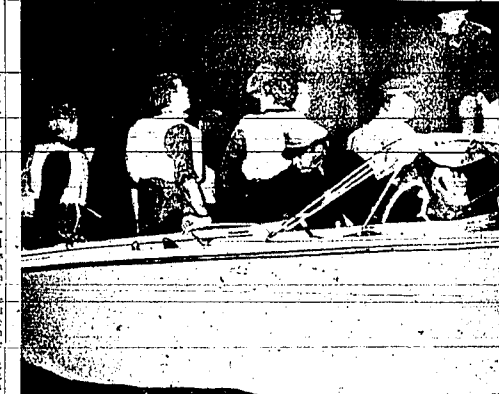

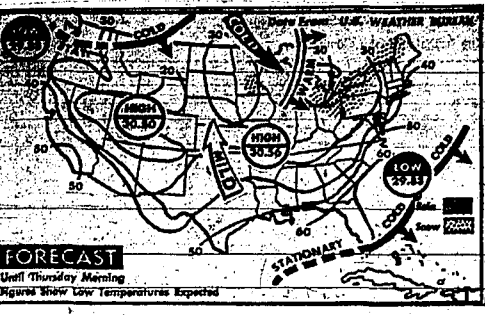

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Stalin's Line Approved by Red Chinese

TOKYO, Nov. 8 (AP)—Communist China bluntly informed the Soviet Union today that Peking has approved the leadership of Albania against all Soviet attacks.

The Chinese government, headed by Mao Tse-tung, issued a statement today praising the leadership of Albanian party leader Enver Hoxha.

The Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev denounced Hoxha's statement as "a gross violation of the ways of Marx and Lenin." The communist Chinese statement today said the Albanian party, under Hoxha's leadership, is "correct."

The statement was issued to commemorate the anniversary of the late Soviet premier's death.

But it went beyond any ordinary denunciation of Hoxha, in obvious defiance of Khrushchev, although it did not mention the Chinese and Albanian people and their close unity can be shown by the statement.

"Let us about! Long live the great leader of the Chinese people! Long live the eternal, unbreakable friendship!"

Russians, Red Chinese Fight For Communist Leadership

LONDON, Nov. 8 (AP) — The world communist movement appeared today to be heading for a bitter split, with Moscow and Peking openly contesting leadership.

Communist China, smarting under Soviet Premier Nikita S. Khrushchev's blunt refusal to compromise in their ideological dispute of Marxism, has retaliated with a vengeance.

In the past two days, in blatant defiance of Khrushchev's denunciation of Stalin and the Stalinist leadership of Albania, Communist China has:

- Praised Josef Stalin as the true defender of Leninism.
- Publicly supported the Albanian communist leadership as "correct . . . glorious . . . destined for greater achievements."
- The communist experts saw nothing yet to indicate anything so drastic as a diplomatic break between Moscow and Peking. But the contest has badly shaken the ranks of "monolithic unity" the communist world has tried to hold up over the years.

Sino-Russian differences have flared the Moscow-Peking axis for the past two years. A year ago they were patched up by a compromise reached at a Moscow summit meeting of communist leaders from 51 countries.

The differences began to show up again a few months later and were brought to a head at the 22nd Soviet communist party congress which has just ended in Moscow.

After wading through the doctrinal jargon in which the communists clothe their ideological differences seem to be reduced mainly to 101:

- The Soviet Union has at least publicly proclaimed a long-range policy of peaceful coexistence with the west-on the one hand.
- Communist China continues to maintain an openly belligerent attitude toward the west and insists that communism should gain and actively support revolutions in newly-emerging countries.

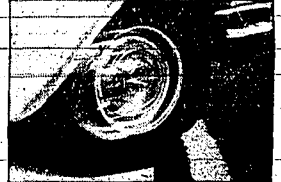

The Soviet Union is proving to be something less than nine feet tall in the economic war she declares against the West.

Through central governmental control, the Soviet Union can and has brought various sorts of trade and political pressures.

She agrees to trade for various products of other countries, and sometimes fails to deliver for both economic and political reasons.

It is production that has made some progress in certain highly emphasized lines, but in basic raw materials she has failed to close the gap.

At the same time, the Soviet Union takes the production of other countries and, just as likely as not, resells in competition with the rest of the world.

Indeed, the new power growth in Europe promises to become one of the world's central facts within the next few years.

Experts in Washington are calling the British decline in the world's largest economy the biggest story of the year, despite the promise that the United States is going to help.

