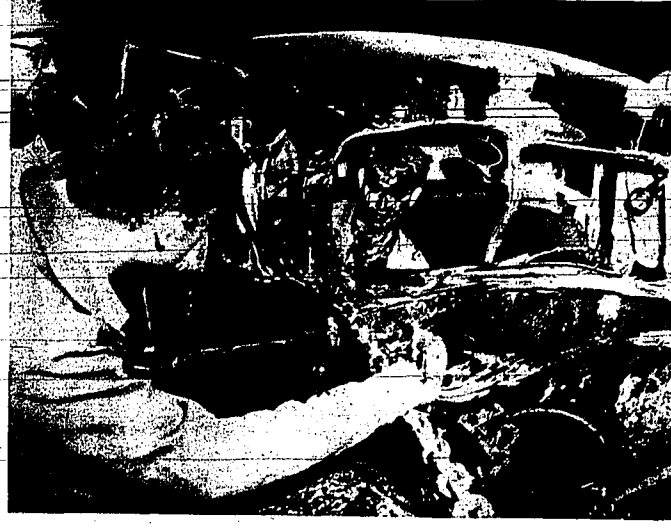

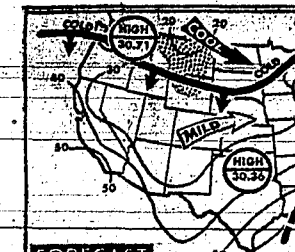

Unit Warns Bogus Bills Flood N. Y.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Congressional bills are flooding New York and popping up in other states as well as in California, the secret service is reported today.

James J. Rowley, congressional secretary, said the secret service is in contact with the state legislatures and is making a special effort to alert the public.

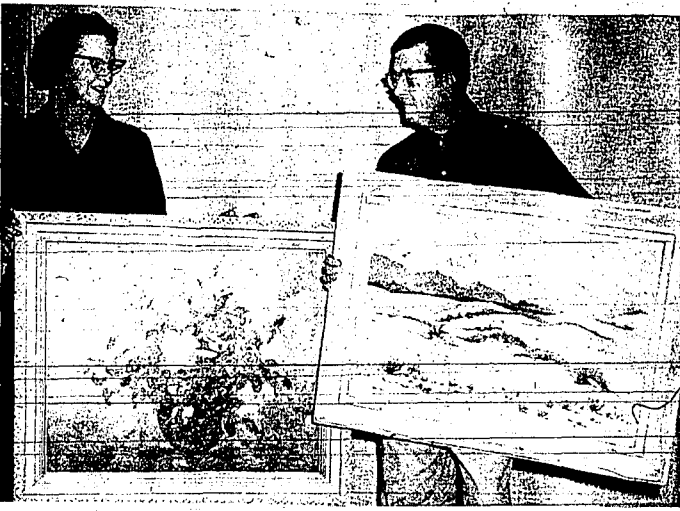
Although the bogus bills are not top quality counterfeits, they are so deceptive that some are being taken up by bank tellers.

Limited numbers of phony bills have appeared in New York, California, and Nevada. They pose a special problem because of counterfeit bills are uncommon and people are even less likely to check to see if they are genuine.

Only last spring a rash of counterfeit bills appeared in the state. The bills were found by the secret service—unit agents found the printing plant in Union City, N. J.

Despite intense efforts by secret service agents to track down the source of supply, the phony bills have been appearing in increasing numbers in New York.

