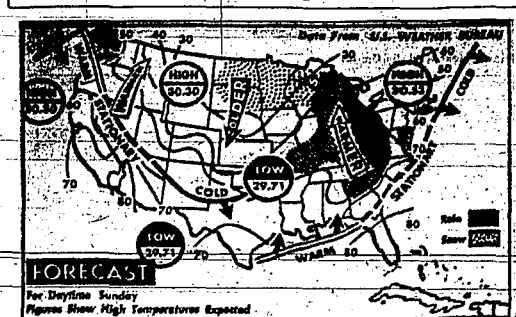

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Police Patrols Escort Trucks Bringing Milk Into New York

NEW YORK, Nov. 4 (AP)—Special police patrols were assigned to main trucking routes entering the city today as a precaution for milk trucks arriving here in the midst of a Teamster strike.

The strike has cut off a daily supply of one million quarts of milk daily for 10 million residents of New York City and Long Island.

The Teamsters had agreed not to interfere with the shipments as long as no attempt was made to operate struck milk plants here.

One plant was exempted by agreement with the union—the Bronx Terminal market, which was taken over by the city to supply hospitals, schools and other institutions.

Motorcade units and radio cars of the police safety division were sent to the city line, chiefly in this vicinity.

Four trucks laden with packaged milk from the Eastern Milk Producers cooperative at Syracuse, N.Y., arrived at Staten Island at 11 a.m. They carried about 12,000 quarts.

Farmers drove the trucks, which traveled over the Goethals bridge via New Jersey, New York City police met the trucks at the New York end of the bridge and escorted them to the Westinghouse dairy. There were no incidents.

The milk was brought in to be sold from the dairy platform with a limit of two quarts to a customer. The dairy stressed that it was not "delivering" milk on its usual routes.

Another convoy of trucks, each carrying about 8,000 quarts, entered Nassau county on Long Island from Suffolk county under a heavy police guard. No incidents were reported.

Negotiations to settle the strike were deadlocked with no sign of a settlement as the city took over the Bronx plant.

October Moisture Boosts Snake River Reservoirs

BURLEY, Nov. 4.—Climbing far better condition than a year ago, chief of the river control and storage division of the bureau of reclamation at Burley, reported that the Snake river reservoirs show an increase of 137,000 acre feet more than last year this time. Total acre feet of water is 826,706.

This moisture increase is encouraging to the irrigation prospects for the entire area," Simmons said. "Soil moisture is in the 100 per cent at Island Park on the north fork of the Snake to set a new record, and 70 per cent at American Falls. Precipitation was also well above normal at Panguitch on the south fork of the Snake with 1.70 inches in October.

Simmons said release of water from Panguitch has been restricted to 1,225 second feet with the bare minimum to fill the river rights of Idaho Falls. Only enough water is being passed through the Minidoka plant to satisfy Idaho Power's secondary rights below Milner and a small diversion is being made for the Twin Falls Canal company which

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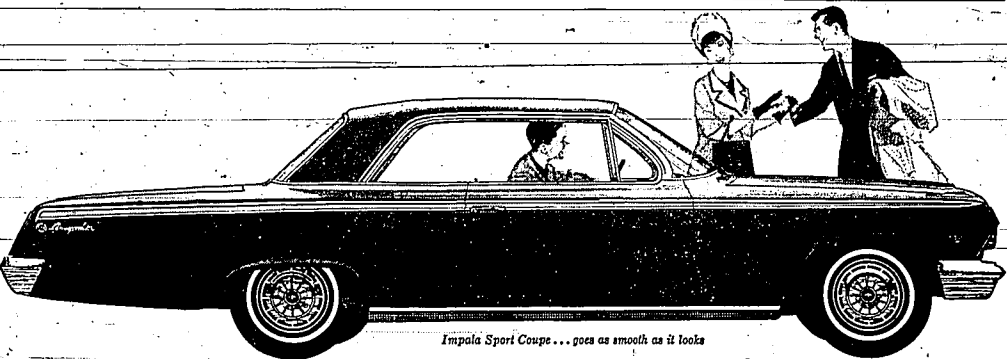

Slain Russ's Widow Asks Trial Switch

PARIS, Nov. 4 (AP) — Leon Trotsky's widow has written to Soviet authorities asking for a switch of the trial and sentencing of Stalin at the recent Soviet communist party congress.

