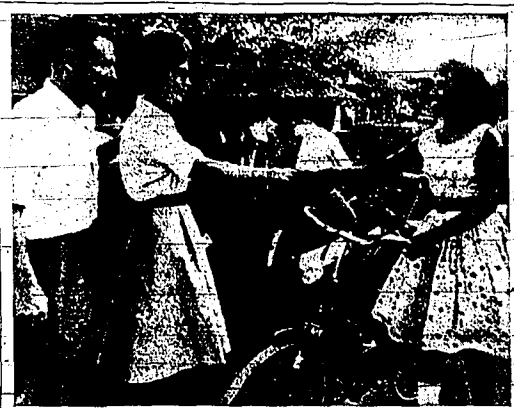

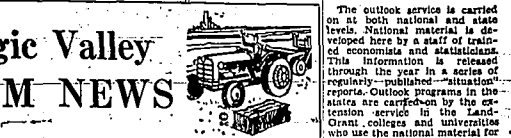

The Packers' offense went back into a slouch when the Lions took a 10-0 lead in the second quarter, and they fell behind 9-7 when Martin made his third field goal.

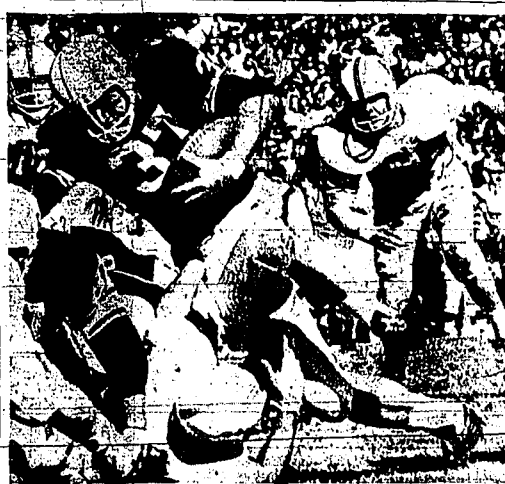

You Can Stretch Room for Storage

Our most unwise storage problems come out in the open in modern houses. They don't offer the friendly compartment of attic, back hall or under-stairs closets.

Even the basement for utility room turns up the odds as an open, spacious playroom with no storage secrets!

It'll grant that the busy-bodies of yesterday didn't feel efficient, well-planned storage. They offered many temptations to squirrel things away instead of pitching them out.

Improved housekeeping. Moving into a modern, open-planned home has improved the housekeeping, a friend of mine reports. In her home, as in many, additional storage space had to be devised from walled corners, nooks, and end walls.

Many aids for stretching space are available. Assemble (to yourself) shelving is a good example. Open shelves, even those fitted with storage boxes, have their limitations. Some household equipment and supplies are better kept out of sight.

To suggest ideas to you and me, let's look at the storage ideas designed and approved by a floor-care service department, and pictured with this article. Although planned for a modern home, it got ideas for solving some of my storage problems (look at the shelf, on door at left) to hold the bath towels upright in holes drilled through the wood.

Nook Converted. A long, deep, nook in a playroom with the hot water heater in one corner was converted to a storage-cool-and-dry closet with special facilities for hardware items.

The hot water heater is electric and is heavily insulated. Air holes in the outer room allow proper ventilation.

Closet door left, in 'nook, is faced with pegboard and has an inside four-inch xark. Top shelves hold cleaning polishes, waxes, etc. Below come the tubs on shelves.

The tubs are mounted for the vacuum and the floor polisher are spaced on the wall. Above the heater are partitioned shelves staid for big trays, tall vases and bequity flower pots.

Better "Image" Asked by Murrow

HOLLYWOOD, Nov. 24 (AP)—Edward R. Murrow, who hinted that Hollywood should sell a better "image" of America overseas, can rest assured movie makers are behind him. Extraordinarily far behind him, in a matter of fact.

As director of the United States Information Agency (OSIA), Murrow addressed movie-town brass earlier this month, hopeful they would mend their ways of depicting us as a nation of snobs, gamblers, adulterers.

But [the celluloid mahatmas] were already on up on him.

Before Murrow made his speech the Motion Picture Association of America, headed by Eric Johnston, had related his code to accept immoral relationships, including homosexuality, but that doesn't mean movie men went in favor of a better image.

Very few films downgrading our way of life are sent to what Mr. Johnston described as "undeveloped countries." Such places as Uganda and Somalia land are nurtured along on John Wayne extravaganzas.

Films depicting narcotics addicts, sex deviates, cannibals and other all-American types are lent to civilized countries, i.e. Western Europe, because, according to Johnston "they have the same kind of problems."

He indicated chances were slim (perhaps nil) such films as "The Children's Hour" and "Advice and Consent"—both containing homosexual themes—would ever reach the likes of Indonesia or Ghana.

Quackery Costing U.S. 10 Millions

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24 (AP)—The food and drug administration reports that millions of Americans are doing themselves ill by nutritional nostrums of every description.

"Exploitation of this market is the most widespread and expensive form of medical quackery in the country today," the FDA noted in a summary report on nutritional quackery.

It is estimated that the quackery is costing 10 million Americans over 500 million dollars a year.

"We have quotas in underdeveloped nations," Johnston explained. "And they wouldn't include pictures like 'Children's Hour' or 'Advice and Consent.'"

