# Russian Asserts U.N. Controlled By U.S. Official

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Oct. 13 (UPI)—Soviet Ambassador Valerian A. Zorin charged today that the United Nations is being run under "a seizure of powers." Zorin made the charge at a news conference at which he also urged quick appointment of an acting secretary general and agreed with as many as six deputies. But he rejected U. S. Secretary of State Dean Rusk's offer to strengthen the United Nations to eliminate the "one-sidedness" of the late Dag Hammarskjold's administration. If this is not done, he said, "the organization will collapse."

# Mock War in Air Planned On Saturday

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (AP)—Mock aerospace war on a vast scale will rage Saturday through Nov. 15, according to a spokesman. MOSCOW, Oct. 13 (AP)—The Soviet Union announced today that it had fired a giant space rocket some 7,000 miles into the central Pacific in a test carried out with "great accuracy." The Soviet Test News Agency announced the rocket, latest in a Soviet test series, "was fired from a distance of more than 11,000 kilometers (7,450 miles)." It said the dummy of the final stages of the carrier rocket hit the ocean surface in direct proximity to the target point, only a few minutes after launch.

# Red Berlin Police Fire Fusillades, Nearly Hit Five American Soldiers

BERLIN, Oct. 13 (UPI)—Communist police fired hundreds of shots into the American sector of West Berlin today in two fusillades, narrowly missing five U. S. military policemen. The shooting was the biggest outburst of gunfire since the communists seized the Berlin border on Aug. 13. The communist police's police first sprayed the U. S. sector with 250 to 300 shots from rifles and submachineguns in a dawn attempt to stop nine German refugees who crossed a truck into the reds' barred war border barrier. # AEC Readies for Atmospheric A-Tests if President Decides

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13 (UPI)—The atomic energy commission is getting ready to resume nuclear tests in the atmosphere in case President Kennedy rules that national security demands it. LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13 (AP)—A federal grand jury has returned antitrust indictments against General Motors corporation, four Chevrolet sales executives and three southern California dealer associations. The jury charged the defendants with conspiring to stop independent dealers from selling cars through discount houses. GM Board Chairman Frederick Donner denied the accusation. He said GM frowned on the discount dealers' lack of service facilities and other customer conveniences—but did nothing to discourage the discounting.

She listed aids which the real estate man might provide in contacting an abstractor, which would expedite paper preparations.

Bell told of his work in checking real estate trust funds, importance of keeping them straight and explained best activity on the state basis. He said that anyone receiving below an 80 in the real estate examination now is not passed by the state board.

Bell also said that of those who do pass in the state, only one out of each five remains in the business. Courses are being offered in real estate now, he said, and no doubt in the near future will be required.

The next meeting of the local board, Nov. 8, will be held at Jerome, on invitation of S. N. Weeks.

### Washington Might Build Atom Plant

**OLYMPIA, Oct. 13**—Information that the state apparently has legal authority to build a nuclear electric power plant at Hanford, Conservation Director Earl Conroy says he now will ask the atomic energy commission whether it would agree.

An informal, preliminary opinion was given yesterday by John Riley, assistant attorney general. He said Conroy's department has from a reactor now being constructed at Hanford. Conroy turned it down as a federal project this year.

Conroy said the state would have to determine whether the AEC would lease a site and sell steam, and whether Bonneville Power administration would distribute the electricity. Also, he said, prospective bond purchasers would have to be assured of validity of the undertaking.

Charles Luce, chief of the Bonneville Power administration, was in Wenatchee when word of Riley's opinion came.

He said his agency would do all it could to help Washington if the state decides to finance an atomic power plant at Hanford.

### Idaho State College Starting 2-Year Dental Hygiene Class

**IDAHO STATE COLLEGE, Pocatello, Oct. 13**—Twelve members of Idaho State College's 1961-62 student body hold a certain distinction. They are the first students to enroll in the newly-inaugurated two-year program in dental hygiene.

