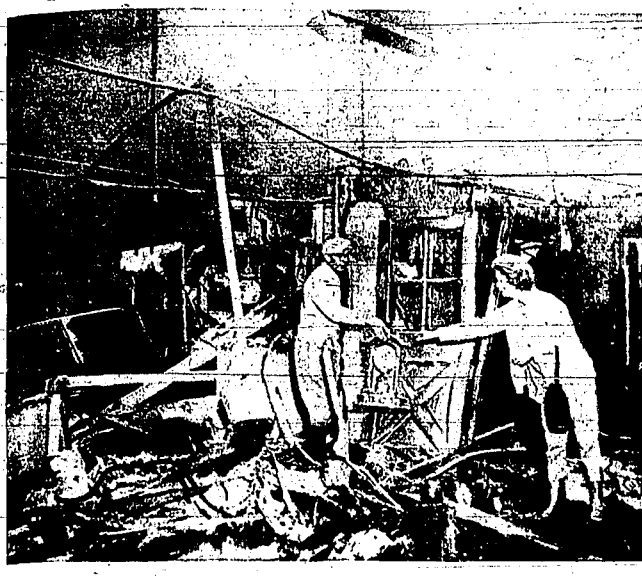

Los Angeles District's Worst Fire Continues; 250 Homes Already Hit

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 7 (AP)—Two disastrous fires threatened early today to join and burn uncontrolled on a 10-mile front that officials said would threaten a whole new community—fashionable Pacific Palisades. The major multimillion-dollar blaze—the worst in Southern California history—already had destroyed more than 250 costly homes including those of such film stars as Burt Lancaster, Joe F. Brown and Zsa Zsa Gabor.

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New Traffic School Recommended Here

Organization of a traffic school by the Twin Falls police court in cooperation with the police department, was recommended to the city commission Monday evening in a letter presented by the citizens' traffic committee.

The committee, organized in July to study the traffic situation in Twin Falls, said the school would not be intended for use as punishment, but for instruction purposes. It would be open to volunteers as well as traffic violators and the primary purpose of the school would be to prevent accidents by "instilling proper driving attitudes" and by "improving the student's knowledge of traffic laws."

The committee also recommended more stringent enforcement of parking regulations. It was explained that, in many instances, equipment and materials are parked in such a way as to block emergency vehicle access.

A study of intersections was recommended to determine if road markings spaces near intersections are so located as to obstruct vision, instances where vision is obstructed should be corrected, the committee added.

Many intersections in town, near which cars are legally permitted to park, are made hazardous, the committee noted.

Jerome Riddle, city commission chairman and a member of the traffic committee, said two other traffic schools are in existence in Idaho. One is located in Boise and the other at Pocatello.

Riddle said the group had contacted Pocatello officials and was told the program has "been quite successful. Pocatello officials reported the program has been a greater success since traffic officers have been instructed in the class, Riddle asserted.

Pocatello said that had a solution to the problem. The program was taken by the commission Monday.

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Frost Hurts Valley Spuds Out in Fields

Farmers reported that the frost which covered Magic Valley and below counties early Tuesday night, has done much damage to the potatoes that have not been harvested yet.

W. C. Fricke, Jerome, reports that there still remains to be harvested about 800 to 1,000 acres in Jerome county. The frost should continue there may be considerable damage to the potatoes.

He said temperatures dropped Saturday night and have continued to drop each night since then, but it has managed to warm-up fast enough during the day to keep the frost from touching potatoes six inches up from the ground.

Fricke added that there were 15,000 acres of potatoes planted in Jerome county this year and that operations were just about completed to bring the remaining yield out of the ground.

Donald V. Wain, Falla county agent, reports Tuesday that in the Castelfore area most of the spuds are harvested but a few being brought to grade. Houses show traces of frost damage.

He said produce dealers report Twin Falls county has fewer potatoes in the ground than the north side and Mini-Groves and Of the few remaining spuds still being brought in to the Kimberly market area, many show no frost damage.

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Dominy Says Bill to Have Multiple Use

BOISE, Nov. 7—Wilderness preservation as finally enacted will represent a compromise, Dominy, U. S. commissioner of Fish and Wildlife, predicted today.

In his testimony he said that "as far as it can be made" the "multiple use" concept will be written into the wilderness bill which gets the wilderness bill which gets the "final" approval in congress.

"I hope that as the bill is passed and gets into final language it will be a bill that will not prevent the kind of development that we are now considering as a means of demonstrating to the ever growing population of the West."

