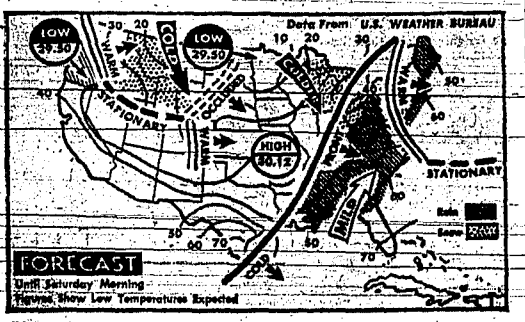

Gen. Taylor Ready With Asia Report

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Gen. Maxwell D. Taylor returns from his Southeast Asia mission today to give President Kennedy his ideas for bolstering South Vietnam against growing communist infiltration.

The President's special military adviser was scheduled to report to the chief executive at the White House at 9 a. m.

Taylor's recommendations for a "crisis" program and the President's subsequent decision to send U. S. military forces to mark a turning point in U. S. strategy in Southeast Asia, were announced last week. Taylor controlled a considerable number of Laos and air punching out of Laos in neighboring South Vietnam.

Taylor has declined to say whether he will recommend sending U. S. military forces to the republic of Viet Nam. But his public remarks have indicated he needs to need to quantify any large number of American combat forces to that country at this time.

Some officials believe, on the basis of information from the field, that Taylor will recommend U. S. forces in a supply and logistic capacity, but not for combat units unless he is sure of the situation.

BERLIN, Nov. 3 (AP)—United States today ordered more military convoys into West Germany through the Soviet zone to demonstrate western rights of access to the divided city.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3 (AP)—Unemployment in the nation decreased by 151,000 in October to 3,384,000, an employment rate of 68.2 percent, a record for any month.

It was the first time in a year that the idle total has been below four million, the labor department said today.

Despite the big increase in employment and drop in unemployment, the seasonally adjusted rate of unemployment compared with the civilian labor force remained at 6.8 per cent.

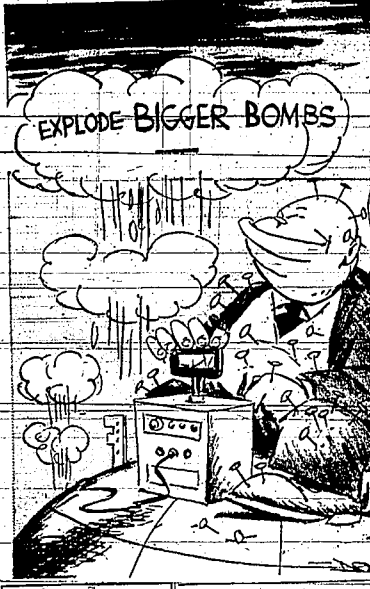

FRATONIA, Nov. 7 (AP)—The South African government today granted Zulu leader Albert John Lutulu a passport to go to Cuba to collect the Nobel Peace Prize.

Lutulu, 61, has been restricted to a native reservation in the eastern province of Natal since the 1960 race riots at Sharpeville. He was banished to the nearby African National Congress, which was later outlawed.

They will next visit Arden, where the climate is similar to their native land, according to Clough. He said while the climate in Magic Valley is not comparable, water problems here are similar to those in the Somali republic where nothing can be grown without irrigation.

The boys who were briefed Thursday by Earl Stubbelt, manager of the Twin Falls office of the Production Credit association which covers the eight-county valley area. Thursday afternoon they will tour the Amalgamated sugar factory here and leave in the afternoon for Elk Lake City.

Alan Rutkin had started Britain on the way to victory with a decision over Sherman in Washington, Philadelphia.

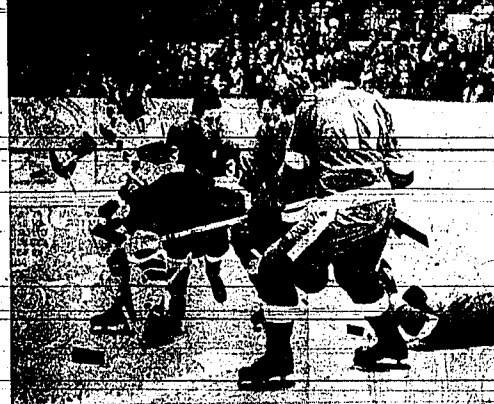

With Little Care of Fireplace You Can Keep Home Fires Burning This Winter

Lucky enough to have a fireplace in your home, you consider it only a decorative item, you are missing a lot of pleasure and comfort that can come from a fireplace on a chilly evening.

Too many people use their fireplaces because they've convinced they don't work properly — a notion reinforced the first time the fireplace was tried and it did nothing but puff smoke back into the room.

May Be Faulty Design
A smoking fireplace could be the result of faulty design. But, it's more likely the result of improper adjustment, dirt, or a number of other minor things that can be corrected.

The best designed fireplace will give trouble if the fire hasn't been properly built. A fire built too far forward will smoke, for several reasons. If it extends farther than the inside lip of the opening, the front smoke will just naturally spill out.