In support of ending the production code to include sex deviation Johnston said, "Movies are now a mature form of entertainment. They are no longer juvenile peep shows."

"No more restaurant should be placed against motion pictures than against any other mature medium of communication."

"We felt that some sections of the code should be altered so movies would be free to compete with what is read in books, magazines, newspapers and what is seen on Broadway."

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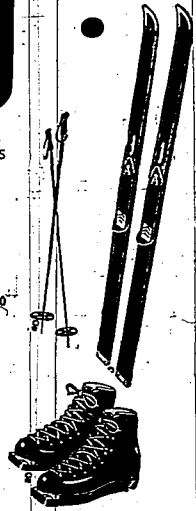

2 tablespoons grated Parmesan cheese	1 teaspoon oregano

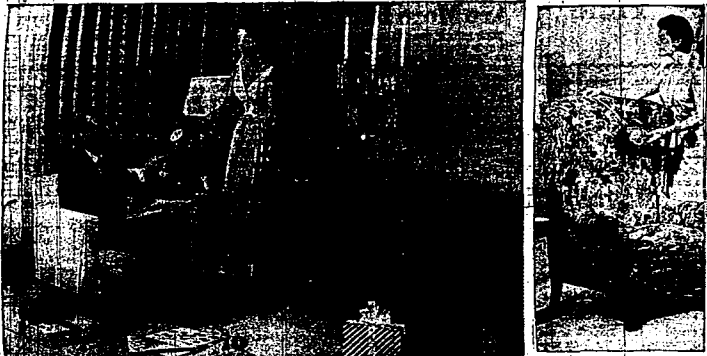

All Dean's own flight certificate, the airline gave out to him commemorating their first flight. Dean scribbled the words of "Big Bad John" on the back.

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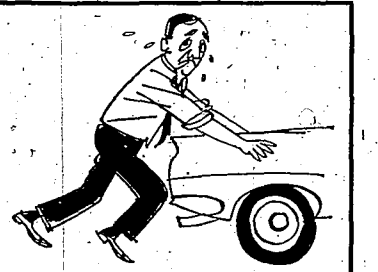

Christmas Perfect for Snapshots

By BART KINCH
Christmas offers a unique opportunity for available light snapshots in color.

The term "available light" refers to photography that makes use of natural illumination normally present when a picture is taken. The photographer's intention is to preserve the natural mood and appearance of his subject.

To do this, he shoots without the aid of flash or floor lights. For available light picture-taking, use a high speed color film. Turn on all the lights in the room, including those on the Christmas tree. This should enable the photographer to capture the usual holiday home activities without noticeable blur.

Time exposures of the Christmas tree alone also may prove rewarding.

When properly executed, available light photographs exhibit an honest, true-to-life feeling that would be difficult if not impossible to achieve with artificially added illumination.

The basic requirements for taking available light pictures are: a camera with a fast lens, an accurate meter which can measure light levels in the

range, and high-speed film. A useful accessory is a table-top tripod that can be carried in one's pocket.

Available light can take many forms; it might be soft north light from a nursery window; harsh, contrasting light from a living room light fixture; light from banks of fluorescent tubes in an office; the bright beam of a theater spotlight or the glow of a single candle.

Usually, available light is low

intensity and thus calls for a relatively wide lens opening. In some cases, extended development will have to be used during processing to increase the effective emulsion speed to a level permitting a flexible handheld shutter speed.

Although many sizes and types of cameras can be used for available light photography, the 35 millimeter camera with its fast lenses, ease of handling and large film load are a distinct advantage.

Another good performer is the many twin-lens reflex camera that utilizes 120 roll film. These cameras have many of the features of 35 millimeter equipment plus the advantage of a larger negative size.

Desks, Dressers Cause Trouble in Most Homes

Lessons in family sharing hit a snag when the subject of desks and dressers comes up. One reason is that it is difficult for parents to set a good example.

Youngsters are taught to share toys and play equipment. Sharing of closets and bedroom space can be worked out amicably. But to ask two people to double up on dresser or desk space is to set the stage for friction.

Take a dresser or chest of drawers, for example.

It seems so logical and simple to assign the bottom three drawers to your spouse while you struggle along with the top four. But this division of labor takes into account the variety of items to be stored.

Pretty soon the head of the house is slipping his cuff links, handkerchiefs, watch chain and similar small items into the drawer where you keep gloves, scarves and jewelry.

And you yield to the temptation to tuck odds and ends into the empty spaces next to his socks and shirts. This leads to strong words and angry dresser.

Even though severely limited by the small size of most bedrooms, furniture designers are responsible for excellent "for men only" chests and wardrobes. The variety of styling, of wood used, of finishes is great. In general, error space is planned for specific masculine clothing—shirts, socks, bulky sport sweaters and so on.

Some include mirrors and built-in lighting. Others have space for ties.

To conserve floor space, dressers are likely to be tall rather than wide, to make best use of floor space.

Wardrobes which are lower and wider have space for hanging top coats or jackets.

It's a trend that manufacturers are planning for Christmas and you

will have a hand in the selection, another point should be considered.

Big dressers of chests are heavy, and some provisions for cleaning under and in back of them should be made.

Some which appear to rest on solid bases on the floor actually have concealed ball casters for easy moving. Legs on others hold them high enough off the floor to permit a vacuum cleaner to slide underneath.