The letter, disclosed today by the International news agency, said she asked that you totally and publicly revise the Moscow trial which the chief accused were Leon Trotsky and my son Lev Sedoff. I ask a complete and public investigation on the means employed by the GPU (Stalin's spy agency) against Trotsky, my son and myself. I ask that the assassination in Mexico, the trial and the execution be treated as a crime.

Moscow Trotsky also asked that the GPU be abolished and the whereabouts of another son, Leon Sedoff, arrested in 1935, be revealed.

The letter was addressed to the president of the supreme and central committee of the communist party.

Trotsky had a power battle with Stalin in 1927 and fled to Turkey then to Mexico, but was always in danger from secret spies agents.

In 1940, a Soviet agent invaded Trotsky's house, despite heavy security, and murdered him with an axe. His death was imprudent and delayed in 1940.

Adenauer Will Visit Kennedy

BONN, Germany, Nov. 4 (AP) — Chancellor Konrad Adenauer said today he will go to Washington this month for talks with President Kennedy on the Berlin and German situation.

The chancellor told newsmen no definite date has been set but he will need another eight days for the formation of his cabinet, with which he must first discuss the trip.

The chancellor made the statement after meeting with parliament members of his Christian Democratic party, who accepted a compromise coalition agreement with the Free Democrats, virtually assuring Adenauer's reelection as chancellor.

Nevada Site Selected for Reactor Test

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP) — An experimental reactor developed under America's program for producing a plutonium-powered rocket will be given a full power test in Nevada Tuesday.

The atomic energy commission and national aeronautics and space administration, joint sponsors of the project, said the test would be conducted at the Jackson Flats area of the Nevada test site.

The reactor, known as Kivi-B-1A, has been under development since July 28, an AEC-NASA announcement said. It is the first of a series of reactors that will be ground tested under the nuclear rockets program.

The full power test will include the Kivi-B-1A program. The announcement said no significant release of radioactivity from the operation of the reactor is anticipated. News correspondents and unofficial observers will not be permitted to watch the test.

"Military leaders," Saltonstall told the conference, "must do nothing to undermine the confidence of our free people in their elected representatives, because the whole strength of our form of government is based upon the confidence of our free people in their elected representatives."

He added, "He will sow the seeds of discord in our national life if he discards the views of our free people in their elected representatives."

Dr. Elizabeth Swain, chairman of the department of biology at the university, said evidence collected by a group of 58 Louisiana scientists indicated strontium 90 present in baby teeth was "If there is strontium 90 in the teeth of children," she said, "it is certainly in the bones." "While we do not have conclusive evidence that the fallout is causing cancer or deformed births, we do know that a sufficient quantity of strontium 90 enters a child's body to be known as leukemia," she said.

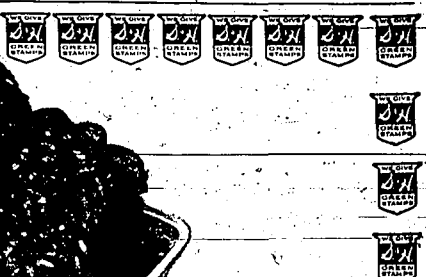

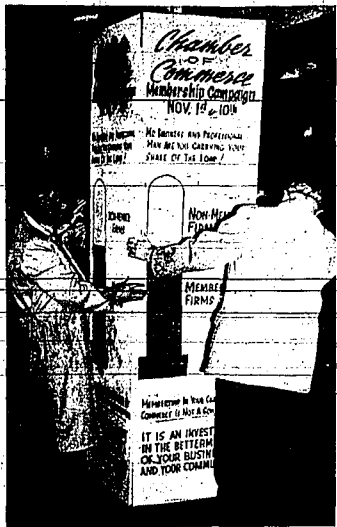

Hansen Hits Controls for Potato Crop

IDAHO FALLS, Nov. 4 (AP)—An Idaho legislative leader declared today that proposed federal controls on potato production would destroy all we have built up in Idaho for the past many years.

