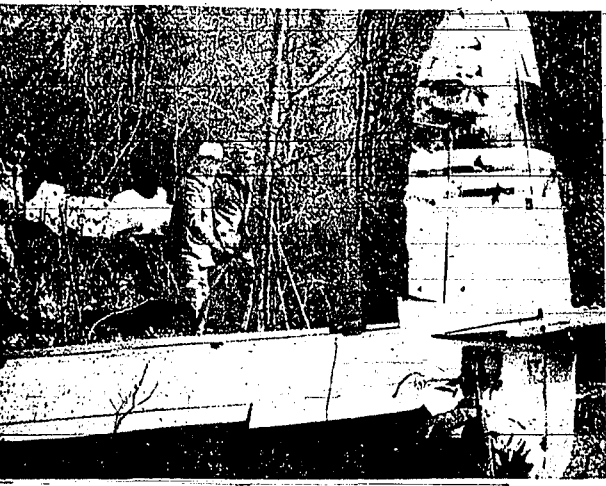

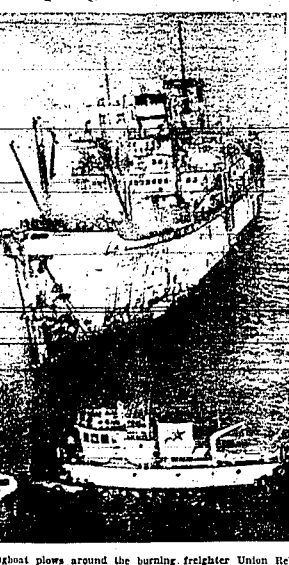

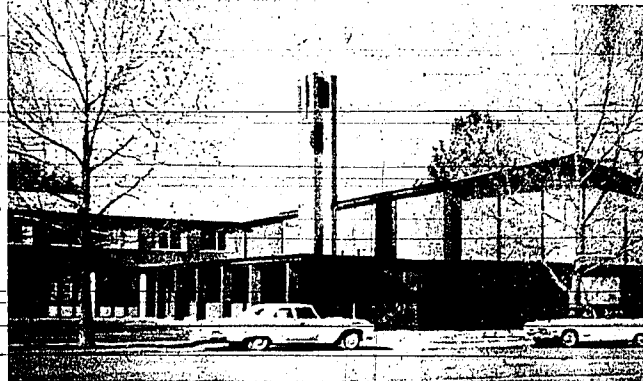
The sale area includes approximately 13,000 acres in the north fork of the Sawtooth canyon, north fork Sub-plateau canyon, Hartley canyon, Plateau canyon, Side canyon and Green canyon. The lumber sold, mostly mature trees, is on a five-year forest plan with six million board feet to be harvested each year, Flicker said.

Idaho Acquires New Machines

BOISE, Nov. 8.—State Auditor B. Williams said yesterday his office has acquired two new machines which will make all documents more readily available for public inspection.

The auditor said the machines are combination reader-printers which will provide viewing and printing copies of warrants and affidavits copies of microfilm in the state vault.

"When a state agency, news reporter or other interested party wants a copy of a certified warrant, it can be copied directly from the microfilm without taking it off the machine," Williams said.

Williams said the installation will also save space in the cramped state vault.

The machines which hold 11-1/2 microfilm can hold 2,000,000 microfilm warrants, less than one per cent of the storage space needed for the original documents," he said.

Banker Notes Construction May Increase

BOISE, Nov. 8.—An Idaho banker says there are indications that Gen. state home building may be coming into a more active period than it has been during the past several years.

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Ozan Marsh, Pianist, Plays Monday at Ketchum Chapel

KETCHUM, Nov. 8.—An American pianist, Ozan Marsh, will appear in the second of the series of Wood River Community Concerts at the Ketchum LDS chapel at 8 p. m. Monday.

When he appeared in Pittsburgh November 1, 1956, the Pittsburgh Press proclaimed, "Dazzling!" and added, "The United States is full today of brilliant young keyboard technicians who can zip through the most complicated music with the ease of an IBM machine (and with about as much expression)."

What many of them lack is the depth below the gutter. Ozan Marsh showed conclusively that he is an exception—solidly in command of the keyboard, he can produce music of the utmost delicacy and poetry also a youthful, intense power with no hammering—arm-swinging-irritating mannerisms—and always a clean, clear, shining melody.

His early tutoring was under the guidance of the internationally known teacher, Richard Buhlig. His extraordinary talent was soon noted by the great Dutch pianist, Egon Petri, who offered him a full scholarship for study in Poland—where he was born.

He has also studied with Emil von Sauer, at the time one of the last living pupils of Franz Liszt. While in Europe, Marsh also studied with the great Casadeus in Paris. Through his association with Sauer and Casadeus, Marsh developed a special affinity for the piano music of Liszt and Chopin.

