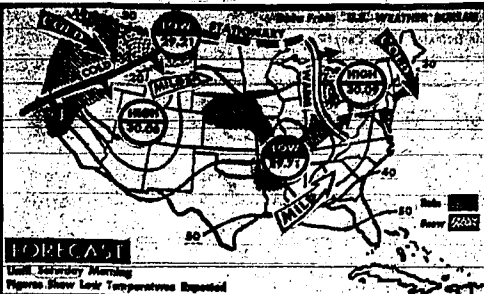

The veterans agency is responsible for administering various veterans benefits available to former members of the armed forces. Helweg said that widows and orphans, he emphasized, are included in the benefits.

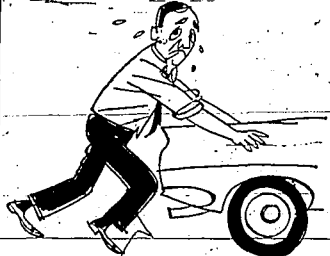

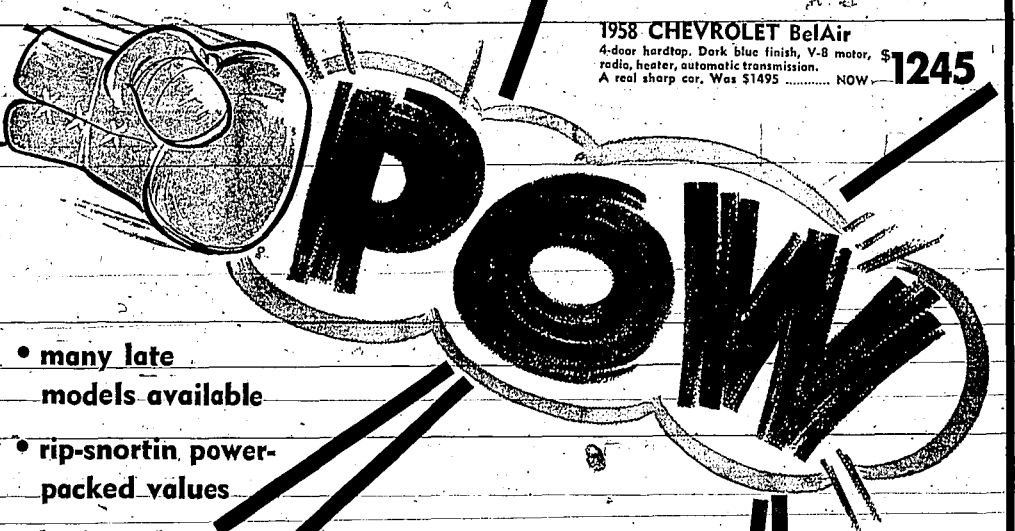

General Status of Farmers Rated Better So Far in '61

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10—The agriculture department reports the financial situation of farmers in most of the country has improved so far in 1961. A report on the agricultural financial outlook said the improvement is expected to continue, and possibly to be increased in 1962. Factors the department listed as improving the credit and financial situation included an increase in farm income, a further advance in farm land values and a decline in interest rates, plus government payments to farmers under crop control programs. The improvement was said to hold true especially in tobacco-producing areas, the "corn" belt, the central and southern parts of the Lake states, the Great Plains except the Dakotas, and the cotton-producing and cattle-ranching areas of the West. Little change from last year was reported for dairy areas and a decline was noted for broiler and turkey producers and sheep ranchers. These commodities ran into price difficulties this year. Sheep prices fell about 25 percent. Farm assets on Jan. 1, 1962, were expected to total 211.5 billion dollars, or about 2.5 billion dollars more than a year earlier. Farm debts were expected to total about 27.7 billion dollars, or 1.5 billion dollars, double of farmers—the value of assets minus debts—were forecast at 184.1 billion dollars for Jan. 1, or 1.4 billion dollars more than last Jan. 1.

Doleful Outlook Predicted On Eggs, Broilers, Turkeys

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10—The agriculture department today forecasts a doleful financial outlook for producers of eggs, broilers, and turkeys during 1962. The supply of these commodities will be at least as low, and possibly lower, than this year. This means the consumer will pay lower prices at the retail counter. Economists writing in the department's publication, "The Outlook for 1962," predicted that egg production in 1962 is expected to exceed slightly the 170 million cases that were produced in 1961. They said prices to producers are likely to average below 1961. These low prices will be noticeable in the first quarter of 1962. Egg prices were 50.14 cents per dozen in the same period of 1961. The nation's eggs in 1962 will come from a flock that on Jan. 1 will be a little smaller than the 340-million-poultry-layers on hand at the beginning of 1961. But the rate of lay per bird is likely to average higher than last year because more of the flock will be pullets and fewer will be hens. The department said the egg supply next year is likely to increase more than the prospective increase of nearly two percent in the U-S-B population, permitting the average egg price to advance two or three cents above the average of 52.3 cents per dozen presently set.

