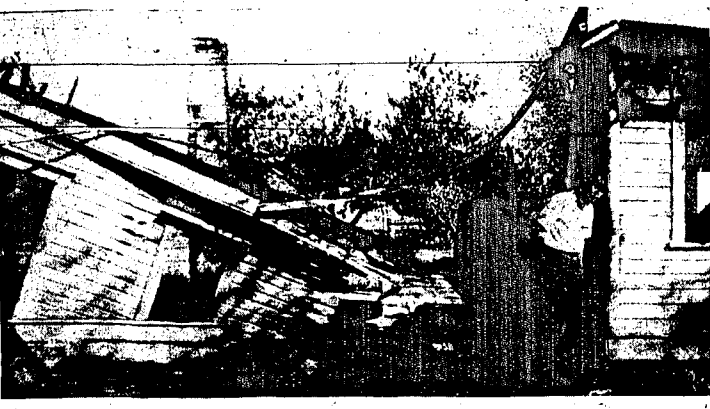

**Fryers, Beef Are Current Good Buys**

 Broiling and frying chickens complete with roast beef for the to-beeaten eye in supermarkets display advertisements this week. Overproduction of chickens has pushed prices as much as 12 to 15 cents a pound cheaper than the year earlier figure. Fryers are 1 to 4 cents a pound cheaper than last week in Seattle and 4 cents a pound less in the New York market.

Government economists note, however, that broiler slaughter, which has been running 25 per cent above last year, now is trending downward. Market supplies for this month are expected to number only about eight per cent more than a year ago.

An added attraction for chicken in the Midwest stems from slightly higher beef prices due to an advance at the wholesale level.

Sharp declines at wholesale for hogs and bellies promise lower prices in the next few weeks. The decline for bellies, from which bacon is derived, comes as a result of inventories of hogs. As of Sept. 1, these amounted to 12.8 million pounds, the lowest on record for the date.

Pork and round roasts continue to be the top beef items, with a special price only occasionally. Turkeys are plentiful generally and priced accordingly.

Cabbage, carrots and onions head the list of outstanding vegetable buys in most areas. White snap beans, celery, lettuce, potatoes, squash, sweet potatoes, cauliflower, green peppers, tomatoes and corn also rate as good buys in many sections.

The expected strong cranberry crop is reflected in bargain prices for berries earlier than usual for this season. Apples, grapes, pears, lemons and oranges also are bargains.

**Idaho Guard Departs for Tour of Duty**

BOISE, Oct. 19 (AP)—Units of Idaho's army national guard to four communities leave today for Ft. Lewis, Wash., to begin a tour of active duty as part of the nation's military build-up.

Guardians of the 159th engineers from Nampa, Orofino and Grangeville and the 88th Transportation Company from Emmett are the first of Idaho's guardsmen mobilized because of the Berlin crisis.

Next Tuesday the other three units will leave for the Washington base. They are the 145th engineer group of Idaho Falls, the 196th supply truck company of Driggs, and the 338th truck company of Ashton.

Units from Nampa and Emmett will meet near New Plymouth and from a single convoy for movement to Pendleton, Ore. They will be joined there by the units from Orofino and Grangeville, which rendezvous near Lewiston.

**Phosphate Study Slated for Idaho**

"We know there is a prospect for development of this particular industry, and we hope to find out what that prospect is and what the power needs will be for it," said Blood.

**Kennedy Plans Venezuela Visit**

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—President Kennedy was reported Wednesday planning a visit to Venezuela.

White House officials declined comment but an informed source said the trip is under discussion. Although no time has been fixed, the proposed Kennedy visit was understood to have been discussed with Venezuelan officials in Caracas last week by U. S. Undersecretary of State Chester Bowles.

Venezuela is understood to have been marked down for the President's first official trip to Latin America to dramatize his admiration for the South American republic's efforts to rebuild, economically and politically, after many years of dictatorship.

### Shriver Says Peace Group Was Praised

**NEW YORK, Oct. 19 (AP)—**Director Robert Shriver said Wednesday his peace corps, despite the recent postcard incident, has been lauded by Nigeria's government as "making an excellent contribution."

He added the suggestion that certain groups were bent on derailing the peace corps.

An international group—around whom a postcard written by Margery Michelson, a peace corps girl from Foxboro, Mass., fell into the hands of Nigerian college students in the card, Miss Michelson had expressed disapproval at the squall she found in the African country.