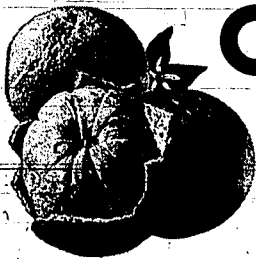

350 Foreign Aid Workers Given Notice

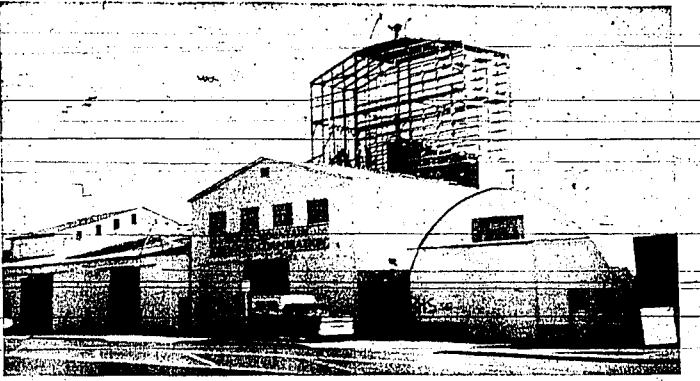

The Oregon fish commission yesterday has announced that a bacterial disease affecting the middle Snake river has killed 42 percent of the fall run of Chinook salmon taken for spawning purposes at the Oxbow dam here. The high death rate at Oxbow was due to Columnaris, a disease affecting the gills of fish, said Eric Jeffries, director of fish culture for the commission. Jeffries said there is no known successful treatment of the disease, which has been present on the Snake but did not become a serious problem until the construction of the Oxbow dam.

High temperatures and low oxygen content of the water taken from the Oxbow dam are spreading the spread of the bacteria, Jeffries said.

BOSTON, Nov. 9 (AP)—Whitey Ford, the first American league pitcher in a dozen years to win 25 games, was named winner of the 1961 Cy Young award Wednesday as the major league's outstanding pitcher. Ford received nine votes from a committee of the Baseball Writers Association of America, Warren Spahn of the Milwaukee Braves, who brought his lifetime victories to 309 last season, received six votes in second place. Spahn was the 1957 winner. Detroit's Frank Lary was third with two votes. Lary compiled a 23-9 slant for the Tigers.

Students; Parents Urged to Look Into Scholarship Plan

The school can't apply for scholarships, the students and parents must take the initiative, says Roy Lowe, guidance director at Twin Falls high school, next Monday.

He pointed out that students are given information and materials on scholarship programs, but that much of the information "isn't getting home to the parents."

General types of scholarships available to students. Scholarships are offered by many colleges and universities. Company scholarships are often given by large corporations. Non-profit organizations, such as the national merit scholarship organization, give tests as well as offer financial aid.

Another scholarships, generally available only at Idaho colleges, are offered by local citizens.

Applications for scholarships to the University of Idaho must be received at the university by Feb. 1. Lowe notes that applications to most other universities and colleges will be due March 1.

"Apply early and apply for more than one type of scholarship," Lowe urges. He notes that high school students should consider scholarships from—or for—Idaho schools because of the lower tuition and fees. He pointed out that a scholarship should be based reasonably, explaining that it would be ridiculous to use a \$500 scholarship at an eastern school because transportation would cost more than the scholarship is worth.

Tests for the national merit scholarships are given during the latter year in high school. Lowe mentioned that by 1961 the na-

family is in college, the student may receive aid even if the parents' income ranges up to \$12,000 per year.

Lowe also notes that NDEA (national defense education act) funds are available to students on a loan basis. Colleges should be contacted and asked for application blanks.

Senior students are eligible to compete for the 100 four-year scholarships offered by General Motors under its national scholarship plan.

Twin Falls high school students interested in applying for scholarships are urged to obtain information, application blanks and other materials from Lowe or Kall.

Lowe notes that students in other Magic Valley high schools should contact school authorities for financial information on financial aid.

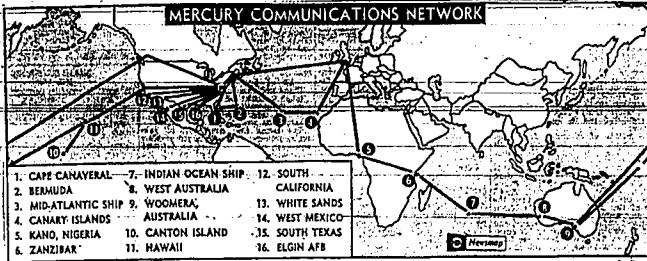