Idaho Wool Growers to Hold Parley

The Idaho Wool Growers Association convention will be held Sunday through Tuesday in Boise, reports Wilbur Wilson, Hammett, president of the association. Speakers will be Marshall Huelsa, Colorado, woolgrower, who will speak on lamb marketing; A. P. Kemp, manager of Armour and company plant inampa, merchandising and producer; Henry Hibbard, wool-grower and director of the American Sheep Producers Council; and Penrose Metcalf, president of National Wool Growers, national issues. Wilson stated the convention affords the opportunity of taking advantage of the wool market, which is growing, through constructive and positive group action of national wool growers. The outlook for broilers and turkeys in 1962 is more clouded than the egg picture, the report said. Producers of both of

Complete Research Reviews Are Planned by Department

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10—The agriculture department is making a thorough review of the importance of its research program. The house appropriations committee asked for a study of the importance of current research projects compared with research needs which have not yet been met. The committee also asked USDA for advice on how more research needs can be met cooperatively by the agriculture department and other federal, state and private agencies. The congressional request grows out of the fact that Congress is asked every year to appropriate far more money than administration budgets call for. Lawmakers are bombarded with demands for farm commodity groups food industry groups and others, all urging approval of new research projects. In 1946, the agriculture department budget for research of all kinds—including farm-weather research stations, was about 34.5 million dollars. This total is about 150 million dollars.

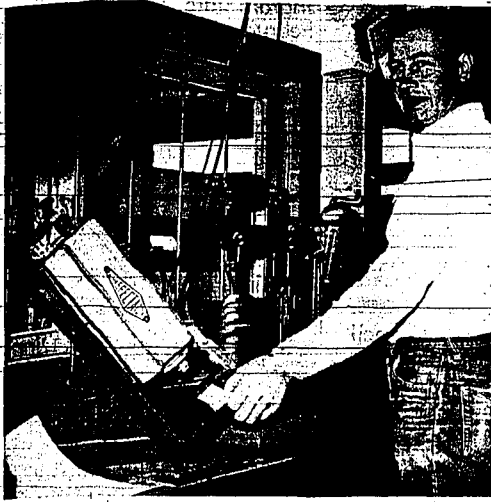

Kennedy Ready to Ask Authority for New Program on Any Farm Commodity

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—The Kennedy administration is ready to ask Congress to authorize federal marketing orders or other new farm programs for any farm commodity. But the first move will have to come from farmers producing the commodity. That summary of the way the administration feels about new marketing programs was stated by Assistant Agriculture Secretary James T. Ralph. Ralph spelled out the administration stand last week in a speech to agriculture department employees at York, Pa. He pointed to a section of the 1961 omnibus farm act under

which farm groups could ask the department to appoint a commodity committee to advise on new legislation or administrative programs. Congress did not say it would provide any new authority, Ralph said. But it did set up a plan for farm commodity groups could begin the process of preparing new proposals. "The door is wide open," he said. "We are prepared to consider any request received from a representative commodity group." Another step in a growing cooperation program to find new overseas customers for American farm products will be taken soon in Europe. The occasion will be the Nov. 10 opening of a 10-day United States food fair at Hamburg, Germany. It will be the largest overseas exhibit of American food products ever presented and the first government food exhibition to include private, commercial exhibitors on a large scale. The fair is part of the market expansion program in which the government cooperates with private industry. Agriculture Secretary Orville L. Freeman will open the fair, which is being sponsored by the agriculture department and the many of the nation's food and agricultural industries. More than 1,500 American food products will be on display for European consumers, retailers and wholesale food dealers.

