Knight Charges Banker Offered Him Nixon Deal

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4 (UPI)—Former Gov. Goodwin J. Knight today named J. Howard Edgerton, a Los Angeles banker, as the so-called "emissary" who he said took him on behalf of Richard M. Nixon to stay out of the California gubernatorial race in return "for any state job he wanted." Knight said the offer was made in a telephone conversation last Sept. 8 before he made in a telephone conversation last Sept. 8 before he had announced his own candidacy for governor in 1962.

Offer Made?

Nixon announced his candidacy last Wednesday, Knight quoted Edgerton, his former campaign finance chairman, as saying: "He (Nixon) will offer you anything you want, be it chief justice of the supreme court of California or any job in California if you won't run for governor."

Edgerton said shortly before noon he expected to have a prepared statement in a couple of hours.

There was no immediate comment from Nixon, although the former vice president already had declined to take the offer.

Knight said he declined the offer and told Edgerton, "I don't want any part of it. I am going to run anyway and you can tell for me. I will face a real tough campaign."

Knight said that Paul Mason, former director of the state motor vehicle department, was his wife, Virginia Knight, listened in at his side as he talked to Edgerton.

Nixon flatly denied the charge, calling it "false and libelous." He also offered to sue on a \$100,000 bond for any damage which the emissary was alleged to have made the call-Nixon said he would sue for \$100,000.

Knight then said that he would produce witnesses to the telephone call.

By noon, however, there was no sign of a boycott, school officials said. "I think we are over the hump," Calhoun said. At least 17 white students were withdrawn from the four schools by their parents after news of the integration spread yesterday.

Subsidies for Metals Inked

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—President Kennedy signed today a bill authorizing subsidies for small domestic producers of lead and zinc.

The law provides 16.5 million dollars for subsidies in the next four years for producers of not more than 3,000 tons of lead and zinc combined annually.

The secretary of interior is authorized to pay the producers 14 per cent of the difference between 14 cents a pound and the market price of lead, and 30 per cent of the difference between 14 cents a pound and the market price of zinc.

An estimated 275 mines may be eligible for the subsidies. Western senators had proposed to add tariffs to lead and zinc to the subsidy. The senate bill would provide a diagnostic work being done and that the diagnosis and tests will be continued through tomorrow.

Kennedy to Hold Crucial Talk With Gromyko Friday

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (UPI)—President Kennedy and Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko will meet here late Friday afternoon for a crucial talk that may determine whether negotiations over Berlin are possible. The White House announced today that the President and Gromyko will confer at 5 p. m. (EDT) Friday. The talk was set up as a result of encouraging progress made in three earlier discussions between Gromyko and Secretary of State Dean Rusk in New York last week.

Although White House Press Secretary Pierre Salinger refused to discuss the subject of the Friday conference, it obviously concerned the Berlin negotiations, and the next steps to be taken by both sides.

Gromyko and Rusk had planned to meet a fourth time in Washington—by Salinger said he does not know whether this would occur before the conference with Kennedy.

Salinger would not say whether the Soviet or American side initiated the White House meeting.

It was understood that Rusk would sit in on the meeting. Llewellyn Thompson, U. S. ambassador to Russia, has been ordered to Washington for consultations and may be on hand for the session.

The discussion between the meeting was crucial—not in terms of whether concrete decisions will be reached. These are not expected to be reached.

The importance of the meeting will lie in the reactions which follow.

It probably will be the last of Gromyko's meetings with U. S. officials before he returns to Moscow. Authorities were keeping a wary eye for signs of a possible student boycott—but all appeared normal as classes resumed.

Tardy U. S. Airline Had New Owner

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4 (AP)—President airlines, the firm that had 180 passengers stranded in England and Ireland on a week-end carrier purchased only a week ago by a Los Angeles land developer.

It has been operating with several leased aircraft, but the new owner, Glen H. Taylor, says he has purchased 34 planes and will begin putting them in operation in several at a time in about a month.