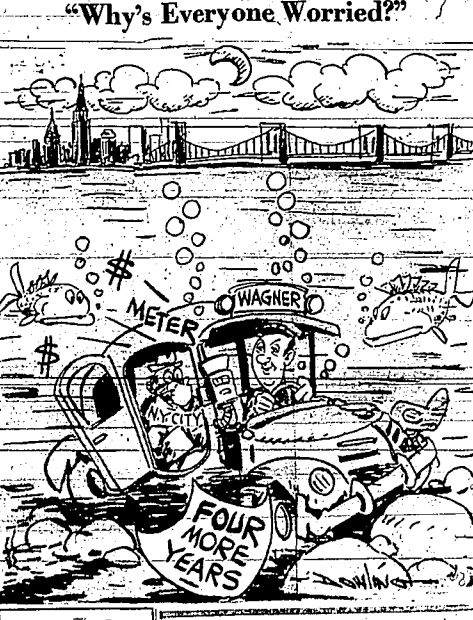

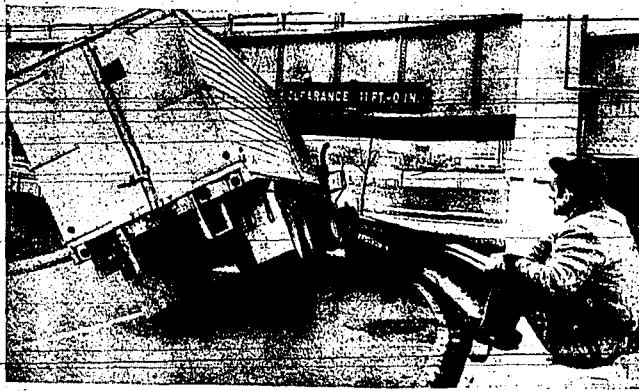

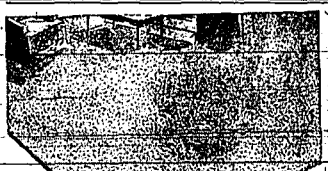

Reconsider VA Closing, U.S. Asked

Twin Falls county commissioners approved a resolution Monday "urgently requesting consideration of the government proposal to close the veterans administration contact office in Twin Falls.

The commission instructed T. W. Eilers, county clerk, to mail copies of the resolution to Sens. Frank Church and Henry Dworshak and Rep. Gordon Harding.

In the resolution, the commission maintains that "the proposed closing of the office in Twin Falls and providing a one day or less per week contact by a contact officer cannot feasibly result in any monetary savings in the operation of the office.

The commission states that expense of additional travel by the office would cost more per month than the \$75 per month office rental.

"The veterans administration contact office in Twin Falls has for over 15 years provided the county of Twin Falls with services to veterans in need of medical treatment and hospitalization that would have become a direct obligation to the county had the contact officer been available at all times to determine the eligibility of the veterans involved," the resolution states.

"A great service has been provided to the county of Twin Falls in the care and assistance of needy veterans and their families through the contact officer's efficient claims service to the eligible veteran," it continues.

"The services are of great value when they can be handled expeditiously by a trained contact officer on duty during the week," the resolution emphasizes.

The resolution concludes by requesting reconsideration of the proposal to close the office and that it not be closed until such time as it can be proved that an actual and not a false economy can be effected.

Present plans call for the office to be closed effective Dec. 29, Arnold Helwege, local VA officer, will be transferred to the Boise office at that time.

Judge Blasts Jail Sentence For Drinker

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14 (AP)—American and British justices follow a cruel and futile policy in jailing drunks, Judge John M. Muirhead declared Monday.

He said enforcement of public intoxication laws "not only has been ineffective, but involves a degree of cruelty—in the jailing that cries for correction."

Muirhead is chief justice of the court of appeal sessions in New York City. He addressed the symposium on alcohol and civilization at the University of California School of Medicine.

The symposium is part of a program intended to provide continuing education for physicians and health workers. The Wine Advisory board, an industry-sponsored state agency, gave a \$25,000 grant to help finance the symposium.

Muirhead said New York City has abandoned public intoxication arrests in 1950. But in other U. S. urban centers, nearly half of all criminal arrests are arrests of drunks.

Deficit Climbs

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—The U. S. deficit in international payments climbed to an annual rate of slightly more than three billion dollars a year in the third quarter, the commerce department announced Monday.

