Two People Die in Pair Of Smashes

Two persons were killed in separate one-car accidents in Magic Valley early Friday on highways near Ketchum. Kimberly, a Colorado woman was killed instantly about 2:15 a.m. on Red Cap corner one mile north of Kimberly on highway 30 and Frederick A. Fick, 29, Hailey, died en route to the Sun Valley hospital of injuries he sustained when his 1958 four-door Chevrolet station wagon was demolished after it went out of control on highway 93 five miles south of Ketchum.

The Colorado woman, Mrs. Frank Bueck, was a passenger in a 1961 Chevrolet, driven by Mrs. Jacob Hopkins, 32, who was hospitalized and released. Both women are from Junction, Colo. Officers said the car missed the curb, crossed broadcast and a power pole and crashed into a fence about 10 feet from the west. Mrs. Bueck apparently was thrown out of the vehicle before it flew the car hit the pole and the fence. Two men were on route 93 at the time of the accident. Snake River and Rock Creek Pollution Discussed at Meet

Pollution of the Snake river and Rock creek by sewage and industrial wastes was discussed during a public hearing of the state board of health Thursday afternoon in the Idaho Power company auditorium. Representatives of Magic Valley sportsmen's groups, recreation and water sports organizations, industrial and city officials attended the hearing. Lovell Turner, principal of DeLoe high school and member of the Cassia boat and skiing club, pointed out the Snake river's use for water skiing and boating. However, he noted that a pipeline from Rupert's sewage treatment system drains into the river above the rock where the recreation club has built several docks. He brought along a small bottle of water from the treatment sewer water enters the river and said that the DeLoe high school teacher had partially analyzed it. He said the polluted water was definitely hazardous and explained that there is an undesirable odor around the area where the Rupert sewage area was dumped into the river. "A major highway junction is near the river where the water is forced to roll up the wind-blown dirt and debris through their cars while driving down the area because of the smell," he said.

School Eyes Three-Shift Class Plans

SUPPLY, Nov. 17.—In addressing the school board Tuesday, Mrs. Camden Meyer reported that a three-shift schedule for the county high school is being considered for the coming year. The board officials and the board of trustees.

Meyer said that such a plan is being used in Salt Lake City and at the Idaho Falls school and at the Twin Falls school. With the plan in enrollment expected to increase in the next year, it seemed to the overworked board.

An enrollment of 1,400 high school students is expected for next fall, he said.

Meyer outlined the proposed plan. Students would run on a two-shift schedule from 8 a.m. until noon, with a second shift attending classes from noon until 3 p.m. Meyer said that this arrangement, or a two-shift arrangement, would not only alleviate the overcrowding problem but also would allow the building to be given over a longer period.

According to a report given by the school official, the district could have additional classrooms, or the county could set a similar plan. Meyer pointed out that the elementary schools of the county is not too far from the real shift, but the high school is the problem.

As to the suggestion offered by a number of people for the construction of a central junior-high school, Meyer said that it would cost around \$1,500,000 to build adequate facilities to house junior high students of the county.

An increase from 4,753 students enrolled in the county in 1961 to 5,501 in 1964 is expected, Meyer said, pointing out that this would create problems at grade level.

Mechanized Feeding Cuts Costs and Also Saves Time, T.F. Farmer Says

Mechanized feeding not only cuts down on time, but also cuts down labor costs, Melvin Sackett, who operates a farm near Twin Falls, reports. Over a period of 10 years, Sackett has built a 141 by 180-foot barn, containing a mechanized feeding system he invented. Sackett said it took 18 years to complete because "the only time I had to work on it was during the winter, when I wasn't farming or feeding cattle."

With Sackett's system, grain trucks unloaded into a 40-bushel underground pit near his feedlot. From the unloading pit, grain is augered into two storage bins with a total capacity of about 4,000 bushels.

The two bins are connected with an overhead auger. From one bin, an auger moves the grain to a reclaimer, where dirt and other trash is taken out, then to a grinder and so to the mixer.

In the mixer, Sackett mixes vitamins, minerals or beet pulp with the grain. Then, the mixed feed is augered to a small bin with a small hand auger at the bottom.

With this small hand auger, Sackett can regulate the amount of grain he wants to feed. He said about one complete turn of the auger equals about two pounds of feed.

Vote Results Are Eyed on Grains Plans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—Political leaders are beginning to debate the vote getting strength of the Kennedy administration's feed program in next year's congressional elections.

One reason that the program encompasses a large Republican stronghold in the Midwest — an area in which Democrats hope to pick up new representatives and senators.

Under this program, the agricultural department will pay around 750 million dollars to producers of corn and sorghum grains who reduced their yields at least 20 per cent. In addition it offers these producers considerably higher prices on surplus on these two grains than were in effect last year.

Non-partisans farmers are not to help from the department. In fact they are pretty much at the mercy of the department because the latter has the power to hold down market prices of the feed grains to punish them for not cutting acreages.

The department estimates that about three farmers out of five did not participate in the program. In the political arena, it is all or nothing. Some farmers will get angry at the program — and the administration will have to answer. Grain grown in excess of recent acre yields by such farmers will not be eligible for price support. As a consequence, a number of the cooperating farmers may be unable to sell some of their grain at government-depressed levels.