As in any free economy, there were specific irritations. The Japanese '50s did not like the American cotton and woolen textiles.

On the other hand, the United States provides Japan with its greatest market. In 1960 Japan's 11 billion dollars in Japanese exports to the United States.

Since whatever might be good for the apple is good for the pear, also cost an American worker his job, and vice versa, an important lesson is that the program needs special treatment.

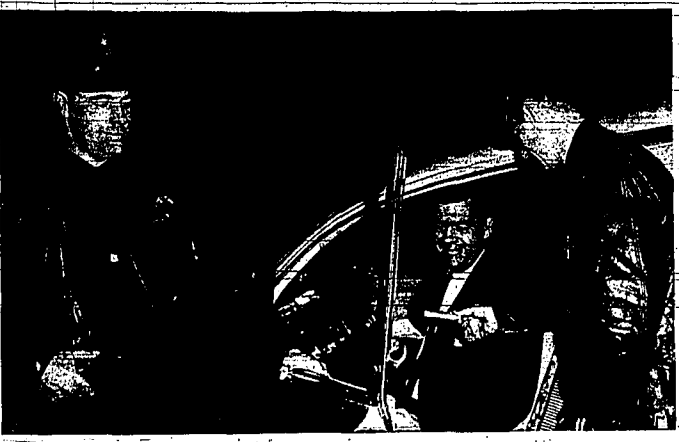

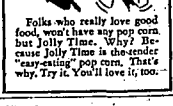

Elder Urges 'Tightening' Home Bonds

RUPTURE Nov. 8—A plea for tightening home ties as a means of insuring proper training of youth by the church is being made by Elder J. Gordon Richards, a member of the council of twelve of the LDS church, in addressing the members of the Minidoka stake conference Sunday.

Elder Richards said he would urge parents to be sure to be home governed by love and affection against the troubles and evils of the world. He said parents should hold the love and respect of their children if their love for them is great enough.

One of the most important attributes needed by youth today, the speaker stated, is the ability to make the proper decisions and to make them quickly, when confronted with the necessity of making a choice. Especially, he emphasizes the emotions and morals of the individual.

Elder Richards also urged young people to use the utmost caution and discretion in making their choices for husbands that a promise to reform or to change his habits after marriage is no good whatever and can not be depended upon.

He also urged young people to marry their kind, and to be faithful, pointing out statistics to show that split marriages have less chance of success. He said all churches recognize this to be one of the main contributing factors in the high divorce rate and broken homes over the nation.

One of the brokenness occasions were conducted by Rodney A. Hansen, stake president, who was the first speaker at the morning session.

President Hansen likened the recent tragic situation of hunters becoming lost in the mountains and ward which struck with little or no warning to the person who becomes separated from his companions.

Early teen-aging is to be deplored by all right-thinking parents, Elder Palmer stated, adding that at such an early age, youngsters are too young to have the ability to understand what is the proper.

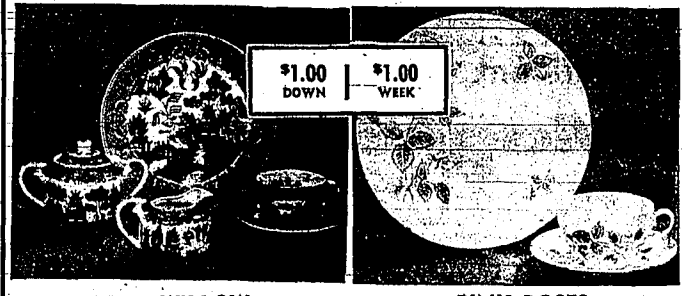

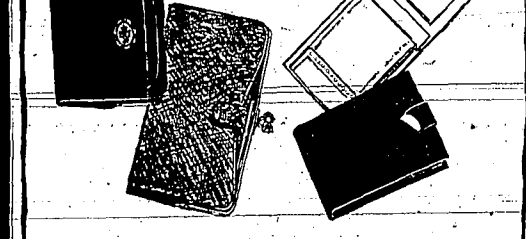

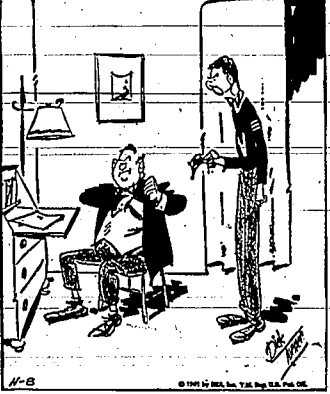