Fire that is too far forward will fall to best the rear wall of the chimney; enough. It's the heated rear wall that promotes the proper draft which in turn pulls the smoke up the chimney.

If the chimney is on an outside wall, it becomes even more important to heat up the back portion, since this wall will be naturally chilled from the outside air.

Momentary Blaze
In addition, prevent a cold chimney before you start a fire. Hold lighted newspapers up to the throat of the chimney. Throw a few newspapers on top of the wood to get a hot-though momentary blaze going.

A dirty flue, an obstruction of any kind, will reduce the flue area and, of course, force smoke back into the room.

Chimney can be cleaned in the immediate area of the fireplace with a long handled brush, or from above by lowering a weighted sack by rope down the chimney. Be sure to block the opening of the fireplace before opening it of soot!

Check Damper
Check the damper to make certain that it works freely, so that you can open it all the way when getting the fire going but can close it lightly when the fire is out. An improperly closed damper provides an escape route for warm air in the room when the fireplace is not in use.

The fireplace opening may be too big, or the flue opening may not be big enough. The area of the flue opening should be roughly one-fourth that of the fireplace.

NO WEIGHTS NEEDED
Easily built roof truss rafters constructed to fit any space, double living rooms without need of partitions or posts. Either Douglas fir or West Coast hemlock is ideal for these rafters because they have great strength for their weight.



place opening. If you can decrease the fireplace opening, it will have the same effect as enlarging the flue and will provide the air that is needed.

A large opening needs a lot of air. Reduce it by raising the bottom line with one or two courses of bricks. Or hold a board across the top of the opening until the fire seems to draw better, then install a hood to cover the opening to that point.

Household Helpers

Clean androors and fire tools. Then spray with a clean lacquer in an aerosol container. This prevents tarnishing.

Put on the plastic mat the electric cord — when you disconnect lamps and appliances. Pulling the cord looses the copper wires inside. They are likely to break.

Avoid spills by placing a strip of adhesive tape around the top of your child's drinking glass. It will give him a good grip.

Goods can make their foot lockers too double duty as attractive window seats by covering them with tailored slip covers and taping them with thick foam rubber cushions covered in the same fabric.

Before you start painting your house this fall, check the condition of the masonry around the windows. If it is missing or cracked, it should be replaced.

Don't Forget to Mulch Garden; It Saves Plants

Don't forget to mulch your shrubs against the ravages of winter. Mulching will save some of your plants from freezing and assure healthier growth next spring.

Of course your garden will benefit from mulch all year because this process saves moisture in the soil by reducing evaporation, and retains warmth of weeds. But for winter, mulch helps keep the temperature of the soil fairly even. And materials piled around plants as much as organic and add richness to the soil.

Winter mulching acts as an insulator, but don't heap mulch against shrubs until the weather turns cold. You must give the wood a chance to mature and harden before early fall frost can damage them. This is even more important in low, wet areas.

Materials for mulching include peat moss, dry leaves, straw, salt hay, pine needles, rotted manure and sawdust. Leaves are very suitable for mulching evergreens and other shrubs. A simple method is to take the leaves around the shrub and weigh them with a burlap bag or boughs to keep them from blowing away. Remove them as soon as danger of heavy frost ends.

It is too costly to repaint all the walls. Do you think fabric could be smoothed over them? I have read that decorators use ticking and other fabrics on walls."

Decorators do use fabric on walls but the walls must be smooth. They use paper behind it, applying the fabric to the paper, not directly on the wall. When the walls are not flat, they either sand them smooth, or attach the fabric to plywood.

The method is to stretch the fabric over the board and staple it to the wood at top and sides using a staple gun. Attach the plywood to the wall and then staple or tack trail over the stapled areas. One other possibility, of course, is to paint your walls a single color, lifting the bumps and hollows to provide texture.

Here's a fireplace problem. "We would like to have a fireplace in our ranch house but my husband says it is a structural impossibility because of the space required for the fire bricks. Would a phony fireplace look too modern in a room that is furnished in early American style or would the coziness of the room be upset by a fireplace that is run by electricity?"

Fake fireplaces and those run by electricity are made in a variety of styles and designs which fit nicely into a cozy room. Also there are many stylish woodburning fireplaces available which do not employ conventional chimneys.

If you investigate the possibilities locally, you will find that some have fine arrangements that take up little space and the fireplace itself can be very decorative. It also is well to check with your fire underwriter, who may have suggestions for safety in connection with both electric and small-flue fireplaces.

The trend is to more color in the home, but many people have difficulties in assembling a satisfactory color scheme as this letter indicates:

"I want to furnish my home in Colonial style, but find that I am stymied when it comes to color schemes. I just don't know how to begin. Where can I get help?" One clue may be obtained by examining documentary fabrics in the various rooms. Some of these early patterns. How to place furniture around

a fireplace isn't as easy as it sounds when you want to make it the focal point of a room as this letter points out:

"I don't have two small sofas to use in the usual fashion at the fireplace in a new home. I have put a small upholstered armchair on either side of it, but that looks skimpy. The other furniture I have includes an oblong table, a large upholstered chair, a desk, a Henrycy bench and two miniature chests which are now used on either side of the sofa along one wall."