State Rep. Orval Hansen, Idaho Falls, a prospective Republican candidate for congress in the second district, warned that adoption of the controls would be "disastrous for Idaho."

"We are alarmed to learn that representatives of the potato industry in the East are actually inducing more controls," Hansen said in a statement.

"If there is one thing we do not need it is federal control."

"The Idaho potato industry has been built on a premium product. We produce a high quality potato both fresh and processed which commands a premium price in the market."

"Because of our freight disadvantage we must preserve this premium market to have a prosperous industry."

"The Idaho Potato and Onion commission will meet in Idaho Falls next week to consider the results of a poll of Idaho potato producers on their opinion to the proposed controls."

Mishaps Kill Trio During Britain Fete

LONDON, Nov. 4 (AP)—Firework accidents tonight killed three persons and injured more than 25 during Guy Fawkes night celebrations throughout Britain. Potato battled crowds in London and arrested 200 persons.

One "wakes and his gunpowder plotters tried to blow up parliament in 1605. Britons have been celebrating the discovery of the plot every year since then with fireworks of their own."

The most serious accident occurred in Wraybury 30 miles northwest of London, where three persons were killed and five were injured in the explosion of a basket of fireworks and the resultant fire.

In Liverpool, at least 50 persons were injured; many of them young children.

There were 207 arrests for disturbing the peace and brawling in London, but officials called the celebrations "quieter than in previous years."

In London's downtown Trafalgar Square, a man was arrested for jumping into the fountain in the 41-degree weather. At least 30 persons were injured in fights and disturbances. A girl thrown into the fountain was treated for shock.

Police battled the crowd for four hours. Several policemen were among the injured.

VIENNA, Nov. 4 (AP)—A small crowd tonight stood in a cold autumn rain in a memorial service for the victims of the Hungarian revolution five years ago.

Several hundred persons took part in the ceremony on the anniversary of the Soviet crushing of the revolution. Memorial wreaths were carried in a procession across the Heroes square. Students and Hungarian exiles gave a program of music readings and speeches in the Vienna concert hall before the ceremonies.

Plot on Life of De Gaulle Noted

PARIS, Nov. 4 (AP)—The French newspaper *Picaro* said today that a second assassination plot against President Charles de Gaulle has been uncovered.

Picaro said the plot had been set to go into operation when de Gaulle visits the island of Corsica next week.

In a report from Algiers, the newspaper said it had learned from certain circles that specific security measures have been taken following information that the chief of state would be attacked again in Corsica.

Administration to Aid Rural Power Cooperatives in Fight

WASHINGTON, Nov. 4 (AP)—The Kennedy administration is making it clear that it intends to use the power and finances of the federal government to help rural electric power cooperatives battle private power concerns for territorial rights.

Twice during recent months the administration has extended big loans to such cooperatives to help them free themselves from dependence on private power companies for electrical power.

In July, the rural electrification administration made a loan of \$2,250,000 to a federation of 10 electric cooperatives in southern Indiana to build an electrical generating plant and a distribution system, that would release them from dependence on a private power concern.

This week it made a loan of \$20,250,000 to nine rural power cooperatives in southern Alabama and Florida to free them from a similar source of power.

REA Administrator Norman M. Clapp says the rural power cooperatives are engaged in a fight for their existence. He says many private power companies are trying to move into rural areas which at one time they disdained.