The students, all women, began classes in September and in addition to making progress in their dental hygiene and liberal arts courses, have already elected officers and organized themselves as the ISC Dental Hygienists' association and as junior members of the American Dental Hygienists' association.

They are now awaiting their November move into the Medical Arts building, the former LDS institute which is being remodeled to house the departments of dental hygiene and nursing and the dental diagnostic and treatment center.

And they are looking forward to the time when they will begin clinic work in the dental center which, according to Patricia McCullough, head of the dental hygiene department, should be in the early spring.

Magie Valley members of the dental hygiene class and the offices they hold in their newly-formed organization are Linda Feeout, Twin Falls, executive secretary; Carolyn Bausher, Fairfield, society chairman, and Sandra Dopson, Hansen, publicity chairman.

In addition to Miss McCullough, the staff of the department of dental hygiene and of the soon-to-open dental center includes Jean Sutton, instructor in dental hygiene, and Dr. Arthur Trammier, lecturer in dental hygiene and supervising dentist.

Miss McCullough said that next September the department plans to add a second class of 12 students to being first-year students in dental hygiene. While the present class is finishing its second year.

Upon completion of the two-year program, students will be awarded the associate of science degree in dental hygiene and will be qualified to take the licensing examination for dental hygienists.

The dental hygiene program, established this year in the division of medical arts, is being underwritten for the first two and one-half years by a \$99,950 grant from the W. K. Kellogg foundation.

### Nixon Avers Kennedy Is 'Unbeatable'

**LOS ANGELES, Oct. 13**—Close friends of Richard M. Nixon say the former vice president has told them he thinks it would be impossible to beat President Kennedy in 1964.

Nixon's economic advisers have told him, the friends say, that the current economic boom would probably be near its peak in 1964, providing tremendous impetus for the President's reelection.

One source said that Nixon, a candidate for California's governorship next year, had no intention of losing money or organization to challenge New York Gov. Nelson Rockefeller or Arizona Sen. Barry Goldwater for the GOP nomination in 1964.

He also said that Nixon believes even war would tend to support Kennedy's reelection.

The friend added that Nixon believes there is a strong possibility of a Rockefeller-Goldwater ticket, since both men have moved toward the center of the political spectrum in Nixon's thinking.

### Exile Leader Says 'Phony' Invasion Set

**By United Press International**

**Premier Fidel Castro** may be plotting a fake invasion of Cuba as an excuse to "liquidate" the imprisoned leaders of the failed April 1957 Bay of Pigs attack, exile leaders said today.

They said they were warned of the possibility of a phony invasion by friendly Latin American diplomats in secret dispatches from Havana.

Cuban Revolutionary Council President Jose Miró Cardona said one such source quoted Castro personally as saying there would be an "invasion" of Cuba "within 10 days from three places."

Miró said it was well known that exiles were not presently in a position for an "immediate" attack on Castro. He pointed out that six governments accused this week by Castro of training invasion troops had denied the allegations.

Miró said also that a fake attack would give Castro an opportunity to "divert" people from domestic problems and also spur crumbling morale in the armed forces.

Informed sources in Washington said any bogus invasion staged by Castro probably would be intended mainly to attract international attention from the problems of Cuba's shortage-plagued economy.

They said the plight of the average Cuban, already bad, probably will grow worse during the current dry season.

### Restoring of Gem Mineral Right Urged

**BOISE, Oct. 13 (U)—** Idaho Democratic Chairman Charles Walters said yesterday that despite opposition from the federal department of the interior, he will seek restoration of Idaho of mineral rights he values at \$6 million dollars.

Walters conferred here with John A. Carver, Jr., assistant secretary of the interior and a former Idaho resident.

Carver said the department opposed a bill which would have restored to Idaho mineral rights on some state-owned land because the measure did not deal with the broad problem involved.

