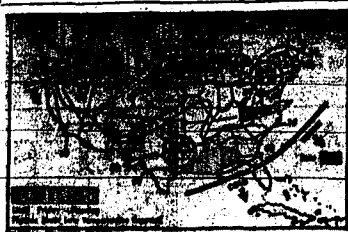

Continuous Threat

Secretary of the Treasury Douglas Dillon didn't have anything new when he said the "very real" threat of inflation to the international standing of the dollar, or, as he put it, the "danger of inflation through wage-price pressures."

And where have you been for the last 15 years, Mr. Dillon? During that period inflation has been running a neck-and-neck race with communism as the greatest danger to the United States.

Deficit financing on the part of the federal government for a major portion of the postwar period—heaped on top of the staggering war debt—has gone a long way to assuring more and more inflation.

Along with his warning, Mr. Dillon was quoted as saying "there are no present signs of inflation." The words are an insult to the intelligence of the American public, but they apparently are intended to set the Kennedy administration line.

Although announcing another slight rise was expected for October, Mr. Myers said the price level has remained unusually stable and is expected to continue to register little change from month to month.

Another part of the daily brainwashing came from Walter Heller, chairman of President Kennedy's council of economic advisers. He said the President is still confident the budget next year will be balanced without boosting taxes.

Higher living costs, increased federal spending and everything that goes along with such factors are calculated to take the edge off inflation. But there is a way to curb inflation and its disastrous consequences.

Let there be no mistake: Communism and inflation are the twin threats to the United States and the communists are well aware of the power of their enemy.

BY GAIN DAWSON AP Business News Analyst NEW YORK, Oct. 26 (UPI)—Industry drove over more heavily on services—such as advertising, an individual. The general economy gains even while the shift-

ing of the economy has been slow. More recently manufacturers have dipped their toes in such things as advertising, research, leasing of equipment, executive recruiting, improving their relations with the public, shareholders and the press.

Today businessmen may turn over their complicated paperwork to electronic computer. They can call in specialists to handle incentive sales campaigns, to plan and run conventions, to conduct stockholders' proxy fights.

It's possible for a corporation today to hire a service agency to do its accounting, a new plant, a second to plan and build it for the company's special needs, a third to finance the building or to buy it and rent it back to the manufacturing company, a fourth to provide equipment on a rental basis and still others to maintain the plant, repair the equipment, furnish temporary workers as needed.

As many corporations turn to financial specialists either to buy it and rent it back to the company, or to provide security offerings, or to lend needed funds, and to others to finance sales to dealers or consumers. Specialists may handle the corporation's stock offering, or to provide security offerings, or to lend needed funds, and to others to finance sales to dealers or consumers.

Corporations increasingly turn to outside specialists to help them in the course of the general course of their particular field. Dan and Bradstreet, for one example, long has been known for setting credit ratings of some three million firms. But businesses now turn to it also for such specialized information as a food price index, commodity price index, new business incorporations, weekly and monthly bank clearings, building permits.

Consultants and trade publications serve ever growing fields as scientific research both wide and narrow specialized technical information.

Consumer research is growing fast. For one example, A. C. Nielsen, Chicago, known for rating radio and TV audience responses, also studies sales of foods, drugs, cigarettes, cosmetics, and other views consumers. It has scores of competitors.

Distribution in many cases is now turned over by the manufacturer to a service firm. Leasing companies have moved into both the field and into manufacturing firms.

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ATTENDANCE FLAG IS WON BY COWBOYS

Magic Valley Total of 61,405 Leads 24 Cities In Four Class C Leagues

Magic Valley's Cowboys played before the largest class C home crowds in the country this season and the local franchise has been named champion of the National Association of Minor Leagues' annual attendance race. Verification of the championship was received by telegram by Ben Jewell followed by a news release. The national association said the local franchise won quite handily. In conjunction with the attendance news, the franchise has received the 1962 working agreement from the Philadelphia Phillies. The agreement, similar to the last pact, calls for options on renewal for the 1963 season, also.

