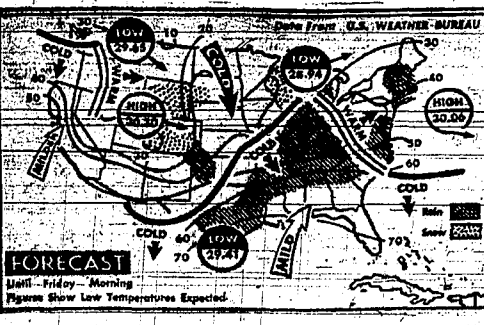

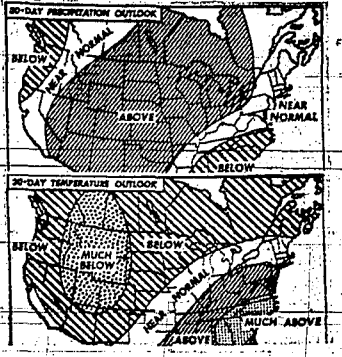

In Seattle Wednesday, 16 bids were offered to the general services administration, which put the plant up for sale.

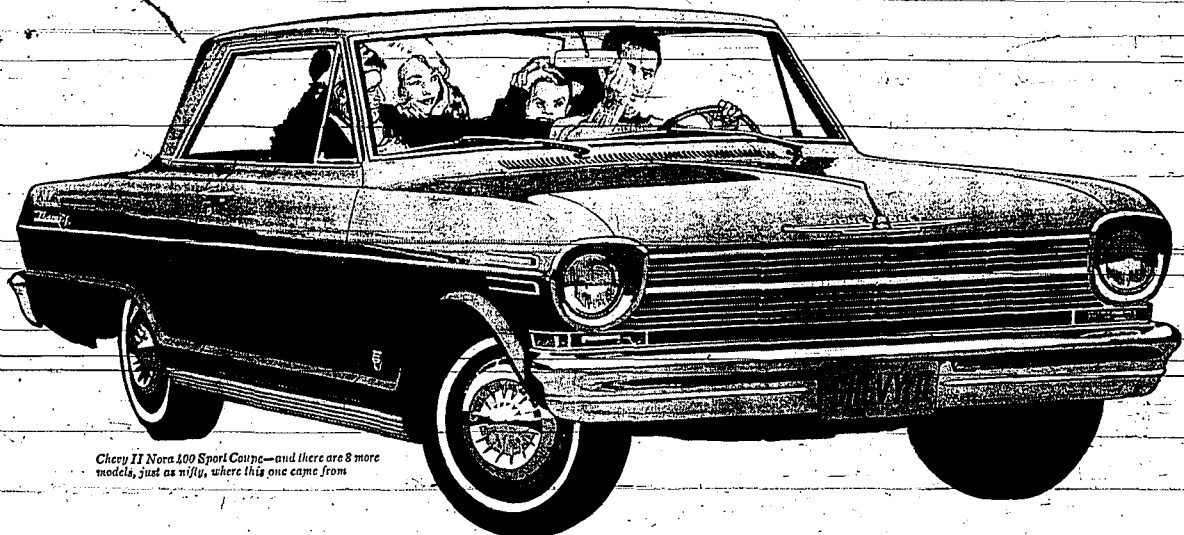
Gen. Robert E. Smylie expressed pleasure over the bid results and said it should mean employment of about 2,500 people here too very long.

TUCKER'S NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2—Tucked away on the inside pages of the newspapers was the news that the U. S. Marine Corps "Americans are shockingly unfit to defend their country."

A few weeks ago, the President's council on physical fitness was urged to publish some "shocking" news. The council was to search for "shocking" news. The council was to search for "shocking" news.

The reason? Youngsters in their "civilized" countries, much stronger than their American counterparts.

More recently, a young high-school teacher who escaped from Communist Russia, told us that there were no "shocking" news. There were students in her eyes. Some of the "shocking" news was that they should oppose it, but they didn't know a thing about the status of Liberty except that there was a day by day in Communist Russia.