Mechanization Nearing For Harvest of Onions

UNIVERSITY OF IDAHO, Moscow, Nov. 10.—The laborious methods of hand-topping and storage of onions in crates or sacks will be a thing of the past in a few years, reports D. F. Franklin, superintendent of the Farms branch station. University D. W. Works and L. O. Williams, agricultural engineers at the University of Idaho. With the advent of mechanical onion tappers along with bulk harvesting and storage as used by Eastern and Midwest growers, Idaho onion producers will need to adopt these improved production features if they are to compete with Midwest and Eastern producing areas, says Franklin. Idaho growers paid last year as much as 18 cents per crate for hand-topping alone. Crates to store these onions cost nearly one dollar per bushel. University researchers consider it feasible to combine forced ventilation with bulk handling and storage to make the sweet Spanish onion production more economical. At present, the Midwest and Eastern growers produce a globe type of onion which is less prone susceptible than the "diplo-recept" Spanish type. The second season of research to determine the best methods of bulk handling and storage of onions is in progress at the Farms branch station. Onions are harvested direct from the field in bulk containers and placed in forced ventilated storage until they are ready to market. The experimental storage containers being compared with standard practice of field curing and storing in crates. The researchers hope to determine the best method for curing the onions and the effect of bulk handling and storage on quality factors at the end of storage season. After this information is known, Idaho onion producers should be in the position to manufacture their onion harvesting and storage cost of operation. The research is being conducted co-operatively with the Idaho potato and onion commission, onion

Record-Breaking Total of Irrigation Pumps Placed in Service Last Season

BOISE, Nov. 10 (Special)—A record-breaking 541 new irrigation pumps using as much electricity as a city of 30,000, were extended service by Idaho Power company throughout its system for the 1961 season, requiring an investment of nearly two million dollars in new facilities. This was announced Wednesday by J. Emery, Idaho Power vice president and assistant general manager, in a special report on the company's achievements during the recently completed irrigation-pumping season.

He said two other records also were set in one of the driest years in Idaho history. The new pumps supplied water to a total of more than 82,000 acres of new irrigated land put under deep-well pumping in the area in a single season.

The new pumps, with an aggregate demand of about 30,000 kilowatts of electricity, totaled 1,675 horsepower—the greatest new pumping load added to the company's system in a single season.

Emery reported that the new pumps, totaling nearly 200,000 horsepower, provided water for more than 620,470 acres. The pumps put into service for the 1961 season, Idaho Power built more than 100 miles of new rural distribution lines, constructed four new substations and increased the capacities of seven existing substations.

"Our investment in these service facilities totaled nearly two million dollars," Emery said. "This sizable amount of money, of course, is in addition to the investment Idaho Power is making on a continuing basis for new generator plants and high-voltage transmission lines to assure ample supplies of electricity for all of our customers."

He pointed to the company's new Snake river hydroelectric development and the recently completed 220,000-volt transmission line between Boise and American Falls as two examples of other facilities being built in part to serve the steadily increasing irrigation load.

"Idaho Power was able to meet the service demands of the past dry season with hundreds of new pumps being rushed into service because we are building ahead to fill the electric needs of our area," Emery said.

The utility executive recalled that Oxbow dam, second unit in Idaho Power's Snake development, started production early in July under an interim program aimed at making additional use of the river's water and helping to fill heavy irrigation pumping demands.

Surplus Cut Expected For Feed Grain Plans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 10 (AP)—The agriculture department predicts its controversial feed grain program will reduce current surpluses of corn by about 150 million bushels from the Oct. 1 level of 1,600,000,000 bushels. It said there is likely to be no reduction in surplus stocks of sorghum grain, which reached 70 million bushels Oct. 1.

Under the feed program, the government will pay growers about 70 million dollars for reducing acreage of corn and sorghum grain in an effort to reduce surplus supplies.

The administration and the American Farm Bureau Federation disagree about the effectiveness of the program. The administration says it averted new surpluses and opened the way to a reduction in corn supplies. The bureau calls the program a disaster, saying it will cost more than it is worth.

A feed situation report said the total supply of feed grains and other concentrates for the current marketing year ending next Oct. 1 is estimated at 25 million tons, 7 million less than in the last marketing year.

"This reduction, although relatively small, is the first break in the steady upward trend in feed concentrate supplies that began in 1951," the report said.

Baldness Caused By Hair Rollers

NEW YORK, Nov. 10 (AP)—Bald spots in women's hair probably are caused by brush rollers used in hair setting, Dr. Morris J. Lipnik, of Detroit, reported in the Archives of Dermatology, a medical journal.

He described 15 patients complaining of hair loss. Some used brush rollers for several months. Others used them for as long as two years.

When use of rollers was stopped, hair began to regrow in three to four months in 11 of the women. In two cases, scarring of the scalp prevented regrowth.

Books in German Say Hitler Was Right, Author Avers

The New Germany and the Old Nazis, by T. H. Tetens (Random House): An alarming percentage of Germans still think Hitler had the right idea, according to Tetens, a former newspaper editor who escaped a Nazi concentration camp in 1934. The book is crammed with names and records of Nazis who have returned to positions of authority and influence. Tetens reports anti-Semitism is still on an individual level.