Walters said that after talking with Carver the latter agreed to reassess the legislation and perhaps recommend amending to include all states similarly situated.

Involved are the mineral rights, reserved by the federal government, on land given to the state in exchange for state-owned land including in national forest boundaries. Rich phosphate beds subsequently were discovered.

### Police Group Is Organized In Twin Falls

Magie Valley law enforcement officers are starting a charter organization of the Fraternal Order of the Police in Twin Falls, the third such chapter to be formed in Idaho, reports Richard Frazier, city detective, who is serving as temporary president of the chapter.

A group of law enforcement officials from the Magie Valley area met with Fred Swego, Idaho Falls, a member of the fraternal order, Wednesday evening.

Swego outlined the organizational setup and the initial charter was then signed by those present.

Sometime within the next month a valley-wide meeting is planned at which time permanent officers will be selected.

Alma of the organization, a national affiliation, is to create better police departments, better officers, better working conditions and create job security in police departments which are politically oriented, Frazier explained.

The order was initiated 48 years ago in Philadelphia, Pa., he noted. It is best known for its Police Athletic League (PAL) activities on the community level, which is a western program aimed at combating juvenile delinquency, he added.

In attendance at the Wednesday meeting were officers from the sheriff's department and police department at Pocatello, Frazier said.

### Union Chiefs Swap Claims Over Racism

**NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (U)—** Organized labor's high command Thursday denied laxity in enforcing racial equality among union members as charged by the AFL-CIO executive council overwhelmingly rebuffed accusations leveled by President Philip Randolph of the Brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, the council's only Negro member.

Voluntary compliance with the principles of equal rights, the council said, is a more likely and successful solution. It said the AFL-CIO is only a voluntary federation of unions and that each retains the right to run its own affairs.

