

## Giant Russ Atom Bomb Is Exploded

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (UPI)—Russia today exploded a giant nuclear device so powerful it prompted European reports that Soviet Premier Nikita Khrushchev had tested his promised 50-megaton super bomb, but a spokesman for the U. S. atomic energy commission said, pending an official statement, that indications were the bomb was not in the 50-megaton range. The White House also was "highly skeptical" that Khrushchev had fired his big bomb. Described as a senseless "terror weapon" by U. S. officials, the bomb would have the explosive power of 50 million tons of TNT and would be the biggest blast ever launched by man. It would produce one-third as much radioactivity as all the nuclear weapons ever exploded by all the atomic powers.

The largest previously announced nuclear explosion was a 15-megaton blast set off by the Soviet Union on March 1, 1953. First report of the latest Soviet explosion came from Sweden's (Continued on Page 3, Column 2)

## Two Hunters Are Lost; Exposure Is Blamed in Death

One hunter has died of exposure and at least two others are assumed lost as the result of a week-end snowstorm that stranded hundreds of hunters in the mountain. 42, Rupert, was found Sunday morning on a trail leading toward Albion after he had been lost for about 14 to 18 hours in the fog and blizzard. An earlier report indicated he had died of a heart attack, but it was determined he died of exposure.

## Auto Union, Firm Hoping To Sign Pact

UAW Vice President Norman Matthews said last night that 25 of 68 units have received their proposals, with 11 more close to settlement, as the result of around the clock week-end negotiations at Chrysler's 55 plant on coast to coast.

UAW President Walter P. Reuther, driving for a full settlement of the strike, is expected to meet with Chrysler Vice President John D. Leary to review negotiations today. ## Anti-Stalin Moves Head Red Meeting

MOBOWO, Oct. 23 (AP)—The 2nd Soviet communist party congress is moving into its second week today with no sign of a let-up in the bitter, open campaign against old-line Soviet and Albanian leaders.

Shortly after the meeting opened this morning, Elisabeth Gurley Flynn, 70-year-old chairwoman of the American communist party, stepped to the podium to speak.

From the harsh tones of last week's speech, it appeared certain that a shock of the kind over Albania will be formally announced from the rest of the Soviet bloc.

It appeared the congress also was leading up to the expulsion from party membership of such members of the Soviet "party" group as V. M. Kuznetsov, Kaganovich, Georgi Malenkov and the aged Kliment Voroshilov.

Although the more than 5,000 delegates and their foreign communist guests took the day off yesterday, a speech by Premier Khrushchev was expected to be made Wednesday.

Ignored was the plea of Communist Chinese Premier Chou En-lai, a supporter of Albania's Premier Ho, to keep such intra-party quarrels private and try to work them out by negotiation.

## \$40,000 Damage Listed for Truck Mishap Near Jerome

JEROME, Oct. 23—Some \$40,000 damage to a semi-trailer pulled for a truck accident about eight miles east of Jerome on state highway 26 at 4 a. m. Saturday, state Patrolman Marvin Wright said on citations were issued and the accident was caused by road and weather conditions.

Wright said the truck, owned by Kenneth L. Carver, 44, Salt Lake City, driving a 1961 Kenworth truck-tractor owned by Garrett Truck Lines, was on a semi-trailer pulled by truck trailer, told officers he saw a down-grade road and slowed. The trailer slipped and slid, he said.

## Hammarskjold, African Leader Awarded Nobel Peace Prizes

OSLO, Norway, Oct. 23 (AP)—The Nobel Peace prize for 1961 was awarded today Dag Hammarskjold, who perished in a peace mission in the Congo. The delayed prize for 1960 went to Albert John Lutuli, a Zulu Christian leader in South Africa, for his efforts to alleviate racial discrimination. Lutuli is the first African to receive the prize, worth 250,232 kroner—\$48,640. The Nobel Peace prize committee (parliament) last year postponed its award.

## U.S. Troops Force Open Berlin Border

BERLIN, Oct. 23 (AP)—The United States protested to the Soviet Union today against the behavior of East German border guards who Sunday night halted the top state department official to the communist-ruled sector, officials reported. American troops with fixed bayonets had to escort E. Allan Lightner, Jr., deputy chief of the U. S. mission, to insure passage of his private car through the Friedrichstrasse checkpoint into the Soviet area.

The protest was made in writing by the U. S. ambassador, Walter M. Robertson, to the Soviet ambassador in East Berlin, Col. Andrei I. Solov'yev, a communist aide.

Only a few minutes later, the East German communist announced that allied personnel in the western sector of Berlin must show identification papers to U. S. police guards.

The U. S. soldiers were backed up by three Patton tanks that moved up to the border. The tanks stood guard through the night as the border was reopened.

The behavior of the East German police, "created the incident and forced the United States to send a military escort to the border to assist the U. S. minister in exercising his right of free entry and free movement in the Soviet sector," the statement said.