He concludes: "The popular western view of the Bonn republic as a bulwark against communism is a dangerous illusion nourished by German propaganda. No German statesman of government would hesitate for a moment to strike a bargain with Moscow if the Kremlin were willing to make an attractive offer, such as the return of the lost provinces or a new partition of Poland."

Conversations with Lincoln, compiled and edited by Charles M. Segal (Putnam): Abraham Lincoln may be one of the most

written-about men in history but there still are new ways to explore the character of the U.S. president in book form and Segal has found a good one. Hundreds of persons who talked with Lincoln write down what he said—from jokes to solemn discussions, from recitations of Shakespeare to irritable diatribes of "I am and I never" seeking favors. Segal, a Canadian-American New York public relations director, has compiled 125 of these accounts with notes to explain their context.

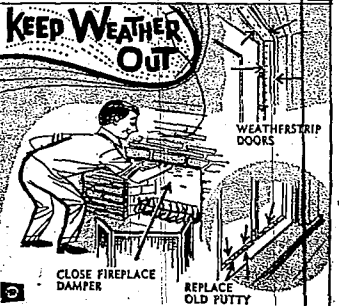

Working Around Home

You've Got Those Drafts Checked When Doors and Windows in Home Fit Tight

Walking around the house with a light candle in your hand might give you some idea of the notion that you're going off to sleep and you're a pretty good way to locate drafts. Maybe you don't need the candle. Perhaps you've already noted some of the cold breezes that give your home an uncomfortable, outdoors feeling. If you haven't by now, you will soon really cold day when the wind is howling at high speed. Whatever method you use to locate the source of the draft, do something to block it.



Worst Offenders Doors and windows are the worst offenders. They permit air to enter and they do not improve with age. Weatherstripping is the obvious answer to the problem of drafty doors and windows. You can find materials that can be made of wood or just pressed into place.

Most permanent — also most costly — is metal, generally brass. Measure carefully and fill along the track in which the window sash travels. Around a door, mount the inside of the jamb so that the door will compress it as it is closed.

Felt Is Cheap Felt is permanent and should not be used where it might come in contact with moisture. There are also combinations of wool and felt that are flexible; metal and sponge rubber, and felt covered with a plastic coating. These are applied by pressing them against the door or window to make certain of a snug fit, then nailing or stapling them to the frame. Some forms are available with an adhesive. For the bottom of the door, get the type of weatherstripping that is a length of metal with felt along the bottom. Press this to the interior of the door so that the felt rubs against the floor.

Use Plastic Putty A rope of plastic putty can be mounted quite easily by just pressing it into place. But the window will have to remain closed all winter. The material must be removed every time the window is opened.

Idle Fireplace If the fireplace is idle it may be furnishing a path for warm air to escape and for cold air to enter. Make certain that the damper is closed and fill snugly. Keep it closed so long as there is no fire.

Pipes coming up through floors and walls provide an entry place for air. Loose insulation, asbestos cement or some other filler should be placed in the opening. Ringing plates or grouting will go around the pipe and cover the opening are available.

LAUSANNE, Switzerland, Nov. 10 (AP) — Let's just say I don't make it. The speaker was screen actor William Holden as he was talking about Hollywood, which he left two years ago because, he said, he wanted to be a "free man."

Holden, his wife, Ardis, and their two sons, West and Scott, came to Switzerland. He said he could live in "peace and comfort" and still be only a couple of hours away by jet from almost any movie location.

Now the family's villa on the shore of Lake Lemano has become home base for a three-continent shuttle that takes Holden regularly to Hong Kong and to Kenya, in Africa.

And not only for movie-making, Holden is part-owner of a real estate in Hong Kong and of a deluxe country club in Kenya.

"I don't think people have fully understood what I've tried to do," he said in an interview. "I'm getting enough letters from friends telling me off for all kinds of sins, topped by my allegedly turning away from the tax collector. 'Why don't they want to understand that I'm hanging on to

the prerogative our forefathers fought for, the prerogative of being a free man? I love the work. I love to try over it. I love to come down through the clouds to find myself in my house by the most beautiful lake in the world; or to descend into learning, incorporating Hong Kong."

"Our are not one but three homes. We own a beautiful apartment in Hong Kong. Our third home is the Mt. Kenya Safari club which I own with my two partners in Kenya. It has a view of the mountains that takes your breath away."

Holden said "I have learned a lot since we left Hollywood." "The most important lesson was to appreciate the world he lives in." "I am never sadder than when I am in Hollywood.
