### Oil Glut Held As Reason in Sale of Firm

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 17 (AP)—An oil company which started 53 years ago because Capt. William A. Mason wanted the scarce new shipping fleet is selling out Wednesday for a tidy sum of \$20 million.

The reason: Oil has glutted the modern world's markets.

Since Mason drilled his first California well in 1908, his Honolulu Oil corporation has grown to be the third largest independent producer in America, with properties in six states, including Alaska, and in Canada.

The liquidation deal—best for the company and its shareholders—is scheduled to be completed in October, according to a spokesman at Wilmington, Del.

Contracting to sell the producing and reserve properties and negotiating the purchase of assets from the Hawaiian Oil company and Pan American Oil company, a Standard Oil (Ind.) subsidiary, secured the sale.

Honolulu Oil's management and stockholders had been winding up the deal.

With no refineries or retail marketing, Honolulu Oil depended almost entirely on selling its production to integrated companies.

With crude prices depressed by high world production and the influx of foreign oil imports, Honolulu Oil's management and stockholders chose to sell out to integrated companies rather than risk trying to go into refining and marketing on its own.

### Wilderness Bill May Become Major Idaho Political Issue

BOISE, Oct. 17 (AP)—Campaign patterns for the 1962 elections in the Gem state have begun to emerge with the conclusion of the big gatherings at which the opposing parties revealed their line of attack.

Last week-end in Boise, Idaho, Democrats accepted the Republican challenge to stand by the record of Sen. Frank Church and his position on the wilderness bill when they gathered in record numbers.

The \$125,000-a-plate, fund-raising testimonial for Church drew a thousand Democrats from all sections of the state.

When Idaho Republicans met at Sun Valley two weeks ago they struck heavily at Church's support of the wilderness bill. They criticized the wilderness bill and Church's role as sponsor of the legislation when it passed the Senate.

On these two issues the battle lines are drawn.

Republicans emerged confident they can defeat the bill of Representative Harding of the second district for reelection.

The results of Friday night's gathering indicate the Democrats will rely more heavily than ever on the role of Church as key man in the party.

Church is expected to exert heavy influence in next year's elections for the state. His support is expected to strengthen the position of Representative Harding and Graigg Frost in their reelection.

His support of Harding in 1960 was a factor in Harding's victory over veteran second district Congressman Budde.

Church also may influence the governor's race.

State Democratic Chairman John G. Walters is reported to have support of Church for the party's nomination for governor.

Church, however, told the Associated Press, "I am going to keep out of the governor's race. I think the people should choose for themselves." He indicated, however, that this applied only to the primary.

State Sen. Howard Hechtner, D. Nez Perce, squeaked reports he would step aside if Walters decides to run. The north Idaho solon is close to the wilderness question because of his proximity to mining and timber interests.

Supporters of Max Hanson, appointed Idaho director for the farmers' home administration after the Kennedy administration came to power, also let it be known an attempt would be made to draft him for the gubernatorial nomination.

Hanson was defeated by A. M. Deer for the Democratic nomination in 1958 by 127 votes over the bitterly contested gambling issuer.

Deer lost in the general election to Rex Babcock, a Republican, whose support of gambling was considered a key factor in his defeat.

Two other Democrats have already announced their bid for the gubernatorial nomination. They are A. F. Hintz, Mackay, former cluster county state representative, and Omar Maline, Parma.

Others mentioned as potential candidates for the Democratic gubernatorial nomination are A. F. State Rep. Don Pieper of Bonneville county, and Charles Herrington, Salmon attorney.

The Friday night banquet brought together Democrats of many shades and they all, in effect, showed their support for Church.

However, some Democrats from grazing, lumbering and mining areas of the state have indicated they are by no means sold on the wilderness bill.

Whether Republicans can capitalize on this possible rift remains to be seen. They will make every effort to do so.

**BOISE, Oct. 17**—Proposed locations for interstate 80N in the Boise and Caldwell areas were announced Monday at a meeting of the Idaho highway board.

The board also decided a street widening project on U.S. 99 in Shoshone would be placed in the 1962 construction program, but details would be worked out after the board meets with Shoshone officials Thursday morning.

Hearings on the routing proposals were scheduled for Caldwell Nov. 7 and Boise Nov. 13.

The board also ordered completion of a study in connection with possible relocation of U.S. 101 between Idaho Falls and Chester in Fremont county, between St. Anthony and Ashton.

### Slum School Needs Listed By Educator

**WASHINGTON, Oct. 17**—Both money and a realistic approach to the task of slum-area schools are needed to head off an impending explosion, Dr. James B. Conant says.

