### Man Who "Crystal-Balls" Space Race Predicts Manned Moon Colony by 1975

HUNTSVILLE, Ala., Oct. 9 (AP)—To Heinz Hermann Koelle, scientist, the immediate future is today's assignment. At 36, Koelle is director of the national aeronautics and space administration's George C. Marshall Space Flight Center. In government parlance, this native of the once free city of Danzig, is responsible for the analysis, planning and design of advanced space vehicles and space transportation systems. To plain English, that crystal ball he is peering into is the space race. His point of departure is the present. He then figures out where the United States is going, how when and at what cost. He believes: 1. Large manned space stations in a 300-mile-high orbit will be feasible in 1968-69. 2. A permanent manned moon station will exist in 1970, a station which can be expanded into a lunar colony by 1975. 3. Manned planetary expeditions can start in 1972, with a view to the arrival of a 100-man expedition on Mars in 1980. Without undue strain on the budget, the United States will be able to support the equivalent of 500 man-roundtrips to the moon in 1978 in addition to 5,000 man-roundtrips in low orbit. 5. Space flight costs will be so reduced that commercial passenger-cargo space flights will be economically feasible between 1970 and 1980. All these developments, said Koelle, will be witnessed by the middle-aged generation of today with today's younger generation "taking part."

Koelle expressed his rationale thus: "If you spend 100 million dollars annually to sustain a lunar base, that is a bargain solely for military and scientific reasons. If you have to spend one billion dollars, I doubt if it would be worthwhile." Most top scientists here believe the moon will have a definite military potential as a base for military satellite and antisatellite operations. The scientists here also believe that as man explores his solar system he will make new discoveries, find new sources of energy, develop metals unknown on Earth and solve some of the medical mysteries of what makes man tick. It is unlikely that man will travel beyond this solar system to the stars for perhaps a hundred years or more—or until such time as he discovers sources of power which will enable him to approach the speed of light—186,000 miles per second. The distances to the stars are too great for man to reach in a lifetime at present top speeds. In arriving at his cost-relevant-to-objective conclusions, Koelle functions in a sort of mathematical hazy region where variables are seemingly infinite and depend upon such things as launching rates, types and numbers of vehicles and whether they are reusable, size of payload, appropriations, national goals and man's ingenuity. A simple distillation of the methods Koelle uses in arriving at a multiplicity of possible answers requires a 100-page booklet filled with definitions, charts and formulas. Another handicap is that the nation has no plan for the long-range allocation of resources and no long-range goals except to reach the moon by 1970—and this objective was not stated directly until May 25 by President Kennedy. Koelle therefore has to assume that the United States will find it desirable—even necessary, to achieve certain objectives in space over the next two decades which is about as far ahead as he is looking right now. Koelle was asked when the United States could expect to reach certain arbitrarily selected goals, such as the moon and Mars. "First comes the decision," he replied. "When you give us an objective and tell us the resources then these factors will determine the target date." Each time Koelle calculates the future, he must restate what is technically possible to the availability of resources. The less money available, the longer the time required to reach an objective. The smallest program envisioned by Koelle calls for the spending of 24 billion dollars from 1960 through 1970. The largest program will cost 43.8 billion dollars over the same period. Koelle's third program is a compromise costing about \$22 billion dollars over the next 10 years. As something of a political realist, Koelle keeps the taxpayer in mind. His maximum program assumes that the United States will continue to appropriate the same per-

### Physicist Is Wary of Red Blast Fallout

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9 (AP)—Physicist Ralph E. Lapp, who helped in development of the atom bomb, says by his opinion that fallout from the Soviet Union's nuclear tests have exceeded that of the United States. The Soviets fired their eighth atmospheric explosion yesterday in their current test series. "They have according to the latest count, sent up over 10 megatons of weapons. I don't know precisely how much of this would be dirty, but this, in my opinion, exceeds the safe level that a number of scientists—some of them from the atomic energy commission—agreed upon as a safe level back in 1957 when we didn't know about the different kind of fallout from Russian tests," Lapp said. "It turns out that Russian tests drop the amount of fallout to the Earth sooner than the American tests in the Pacific. And, therefore, we find out on the actual measurements that we get 10 times as much radiation dose from these Soviet tests as from American tests in the Pacific. "Therefore, the safe annual limit for Russian testing I would put closer to the value of three megatons per year than I would the old 1957 value of 10 megatons per year. "A megaton is the equivalent of the energy released by a million tons of TNT.