He said the bill which passed the Senate in September "has created much discussion across the country. Committees which will consider the measure, will attempt to compromise and to meet the best possible solution and to meet the needs of the nation."

He said the bill will be a "careful evaluation of natural resources" prior to designation of a wilderness area, and that he has to be sure to be sure for one use for eternity.

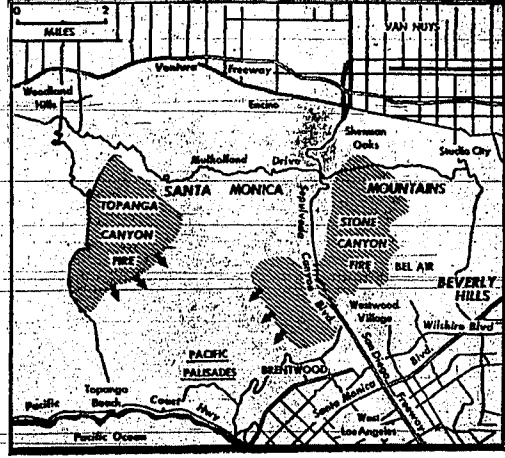

Soviet Airlifting Help for Rebels

WASHINGTON, Nov. 7 (AP)—Soviet planes are carrying supplies to a communist military base in southern Laos which in turn supports the Red guerrilla war in neighboring South Vietnam, according to the state department.

Viet Cong communist guerrillas in South Vietnam have doubled strength since early this year and now total an estimated 26,000 armed and trained troops, the U. S. report said.

State department spokesman Lincoln White said yesterday the Viet Cong troops are getting supplies from the Soviet-equipped Pathet Lao base in the Tayetone district, near the South Vietnamese border.

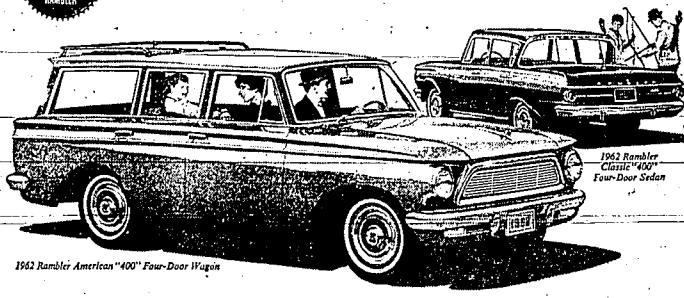

Finland Asks Soviet Talks About Treaty

HELSINKI, Nov. 7—Finland asked the Soviet Union today to receive the Foreign Minister for discussions on the Soviet request for joint defense measures.

An answer is received, the government intends to discuss the Soviet and some foreign military experts to Moscow to discuss the Soviet side of the treaty, an announcement said.

The note asked the Finnish government to implement the agreement, which provides for joint defense attacks in case of a concerted attack by "any or any state allied with her."

Presumably, the government will reply in the Soviet note that the Finnish side will accept the treaty but only to seek clarification.

Sandys Tours Accra Route Of Elizabeth

ACCRA, Ghana, Nov. 7—Ghana's Secretary of State Sandys drove through central Accra today in an open car over the route Queen Elizabeth's bulletproof limousine will follow today if she comes here on schedule.

Sandys was accompanied by President Kwame Nkrumah, object of recent attacks which have caused British concern about the Queen's safety. Nkrumah also expelled two bombers here last night.

Today, however, the crowd was in a holiday mood. Sandys and Nkrumah with cheering handkerchiefs and small bands is due back in London tomorrow morning. He will drive straight from the airport to a cabinet meeting at which a final decision on the Queen's trip to Ghana will be made.

Prime Minister Harold Macmillan will go to Buckingham Palace after the meeting to inform the Queen of the government's decision.

Usually every British newspaper argued today that the Queen should stay home in view of the two bombers set off in Accra last night.

Potato Growers Oppose Controls

TWIN FALLS, Nov. 7—Idaho potato growers are overwhelmingly opposed to acreage control of their crops, if any, by a survey being conducted by the Idaho potato and onion commission as any basis.

The commission met in Idaho Falls yesterday. G. C. Row, executive secretary, told members that 23,000 survey cards went out to growers, requesting their sentiments on control proposals. Row said 15 eastern states are asking for legislation which would control potato acreage, production and marketing.

Row said as of now, 2,150 cards have been returned. Of these, 30 answered yes, they would like control. Fifty gave qualified yes answers. There were 1,866 no, and 130 qualified no. Row said he has a few more qualified yes that could be counted either way.