Carey Gets 19-13 Victory Over Wolves

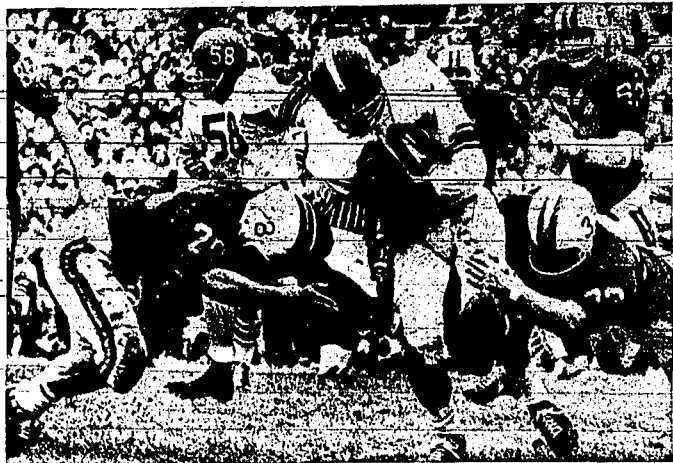

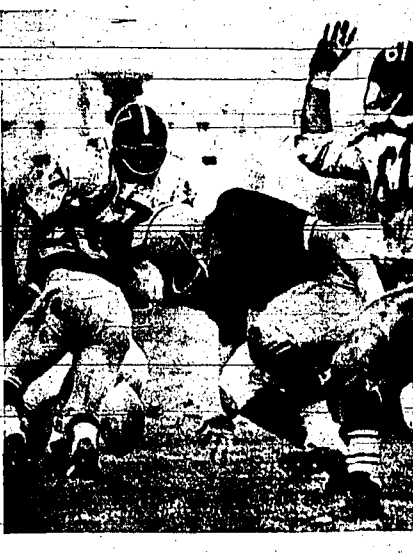

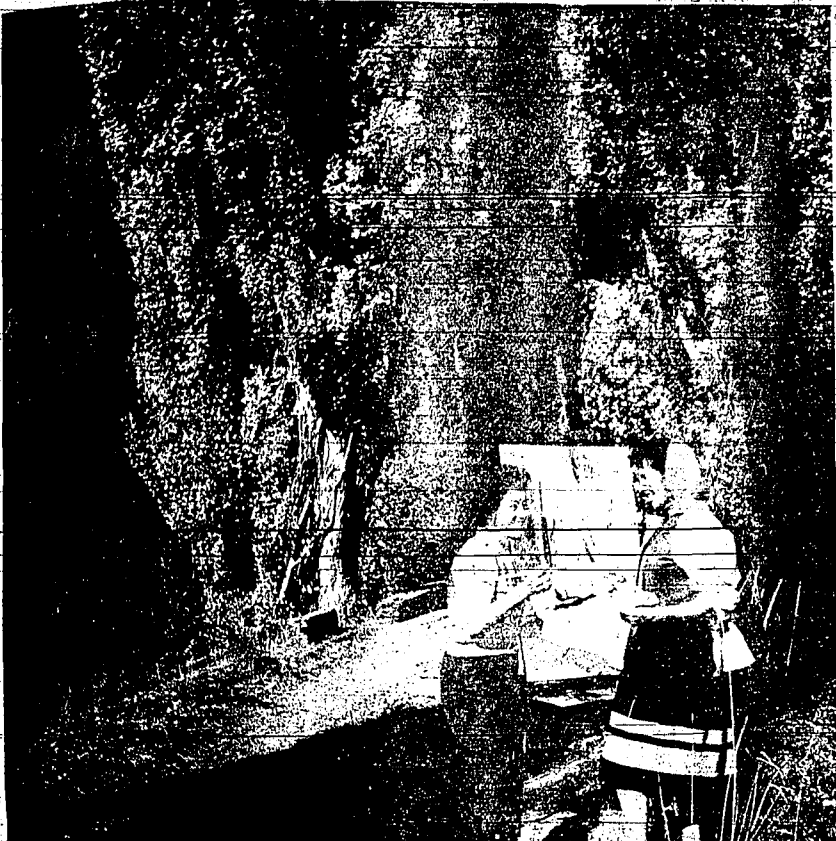

Survival Rules Important To Hunter Lost in Storm

The storm in the south hills this deer season pointed out a well-known and important fact — that any hunter who enters the woods and mountain areas must be prepared at all times physically and emotionally to cope with the worst that equal weather can offer. A hunter stranded in a backwoods area faces at least minor discomfort and at most, death. Hunter's prepared for the worst. And this is the key to survival in adverse conditions are prepared for the worst the elements offer. In an effort to point out some of the primary precautions a hunter can take to save either his health or his life, the Times-News consulted Keith Turner, a Twin Falls man who has made a habit of studying methods at which can save his life in a emergency and protect himself when exposed to the elements. The advice he gives is not intended for the man who is caught in the backwoods outfit with only a few pieces of equipment and provisions to carry him through a long storm, but, rather, for the man who is either lost or prevented from returning to camp or car because of foul weather. The early fall storms, the ones that come on the heels of Indian summer weather, are the most treacherous. They are the ones that trap the unsuspecting and ill-prepared hunter. Turner emphasizes that these storms usually are short-lived, to the advantage of the stranded hunter. If he manages to keep his wits about him he will survive. What Turner has to say can be presented in one sentence—be equipped, stay cool, stay dry, stay warm and stay refreshed. If a hunter will follow this advice he either will be found or able to find his way out when the weather clears. Being equipped is a relatively easy job. It consists of simply wearing adequate warm and water-repellent clothing and carrying a good knife and a good supply of waterproof matches. "Being dry" is the most important. The face of bad weather is more difficult, and it probably is the most important. Turner says this probably is one of the most difficult things for a lost or stranded hunter. "The hunter must admit to himself that he is lost, and then not panic at the thought of it," he says.

Valley Resident Has Aided in Changing Korea School Plans

For the past two years a former resident of Twin Falls and Magic Valley has played a role in modernizing and revamping the Korean school system. He is Dr. Burton C. Newbery, son of Dr. and Mrs. C. T. Newbery, Twin Falls. Dr. Newbery and his family now live in Gooding and are ready to move to Buhl, where he will undertake a similar program. Dr. Newbery lived in Twin Falls during most of his public school days, leaving Twin Falls in 1935 to attend the University of Oregon. He received his BA degree from the College of Idaho and his MA from Montana State University. Both degrees were in English. He then taught in Gooding high school and the College of Idaho in English departments. In 1952 he received his doctorate in education from the University of Oregon. He taught at the University of Nevada from 1952 to 1959. His wife and three sons were with him in Korea. She is the former, Ella Stone, Garding. Dr. Newbery says, "There was an effort to emulate the school systems in the United States. My function was to work with the Koreans, study the attitudes of the Koreans, the standards of the community and then set up a school