### Too Fast

AUSTIN, Tex., Oct. 9 (AP)—The air force said today it has learned a lesson in public relations from Jim Wilson, assistant city manager of Austin where Bergstrom air force base is located. As happens several times a week, a bomb-bomb from one of the jet planes at the air base had just shaken up a section of the city when Wilson's telephone rang. "I want you to stop that plane that just flew over and broke the sound barrier," an irate lady demanded of Wilson. "Did you get the license number?" he asked. "They both laughed. "It wasn't me, it was silly, wasn't it," the lady said and hung up still chuckling.

### President to Talk in West In November

NEWPORT, R. I., Oct. 9 (AP)—President Kennedy will head west on a speaking tour in mid-November. It could wind up with his leading a personal hand to cabinet officers and other administration executives in reporting to the people what congress accomplished and what more he would like to accomplish. Pierre Salinger, White House press secretary, announced yesterday that Kennedy will speak Nov. 16 in Seattle at the 100th anniversary of the University of Washington and again Nov. 17 in Phoenix at a dinner honoring Sen. Carl A. Hayden's 50 years in congress. Piled with questions, Salinger said that after the Phoenix visit, Kennedy has "some other stops under consideration."

### U. N. Moves Up Five Jets

LEOPOLDVILLE, The Congo, Oct. 9 (AP)—Troops of the Swedish jet fighters to Luluabourg put the United Nations air attack force within striking distance of Katanga province today. The Swedish "flying barrel" jets arrived in Leopoldville last Wednesday. They were flown yesterday to Luluabourg, just 525 miles from Elisabethville—the half the distance for Leopoldville to the Katanga capital. The United Nations was able to send the fighters without breaking the cease-fire provision. That states Katanga and UN troops may not reinforce their positions during the truce. Luluabourg is not in Katanga.

### India's Defense Chief Doing OK

NEW YORK, Oct. 9 (AP)—Indian Defense Minister V. K. Krishna Menon is "doing very well" in Montefiore hospital following surgery to remove a collection of blood from between his skull and brain. "She rises up there every day and mixes the elixir which makes the liqueur," he said. "Then she sends the bottles through to us here in Edinburgh at our compounding house." The son smiled. "She has ever interfered with the delivery because my mother's chauffeur—well, he's a former staff and well speed cap," Mrs. MacKinnon is an unusual woman. But, like a great many other women, she won't tell her age. "She won't give that to anybody," said her son. "Even I don't know it. I think she's somewhere between 70 and 80." Although Mrs. MacKinnon employs a driver, she does a lot of her driving herself. She leads a busy social and business life and often visits the United States and Canada. "When she prepares to make a journey," he explained, "she mixes up large bottles of the elixir."

She manages to time her return just about the time the supply is finished. "She dresses extremely well and travels to Edinburgh about 20 miles from Lilliburg—regularly. "She visits us here to see for herself if we're doing things the proper way," said the son. Another of his mother's peculiarities is a strange dislike of talking about herself. "You won't get any of this information about my mother from her," he said.

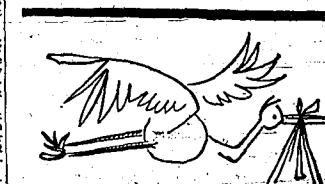

Macmillan's Moves Hint Of Election

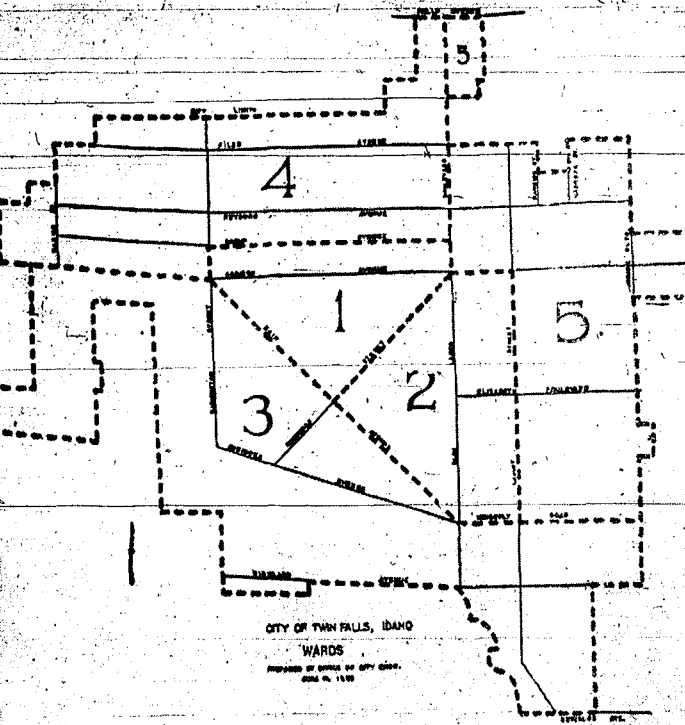