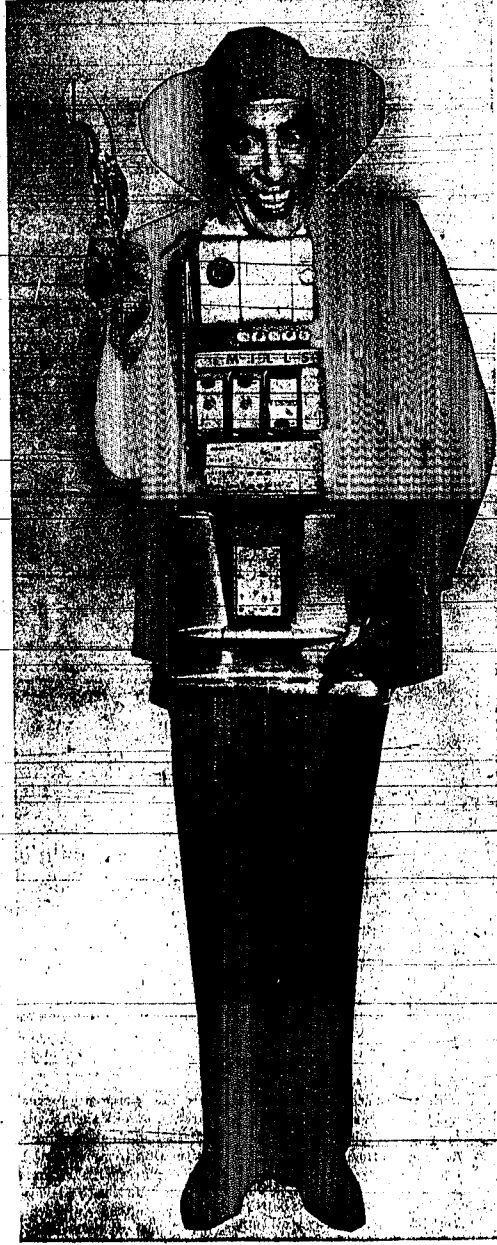

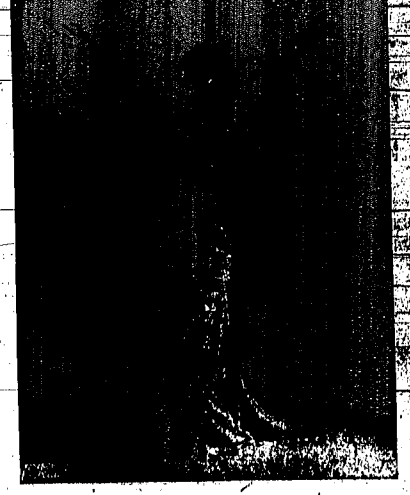

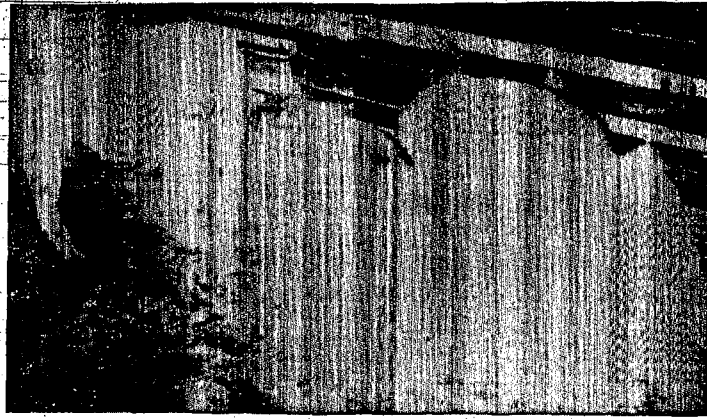

Reports from four Twin Falls area companies indicate bean harvesting in the area is about 95 per cent completed, but damp weather Wednesday apparently held up the harvest for a couple of days. Joseph Fik, field man for the

Maney Seed company, notes including pinios, reds and Great Northern, are from five to seven per cent above the 10-year average and garden bean varieties have been yielding 10 to 15 per cent above the average, despite a severe wind which damaged some fields in the area last month.

Gooding Farmers Given Warning on Labor Laws

GOODING, Oct. 13—Gooding county farmers are being alerted to the fact they face fines up to \$10,000 or a six-month jail sentence or both if they employ youngsters under 16 years of age for harvest work during school hours.

He mentioned that the overall loss from the wind probably would be about six per cent throughout Magic Valley, and added that this is the first year for about three years that the crop yield has gone over the average.

Robert Montgomery, manager of the employment security agency office here, said he has been informed by federal officials to have nothing to do with placing youths under 16 years of age in agricultural work during school hours.

William Crow, general seed manager at Intermountain Seed company, says yields "in most cases are above average." He explained that during the season there usually are some crops that don't yield the same as other crops in the area, but that yields so far are above average.

Many of the farmers are harvesting their potatoes by combine or with Mexican crews, but the strict enforcement of the federal regulation will affect between nine or 10 Gooding area farmers. Montgomery said he is contacting them so they will understand the risk they are taking if they continue to employ youths under 16.

F. V. Morrison, who can't remember when he and his father didn't raise horses, entered 10 Percheron and two colts in the competition. His ribbons include three first premiums, six second premiums, the reserve champion mare and the champion mare.

Alerting of federal officials to the violations of the regulation evidently resulted from letters written to state labor officials by school superintendents at Wendell and Gooding, Montgomery said.

The champion Percheron stallion, owned by W. Russell Johnson, Georgetown, was bred and raised by Morrison and purchased by Johnson last spring. Morrison notes that he has had inquiries from 20 different states in the past about heavy horses.

