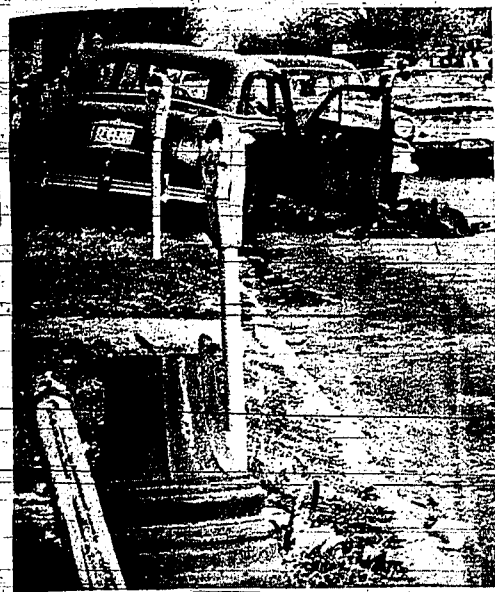


Death Car Leaves Path of Wreckage

Time for Action... The reactions of people in times of stress and crises are likely to have a large bearing on the course of nations and whether those nations will survive stress and crises.

Time for Action... Here and there across the nation a few voices have been raised in protest over trends, conditions and attitudes not conducive to the preservation of a great nation.

Time for Action... "Let's quit being bulldozed and bedazzled by self-appointed long-hairs. Let's have the guts to say that a book is dirt if it's not worth reading. Let's have the guts to say that a painting is a daub if you can't figure out which way to hang it.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

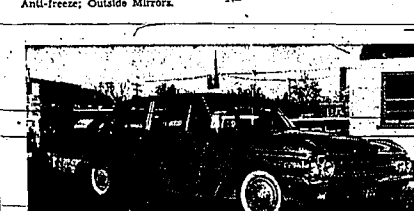

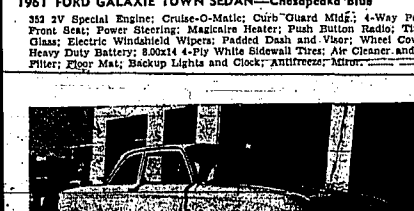

Test Report Broadcast to Russians Set

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Voice of America will broadcast a report on the test results of the Soviet nuclear test on Sunday. All its effective facilities for an eight-hour broadcast will be used for the report.

The VOA said the transmission power involved, 431,000 watts, will be the greatest concentration ever achieved for the Iron Curtain area.

The report, of more than 80 minutes, will be broadcast in the simplest U.S. broadcasting stations operating simultaneously.

Nearly 80 different frequencies and eight languages will be used in the effort to tell the Soviet people of this is the fourth test and the world's recaller to them.

Beginning at 9 a.m. the VOA said the broadcast will report on the remaining nuclear test to the Soviet nuclear testing, the perils of the Soviet nuclear test to achieve a ban on testing.

The paradox of milk selling unaided in store coolers, and then being dumped in the gutter, in a city that has had its milk supply all but dried up by 8-minute-day Teamsters Union strike results from health department regulations.

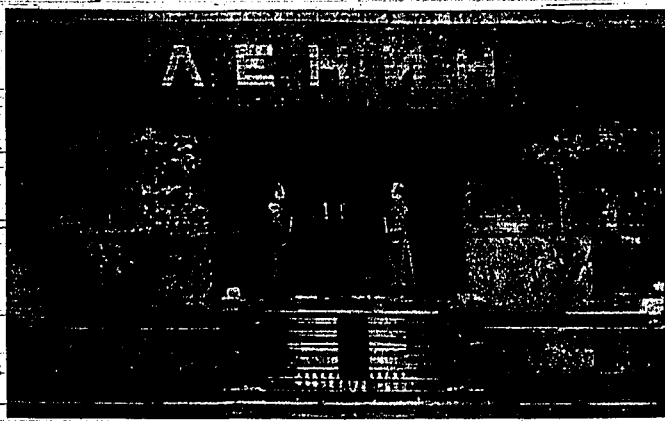
No milk that comes from a source not inspected and approved by the health department can be sold in New York, and inspectors are enforcing the regulation where they find milk from non-approved sources being sold.

Federal Suit Filed to Halt Racial Laws

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—The Justice department yesterday filed a suit seeking to prevent Mississippi officials from enforcing a segregation law which prohibits interracial co-mingling in their terminals.

Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy announced filing of a suit July 16—few hours before the 1961 effective date of the law prohibiting racial segregation on their terminals—buses and in their terminals.

Kennedy said the suit, filed in U. S. District Court in Oxford, Miss., also asked that the state segregation law be declared in conflict with the U. S. constitution.

The attorney general said the court also was asked to "issue a temporary restraining order against enforcement of the state law," but a Justice department spokesman later reported this request was denied by U. S. Judge Claude Clayton.

