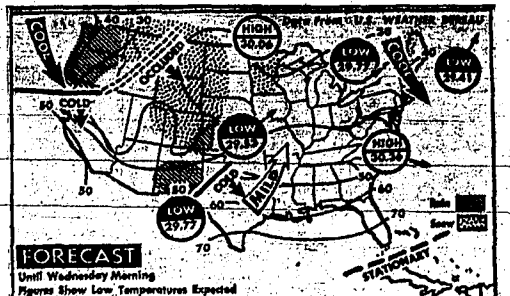

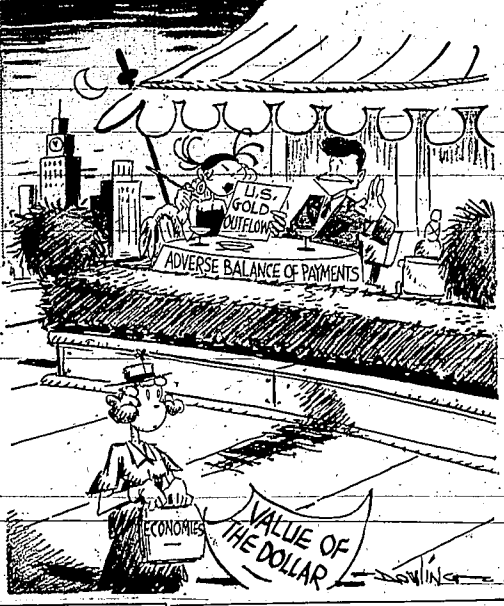

Speakers Hit School Stand By Catholics

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—A possible religious conflict brewed today in the background of a threatened fight over the school speaker.

The possibility was raised by a statement by Rep. Albert W. Harris of Massachusetts for November 20, made vacant by the death last Thursday of Speaker Rayburn.

McDonnell, 70, presently has an official opposition to Harris's seat, to which most observers had assumed he would be re-elected by virtue of having been Democratic floor leader since 1949 and acting speaker since Rayburn was stricken last August.

Rep. Carl Albert of Oklahoma and Rep. Bill Miller of Missouri are the announced candidates, with Albert having the inside track.

Agency Discovers Crisis in Pentagon Supply of Catsup

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21—The defense department has found a solution for the big catsup crisis.

The GAO, which checks on spending by all federal agencies, said today it found that the military's subsistence supply agency at Chicago had purchased 2,000,000 pounds of catsup in the wrong size or type of container during the 1948 and 1950 fiscal years.

It began in fiscal 1948, when the food department bought 200,000 pounds of catsup in 16-ounce bottles and far too little 14-ounce cans, which hold 7 1/2 pounds each.

As a result, it couldn't supply the army when the army, navy and air force asked for them, and had to send 2 1/2 million pounds of bottled catsup pastes. The auditor said this cost \$154,000 extra, figuring catsup in bottles to be worth five cents a pound more than in cans.

In addition, the supply agency had overpurchased catsup in special containers for overseas shipment and bought too little for use in this country. Substitution of 3 1/2 million pounds of export-packed catsup for domestic orders cost another \$55,000, the GAO said.

The auditors said they started following the catsup trail just in time to prevent another big error. The supply agency determined not to get caught in the same error twice, ordered too much catsup-in-cans, and not enough in bottles for fiscal 1950.

The GAO said when it pointed out the problem to the agency, it was able to cancel orders for 1 1/2 million pounds of catsup in cans and save \$175,000.

The GAO said most of the problem was caused by the failure of the supply agency to check through the supply agency and either overstate or understate the quantity of catsup.

It said the defense department solved the problem by taking quick steps to centralize the composition of food requirements by the supply agency, which should cut down on such errors in the future.

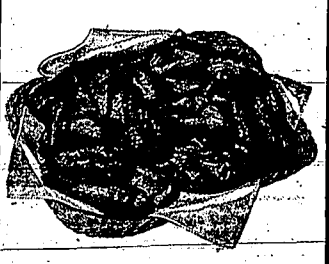

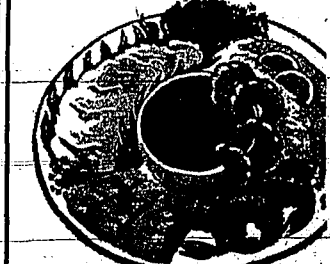

State Agency Security Will Have Checks

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Federal department security policies have come under scrutiny by the senate internal security subcommittee, it was learned yesterday.