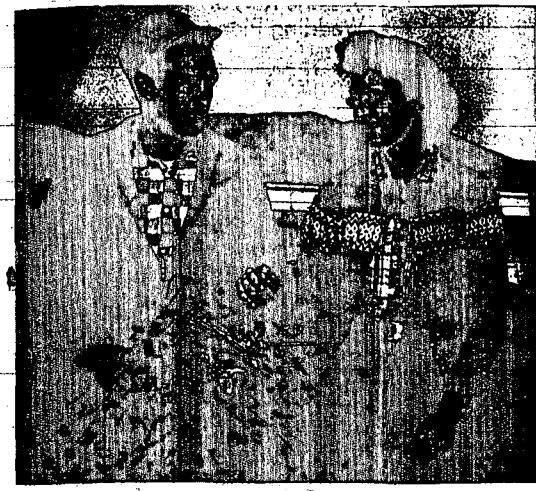

graduating from high school last year, he joined the army. Castle, himself, handles the beef and cash crop units, and both he and his sons handle the forage unit. He also decided to put maximum production by putting into effect many progressive ideas. He has installed two and one-fourth miles of permanent mainline ditch which delivers water to many fields. He has installed pre-fabricated concrete turnouts on all ditches used for flood irrigation. This sprinkler system, he has added two irrigation pumps to supplement other sources of water, and he has connected these to a sprinkler system. This sprinkler system, besides making it possible to irrigate rolling land that couldn't be watered otherwise, also covers the land with perhaps 30 per cent less water than is needed under gravity flow. At present, he has two and three-fourths miles of moveable sprinkler line, and he plans to add another three-fourths mile the next year. His sons do most of the irrigating and the moving of the sprinkler pipe. The rolling land is planted to grass mixtures and clover. The better land is planted to potatoes, alfalfa and wheat. Alfalfa and wheat are planted on the contour to help prevent erosion and hold soil moisture on steep slopes. The bottom land, which tends to be marshy, is planted to permanent pasture. Castle also believes in taking soil samples and having these analyzed for fertilizer requirements. He supplements the commercial fertilizer with a lot of barnyard manure to maintain the organic matter in the soil. Barns and other buildings on the ranch are adequate but not fancy. Castle has built most of them himself. He has the habit of making a bulldozer out of having it paid for when it is completed. Castle has experimented with many varieties of "grasses" and has come to the conclusion that a mixture of intermediate wheat grass, Siberian wheat grass and mix of timothy and alfalfa is the best job on this ranch. Native grasses on the ranch are creosote bush and wild onion. These are under a rotation program which makes sure a field is not overused until it is ready, the livestock numbers regulated so

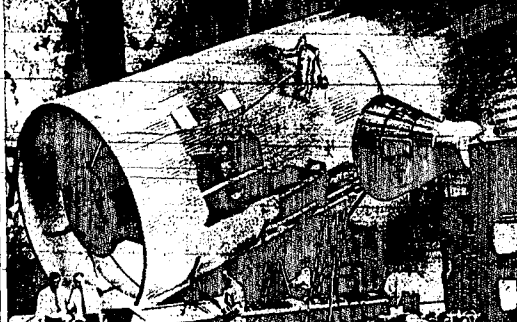

### Carelessness Is Blamed for Home Mishaps

A high percentage of the nearly five-million deaths and disabling injuries in American homes each year can be traced to carelessness while indulging in hobbies around the house.

Most of these accidents occur in and around the workshop and the garden, two places which ordinarily contribute so much to enjoyment of leisure. In order to help cut the toll from home hobbies, Dr. John Henderson has issued a safety check list in connection with "Emergencies Don't Wait Week" (Oct. 8-15). Here are his suggestions:

"Make certain there is plenty of room for equipment, tools . . . and the hobbyist. Cramped quarters lead to accidents.

Keep workshops free of litter at all times. Floors, particularly, should be cleared of scrap, oil, shavings and any obstacles that could cause tripping or uncertain footing, or fire. Sweep or mop up refuse as you go along and dispose of it safely in metal-covered containers.

Keep all tools in a specific, planned, easily identified place when not in use . . . and replace them after use.