Real Nerve

Ever since the selective service act became effective, the nation has been treated to a parade of muscular, well-coordinated athletes who had been conditioned physically for the job. The public has been given long, involved explanations of why individual athletes shouldn't be drafted. How much longer will the public continue to stomach such farces?

Lastest incident of the slating of a "nerve" athlete was the slating of a football player. First off, either management of the pro club or fans apparently have tried to enlist political support in a drive to defer the athlete until after the season. It would make a fine story to seek deferment during the duck season is over.

Then the other day one of the athletes for the Green Bay Packers, showed up at the Great Lakes training station for another physical examination.

He was scheduled to report for active duty in the army the day before, then in a sudden switch, he was ordered to report to the naval hospital at Great Lakes for a physical examination. It was explained he had been troubled with a "nerve ailment" caused by a "pinched nerve." And just how many pro football games has the star halfback missed this season because of his troublesome ailment?

What a ridiculous picture! Here is an athlete involved in probably the most bruising sport known, with the possible exception of ice hockey. Week after week, he slips around on the field. Then he's called for military duty and all of a sudden he has a "nerve ailment" caused by a "pinched nerve."

Perhaps some of the parents of young servicemen aren't entirely paid-properly about athletes, might have some thoughts on the subject. And those facing military duty might like to know it's right difficult to check up on a "nerve ailment" caused by a "pinched nerve." Top athletes, both professional and amateur, should be the type of men most desired in the armed forces, regardless of capacity. It might be time to change the existing regulations to specify that any man healthy enough to participate actively in a strenuous sport will be accepted into the military without further physical examination. The thought is that a physical exam should be necessary for sport that is much more strenuous than military service.

GIANT PROBLEM

The Minnesota accident in which a 76-year-old driver was killed and the driver was killed in a Halloween parade serves to focus attention on a big problem.

Granted, the accident could have involved any driver because no one was hurt to such a degree as in the Halloween parade, an elderly driver having a heart seizure is much greater. The possible consequences were demonstrated quite effectively in the Minnesota tragedy. Two women were killed outright and a dozen others injured.

The problem of aging drivers is not going to go away and it isn't going to solve itself. Every year, a greater percentage of the nation's population is comprised of older people. There is a real danger, both mentally and physically to drive an automobile. Even if they were to be given special tests and examinations to determine qualifications, they probably would pass with flying colors.

As the age increases, so do the possibilities of sudden death from heart seizure or some other ailment. It wouldn't be fair to these older people to send an aging age at which they are no longer able to drive. It is a privilege, something that should be given to those who are physically fit and sound of mind.

The problem has grown enough so that the public is entitled to some sort of protection, and aging drivers deserve protection from themselves if they cannot recognize danger signs.

FREE LIBRARIES AND COMMUNISM

Free libraries exist in America because we have a freedom of speech which is guaranteed by the Constitution. Public libraries are still permitted to provide the needed materials in their search for the truth.

But in a month-long communist society public library freedom would be destroyed. There would no longer be freedom of thought. There would be no more books to be censored; only that the commissar permitted would get to the shelves, and a good Communist would never take to meet the demands of a communist overlord.

Any truly democratic government worthy of the name of government must be in constant conspiracy to maintain itself.

That is an axiomatic truth which has escaped many Americans.

Any measure library trustees can take to help preserve democracy and the right of free expression is a step in the right direction.

Stalin Tomb Shows Mark Of Demotion

MOSCOW, Nov. 2 (AP)—Joseph Stalin, once the unchallenged leader of world communism, was relegated to the ranks Wednesday in a simple grave with the bare epitaph: "J. V. Stalin, 1879-1953."

Only some marks on the floor of the huge tomb in Red Square testify that the old Bolshevik, now reviled as a murderer of thousands, had shared the hallowed mausoleum with V. I. Lenin, founder of the modern Soviet state.