in Koping with the desires of the community. Most of the high schools in Korea are specialized schools. Each one deals with a special subject—academics, commercial, technical, agriculture, home economics, business, and other subjects. And after children reach the age of 7, they are separated and placed in a conerdational situation. This is the result of the teaching of Confucius, whose philosophy concepts have determined the moral conduct of the Korean society for centuries. The Korean school officials wanted to experiment with the educational schools and also with the specialized schools here. We created a sort of social caste system, with the academic schools on top and the fishery schools lagging along at the bottom. By offering a varied curriculum in a school, it is the hope of Korean officials that a more democratic attitude will be developed. And it is the belief of Dr. Newbery that this was the result in one of the schools where he worked, Poyonack high school, just one of five schools he advised. He notes there were skeptical both Korean and American, who thought the specialized school was the only way to handle education here. They based their reasoning on the belief that if students attended a school where various classes were offered they would not want to enroll in the academic courses. But this wasn't the case. Enrollment was pretty well divided among the subjects, with a large group choosing industrial arts. This was an extremely encouraging thing," he says, "for this will bring prestige to the other subjects." Over one-half of the students chose practical training of some sort over academic training. Dr. Newbery explains this means much in Korea, because the country is lacking in persons with technical training. From 1916 to 1948 the Japanese controlled Korea. They never developed the Korean people and trained them to work at jobs requiring a technical background. When the Japanese left after World War II, the country was left with trained personnel. The new experiments indicate that in the near future the country will be able to retrain its people. The system, eliminate most of the caste system and raise the dignity of those who work with their hands. When this happens, the Koreans will retain the social framework needed to operate a country, a framework they lacked for decades. Asked what Koreans thought of the United States and the West, Dr. Newbery says, "Most Koreans are vitally interested in the United States and are sympathetic with Western ideals. They are close to communism and have learned to fear it. Koreans are curious about American politics and social manners. He states that the younger people are tending to move away from the conservative ways of the past. He often was asked about racial prejudice in our country. He says he doesn't believe a person should be an apologist or ignore that we have flaws. When he was asked this question he says it usually developed that the questions also had racial prejudices. He also pointed out that the beauty of the United States is that equality of all races. "We haven't achieved it yet," he says, "but we are working for it. The virtue is that we are aware of our faults and men of good will are striving night and day to correct these faults. While he and his family were there they made a strenuous effort to get to know many Koreans personally. Mrs. Newbery taught English at the Foreign Language Institute and through the students she met and the educators he worked with, they gained the friendship of many Koreans.