But the big news was the attendance (attendance) although in the second smallest class C town in the nation, Magic Valley drew 61,405 in 65 home games.

Only Visalia, Calif., of the California league, is smaller than Twin Falls with a population of 10,701. Others run as high as 40,021 in the Duluth, Minn., area and over 100,000 in five other franchises.

"We cannot by any means say that there is a home sick in Twin Falls," says Jewell. "We had great support from the entire Magic Valley. The parking lot, night after night, showed most of the counties represented liberally. The board of directors and I are extremely appreciative of the support received from everyone."

The attendance figure used as the basis for comparison was \$1,000—the average for the minor league teams last year. Magic Valley did not field a team in 1959 or 1960.

Using that figure as its starting point, the club increased its attendance by 85 per cent. Most of the attendance came in the second half as the club just broke 800 above even in the first 30 games at home.

Jewell said the profit made by the corporation cannot be made public until the annual stockholders meeting in January. "Preliminary reports indicate we did not enjoy the profit the attendance figure seems to allow. However, there were several large expenditures, such as the deposits with the national association and Pioneer league, that accrued with reacquiring the franchise," he said.

While a representative of the club has been invited to attend the national baseball convention to accept the trophy, Jewell said he delegates have been named by the board as yet.

New American Basketball Loop Begins Play Friday

CHICAGO, Oct. 26 (UP)—The American Basketball league, with its new rules including three points for a long distance shot, makes its debut Friday night when the Los Angeles Jets and San Francisco Saints meet in San Francisco's Cow Palace.

Commissioner Abe Saperstein, highly successful owner of the Harlem Globetrotters and owner of the Chicago representative in the new league, Wednesday announced a schedule totaling 220 games with each team playing 80 games.

The league will be divided into two divisions, the Kansas City Steers and Hawaii Chiefs Jointing the Jets and Saints to make up the Western division. The Pittsburgh Wrays, the Washington Tapers, the Cleveland Pipers and the Chicago Majors from the Eastern division.

Although every team has a home site, not one will play all 80 home games at the same site. For example, San Francisco will play in the Cow Palace and the Civic Auditorium with a few games in Oakland and Sacramento.

An interesting innovation will be the three-point basket. Any goal made from an arc 25 feet from the basket will count for three points. The league also has adopted the wider free-throw line with an 18-foot base instead of 12 feet. The wider lane, used in Olympic games, will prevent jams under the basket.

Whereas the National Basketball association rules that a team on offense must get the shot off in 24 seconds, the ABL rule is 30 seconds. Like the NBA, there will be four 12-minute quarters with no zone defense.

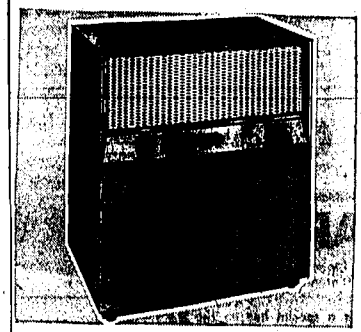

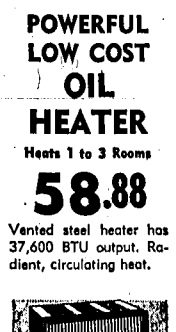

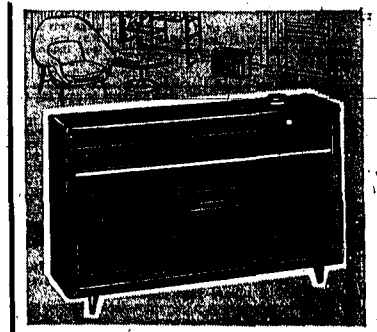

Upland Bird Season to Open Saturday; Average Year Seen

Another normal pheasant hunting season will begin at noon Saturday with several thousand Magic Valley hunters, augmented by the usual influx of out-of-state hunters, opening a month-long upland game season. Charles Blake, district biologist for the fish and game department, reports Magic Valley pheasants enjoyed a "reasonably good year" in nesting but cautioned the first day success is expected to be similar to last year. The season runs from Saturday through Nov. 26. Hunters may shoot four roosters per day and a three-day hen season will be allowed during the Nov. 23 to Nov. 26 finale. Only one hen will be allowed.