Soviet citizens by the thousands lined up in the rain to view Stalin's new grave, already covered with turf, behind the long shadow of the Kremlin's walls. Pravda had announced that the original structure of the tomb had been carried out.

It was obviously a hasty job. The long black cover over the entry to the tomb had been covered with a kind of black tar or plastic. It used to bear the name of Stalin, below that of Lenin. Now over the black covering the word "Lenin" is in red paint.

Inside, Lenin's body lies where it had been since it was moved over to share the gloomy chamber with Stalin, who was put there March 9, 1953, 10 days after his death. Lenin died in 1924 and his embalmed body had been in a wooden structure on the same site until the present tomb was completed in 1929.

For the first time at the 22nd congress of the Soviet Communist party just ended, the Soviet people were told that Stalin had ordered the massacre of innocent thousands of his fellows.

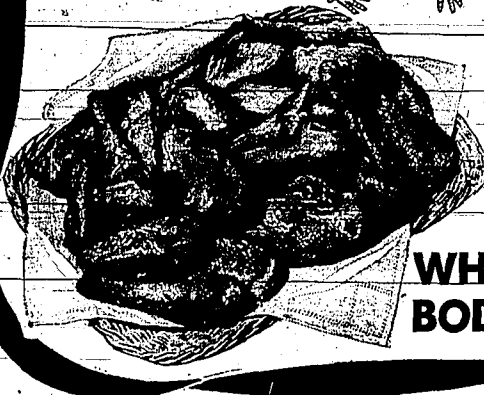

Major Cancer Breakthrough Expected Within Next Year

WASHINGTON, Nov. 2 (AP)—A medical scientist said today when the answer will come, and we are likely to have improvements in therapy before we know the whole nature of the disease.

The prediction was made by Dr. R. H. Ravdin of the University of Pennsylvania at a national cancer conference. He heads a clinical studies panel appointed by the National Cancer Institute to evaluate new drugs for control of cancer.

Ravdin said real progress has been made in cancer research in the past two years, and effective chemical agents already have been found for treatment of special types of cancer.

"Doctors have improved in the cancer fight, and we are beginning to see the light," Ravdin told the conference attended by more than 1,000 physicians and medical researchers from all parts of the nation.

He said it is now certain that "cancer will come under control, just as diabetes did."

"A cancer could come next month, next year, or next week," he said.

"It is important that we keep cancer patients alive as long as possible because we never know when the answer will come, and we are likely to have improvements in therapy before we know the whole nature of the disease."

Ravdin said research to date strongly suggests that "most human cancers are probably due to viruses and the answer in treatment will probably go through a variety of chemical agents."

The protruding bar, which the times news has discussed six weeks ago, is blamed for severe neck and back injuries and is labeled a ready-made handle for a doctor to use in twisting a ball carrier down.

There is a 15-year penalty assessed for grabbing the bar but nothing is being done to get rid of it. And hitting it for hitting the injuries in the past three weeks.

Coaches and doctors have blamed the bar, basically, the bars, for causing many of the injuries to the players.

Another feature which Ostyn likes, the helmet is cut somewhat higher in back, allowing snapping it into the neck takes much more pressure on the bar or snapping this off, coach Ostyn is ordering specially a sponged cover on the outside of the helmet which runs three to four inches wide and goes from front to back. It offers more cushion for the sides.

Perkins, who gained 49 yards in 10 carries against the Giants, weighed 191, played halfback and is the fifth-ranked runner in the league with 415 yards. Cleveland's Brown and Green Bay's Taylor are fullbacks. Taylor weighed 215 and ran 229 yards.

Two weeks before the game at Yankee stadium, the Giants had beaten the Cowboys 21-10 in the first game of the Philadelphia Eagles swooped into the Coliseum and went home 43-2 against the Giants.

The victory over the Giants was twice as big coming after a defeat like that, Landry said. "But I knew the boys would have it. The dressing room was very quiet before the game, but you could see the determination. The Giants are a good club, but the second time around it always tougher if you've won the first time you've played a team."