Disconnect all power tools



When not in use and padlock them if possible. Workshops with power tools should be definitely out of bounds to children unless an adult is on hand to supervise. Locate power outlets conveniently to the user—but out of the easy reach of children.

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## You'll Need Additional Sitting Space When Youngsters, Friends Visit Home

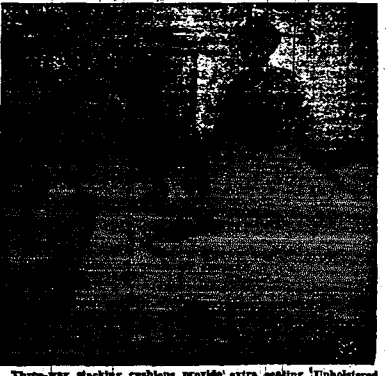

 A simple axiom to remember when entertaining this fall: as sociability increases, seating space decreases.

If you are blessed with sociable youngsters, it is safe to predict that their visit will drop by shortly ahead of your friends. Just enough ahead to stake claim to the available chairs.

This is one sound reason for training youngsters at an early age to have "springs in their knees" when an older person enters the room. Jumping up to offer a chair is all right—as far as it goes, but the displaced person must sit somewhere.

**Place Is Solution**  
 Sitting on the floor is one solution. This is generally favored by the very little youngster and again by the teenager. Even the conventional floor-sitter, however, will latch onto a pad, cushion or pillow if he can.

Obviously, it will be impossible for most of us to stock sufficient chairs to accommodate everyone on a social evening. Auxiliary seating must be found. One of the most ingenious solutions I've seen, but not tried, is presented by the Cleveland person must sit somewhere.

Wash the shade in a circular motion. Then wipe with a damp cloth wrung out in clean, cool water.

 One of these records is "Baxter's Best" by Les Baxter ("Capitol," U.S.). The phonographic record has been able to give stereo-like projection to such Baxter favorites as "The Fog," "Spirits of Paris," "The Quiet Village," "Blue Tango" and "I Love Paris."  
 "Baxter's Best" was issued as a conventional LP several years ago before the country was ready for stereo. Unfortunately it was not recorded on stereotape but it was a best seller. It is difficult to tell that this new re-issue is not a stereophonic record, but it can be played on a stereo set or a conventional set with stereo headphones.  
 If the demand is great enough, perhaps other companies will devise a system similar to Capitol's Dopophonic process. One that particularly could stand this treatment is "Ella's Golden Favorites" by Ella Fitzgerald (Decca). Decca recently retained a number of Ella's pop classics, among them "A-Tisket, A-Tasket" and "Cow-Cow Boogie" which may be heard in this selection.

 No one thought there would be but there is still another recording by the fabulous pianist, Dinu Lipatti, who was cut down in his prime.  
 Lipatti had just had surgery but was already setting the piano world afire. It is a recording of Mozart's first piano concerto as he played it in his last performance with orchestra in 1950 (Angel).  
 Records of Paris were but were destroyed because no one was interested in paying the orchestra musicians for their part. In 1950 two amateurs turned up with recordings they had made from the radio broadcast. By then Lipatti was the height of his posthumous fame and any example of his art had commercial value.

The best of those two amateur recordings is now available — after professional engineers had worked it over for a year. The orchestral sound remains excellent, but that's not too important; the value of the recording is Lipatti's playing and the piano sound, although not of the best, is good enough to reveal what it was like.  
 There are many ways of playing Mozart, aesthetically speaking, and one can only say what is best for anyone but himself. Lipatti's way at this 1950 concert was not individualistic — it was the way of the late Arthur Schnabel, whose student he was. The Schnabel phrasing, the Schnabel pace, the Schnabel nuances are all plain to be heard.