Lightner is deputy chief of the U. S. mission, ranking behind the U. S. ambassador to West Germany. As top state department official in Berlin, he holds the rank of minister.

## Brothers Leave Island Republic

CIUDAD TRUJILLO, D. R., Oct. 23 (AP)—Luis and Rafael Trujillo left the country today for health reasons during the week-end. It was reported today.

Heor Trujillo, another brother of the late dictator Rafael Trujillo, who was reported earlier also to have departed, was understood to be planning an early departure. The United States confirmed last week that men had received entry permits.

## Big Polaris Fired From Missile Sub

CAPE CANAVERAL, Oct. 23 (AP)—The navy today fired an advanced model Polaris rocket from the depths of the Atlantic ocean for the first time.

The 5,900-ton submarine, first of the first designed to fire the 30-foot-tall Polaris "A-2" rocket from a firing tube in its deck at 40 seconds past 11:22 a. m.

The shot appeared generally successful but there were indications of minor troubles with the shot, planned for a range of about 100 statute miles.

But there was no record of any kind from the navy regarding the test. It was the second "zero" shot within eight days for the Polaris program.

The missile erupted from the sub's launching tube ahead of a column of compressed air. It split the surface of the Atlantic ocean, hovered for an instant and darted toward the east by the aid of a massive solid-propellant engine ignited.

It marked the 20th success in 34 known Polaris firings since the first George Washington launched the first submerged Polaris one and one-half years ago.

Rusk Reaffirms American Might WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—Secretary of State Dean Rusk backing a Pentagon official's declaration that the United States has the retaliatory power to crush any aggression, says any U. S. approach to negotiation with the Soviet Union would be from a position of strength.

Rusk emphatically identified himself Sunday with the assessment of U. S. military power by Roosevelt L. Gilpatrick, deputy secretary of defense, at a speech Saturday night. Gilpatrick said the United States has a nuclear retaliatory force of such lethal power that an enemy move which brought it into play would be an act of self-destruction on the part of the aggressor.

## Congolese Army Attacks Katanga

KISumu, Katanga, Oct. 23 (AP)—President Moise Tshombe of Katanga announced today that government forces launched a two-pronged attack on Katanga this morning.

He said news of the attack alarmed him just as his cabinet was considering the central government's reply to his proposals for economic union with the rest of the Congo.

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### 7 Prisoners Saw Out of Seattle Jail

SEATTLE, Oct. 23 (AP)—Seven prisoners, including a society news thief, sawed their way out of their 10th story jail here last night and escaped during a driving rain storm.

Five of the escapees were released at a viewpoint within four hours after the break.

Another inmate, Lawrence D. Johnson, 35, San Francisco, was taken when he lost his grip on a rope fashioned from bed sheets and plunged 10 stories to his death.

None of the escapees was armed.

Still at large were Thomas B. Fasnemeyer, Jr., who was arrested here earlier in connection with the theft of jewels from several prominent Seattle residents, and Arthur B. Peter, Bellevue, Wash. St. Peter has escaped from five prisons since 1942.

"It's your job to keep me in here," Fasnemeyer had told jailers earlier. "It's my job to try and get out."

Two of the escapees, Terry M. Strahlman, who observed his 18th birthday anniversary in jail earlier this week, and Richard E. Loux, were recaptured on the south lawn at the jail by Seattle police men in Bernard Marshall and Steve Brozovich who jumped from their patrol car and leveled shotguns at the pair.

"I'll take a chance with a 38 but not with a shotgun," Loux told the officers.

"Five more seconds and we'd have been gone," Strahlman said bitterly.

B. N. Pitmon, originally from Des Moines, Ia., and a convicted rapist, was rounded up by police in a nearby railroad yard.

Pitmon was right behind Johnson when the Negro fell to his death.

"I'm slipping!" Johnson cried, then, said Pitmon, Johnson lost his grip and fell screaming 120 feet to the concrete below.

### Asian Official Seeking Forces

Not Surrendering

If anyone ever thought that the United States might roll over and play dead under pressure of communist threats, the speech of Deputy Secretary of Defense Roswell L. Gilpatric should set the record straight. Actually, the thoughts in Gilpatric's speech have been repeated and repeated in recent weeks by many officials and President Kennedy on duty.

But sometimes it's best to put thoughts in plain, blunt words. He declared that even if the Russians were to pull a surprise nuclear attack on the United States, this nation could strike back with a blow "flowily as heavy as the enemy's initial onslaught."

"Therefore we are confident that the Soviets will not provoke a major nuclear conflict," he added.

Mr. Gilpatric had another interesting bit of information in his address. He said, "While the Soviets use rigid security as a military weapon, their iron curtain is not so impenetrable as to force us to accept at face value the Kremlin's boasts."

Apparently he is telling the world that the U. S. is able to determine Russian strength in spite of all communist efforts to conceal it.

