New Policies Of Exemption Are Outlined

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—The defense department has laid out the new policies to govern exemption of reservists from emergency call to active duty.

The new policies are based on recent legislation passed by Congress. The policies apply to all reservists who are called to active duty in the Regular Army, Navy, Air Force or Marine Corps.

A key feature of the new policies is that they apply to all reservists who are called to active duty in the Regular Army, Navy, Air Force or Marine Corps.

On requesting exemption, reservists must file a request with their commanding officer or the nearest military service center. The request must be filed at least 30 days before the date of the call to active duty.

Reservists who are exempted from active duty will receive a "leave without pay" status. They will not receive pay or allowances during this period.

Reservists who are exempted from active duty will not be subject to the same disciplinary actions as reservists who are called to active duty.

The new policies also provide for the exemption of reservists who are called to active duty in the Regular Army, Navy, Air Force or Marine Corps.

Decision on Drugs Case Is Due Soon

SALT LAKE CITY, Nov. 23 (AP)— Judge A. Sherman Christensen said Wednesday he is expected to decide on the government's anti-drug suit against the Utah Pharmaceutical Association.

Government and defense lawyers ended final arguments Wednesday.

The government lawyers, Lyle Jones and Don Banks, San Francisco, and the defense attorneys, Arthur B. Hanson, Washington, D.C., opposed each other in the earlier case which the California case which the government won but which has been appealed.

Cases similar to the Utah suit are pending in Arizona and Idaho.

The government contends that the association conspired to fix the prices of drugs and inflated a price fixing schedule to the detriment of the public.

Hanson maintained there was no interstate commerce and therefore, could not fall under the anti-trust law.

Aid Being Sent To Battle Chile Polio Outbreak

NEW YORK, Nov. 23 (AP)— Polio-fighting equipment is being shipped to Chile to combat an outbreak of the crippling disease in Santiago, the National Foundation reported today.

The Chilean government last night appealed to the United States for equipment and the U.S. surgeon general, Dr. Luther L. Terry, referred the request to the National Foundation, the health organization said.

Chile asked for 10 chest roentgenographs, 20 hot pack machines and five rockin beds, said Dr. Daniel Bergman, association medical director of the foundation. He said the equipment was being assembled at the foundation's supply pool in Houston, Texas, for trans-shipment to Chile. The equipment was being obtained from Augusta, Ga., Nashville, Tenn., and Cleveland.

The National Foundation said several deaths had been reported in the Santiago polio outbreak.

U.S., Canada Leaders Eye Stalled Plans

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—United States President Kennedy and British Columbia Premier Bennett have been "in communication" about the stalled \$450,000 Columbia river hydro development project.

This was confirmed Wednesday by U. S. State and Foreign Affairs Minister William, one of the key men in negotiations that led to a Canadian-U. S. treaty for the development of the river for power and flood control.

William said in a telephone interview from Kamloops when Premier Bennett was in Seattle last week "it is obvious that they were communicating" on matters concerning the Columbia development that has been a bone of contention between British Columbia and Ottawa.

Premier Bennett has been insisting that Canada sell its share of downstream power benefits at a rate of five mills per kilowatt hour. Provincial officials here said this could finance most of the dam project but the federal government has taken a strong stand against such sale of the power, arguing it should be returned to B. C. for provincial development at cheap rates.

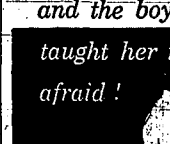

Congo Slows U.N. Inquiry Into Murder

They fear it will relieve the pressure to bring economist Katanga province under the central government's rule.

Adoula was reported to have reaffirmed his determination to carry through on the KIVU investigation at a meeting with parliamentary leaders yesterday.

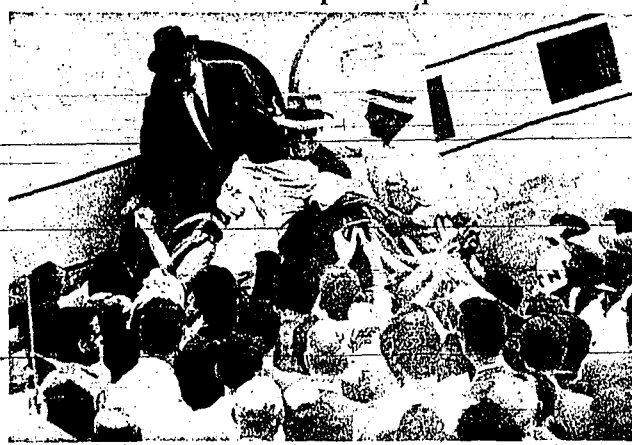

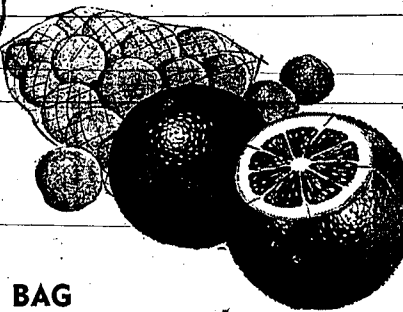

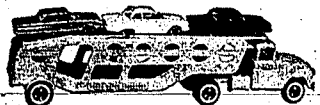

Scientists in U.S. Urging Flu Shot Use

By The Associated Press
A new influenza epidemic has swept the United States in the last three years alone, the specific virus was first recognized, say there are indications that these waves of flu have been involved in some 80,000 deaths.

Scientists have urged that influenza shots be given to older persons, pregnant women, and persons with chronic ailments since they are more often the victims of the worst effects of influenza. Death rates indicate now that the Asian flu has already claimed many of the weak and infirm.