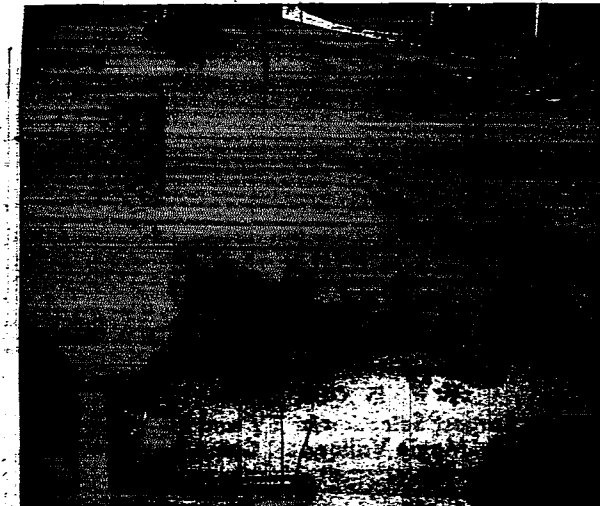

 The only alternative in those days was the music box. But its prissy tinkles was really no competition for the whirring, clicking, honking grandeur of the piano.  
 Today, the roll costs 89 cents. But nothing else has changed. More and more major performers are punching out master rolls and thousands of people are rushing home to pump copies through new pianolas that cost \$1,000. Why? Nobody really knows.

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# Use of Rugs Is Inexpensive Way to Save Costs

Wide-open floor spaces pose a dilemma for the homemaker in search of a floor covering. When two rooms are at one, or flow together with scarcely a pause for a wall or doorway, wall-to-wall carpeting may be fearfully expensive and will not give the wanted effect.

Room-size rugs, area or accent rugs or no rugs at all must be considered as alternatives. Condition of the floor will be one factor.

It's difficult to define the difference between room-size rugs and accent rugs, because handsome designs as now produced in standard rug sizes range from 3 feet by 5 feet to 12 feet by 15 feet.

In general, the area or accent rug tends to be more vivid in design and is intended to highlight a smaller amount of space. In addition, the accent rug may be various shapes: oval, round, square, etc.

The consensus of experts consulted is to steer clear of too many small rugs in a room.

Try to avoid an awkward "half-on" "half-off" arrangement of rug and furniture.

If the rug has a border design, a center motif or fringe trim, a furniture arrangement should take advantage of these features.

If you use two area rugs of almost equal size in different parts of a room, consider selecting blending colors, with the same design motif to unify a sparsely carpeted area.

The rug you set your heart on may be too rich for your immediate budget. In this case, you may be interested in this solution:

A woman purchased two very inexpensive cotton rugs in a pale, expensive-looking beige and taped them together with iron-on tape. These could be separated for periodic washing.

The carpeted area (about 12 or 15 square feet) was unobtrusive but adequate in her charming French provincial living room, and meanwhile she saved up for the permanent replacement.

This grade of cotton carpeting won't give much or long wear, but her total investment was around \$30.

After the hard-earned wool rug was purchased, she separated the cotton rugs, cut them up for bathroom and bedside rugs.

The stamp will be in three denominations—three pence blue, eight pence mauve and one shilling three pence green. The design is based on a representation of the saint contained in a biography of Irish saints published in 1624 by the Rev. Thomas Meschigan.

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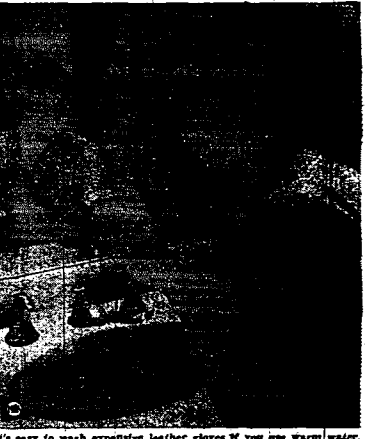

## Cleaning Leather Gloves Requires Certain Knack

If you've had the usual luck with washing expensive leather gloves, you've probably given up and sent them to a dry cleaner. But this is both expensive and time-consuming at the rate that leather gloves sell.