The subcommittee, under Vice Chairman Thomas A. Dodd, D-Conn., called in four department witnesses for closed-door testimony Tuesday.

The action followed a recent announcement that the department plans to eliminate for economy reasons about 25 jobs in its bureau of security and consumer affairs which handles security clearance and other functions.

The bureau was set up in 1952 as the aftermath of charges by the late Sen. Joseph R. McCarthy that communists had infiltrated the state department.

Dodd said the unannounced subcommittee executive session involved "state department security matters," but he declined to elaborate.

The department officially has explained that the manpower cuts were being made in line with President Kennedy's call for economy in all departments, it said the reductions applied to other divisions as well.

U.S. Reports Income Rise For October

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21 (AP)—Total personal income in the United States jumped to a record yearly rate of 42 billion dollars in October, according to the commerce department.

Business also picked up last month, the department said Sunday.

The reports added up to the best economic picture in months, except for the persistent high unemployment rate.

The October income increase amounted to 38 billion dollars from September, a large one-month rise.

Wages and salaries, the income of most people, rose by 2.8 billion dollars in October at annual rates, with substantial gains in the automobile, steel, fabricated metal, electrical machinery, food and clothing industries. There were small increases in textiles and chemicals.

Payrolls in construction, transportation, services and trade went up moderately and farmers' income also rose.

The government also reported good improvements last month in industrial production, factory sales, new orders for durable goods, housing starts and retail sales.

In remarks prepared for an anti-Communist rally, Robert Welch said government aid to communism was carried out "while always pretending, of course, to oppose the Reds."

Welch said "a comparatively few thousands Communists, concentrated in key departments and agencies of our government," have done "a terrific job of determining both the policies and the actions of those agencies and departments—and hence indirectly of our whole government."

France Ends Rebel Strike With Change

PARIS, Nov. 21 (AP)—Thousands of jailed Algerians ended their lengthy hunger strike today in return for status as political prisoners.

Lawyers for three ranking members of the rebel Algerian government being held in a hospital outside Paris announced a three-point agreement for ending the strike, which started Nov. 8.

The French ministry of justice confirmed that 5,000 jailed Algerians were eating once again.

But the lawyers said Vice Premier Mohammed Ben Bella and two other rebel cabinet ministers would continue their fast to win other demands.

The agreement called for France to treat the Algerians as political prisoners, order 11 Communist and persons held in Algeria to abide by the agreement and named the Internal Honorary Red Cross to supervise its conditions.

Solon Predicts

COLUMBUS, Ohio, Nov. 21 (AP)—Sen. Barry Goldwater, R-Ariz., yesterday predicted that the question of U. S. entry into the European common market would be the overshadowing issue before the next session of Congress.

Goldwater, in a press conference after addressing more than 3,000 Ohio State university students, said he was against it unless there are adequate guarantees for American industries.

Richard B. Myers, Middleton, was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary in which was committed to 30 days in the county jail. In connection with the death of Marvin Cheney, 22, District Judge Paul W. Hyatt also directed that Myers should not receive a hunting license for five years.

Cheney was shot Oct. 3 while hunting 30 miles northwest of here. He died two days later in a Seattle hospital.

Elizabeth Ends Visit to Ghana

AKORADI, Ghana, Nov. 21 (AP)—Britain's Queen Elizabeth II said she was leaving Ghana Monday to a tumultuous farewell of cheers, a deafening clatter of shotguns and the thunder of a 21-gun salute.

Turkey Cost Reported at 10-Year Low

By The Associated Press
Burgundy in this country has been an extra reason for being thankful this Thanksgiving Day as turkey is selling at the lowest prices in 10 years.

Butchers are selling at an average of 29 cents a pound for birds weighing 18 pounds and up, 33 cents for 10 to 17-pound birds and 35 cents for birds under 10 pounds. This is a half-cent a pound cheaper than last year.

Butchers are in good supply and have been given a clean bill of health.

For those who aren't turkey eaters, hams and roasts are being widely advertised. A great variety of vegetables and fruits is available to round out the holiday menu.

But buys on the vegetable counters are broccoli, cabbage, cauliflower, spinach, escarole, Boston and iceberg lettuce, east-west and potatoes, carrots, green onions, mushrooms, rutabaga, peppers, radishes, spinach, acorn and butternut squash, and golden and red finger potatoes.