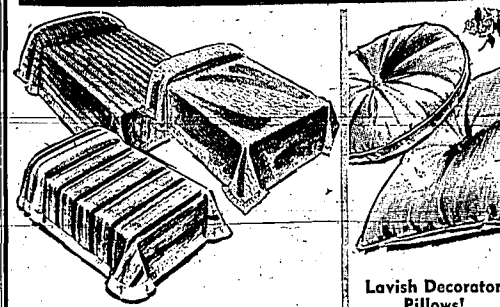
DeVolder stated this was a minimum figure and that approximately \$10,000 would be needed in various types of equipment to bring the library up to a high degree of efficiency.

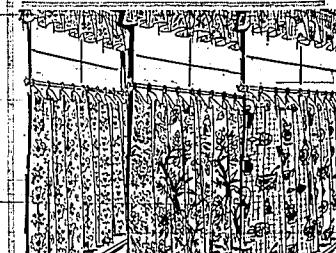

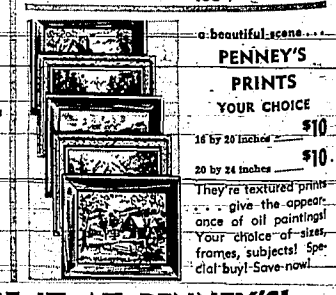

Buhl Blacksmith Anxiously Awaiting Day When Hobby Replaces Business

BUHL, Nov. 4.—Ernest Kral is a man who hopes his hobby takes over. In fact, he has it planned that way. Kral is a blacksmith who has labored all his life in his shop, just east of the Ring corner on highway 30, west of Buhl. There he does blacksmith and general farm machinery repair work. "But one-of these days those plow shares are going to get too heavy," he says, "and when they do I know just what I'm going to do."

It is along to turn to gunsmithing and open a small business on his farm. Without plan, he has been moving in this direction for many years, for he slowly has built up a shop and shooting area on his farm that is not only the envy of other shooters, but also gets plenty of use by other gun cranks in the area.

He first built a range to teach his wife how to shoot. Mrs. Kral had never taken shooting seriously until the late 1940's. She decided then she wanted to take part in her husband's hobby.

So Kral gathered some scrap lumber and went to work on some outbuildings on his farm. One was a chicken coop, the other a brooder house. He took the scrap lumber and connected the two small sheds and built a 50-foot indoor range, with four target positions.

Although in recent years it has been used by Kral and his rifle and pistol shooting friends, it originally was built to teach Mrs. Kral how to fire a .22 rifle. That first winter they spent plenty of time learning. More than 20,000 rounds were fired in

Last fall Kral gave up and built another building on his farm and devoted it to the small store and a gunsmithing workshop he runs as a hobby. He was a charter member of the Buhl gun club and helped build the first clubhouse.

He has a National Rifle Association lifetime rating as a master smallbore rifle marksman. He was first rated a master in 1920 and received a lifetime rating in 1959. His house, full of trophies and medals, attests to his many years of competition in smallbore rifle matches.