In addition to pheasants, the quail and partridge season begins Saturday. Blake noted these species are subject to different bag limits and season lengths for various areas and urged hunters to check out the upland regulations available at any license vendor.

In looking at the prospects for the season, Blake said "Actually, little difference is seen from last year when opening week-end checking stations recorded an average bag of one bird per hunter."

He said the areas that have produced the best results in the past hold the best prospect again this year. These include the Appleton, Hunt, Dietrich and North-Minidoka areas which provide a maximum cover for pheasants. "It follows that more intensely row cropped and pasture lands will be less productive," he noted.

Blake urged hunters to ask permission to hunt on deeded lands. "Magic Valley sportsmen are indeed fortunate to live in an area where permission to hunt is readily given. To insure this freedom in the future requires only a consideration for the rights and property of others," he pointed out.

Hawley Hill, regional supervisor of conservation officers, reports in general the regulations applicable to bird hunting are similar to past years. Hunters should not dress birds so completely that specie and sex are not easily identifiable. It is unlawful to hunt while riding in a mechanically powered vehicle or to shoot from or across a public highway. No artificial light may be used in killing game or to kill birds with a rifle or pistol of any kind.

DALLAS, Oct. 26 (AP)—A glance at the team statistics shows without hesitation why San Diego is leading the American Football league by a mile.

The Chargers are the stingiest on defense of any team in the two-year history of the league. They have allowed their seven foes a total of 1,522 yards—an average of 217 yards per game. It's in passing defense that they are the toughest, however.

The Buffalo Bills last year won the pass defense title by holding their opponents to 1,461 yards. This year San Diego has allowed only 886 yards in one-half the schedule and picked off 26 enemy throws. Buffalo intercepted only 23 for the entire 1960 season.

Houston still leads in total offense, rolling up 2,491 yards in six games. San Diego is second with 2,266.

1,000,000 Salmon Eggs Are Planted In Clearwater

BOISE, Oct. 26 (AP)—The Idaho fish and game department said Wednesday that nearly a million salmon eggs from fall run chinook have been planted in the Clearwater river drainage above Selway falls.

The department said that fish passage facilities "must be engineered and built within four years in order to accommodate mature fish from the incubation when they return from the ocean near the end of their cycle to spawn in the man-made redds."

Director Ross Leonard said exploratory drilling at Selway falls is already underway. The fishery is also expected to help migratory steelhead trout to upriver spawning beds.

The salmon restoration program is being financed with federal funds made available through the Columbia river development program in an effort to restore fisheries that have been depleted by dam construction, Leonard said.