Shriver departed from the text of a speech prepared for a YWCA fund-raising conference to note that the Nigerian students had passed a resolution condemning "peace imperialism."

"This is familiar rhetoric," Shriver declared. "It is not surprising that certain groups are working by subtle and mischievous to destroy the peace corps."

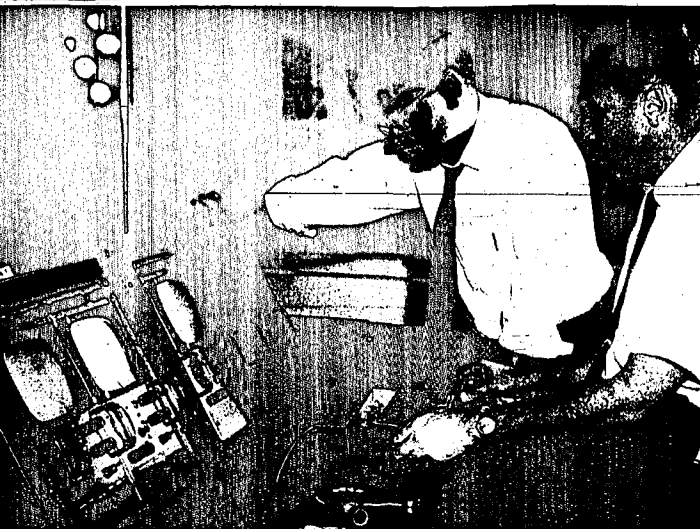

### Closed Circuit to Operate in University's Classrooms

**UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Oct. 19—**Channel 7, the University of Idaho closed circuit television installation, will be operating within the next three weeks.

Dr. William Snyder, head of the communications department, said the television installation, which will broadcast to 10 classroom buildings and all student living groups and other buildings now receiving signals from the campus cable system.

A total of \$35,000 worth of equipment has been added to the closed-circuit facilities for "News, informational, cultural and enrichment type programs will be aired when the operation begins," said Dr. Snyder. "To this will be added a number of regular courses beginning the second semester of this year."

Plans are being made to offer several courses from different disciplines, such as radio education, geology, photography and social sciences, Dr. Snyder said.

An expanding use for the teaching tool of television is predicted.

"It is hoped that the local schools will participate with the university programming and teacher education," he added. "It will soon be possible for the University of Idaho to tie into state-wide and nation-wide programming featuring outstanding teachers and experts from across the country without actually bringing them to the campus."

To be used principally as an adjunct to teaching to regular classroom subjects, the installation and operation has already served as an educational project for students, who under faculty supervision have help set up and operate the equipment.

With the closed circuit system and the addition of a low power FM radio station for which application is being made to the federal communications commission, the department of communications will be one of the most thoroughly equipped in the Northwest," Dr. Snyder said.

The department also has complete cinematography equipment and houses the photography and audio-visual centers as well as a journalism.

### High Court To Consider 'Sit-in' Cases

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—Does the presence of a Negro at a "white" lunch counter automatically "disturb the peace"? This was one of the questions put to the supreme court today in the first arguments stemming from the all-in movement, which swept through the south.

Three separate appeals are be-

fore the court. They were filed by 10 young Negroes who staged demonstrations at Kress's variety store, Silman's drug store and the Greyhound bus station in Baton Rouge, La., last year.

The Negroes, all students at Southern university, were convicted of disturbing the peace. Other demonstrators, whose cases have not as yet been acted on by the high court, were convicted under trespass statutes.

Attorney Jack Greenberg of New York, who represents the students had 14 minutes before yesterday's adjournment to outline his contentions briefly be-

fore the supreme court. They were to be answered later today by District Attorney Sargent Fletcher, Jr., and Assistant District Attorney John F. Ward, Jr., of Baton Rouge.

Greenberg is chief counsel of the legal defense fund of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People.

He told the court yesterday the records in the cases were "barren of evidence" that the students disturbed the peace.

"A conviction barren of evidence is a denial of the due process of law guaranteed by the constitution," he asserted.

### Food 'Cache' For 2 Years Is Proposed

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—A California scientist suggests the United States build a "cache" of food enough for two years would be available within easy walking distance of every American in the event of nuclear war.

Dr. Perry R. Stout of the University of California, speaking yesterday to a component institute of the national research council, said a 15-billion-dollar emergency food supply should be widely distributed.

Stout said: "It will not be too much to follow the ancient Egyptian example that the seven lean years will follow the good. As with the ancient Egyptians, let us take 20 per cent of each year's crop and store it—assuming we can get agricultural production up to such a level."