Fortunately, it really is possible to wash leather gloves successfully if you go at it the right way. And the right way includes these steps:

- Use a special glove bath formulated just for leather gloves. And use warm, not hot, water.
- Wash the gloves on your hands with a regular handwashing action. Gently massage the soiled spots with finger tips. No rinsing is necessary with the glove bath.
- Pat with a Turkish towel to remove excess moisture. Gently pull fingers into line, then blow into the gloves to shape them.
- Dry them flat on a terry towel, away from all heat.
- This last step is most important: Put the gloves on your hands before they are completely dry. The natural oils and warmth of your skin help to bring out the softness of the leather.
- There are two don'ts to observe: Don't ever wash leather gloves after they have been dry cleaned. Don't allow gloves to become too soiled before cleaning.

## Hand Tools Have Many Uses

You may think that hand tools have gone out of style, what with all the talk about power tools these days.

But if you're a home handyman, even one lucky enough to have a workshop filled with power machines, you know how often nothing will do the job properly except a screwdriver or wrench or hammer or any one of half a dozen other still-necessary hand tools.

To make your tasks a little easier, here are some tips on the use of hand tools, some of which you may know of some of which usually are known and used only by the professionals.

A wrench should be pulled toward you, not pushed away from you. Never place a length of pipe over the handle to give you more leverage unless you want to risk of breaking the wrench and not possibly injuring yourself.

In using a pipe wrench, be sure the pipe is gripped at the center of the jaws.

If you use a screwdriver for much heavy work, place a rubber eraser tip (sold in hardware stores) over the handle to avoid blisters on your hands. Don't use soap as a screw lubricant, since it may run the material into which it is driven. Use graphite or paraffin or one of the lubricants made especially for this purpose.

SEEK EXPERT ADVICE

For major rebuilding and remodeling projects around the home, it would be wise to consult an expert before going ahead. For example, if you plan to install ceramic tile on walls or floors, see your local contractor for help in selecting the type, color and design best for you.

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## Sporty Togs Broadcast Locations Men's Shirts Making More News

CHICAGO, Oct. 13 (AP)—You can tell from almost a woman's look whether she's "in" or "out" for the sports clothes she wears.

So says H. Barrow Turner, a women's sportswear manufacturer. A Turner survey turned up such pertinent facts as:

If a girl wears tight black pants—either tapers or Jamaica shorts—there's a good chance she's from Texas.

Miscellaneous girls wear more comfortable britches. They insist on being able to sit down.

Bright patterned blouses in stripes, plaids or prints peg the wearer as northeastern.

"Each section of the country has its special favorites," said Turner.

Climate appears to dictate some preferences. Northeastern wear tapers late into the spring

and early in the fall. Turner has found that Florida "inns" in shorts. But the rule doesn't apply in southern Louisiana where heat and humidity notwithstanding, shorts are short skirts in favor of pedal pushers.

Similarly, tight-fitting (especially a natural for cool climates) slacks are more popular in the South. Skinny-tight trousers could qualify as a Confederate uniform, if Turner's survey is any criterion. In the North, they're popular only in Ohio and Illinois.

Classic checks are worn most often in the East and far West. Turner sees some explanation for regional preferences. He believes for instance that southern girls wear Bermuda shorts and pedal pushers instead of short skirts in deference to property.

A region's heritage also may

influence style, Turner said. He found that local designers and patterns find their ready acceptance in the far West. In the Kangaroo, more so-called East, the coordinated costume, with go-together pants and blouse, is more in vogue.

Mid-high Jamaica shorts are one of the few nationwide preferences in sportswear, said Turner, because they're the most flattering to the most women.

CUSHIONS ADD LIFE

A carpet cushion or pad provides more than extra comfort underfoot—it absorbs the impact of traffic and fills in uneven spaces of the floor that might cause worn spots, thus adding extra time to the life of a carpet or rug.

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