The administration proposes to control feed grain prices except legislative authority to set a large quantity of government-owned surplus grains below support levels. However, this had not been always done in the case of deteriorating products or products sold abroad.

Administration backers hope that a department decision to sell some of this surplus grain below prices farmers received for 1960 grains will minimize unfavorable reaction on the part of the noncooperating farmers.

This decision puts the administration in a position to agree that with the program, grain prices will be no lower than they were last year without the program.

Same Cold Wave That Mought Spuds In Ground Also Starts Market Move

The same cold weather that caught an estimated 13,000 acres of Idaho potatoes in the ground last night is responsible for starting a fair volume of spuds toward market.

However, shipments generally are lagging behind last year with 94,291 cars augured to date compared with 94,504 a year ago. Idaho's marketed spuds are considerably lower than last year, 3,000 cars to date compared with 5,922 a year ago. Similarly, all other potato-producing states are below last year's marketing figures.

Recent reports showed a fairly steady demand for Idaho potatoes at prices ranging from \$2.20 to \$2.45 for 25 per cent 10 ounces and larger. Spuds running 30 per cent brought around \$2.50 to be the best available.

Current movement of spuds to market is believed important to the trade because of the Thanksgiving holiday, traditionally a slow time around the first of the year.

Significant quantities of potatoes have been diverted from the fresh market, particularly by Maine and Washington growers.

Sheep and Lamb Totals for Feed Programs Down

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17 (AP)—Sheep and lambs on feed for market in seven major feeding states total 3,613,000 head on Nov. 1.

The total is six per cent less than the 3,800,000 on feed in the same state a year ago.

The number of sheep and lambs on feed decreased in five of the states—Nebraska by 18 per cent, Iowa 17 per cent, and Colorado 12 per cent. The states showing increases were Kansas 19 per cent, California nine per cent, Texas five per cent, and South Dakota two per cent.

Spud Production For State Hiked

BOISE, Nov. 17 (AP)—An increase in fall potato production in Idaho is reported by the U.S. department of agriculture.

The department said the fall crop is estimated at 120,000 hundredweight. That compares with production of 40,768,000 for 1960 and the 10 year average production of 31,043,000.

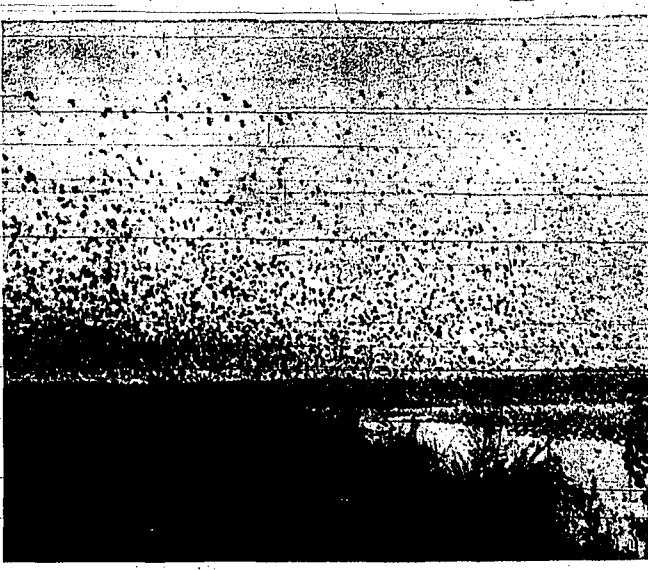

Prepare for Holiday Entertaining

If a heavy schedule of holiday entertaining is ahead, the tips now will smooth the way to put out until the last minute all the extra things to go with holiday entertaining. Be only too nervous in setting and blizzard appearances.

Because much of the holiday partying goes on around the dining table, this is a good place to start getting ready. The extra leaves brought out of their storage box and added to the table will need a thorough dusting.

To bring up the luster of the wood grain and to ward off damage from damp glasses later, use the table top.

If you have a table you cherish, you will want to protect its surface with a pad under the tablecloth. A pad helps to prevent damage from heat and spills, and quiet the clatter of dishes. Some pads may be custom-made to exact size, but this is not always possible because of lack of time or of stores that offer this service.

A good pad is homemade from one-quarter inch foam rubber. This can be bought in many departments in most order stores and do-it-yourself centers. It comes in 18- and 36-inch widths and is easily cut to size.

If you wish to join two pieces, brush rubber cement along the edges and press together. Cut one pad the size of the table without the leaves for small dinners, and a separate additional piece to add with the leaves for large dinners. You can do this with a rectangular table.

To store a foam pad, roll it up large tablecloths which have been stored for several months need refreshing and ironing. The most delicate way to keep these big cloths immaculate until needed is to hang them in a peddled hangers in a plastic cleaner's bag.

Silver wrapped, from storage

should be cleaned thoroughly now. The holiday tablecloth will be needed in a light going-over. Cleaning silver is a good job for children looking for things to do on Saturday night.

Special cleaning projects — curtains, rugs, lampshades, upholstery — can be tended to and crusted off the list.