He won the Idaho state indoor smallbore rifle championship in 1956 and he has a score of medals and trophies that he won in National Rifle Association sectional competitions.

Three Jerome Women Originate Group To Inform Mothers on Civil Defense

JEROME, Nov. 4.—A discussion started during a morning coffee break has led to the formation of a new organization in Jerome, called the "Mothers Against Fallout" group of women who are banding together with the purpose of informing themselves and their neighbors and relatives of the danger of radioactive fallout.

The three women who sparked the idea are Mrs. Paul Barnes, Mrs. Harold Greenblatt and Mrs. Alfred White. They first met on Sept. 29. They discussed the danger of fallout, and that afternoon they contacted other women whom they thought would be interested. Ten women showed up at that first meeting at the Greenblatt home. Since then, with the exception of one, the group has met weekly.

The general purpose of the meeting is to inform members of the organization on how they can prepare for fallout in the event of war, and how they can protect their families.

The history and purpose of the organization was outlined by Mrs. Frank Scherer and Mrs. Paul Barnes, members of the group who have been active since the inception.

The group meets each Friday afternoon at 3 p.m. and activities are provided for mothers who bring their children. During November, the meetings will be held at the Methodist church.

They started out with the original 10 members and at the last meeting 35 women from Jerome and the surrounding area attended.

At the first meeting the county civil defense director, Ralph Peters, spoke to the women and answered questions they posed concerning civil defense. Agnes Frank, county home demonstrator, talked about home demonstrations, and next spoke concerning preserving foods for a fall-

Development Of Idaho Is Rupert Topic

RUPERT, Nov. 4.—A future which includes development plans, hopes and predictions for Idaho, especially for the agricultural areas, was outlined by Dr. Frank Seelye, of the Idaho State college business department, in an address at the agriculture-business banquet Wednesday night at St. Nicholas parish hall.

More than 200 persons heard Dr. Seelye describe the almost certain expansion to be expected for the agricultural industry. He pointed out that in California alone the number of permanent residents was increasing by about 40,000 each month, predicting that by 1970 it will be the largest state in the nation, population-wise, and will have to look to surrounding areas for its food supply.

Flours show an expected 22 to 25 per cent increase in the population in Oregon and Washington, adding to the expanding markets for Idaho products, since expansion in areas for the construction of the expected 25 million new homes will take more and more acres out of food production.

The speaker pointed out that Idaho's "pull" had an estimated 200,000 people's area that could be developed as the need arises.

He also predicted that by 1971, some 57 per cent of the crops of the state will be processed within the state. Of the 25 million new homes to be built within the next 10 years, 24 per cent will be constructed in the three Pacific coast states, Dr. Seelye said, pointing out the potential growth in Idaho's farming and cattle feeding operations to keep pace with the rapidly expanding markets. He said that for every five

new homes one acre was taken out of production.

For the first year in what is planned as an annual event, a "Farmer of the Year" award was made by the Rupert Chamber of Commerce, sponsors of the banquet, with the 1961 plaque going to Gerald Schneider, Paul Farmer, Dale Butler, chairman of the Chamber of Commerce agriculture committee, made the presentation. Mrs. Schneider received a floral centerpiece.

Dr. George DeHoff, president of Magic Valley Christian college, Albion, acted as master of ceremonies. In introducing the guests and program members, a trio from the college was composed of Helen Hanks, Alice Higgs and Bonnie DeHoff.

Other three candidates named to the farmer of the year award by the county—Granger—were Thomas Mabeley, Rupert; Martin Muecke, Paul; and Lloyd Patterson, Pioneer district.

Schneider is secretary of the Magic Valley Electric company, president of the board of the Western Bean pool, financial secretary and secretary of the Paul Methuon church; assistant steward of the Paul Grange and is a member of the Rupert Elks lodge. He has served six years as a director and secretary of the Mini-Casino Marketing co-op and a director of Western Beans Bean Growers, Denver.