Without doubt, the Russians don't miss speeches such as the one by Mr. Gilpatric. Nor do they miss much in the way of military information because virtually anyone can find out the location and approximate personnel of any U. S. military camp or station.

The one item that might provide a little trouble for the methodical Russians is to understand the American mind.

Best in People Adversity has a way of bringing out the best in people, as was demonstrated once again over the week-end when scores of hunters were stranded by snow in the south hills.

When it became obvious that outside help would be necessary to take many people out of the mountains, there was no hesitation on the part of law enforcement men, fish and game department personnel, members of the national guard and volunteers.

The stranded people themselves joined forces whenever possible to help each other. There were dozens of reports of drivers stopping to help push a car back onto the road or offer a ride to someone walking out.

The action of Sheriff James H. Benham is perhaps representative of the response in the emergency. Using his own four-wheel drive vehicle, the sheriff almost literally combed the mountain country in which hunters were most likely to be stranded.

The one sour note reported during the week emergency was the case of the four youngsters remaining in a cabin when they saw something move and assumed it was a deer. But even this incident had its compensations.

Undoubtedly there are literally scores of people who went out of their way to help others during the snowstorm. Most of them will remain nameless so far as any sort of public recognition is concerned. They get their reward in the knowledge that they have helped someone.

### High Court Orders Race Case Review

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—The supreme court today ordered a federal court to examine Alabama's five-year-old suit against the National Association of Colored People if a state court does not consider the case by Jan. 2.

The high court also said the federal court will keep tabs on the case until there is a final determination and take such steps as may appear necessary and appropriate to assure a prompt disposition of all issues involved in, or connected with, the state action.

The association is under a temporary restraining order from the Montgomery county circuit court barring the group from all activities in the state.

The supreme court has already acted twice in the case, once in 1958 and again on June 8, 1959.

Those actions dealt with a \$100,000 dollar fine levied against the NAACP for failure to produce its membership list and, according to the state, other records. The high court set aside the fines on the ground that the lists could properly be withheld.

### Solon Avers Medical Care Bill 'Logical'

ALBUQUERQUE, N. M., Oct. 23 (AP)—Sen. Clinton P. Anderson, D-N.M., thinks his medical care for the aged bill will be enacted because it is "the most logical way for a dynamic democracy" to solve the problem.

He predicted yesterday the King-Anderson bill would pass, although it "is going to be one of the most controversial issues in the next session of congress."

But Anderson rapped the American Medical Association's lobbying against the measure on grounds it tended toward socialized medicine. Anderson said the AMA had done "a grave disservice to the entire medical profession, as well as to honest discussion."

He said the bill had been attacked as "an engraved invitation to overcrowd our hospitals."

"After all," he pointed out, "it is only on a physician's order that a patient is admitted... so the reins are in the doctor's hands."

He said the bill designed to provide certain health-care benefits for about 14 million Americans 65 or over, is intended to "take the burden off the general taxpayer."

Anderson said the measure had safeguards and added he did not think "people are going to be hurrying to the hospitals" if it becomes law.

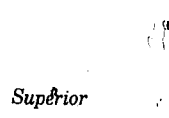

### Hoffa Names Meany, AFL In Libel Suit

CHICAGO, Oct. 23 (AP)—James R. Hoffa and his Teamesters union filed a million-dollar libel suit today against AFL-CIO President George Meany and 24 other top AFL-CIO officers.

The suit, brought by Teamesters President Hoffa in U.S. District Court, charges that Meany and the other AFL-CIO leaders conspired to portray Hoffa as "perpetrator of a fraud upon the American labor movement."

Meany and the defendants in the suit said, "perpetrator of a fraud upon the American labor movement" was done, the suit added, as a "smoke screen to conceal the true picture of the interests of AFL-CIO, a tottering house of labor which has all it can do to keep its own rank from falling to pieces."

### Rebel Claims Hoffa Courts Stray Locals

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 23 (AP)—James T. Luken, who led a rebellion in the Teamesters Union in Cincinnati, has tonight announced that he is recruiting members here that "there is no greater enemy of the labor movement in the United States than the Jimmy Hoffa."

Luken, long a bitter foe of Teamesters President James R. Hoffa, charged that the international brotherhood has spent more than \$250,000 in Cincinnati to draw members back into the fold.

Luken is president of the Dairy Workers union, which last week petitioned the AFL-CIO for a charter. A bargaining election is to be held shortly in the union. Luken's union and members of three other Cincinnati unions totaling nearly 4,000, voted in August to disaffiliate from the Teamesters.

He warned the rebels here that local workers would be threatened with loss of pay, employment and benefits.

Luken and William Kirchner, AFL-CIO assistant regional director, took the union rank and filer through step-by-step procedures for freeing themselves from Hoffa's union.

The local rebels, which numbered 20 when the break was made earlier this month, have formed a Drivers and Warehousemen union local and petitioned the national labor relations board for a bargaining election.