Plan table and house decorations if possible. Start building supplies you know you'll need: candles, canned or frozen libbels, paper snack plates and napkins, even cigarettes (keep them in the freezer), and maces.

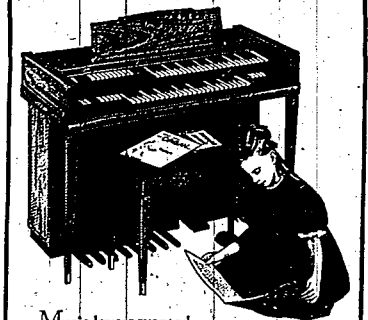

Now, and then Patrice jumps off the circuit to do some television and check her other endeavors. She also keeps tabs on daughter, Arnelia, 7, attending private school in Los Angeles.

"It's like being caught in a revolving door," Patrice laughed.

"But I enjoy being an entertainer. I'm such a hand I'll probably go as long as there's let me."

She remembers Flynn's beloved "Zaca" from prospective buyers, offering it with a crew of 12 and 8,000 square feet of sail for character when not using its motor.

"There are great sentimental reasons for keeping it," she said, "plus if I can have the pleasure of using it two months of the year, why not?"

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 17 (UPI)—I know it is a miracle that I am still alive. That's why I thank God so very much for this.

A serious Mel Blanc—"man of a thousand voices"—was talking about the car crash that cost him his right leg when he was struck head-on by another car on Sunset boulevard last January.

One of the firemen who cut Mel out of the wreckage said later: "We should have just put him in a sack."

Recovering at his Pacific Palisades home, Mel said, "When I asked my doctor what bones I had broken, he told me: 'If someone tells you he broke a bone, you can say you broke the same one—unless it's a left arm.'"

Blanc pointed to his right leg, still in a plaster cast: "This is the one that's slow to heal—21 breaks from the knee to the foot. One of them was compound, and that's what slowed me down."

"The knee cap was torn off my left leg, but somehow it was sewn back on. The other breaks included most of my ribs, the vertebrae, both sides of the pelvis and three skull fractures."

Mel remembers nothing from the time he saw the concussions 31 days later. What did he think about first?

"My mouth," he said. "I realized my mouth and throat were damaged and I couldn't talk. I thanked God for that."

Mel's voice is his fortune; without it he would have been lost.

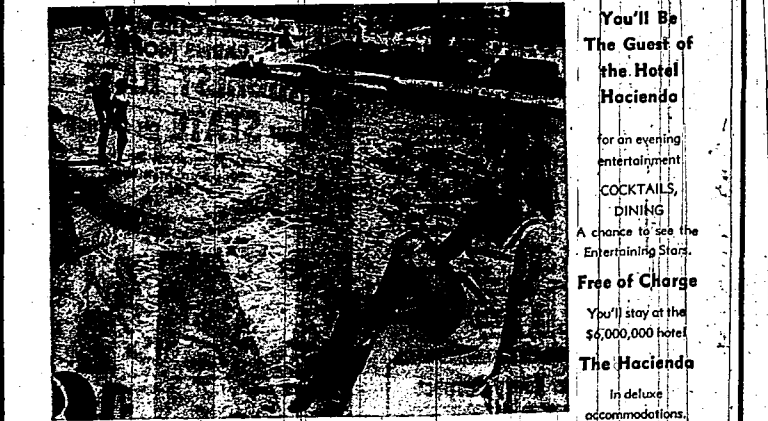

Suitable Programs for Children Are Responsibility of TV

NEW YORK, Nov. 17 (UPI)—The television industry is responsible for providing suitable programs for children because, by and large, parents and teachers are either unwilling or unable to control and guide them. So says Sonny Fox, a career man in juvenile broadcasting.

"Most intelligent parents are alerted to the evils of well-publicized TV violence," Fox said, "and they will act when they hear gunshots, screams and the sound of furniture breaking on the TV set. Fortunately, I don't worry half so much about the children who are watching as I do about all the alien vigils, the bad impressions, that pour out. Parents, generally, aren't even aware of it and don't understand it."

Fox cited a recent survey showing that the average school-age child has 67 hours a week left after his hours of sleep, school and eating have been subtracted. This average child spends almost half of these hours staring at a TV set.

"That's more time than he spends at school, or playing with his little friends," Fox continued. "As a consequence, television has more of an effect on him than his teachers or his friends."

"And some of these TV shows appeal me. Attitudes demonstrated in many of these programs, considered harmless and even kind of cute, are soaked up by the sponge-like minds of the little viewers. They could destroy a child's relationship with adults. Some displace parents. Others use racial stereotypes."

"In many of the situation comedies—yes, including 'Leave It to Beaver' and ' Dennis the Menace'—the kids always look so smart and the parents look so stupid. That's a funny situation—but what a steady diet of this sort of thing does to an impressionable child is not so funny. Perhaps it doesn't do much damage where there is a good strong family relationship, but where it is marginal—as so many are today—it can do a lot of harm."

Fox says that some of the shows aimed right at the younger audience, including "Lassie," often upset and terrify children.

4. Add more open roses, facing blooms in different directions for illusions of depth.