The airline, formerly owned by insurance man Fred Wilson of Beverly Hills, originally operated as Cal Eastern Airlines. It was engaged in military transport work late in World War II. About a year ago it was renamed and set up to operate an international charter basis.

When Pan American and Northwestern Air lines changed to jets, Taylor said, "we purchased a great deal of their equipment and also their spare parts. With our new planes, I believe we have the world's largest charter fleet. I have probably over 10 million dollars worth of spare engines and parts. I shopped around, checking out all the small airlines, before I bought this one. This airline has the cleanest operating record of any that I checked."

Taylor said the present problem began when a Trident airliner crashed in Ireland Sept. 4. This plane, he said, had been fully maintained "up to the last minute." The airline had some 700 tourist passengers in Europe at the time, Taylor said, and the accident left the company with two planes to do the job of three. "We just couldn't operate them on regular schedules," Taylor said.

Taylor said he doesn't believe he is in trouble with federal aviation officials in Washington.

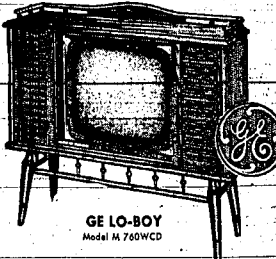

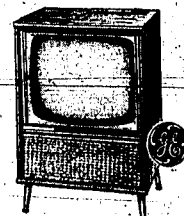

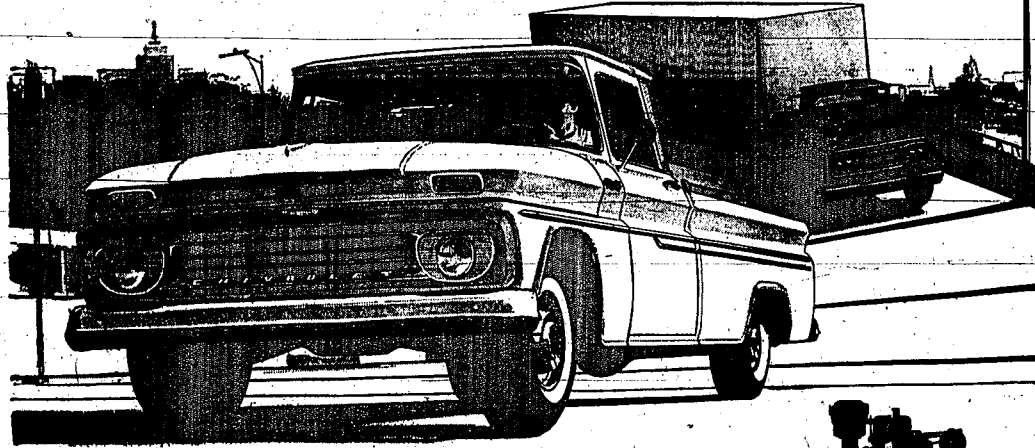

Her daughters are Mrs. Dean McElches, Dayton, O., and Nancy Marlow, Twin Falls.

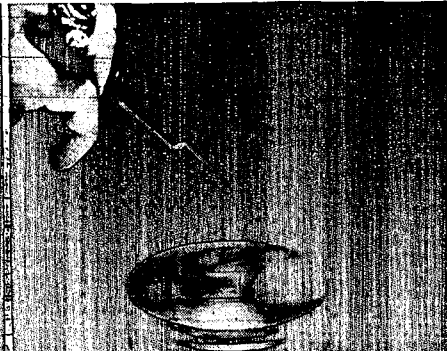

Duplication' Is Blamed in Space Delay

WASHINGTON, Oct. 4 (AP)—A report said Tuesday that duplication in electronic research for defense has delayed the space science program.

The report placed the blame on the facilities provided by the government for exchange of information among electronic researchers.

It was signed by Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey, D. Minn., as chairman of a special government operations subcommittee.

