purple concord, green seedless, red ribiers and Tokays are among the big grape crop-

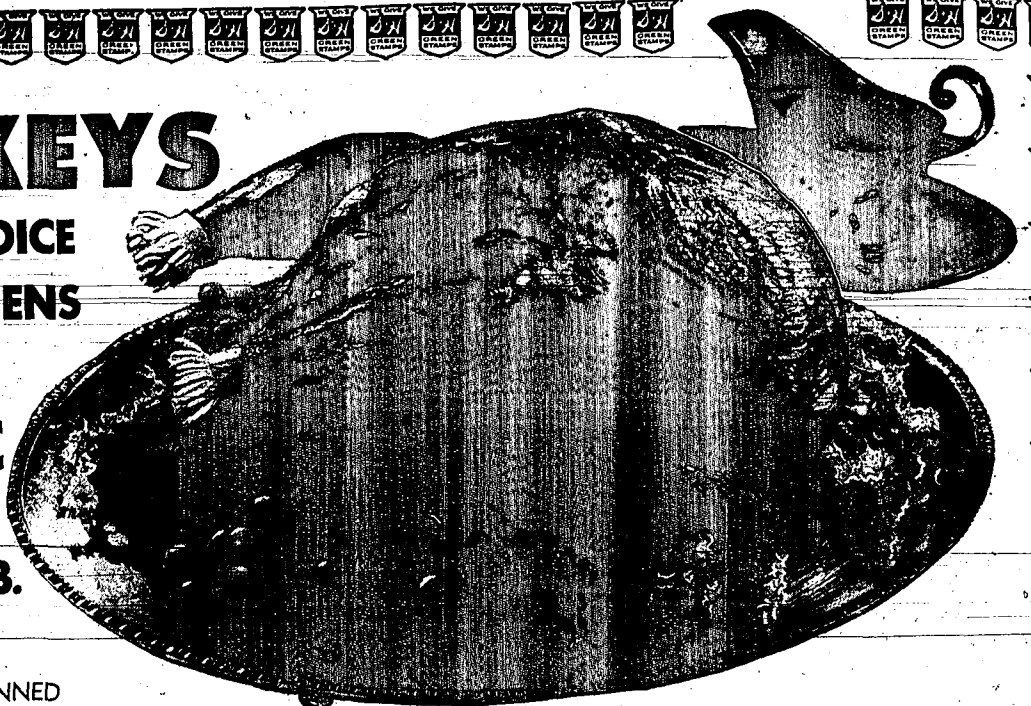

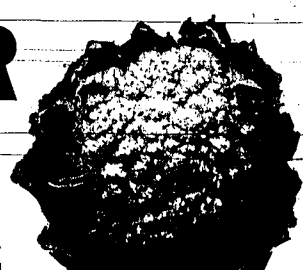

12 Models to Be Offered By Rambler

The 1962 Rambler American will be on display in dealer showrooms throughout the country starting Oct. 6, American Motors Corp. says. The new line of cars, according to Roy Abernathy, executive vice president, the company is emphasizing advanced engineering features

and mechanical improvements designed for greater economy and reduced maintenance. The 1962 Rambler American line offers 12 models in a new deluxe custom and "400" series, providing more luxury at no additional cost, Abernathy reports. They include two- and four-door sedans and station wagons, and a two-door convertible. An optional all-new automatic clutch transmission called "E-Matic," is a three-speed transmission completely eliminating the clutch pedal. This is also available with optional overdrive, the company says. The E-Matic's clutch has a conventional disc and pressure plate which are engaged by levers, without requiring thrust springs or centrifugal weights, the auto-maker asserts. Engine oil pressure and intake manifold vacuum are combined to perform the function of operating the automatic clutch. The driver simply engages the gears as if he were driving a standard transmission car, without employing any separate clutching action. A "Flash-O-Matic" automatic transmission is another option offered this year. In addition to the E-stick and Flash-O-Matic, the Rambler

American also offers standard synchromesh transmission and standard transmission with over-drive as optional equipment. In all, the consumer has a choice of five transmissions on all American models, the widest choice in the auto industry, Abernathy asserts. A new double-safety brake system is offered as standard equipment for the first time on all American models, the company announces. With a tandem brake master cylinder, the hydraulic system for the front brakes is completely separate from the rear brakes. In event

of hydraulic brake failure in front, rear brakes still operate, and vice versa. Self-adjusting brakes, previously an option, will be standard on all 1962 American models, Abernathy says. Lubrication and oil change recommendations will be increased on 1962 Rambler American models. Front suspension and steering linkage lubrication will be extended from 1,000 to 2,000 miles; normal drain period for engine oil is changed from 3,000 to 4,000 mile intervals; a new carburetor air cleaner element will require cleaning every 4,000

miles instead of 2,000 miles, and replacement every 23,000 miles instead of 10,000 miles; drain and refill mileage for automatic fluid is changed to every 23,000 miles rather than 12,000 miles and the 12-month or 12,000-mile warranty will continue on all models. The engine cooling system is filled with Doygard Full-Fill coolant as an extra cost factory option on all models. It is guaranteed for 24 months or 24,000 miles, and the cooling system drain period has been extended to once every 24 months. 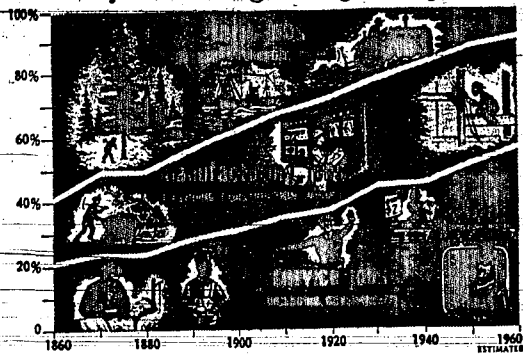

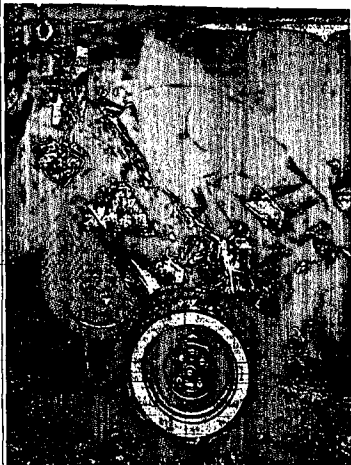