The first epidemic came in two waves, one in 1947, the other in 1948. During the first, the United States recorded some 447,000 deaths from all causes — nearly 40,000 more than had been expected in the second wave, total deaths were 20,000 more than expected.

By 1950, some 20,000 excess deaths were recorded. Hazards for Children
Some drugs, safe for use in adults, can be fatal for children. So warns Dr. James M. Sutherland, University of Cincinnati, pediatrician.

Death, blindness and brain damage in the newborn have been caused by some drugs even though they are considered safe for adults, Dr. Sutherland said. In treatment, pediatricians know that "the child is not a little man" and they must also consider that "the infant is not a little child," he added.

Common Complaint
Some 10 to 15 per cent of the world's population has ulcers, says a University of Chicago doctor. Though the cause is obscure, people ulcer seem to be one of the common ailments of ill health the world over.

Dr. Joseph B. Kilsner said the two essential factors in the formation of an ulcer seem to be the digestive action of the stomach acids and the decreased resistance of the mucous lining of the stomach and upper digestive tract.

Grid Fan Is Being Added To FBI List
WASHINGTON—Nov. 23 (AP)— Frank Eugene Alltop, a shotgun-wielding robber who likes to play football, was placed today on the FBI's list of 10 most wanted criminals.

Alltop, 37, has been a fugitive since 1950 when he and three other prisoners broke out of the county jail at Wayne, Va., while awaiting trial for a hold-up near Kentucky.

The FBI said Alltop, who stands between 5 feet and 5 feet one inch, and weighs between 170 and 180 pounds, is a cunning and vicious of the rights of others.

He once attacked a fellow-prisoner with a knife and is described as an intractable who should be considered "very dangerous." Known by the nicknames "Grid" and "Frog," Alltop was first arrested in Canton, O., in 1952 and convicted of breaking and entering. After a term in the reformatory, he was arrested by the Ohio state patrol near Hamilton in 1954 while in the midst of what the FBI calls "a criminal rampage."

Convicted, he served a sentence in the Ohio penitentiary, then was turned over to West Virginia authorities for further prosecution.

The FBI points out that since February, 1952, when the wanted man was 19, he has either been in custody or a fugitive except for two months.

Alltop, born in Cliven, W. Va., is known as a sports enthusiast who enjoys playing football. The FBI reports that in addition to his liking for stamp collecting, he enjoys reading historical novels and card playing.

He has a medium build, his eyes are blue, his complexion is fair.

Identification marks include two tattoos: the name "Norma" on his right wrist and the name "Blub" on the upper right arm.

In addition, he has scars on his right temple and chin. There is a scar and a mole on his left temple and another mole on his right cheek.

In the past, Alltop has worked as a boiler maker, laborer and truck driver.

The Twin Falls city sheriff's office plans to get the two men arrested and return them to Twin Falls.

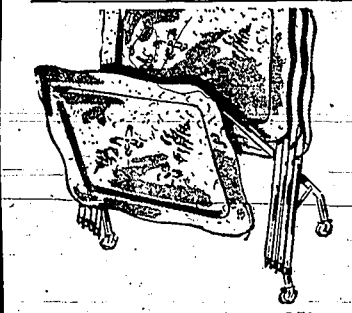

Farms Policy Expressed at Grange Meet

WORCESTER, Mass., Nov. 23 (AP)—The National Grange, in a series of board policy statements, declared Wednesday that it increased its bargaining power was a basic requirement for a sound farm program.

"It is the role of government to assist producers to develop through co-operatives, marketing agencies and orders, better methods to strengthen producer bargaining programs of supply management," the Grange resolution said.

Bargaining programs — developed on a community-by-community basis — would enable farmers "to earn a return for their labor, management and capital investments" commensurate with that enjoyed by others, the Grange said.

The resolution was one of a number adopted by delegates to the National Grange's 80th annual session, which ended here Wednesday.

The resolutions covered a wide spectrum of subjects, ranging from the nation's electoral college system the Grange wants changed to making standards more truly standard across the nation (the Grange favors such a move).

The Grange adopted a resolution supporting marketing and purchasing operations by farmers. Delegates went on record in opposition to "referring to citizenship of co-operatives through punitive taxation or court action when more equitable the Copper Valley act."

Among the other resolutions approved were those urging the government to work for conditions which would keep domestic and world markets open to United States cotton and cotton products on an equitable, competitive basis; to provide for the old civilian conservation corps of depression days as a deterrent to juvenile delinquency; to expand the uses of atomic energy for peaceful purposes; to urge a "freeze" to curtail the operation of family farms.

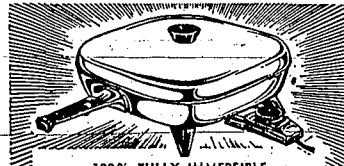

Experts Take Issue on Idea For Shelters

IGWA CITY, Ia., Nov. 23 (AP)—James Van Allen and seven other University of Iowa physicists take issue with Dr. William Libby's vindictive series of articles on how to survive an atomic attack. They call it "extremely dangerous."

Van Allen, who detected the radiation belts circling the Earth through satellite studies, is at the Iowa physics department. The Iowa physicists, in a letter to the editor of the Iowa City Press-Citizen, said of the series: "Libby, a Nobel prize chemist,"

"It is extremely dangerous to give the impression to the public that the building of fallout shelters will enable the average citizen to survive a nuclear war. This gives a false sense of security. The percentage of small margin of safety gained in no way detracts from the very real possibility that an atomic war will mean the end of the civilization of both continents."

"I agree that anybody who interpreted my article as saying that fallout shelters make atomic war tolerable should be outraged. I did not intend to say anything like that. What I intended to say was that fallout shelters greatly increase the chance of survival for those who were not