"One tenth of federally supported electronic research and development may consist of unnecessary, needless duplication of efforts," Humphrey said in a statement analyzing the report.

"No one really knows who is now doing what, where and how in experiments.

The waste may add up to \$200 million out of \$3 billion currently expended for this type of work

per year," Humphrey conceded, however, that little definitive proof exists on which to base the estimate.

The report said the subcommittee found red tape and lack of facilities are so acute that "innumerable scientists and engineers state that 'it takes less time to perform their own research than it takes to try to find out if the research has already been performed or is being performed.'

Food for Americans

By GAYNOR MADDOX

FRESH CAULIFLOWER is in the market this year round, but reaches its peak in September, October and November. Its highest point is in October, when quality is best and prices most reasonable.

For most delicious results, be careful not to overcook cauliflower. It should be tender but firm, not mushy. To boil a whole head, cover with boiling salted water. Bring back to boil and cook 15 to 20 minutes, depending on size. Add 1 teaspoon lemon juice to water to retain whiteness of the cauliflower. To boil flowerettes, use only about 1/4-inch water in pan. Cook only from 5 to 8 minutes.

Fresh Cauliflowers with Capeer-Chress Sauce

1 large head fresh cauliflower
Boiling water

AAU Claims Colleges Are Trying to Gain Control Of All Amateur Athletics

CHICAGO, Oct. 4 (AP)—The president of the Amateur Athletic Union charged the National Collegiate Athletic Association Tuesday with "plotting to take over control of all amateur athletics." N. J. Barack of Columbus, O., said in a statement: "The NCAA is plotting to take over control of all amateur athletics at a time when its special committee resisted AAU efforts to resolve the differences."

"Up until now the NCAA has had a full-time job plotting its own members. Now it wants to control all amateur athletics, college and noncollege, at a time when colleges must face up to charges of serious over-commercialization in athletics."

In Los Angeles, Wilbur C. Johns, head of special NCAA committee on AAU-Olympic relations, denied his committee had any idea of plotting a breakdown of amateurism. Johns, athletic director of UCLA, countered that it was the AAU that bargained in bad faith. Barack made the accusations before leaving for home after attending a series of meetings in Chicago.

The AAU and NCAA are locked in a squabble over international jurisdiction. The Chicago and Johns camps have each sent a delegation to the International Basketball Federation—(FIBA) which the AAU controls with two delegates. A statement was reached on proposals by both sides of the NCAA-backed National Basketball Committee. Another meeting was set for Dec. 8 in Washington, D. C. in an attempt to resolve the issue.

Crop Failure Disclosed by Soviet Union

MOSCOW, Oct. 4 (AP)—The Soviet Union has disclosed a virtual crop failure in Kazakhstan and the virgin lands. This may have a considerable effect upon both domestic and international policies.

Pravda reports that delegates to the Communist party congress in the central Asian republic "spoke with great uneasiness about the fact that the year Kazakhstan cannot give the state much grain."

Last year Kazakhstan and the virgin lands also had a disastrous harvest. The first secretary, Nikolai Belyuzov, was fired from his local job and his top job on the Moscow presidium.

The development of the virgin lands is a pet project of Premier Khrushchev, who sees these vast reaches of central Asia as a means of overtaking the United States in food production. It all accounts the harvest in western reaches of the Soviet Union is not much better.

The crop setback may have its influence on foreign policy, on the international front, the Soviet Union almost always lowers its demands when there is a bad harvest since, unlike the United States, it has no reserves on which to fall back.

Pravda blamed both bad weather and family techniques for the harvest failure.

Russ Hint They Might Postpone Berlin Deadline

LONDON, Oct. 4 (AP)—Communist diplomats hinted today that Russia might postpone the signing of its threatened separate peace with Germany if the West agreed to negotiate a speedy Berlin settlement.

Russia still intends to sign such a peace treaty, but the move could be deferred if negotiations for a Berlin accord were held soon and not dragged out indefinitely.