Despite a variety of moves to bring the international accounts into balance, the deficit increased by more than 50 per cent from the April-June quarter, the report stated.

Licenses Lost

BOISE, Nov. 14 (AP)—Twenty-two Idaho motorists lost their driving privileges last week for drunken driving, according to Law Enforcement Commissioner E. R. Hopper.

In addition, 14 other motorists had their licenses suspended for reckless driving. During the week state police made 391 traffic arrests, 10 through the use of radar.

Agency Sets Faster Work On Refugees

WASHINGTON, Nov. 14 (AP)—Welfare Secretary Abraham Ribicoff has ordered a speedup in the resettling of Cuban refugees who stream into Florida at a rate of more than 2,000 a week.

Ribicoff, head of the department of health, education and welfare, expressed dissatisfaction at the relatively small number of refugees resettled away from the Cuban colony.

Antonio Milocco, the department's staff adviser on the Cuban refugee program, said two major steps have been taken to quicken the resettling process.

He said J. Arthur Luzzi, who became deputy director of the Cuban emergency refugee center at Miami to promote and coordinate the problem of resettlement.

The other step taken has been to increase the staff of the U. S. employment service in Miami.

Volcano Active

JAKARTA, Indonesia, Nov. 14 (AP)—Volcanologists watched with increasing concern as the country's volcano, Merapi, in central Java erupted with increasing frequency and violence.

The volcano's activity has increased as the monsoon rains set in, erupting smoke and steam.

REDS ASK INVESTIGATION BRITICOM, Nov. 14 (AP)—The international control commission today received a request from the communist North Viet Nam regime to investigate the reported buildup of U. S. warplanes and armor in South Viet Nam. Basing its complaint on reports by New York newspapers, North Viet Nam asked the ICG to look into the matter.

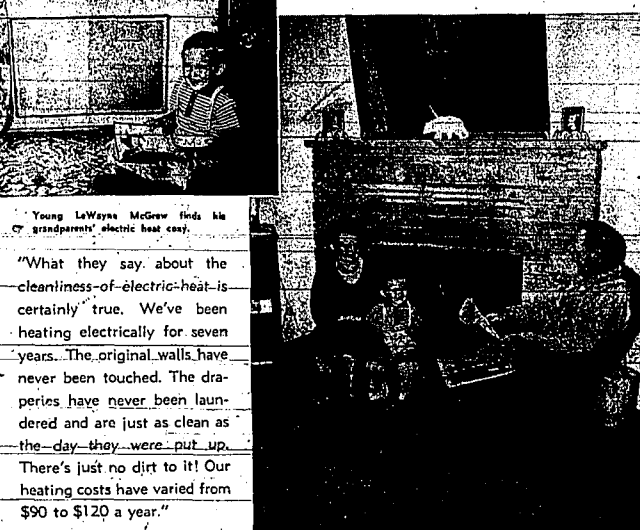

Latin Leader Says America Not Helping

GUATEMALA CITY, Nov. 14 (AP)—President Miguel Ydigoras Fuentes said last night the United States is not providing leadership for the free world in its fight against communism.

Ydigoras said a news conference commencing in pushing the "back and back" policy because the aids have many of communist plan and action would be the free world is divided.

"We need leadership," the president said, "I do not think the United States is preventing the leadership to push back communism."

Ydigoras complained also that Latin America is not doing enough to fight communism. He said the Latin nations which have no broken off relations with Fidel Castro's Cuban regime—10 of the 20 countries south of the border—have not done so because they fear Castro's fifth column.

He said Guatemala "suffered strike after strike" when it broke relations with the Havana regime. He said Castro is buying arsenals in Guatemala as much as \$250 a month.

"We cannot do the same in Cuba," Ydigoras said. "Our agents would be shot."