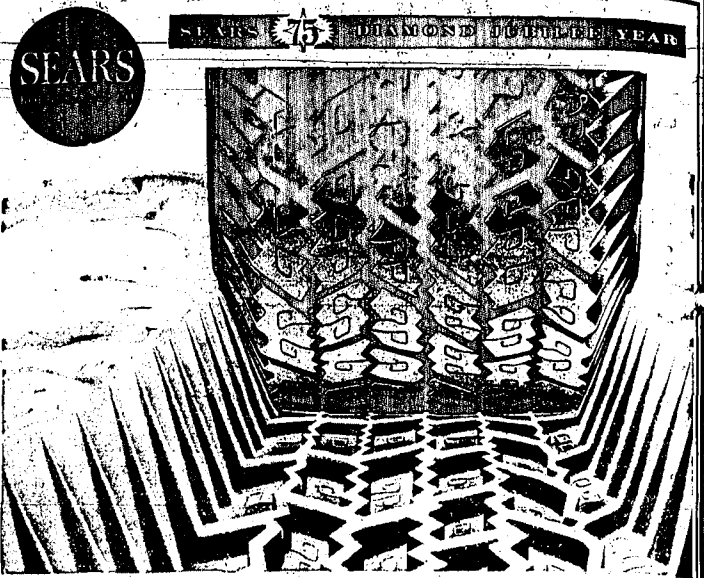

Administration Officials Say Reds Now Have 'Missile Gap'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (AP)—The Kennedy administration today has concluded that the United States which faces a "missile gap."

"Missile gap" is the term long used to describe the plight America would be in in the early 1960's when, it was held, Russia would have superior numbers of long-range ballistic missiles. It came to symbolize, to many, an overall American military lag behind the Soviets.

The fact today is that America now has 40 ICBMs and will have 60 at the turn of the year. It also has 90 Polaris missiles at sea aboard five nuclear submarines and a sixth such ship with 16 missiles at, or near, Cape Canaveral, Fla. The navy says Russia has nothing like the Polaris missile.

Therefore, the administration now apparently believes that if anyone faces a "missile gap," it is Russia rather than the United States.

After lumping missiles, bombers, artillery and other vehicles, the administration lays claim to "tens of thousands" of nuclear delivery vehicles and more than one warhead for each vehicle.

This assessment was given in a remarkable speech last Saturday by Deputy Defense Secretary Roswell L. Gilpatric to a group of corporation executives at Hot Springs, Va. He provided illustrative details.

Gilpatric said that even after receiving a surprise nuclear attack American forces could retaliate with at least as heavy a blow as the Soviets' first onslaught, perhaps a greater one.

By 1965, without any raising of present goals, the United States will have 824 intercontinental ballistic missiles, most of them in hard-to-knock-out underground sites, and 464 Polaris missiles in 29 atomic-powered submarines—a total of 1,288 long-range missiles. Of that total, Kennedy administration defense budget increases accounted for 202.

The land-based force will comprise 128 Atlas missiles of two types with ranges of 7,350 and 8,000 miles; 108 Titan of two types with ranges of 8,000 and 9,770 miles, and 600 solid-fuel, fast-firing Minuteman missiles with 6,325-mile range. There will be three Polaris types, with 1,280 miles, 1,725-mile and 2,975-mile range.

Today there are Atlas operational at Vandenberg air force base, Calif., Warren AFB, Ohio, and Omaha AFB, Omaha, Neb., Fairchild AFB, Spokane, Wash., and Forbes AFB, Topeka, Kan.

While the missile force is building up, the big punch continues to be carried by the 1,465 jet bombers of the strategic air command. They include 858 B-57 medium bombers, 570 intercontinental B-52s, every one of which can lug close to 50 megatons of nuclear bombs, and 40 supersonic B-58s.

While asserting military superiority over Russia, the administration views Soviet technology with extreme seriousness. It has taken steps to expand the missile program, accelerate work on missile defense measures and produce U.S. retaliatory forces through mobility, concealment and hardening of underground sites.

While the Russian 30-50 megaton explosion is regarded as a necessary military test, the Soviet rocket shots in the Pacific and Atlantic are something else again. The three-stage rockets are said here to be operational intercontinental ballistic missiles, somewhat improved over those used in earlier Pacific tests.

America's anti-missile missile, the Nike-Zeus, is in an advanced stage of development. It is scheduled to be tested in the Pacific next spring against the Atlas intercontinental ballistic missile.

The Zeus development has cost nearly a billion dollars so far. But there is no assurance that the defensive weapon will be put into large-scale production.

The army, builder of the Zeus, is confident of its anti-missile production for the last two years. But even if the Zeus is successful, questions will remain in military quarters as to how effective it would be against a multifaceted attack possibly using decoys to confuse the defenses.