Or they said, Moscow might sign the treaty this year as threatened with the understanding that it would be amended to include agreement in Berlin. Such an understanding would be conditional on an East-West accord to start full-scale negotiations soon.

These vague hints gave the first indication that Moscow might not stick to its December deadline for a treaty with the East German regime, western diplomatic sources said.

UNITED NATIONS, Oct. 4 (AP)—Nationalist China has decided that this session of the general assembly is the best time for a showdown on its membership in the United Nations.

Well-informed Chinese sources said today that the Taiwan (Formosa) republic will not compromise its principles just in order to keep its membership for perhaps a year or two.

President Chiang Kai-shek was reported to have decided to gamble on an "all or nothing" policy in the belief that any other course would lead to steady deterioration of the Nationalist position.

The immediate crisis for Nationalist China is the question of Outer Mongolia's admission to the United Nations. Chinese voted Outer Mongolia in 1951 and is ready to do so again when the security council takes up the application in a few days.

The United States tried, and failed, to get China to abstain on Outer Mongolia.

Russia has linked Outer Mongolia's admission with that of Mauritania, a new African state. The Soviets say they will not let Mauritania unless they are certain that Outer Mongolia will be admitted.

A group of 12 new African members known as the Brazzaville group has put pressure on China to yield on Outer Mongolia so that Mauritania may be admitted. They have threatened to vote for seating Communist China unless the Nationalist China indirectly blocks Mauritania's membership.

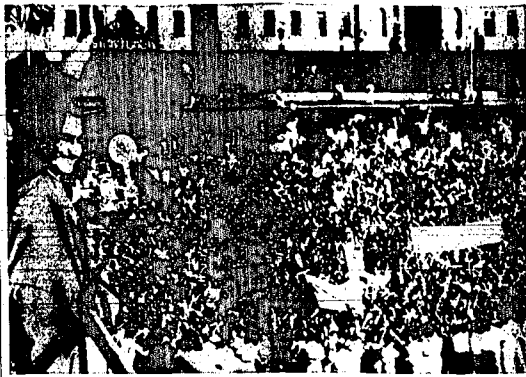
"The ruling in no way opens up the code to irresponsible or immoral or indecent scenes or treatment.

A new novel of intrigue and adventure is "Pearl Is the Key" by Altair McLean. It is his first novel with an American background.

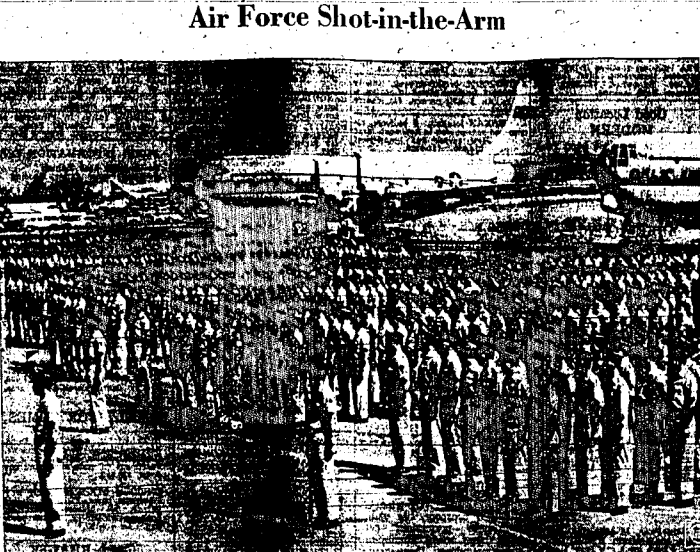

Army Engineers to Survey Regional Fallout Shelters

WALLA WALLA, Wash., Oct. 4 (Special)—The President's public fallout shelter survey program for Idaho, Montana, and Walla Walla county, Wash., has been assigned to the Walla Walla district of the U. S. Army Corps of Engineers.