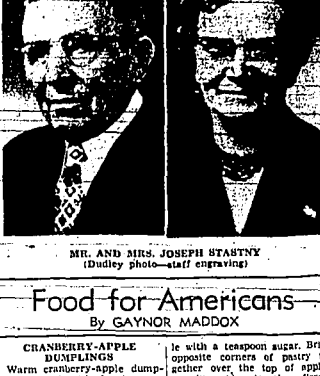

Israel Slates Talk on Red Jew Arrests

JERUSALEM, Israel, Nov. 14 (AP)—The Israeli government is expected to react tomorrow on the reported renewal of persecutions of Jews by the Soviet Union, it was learned today. The Knesset (parliament) is to debate the situation in the light of the arrest and trial of leaders of the Soviet Jewish community in Leningrad. The debate was called on a Herut party demand that the Knesset adopt a clear stand leading to worldwide protests. Such protests, Israeli leaders hoped, might prevent further persecutions of Soviet Jews. Informed sources said Foreign Minister Golda Meir probably would speak for the government tomorrow, and not Prime Minister David Ben-Gurion. The sources said the government is still discussing whether to participate in protests by world Jewish organizations, especially in the United States, and whether to raise the issue at the United Nations.

Firm Claims Rail Switch To Be Costly

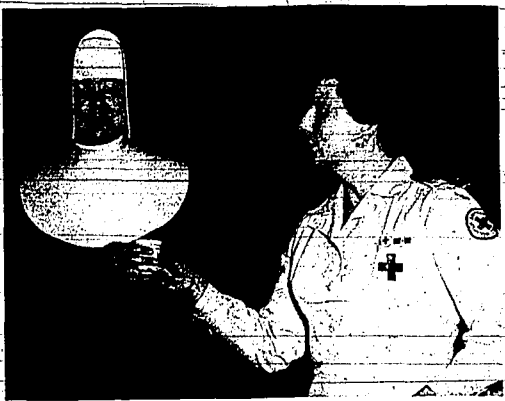
SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 14 (AP)—The president of a firm which furnishes freight cars said today that a switch from Western Pacific Railroad through a company owned jointly by Pacific and Southern Railway would cost more than \$100 million. He said that Santa Fe gains control of Western Pacific. Testifying for Southern Pacific at a state commerce commission hearing on the battle for control of WP, W. C. Glick, president of the Bangor and Aroostook Railway, said his firm would be hurt by a Santa Fe-WP merger. Robertson said Bangor now furnishes refrigerators to the Pacific Fruit Express—owned by UP and SP—for use by Western Pacific. Santa Fe has contended that it could save two million dollars a year by furnishing its own refrigerator cars to WP. This contention was made earlier Monday by A. E. Chasanson, general manager for Pacific Fruit Express. Chasanson said there would be no savings but only a transfer to Santa Fe of payments Western Pacific now makes to his firm.

Walters Says Water Land Laws Needed

BOISE, Nov. 14 (AP)—State Land Commissioner John G. Walters said he believes legislation is needed to give Idaho specific title to land that is underwater.

Smylie, land board chairman and also Republican on the board, disclosed that two assistants in the attorney general's office filed a disclaimer on behalf of the state, relinquishing title to a strip of land on Lake Coeur d'Alene.

Smylie asked Walters then to undertake an investigation and later wrote Atty. Gen. Frank Benson asking him to take legal steps to cancel the disclaimer.

Smylie said he thought the filing of the disclaimer might cloud the state's title to underwater lands, which he said are held in trust by the state for the use of the people and cannot be disposed of.

Neither Walters nor Benson has replied officially to Smylie. Walters, who also is state Democratic chairman, said the investigation of the filing of the disclaimer at Coeur d'Alene "seems to show that this land is in a somewhat different situation than underwater land generally."

City Council Will Contest Poll Results

PROVO, Nov. 14 (AP)—The outgoing city council, snatched down at the polls last Tuesday, is not through with its fight, for the city manager form of government.

Monday night the council voted to appeal to the state supreme court a district court decision, which ruled that it could not refuse to put the question of charter repeal on the ballot.