Group Seeks Protection of Power Links

OLYMPIA, Wash., Nov. 1 (AP)—The "Bonneville power administration has sent to state officials a final draft of proposed legislation to safeguard Pacific Northwest power resources under a possible hookup with California, an official said Tuesday.

Conservation Director Earl Cope said he had received a copy of the legislation from the BEA in Portland.

In Portland, a BEA spokesman said the proposed bill was a final revision drafted after a conference with Northwest power companies and other interested persons.

Cope said the legislation presumably will be introduced in the next session of Congress.

The bill carries only minor changes from earlier drafts that have been proposed.

The legislation is designed to protect the Pacific Northwest if a high-voltage line is ever constructed for the sale of surplus power to California.

As drafted earlier, it provides primarily for a call-back of power after seven days notice if it is needed to meet requirements in the Pacific Northwest.

Inquiry Ordered Of Plane Crash

ELIZ, Nev., Nov. 1 (AP)—An investigation from the federal aviation agency planned today to look into the circumstances of the airplane crash Tuesday which killed William C. Aney, 39-year-old general manager of the Angulus Trailing Manufacturing company, El Monte, Calif.

Aney was flying from Pocatello, Idaho, to Las Vegas, Nev., when he encountered a snowdrift and his single engine plane crashed into the side of a mountain. Deer hunters spotted it two hours later.

Radio distress signals from the plane were heard.

Deputy Sheriff Ted Olson of Eliz said the wreckage was scattered in the vicinity where the plane did not burn.

4 More Cranes Arrive in Texas

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—Another four adult whooping cranes have arrived in Texas for the winter, making 24 of the scarce birds now accounted for in the interior department reported today.

The 24 include four hatched this year.

At spring of wild whoopers left the ARNOLD national wildlife refuge on the Gulf coast of Texas for the winter, the selection of some 2,800 miles into the Canadian wilds.

That was the largest flock of wild whoopers counted since systematic checks were commenced in 1952. The record was established on the afternoon of last Nov. 15 when 30 adults and 6 young of the year were spotted in and near Aransas.

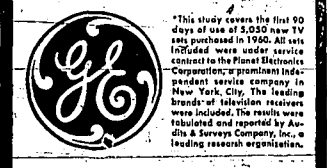

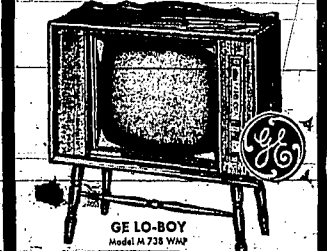

U.S. Employee Totals Lower In September

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—A congressional watchdog group reported today that the number of civilian employees on the federal payroll decreased by 17,883 during September.

Civilian employment was 2,471,416 in September, the report said, compared with 2,489,303 in the previous month.

The decline was released by Chairman Harry F. Byrd, D. Va., of the joint committee of the House and Senate on the permanent federal extension of nonmilitary federal expenditures.

They showed that the largest decrease was in 19,553 employees in employment in civilian agencies. Only a net decrease of 110 jobs was made in civilian working for military agencies, reflecting President Kennedy's emphasis on a buildup of forces to meet the Berlin crisis.

Pakistan Claims Russia Forgets Documents

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 1 (AP)—Pakistan charged today that Russia had forgotten documents pertaining to outline plans of the central party organization (CPY) to create nuclear "death zones" in its own country and Iran as part of an attack on the Soviet Union.

Pakistan Ambassador Mohammad Rafiqul Khan condemned the documents as "voluntary and absurdly" and said that Russia is preparing the "false papers" to be used to the detriment of the propaganda mills.

Soviet Delegate Semyon K. Tsypkin replied that the documents were "not checked and verified," alleging that they had been sent by CPY to military commands of Iran, Iraq, Pakistan, Turkey, Britain and the United States in 1958.

Idaho's Solons Termed Liberal

BOISE, Nov. 1 (AP)—Idaho's delegation in Washington, Aug. 28, in the opinion of Sen. Henry Dworshak, is now among the most liberal from any state, a "small liberal" panel of Republican congressmen said here Tuesday.

One of the panel, Rep. Charles E. Goodell, New York, said, "We do not feel that this representation reflects the true feeling of Idaho voters."

The panel of four GOP congressmen denounced the New Frontier and all its works at a press conference here.

U.S. Defends Processes of Reserve Call

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1 (AP)—A Pentagon spokesman conceded Tuesday a few errors had been made in calling up 120,000 reservists, but they depicted a conscientious charge that personal problems of the men are being ignored.

In case of doubt, he said, they have leaned over backward to decide in favor of the individual.

Most of the few errors have stemmed from reservists' failure to keep the army informed of their changes in personal status or critical occupation that might make them exempt, Darrell said.

"There's no law to make them keep contact with the army," he said.