Conant, former president of Harvard university, expressed this view in a new book, "Slums and Suburbs," published Monday by McGraw-Hill. It is an expansion of an earlier study he made of junior high school education in the public schools.

"The building up of a mass of unemployed and frustrated Negro youth in congested areas of a city is a social phenomenon that may be compared to the piling up of inflammable material in an empty building in a city block," he said.

"Potentialities for trouble—in

deed possibilities of disaster—are surely there."

The main problem in city slum schools, he said, is to offer courses that have some relation to the students. He stressed vocational education.

"Foreign languages in grade seven or algebra in grade eight... have little place in a school in which half the pupils in that grade read at the fourth grade level or below," Conant declared.

Conant also criticized those who "have placed a taboo on the use of the word 'Negro.' I think this has proved to be a great mistake. How can we improve a situation if we are deprived by terminology from knowing what the situation really is?"

### Red Acts at Fire Hits Bus, Meet to Ease Tense World

Nikita Khrushchev acted to ease some of the pressure of world tensions today.

But his final words as presented before the 22nd communist party congress in Moscow reminded President John F. Kennedy of a phrase—"an apple for an orchard."

He withdrew his Dec. 31, 1961, deadline for signing a separate treaty with the communists. East Germany in exchange for a "reasonable" and "realistic" view by the western powers as led by the United States.

He announced the Soviet Union would conclude its current negotiations with the west toward general and complete disarmament.

Since the Dec. 31 deadline and the Berlin crisis were of Khrushchev's own making, there was no way of knowing to what extent he may have been influenced by the sharp allied rejection of any ultimatum and by consequent allied military preparations.

But at no point did he retreat from previous demands on Berlin which the West already has declared "unacceptable" and he repeated that "a German peace treaty must be signed with the western powers or without them."

The smiling, businesslike tone in which the speech was delivered failed to cover other conditions which under present circumstances the West almost must find unacceptable.

### Canada Area Natives Are Hit by Flood

**TERRACE, B. C., Oct. 17**—Radio stations today issued calls to Indian fishermen to return home to help families stricken by floods that swept away 11 homes.

At least 100 Indians were made homeless yesterday when their homes were swept away by the bursting of a dam east of the southern tip of the Alaska panhandle. Exceptionally warm weather that melted early snow combined with heavy rains to cause the dam to spill its banks.

No casualties were reported as scores of residents of Aiyansh escaped to higher grounds with nothing but the clothes they were wearing.

More than 30 other buildings in the village, including two schools and the Indian health services nursing station were damaged by the floodwaters.

Many homes were flooded at the community of Greenville, 20 miles southwest of Aiyansh. Vancouver, between the two villages, was cut off by the floods but remained dry.

### Depression Ends

**NEW YORK, Oct. 17**—The United States is emerging out of the recent business depression according to the commission of national statistics of the U. S. department of labor.

Speaking at a dinner meeting yesterday, Commissioner Ewan C. Younger said the rate of unemployment reabsorption would double on how fast the present business recovery proceeds as it develops into full prosperity.

U.S. Attempt At Shoot for Ranger 2 Set

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Oct. 17 (AP)—U.S. military... space administration announced Monday it will attempt within five days to launch a Ranger 2 spacecraft on a million-mile journey into space.

Earlier NASA reported the first launching of a Saturn superbooster is slated for the same time period. This will be a brief flight of the 13 million-pound thrust first stage only.

An Atlas-Agena rocket is being readied to take the Ranger 2 into space in a test of techniques for a second stage reentry.

NASA hopes for a more precise prediction than that achieved on the first Ranger launch. A malfunction in the Agena second stage sent the craft into the Earth orbit instead of slipping it into space.

The Atlas-Agena, largest T-3 space booster, will zoom skyward in an effort to place the Agena stage into a so-called parking orbit 100 miles high. When the Agena reaches a desired position on its trajectory, it will re-ignite and propel Ranger 2 on a course designed to take it more than 300,000 miles out before it swings back to descend in the Earth's atmosphere some 30 days after launch.

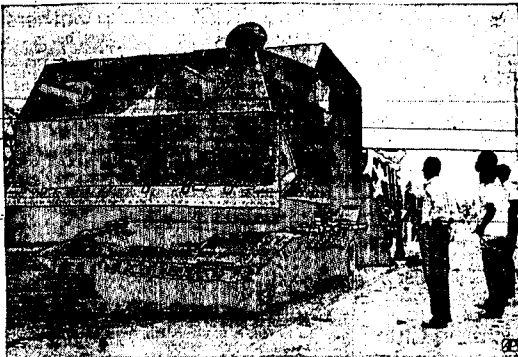