The proper protection factors and adequate to accommodate a large group of persons. No new construction is involved and the survey will be confined to existing facilities that meet the specifications or that may be converted easily to shelter use.

In the 68 cities of Idaho and 97 cities of Montana having populations of over 1,000, this day and night population becomes important in that the public school attendance bus-hauled from rural areas affords

T.F. Joins in Plan to Take Crisis Stand

Twin Falls participated in a nationwide program to demonstrate support of President Kennedy's stand in the Berlin crisis. City Manager H. L. Derrick and Vernon Riddle, city commission chairman, sent a telegram to Mayor Myrtle Burns, Jacksonville, Fla., president of the United States Conference of Mayors. The telegram, one of thousands sent from throughout the nation, was addressed to Mayor Willy Brandt of West Berlin.

Derrick explains it was indicated by President Kennedy and the state department that the conference of mayors could render "a great national service to the general cause by demonstrating our opposition to the solidarity of the American public to the firm position which President Kennedy has taken, particularly with reference to the Berlin crisis."

Derrick noted Spokane's mayor pro tem, Howard Bull, explained the telegram plan to 25 mayors in eastern Washington, Idaho and Montana.

"Twin Falls' telegram states: 'On behalf of the citizens of Twin Falls, I wish to congratulate you and the people of West Berlin for the fearless resistance you have taken against the continued aggressive acts of the communists. We firmly believe the stand taken by President Kennedy, the secretary of state and yourself is essential to the preservation of the rights of all free people everywhere.'

Upon receipt of the telegram at Jacksonville, half of them were translated into German by Western Union. These were put into a complete packet with similar telegrams from throughout the nation. Every city which has a Western Union office is sending a telegram, according to Bull.

Bull, in the telephone conversation with Derrick, Riddle and some 25 other city leaders in Washington, Idaho and Montana, noted that other community leaders, such as civic club presidents and Chambers of Commerce are participating.

The telegrams were presented to Mayor Brandt by a delegation from the state department and the conference of mayors. The telegrams are being displayed in windows of shops and stores in the downtown area in principal cities of West Germany.

"After the delegation visits Mayor Brandt's will continue to Munich, where messages will be broadcast to all of the people in the satellite countries behind the iron curtain."

Idaho Water Supply Said 'Down Drain'

MOSCOW, Oct. 4 (AP)—Idaho water supplies literally are going down the drain, a conference on the state's economic future was told yesterday.

Gilbert Corey, associate professor of agricultural engineering at the University of Idaho, told the meeting of top-level authorities that the state should make better use of its water for economic development. Other areas with acute water shortages may soon develop an adequate supply and Idaho must do the same, he said.

"If we don't develop our capacity, the other areas will be after the state's water rather than other Idaho products."

Before industry can be lured into the state, Idaho must take a long look at its water laws to see if they are adequate, he said.

Corey was among a number of speakers for the second session of the three-day conference.

Buildup for Red Forces Is Reported

BOHN, Germany, Oct. 4 (AP)—Poland, Czechoslovakia and East Germany have increased their military forces 20 per cent in the last eight weeks, authoritative West German military sources said yesterday. This would mean an increase of 102,000 men in the armies of the three communist nations, whose combined strength was estimated at 510,000 men on Jan. 1.

The West German Defense Ministry would make no comment for publication on the report. The informants, who declined to be identified, made the report, however, amid discussion of such NATO problems as a buildup of its forces.

The sources also asserted the Soviet army in East Germany, totaling about 400,000 troops, has been reinforced by 14 different types of rockets and missiles. All are capable of carrying nuclear warheads, the sources said.

"They said the rockets and missiles 'in' East Germany are ground-to-ground type, fueled with solid or liquid fuel, and some are mounted on tank-type armored vehicles."

The sources said there was no indication East German troops have been equipped with modern tactical ground-to-ground rockets and missiles.