He added: "In this age of nuclear weapons, the United States is perhaps the most vulnerable of the large nations because of the dependence of her agricultural complex upon industrially supplied fertilizers, fuels and machinery."

"Consequently, in case of large-scale nuclear combat with primary targets being our concentrated industrial establishments, agriculture, even though highly dispersed, will become paralyzed immediately."

The agricultural scientist said a "two-year survival" of food would require supplies of about 100 million tons of grain, protein, desiccated and compacted carbohydrates and fats similar to those plus the vitamins necessary for a adequate diet. And, "as for our present surplus grains, they must be gotten out of the warehouses and converted to animal protein."

### Expert Says Desert Best Shelter Site

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 19 (AP)—Want to escape long-range fallout from a nuclear bomb? Go live in a desert.

That's the answer Nobel prize-winning chemist Will Libby gave at a news conference here, Libby appearing at the national civil defense council convention, explained.

Fallout is carried by rain. There's little rain in the desert. And, therefore, rain that would be relatively free of worldwide fallout.

He said fallout shelters protect humans from radiation but not against the long-range effects of radiation. However, he said, billions of lives could be saved by shelters and should be built immediately.

### Rockefeller Plans Ahead For Election

ALBANY, N.Y., Oct. 19 (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller is working on the first phase of a political campaign that might, if all goes well, land him in the White House in 1968.

The program's first winning goal is the gubernatorial election in 1962.

At present, the 55-year-old Rockefeller is testing at the local level with a system of "saturation" tours to carry his message to the people. He has sampled four upstate cities—Syracuse, Binghamton, Rochester and Buffalo.

In 1958 Rockefeller won all four of the upstate cities in his race with former Gov. Averil Harriman. Last year Sen. John F. Kennedy lost only one of the four large upstate cities to Vice President Richard M. Nixon—Binghamton by 87 votes.

Kennedy carried New York state by 188,666 while Rockefeller won it three years ago by 573,084.

The governor's saturation tours include 30 or 40 scheduled stops in a two-and-one-half day visit to an area. He speaks of the state's improving economy, fallout shelters, more aid for schools and no tax increase.

After his talks, Rockefeller holds a question and answer session. The inquiries come from the personal to state, national and world affairs.

RICHFIELD, Oct. 19 (AP)—Representatives for Richfield's two schools have been named by Mrs. Ralph Riley, Jr., room mother chairman.

### Gold Problems Not Solved

#### Despite Progress in 1961

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19 (AP)—The dollar in your pocket looks the same now as in October, 1960. Even so, your dollar has changed. A year ago the dollar was shunned by many people, even some Americans. They scrambled to get rid of dollars and acquire German marks, Swiss francs, British pounds—and gold. There was fear the dollar might lose its value.

But there is no reason to conclude that the dollar's problems have been solved. In fact, to cite a few recent happenings there is cause for continued watchfulness:

The London gold market had another flare-up last month. Prices rose by pennies and not by dollars and the flurry was attributed mostly to Berlin jitter rather than dollar worries.

Even so, any continued instability in the market price of gold would bode ill for the dollar.

Although stronger than a year ago, the value of the dollar in relation to some European currencies has declined a bit recently. A further slide could portend new difficulties.

The U.S. balance-of-payments situation has worsened in recent weeks after showing marked improvements earlier in the year.

This is most important because the balance of payments is the biggest single factor determining the strength of the dollar.

### Since 1960, the United States has had a persistent payment deficit. That means Americans have laid out more money for imports, travel, investment, foreign aid and military preparedness than foreigners have spent and invested here.

The deficit approached four billion dollars in both 1960 and 1961. It dropped to 1.5 billion dollars on an annual basis in the first half of 1961 but is climbing again. The reason is exports are declining while imports are rising due to the U.S. economic recovery.

A large balance-of-payment deficit inevitably weakens the dollar because it affects the U.S. gold supply—the reserves which back up the dollar's international reputation.

The reputation hinges on this country's 77-year-old pledge to sell gold to foreign governments and central banks at a fixed price—\$35 an ounce. So long as the pledge is honored, the dollar is as good as gold.

Deficits give foreign central banks—the money-lending banks of foreign governments—extra dollars with which to buy American gold. As a result of deficits, foreign gold buying has reduced U.S. gold holdings from 22.9 billion dollars in 1957 to just over 19 billion dollars now.
