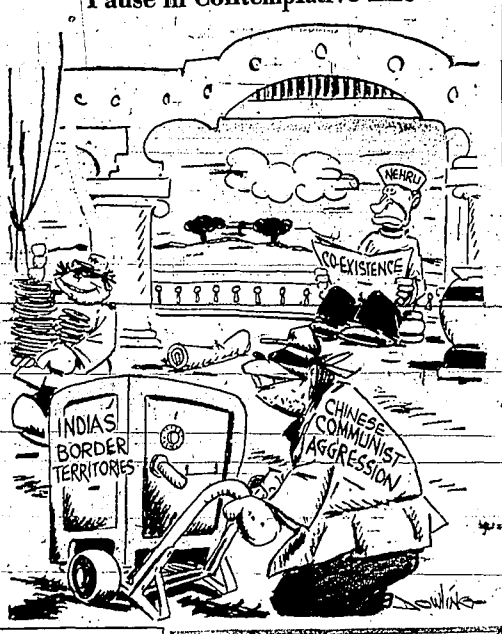

### Governor's Post Has Three Hopefuls; Possibilities Include Ex-Camas Man

BOISE, Nov. 25 (AP)—There are three announced candidates for the Democratic nomination for governor of Idaho and a number of other possibilities. But one of the most likely prospects for the job is probably by law from taking any part in politics. That man is H. Max Hanson, 43, who will be running for the farmers home administration. He is a former state senator and has run several times for the gubernatorial nomination. Hanson admitted that I have been asked to seek the nomination. Hanson said in an interview. ### Death Takes Wealthy Man At Age of 80

STOCHOLM, Nov. 25 (AP)—Ago Leonard Wenner-Gren, a Swedish farm boy whose salesmanship helped him to amass one of the world's biggest fortunes, died yesterday of cancer. He was 80.

The U.S. government estimated his personal wealth at 1 billion dollars several years ago, but Wenner-Gren repeatedly declined to offer an estimate of his net worth.

"All that is required to make a million dollars is hard work and discipline," he once said.

He died at the Red Cross hospital here where his American-born wife, the former Marguerite Gaullier, was reported under treatment for a illness of an undisclosed nature.

An operation earlier revealed that the Swedish industrialist and philanthropist had a stomach tumor that had spread to the liver. He had been under treatment for about a month. The couple had no children.

### Coast Strike May Spread Across U.S.

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25 (AP)—A walkout, touched off by a grievance in the San Leandro, Calif., plant of Western Electric company, today spread throughout the San Francisco bay area and threatened to involve telephone company employees throughout the nation.

"A spokesman for the Communications Workers of America said the strike could go nationwide unless the issue are resolved soon.

CWA members picketed Pacific Telephone, a subsidiary of the phone company, suspended several hundred employees who participated in a 45-minute union meeting during working hours last Wednesday. The meeting was called by CWA local 615 to discuss grievances involving the suspension of four employees.

Reports of a jurisdictional dispute between the CWA and the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers union came to light today as a spokesman for an IBEW organizing committee charged that the CWA walkout was the desperate move of a weak union.

Both CWA and IBEW are AFL-CIO affiliates. The IBEW which represents other employees in the telephone industry, was attempting to bring about a national labor relations board election among the group of employees at Western Electric now represented by the CWA.

### Jury Frees Man In Murder Case

ORANOVILLE, N.J., Nov. 25 (AP)—A 10th district jury deliberated just three hours here today to find the Bruce O. Meador, 28-year-old Cranfordville farmer had been charged with second degree murder in the death of his 21-year-old water wife. Her body was found stuffed in a culvert near here.

### Aide to FDR Now Adviser To Columbia

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—A former White House assistant, who a decade ago figured in congressional investigations of communist activity in the U.S. government, now is an economic adviser to the government of Colombia.

But both the state department and the Colombian embassy said yesterday the one-time congressional investigator, Lauchlin Currie, has nothing to do with spending U.S. foreign aid money in the Latin American nation.

Currie, 60, a Canadian-born economist and former Harvard professor, was one of Franklin D. Roosevelt's administrative assistants from 1939 to 1945.

In 1948 Elizabeth Bentley, confessed Soviet spy courier, said he was one of several government misemployed who fed the spy ring secret U.S. information.

### U.S. Sailors Misbehaved, Guinea Says

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—The government of Guinea says American sailors misbehaved on a recent goodwill visit but the state department emphatically denies it.

The leftist government of Marxist-leaning Sekou Toure said that crew members of two navy vessels "disgusted" the people of Conakry, capital of Guinea.

The state department press officer Lincoln White said yesterday:

"We deny categorically that there was misconduct of American sailors in Conakry in connection with the visit."

"The USS Donner and USS Suffolk, floating drydock ships that have been making a goodwill tour of the Atlantic coast of Africa, arrived in Conakry Nov. 17.

While absent embassy officials in Conakry carefully investigated the alleged incidents and found no evidence of their having taken place.

News dispatches from Conakry said the sailors were accused of abducting and taking pictures in restricted areas and of having "mugged" residents.

CHEWELASH, Wash., Nov. 25 (AP)—William B. Hunter, 12, Chewelash, Wash., was killed instantly by eight miles southwest of here when struck in the neck by a bullet from a companion's rifle, Stevens County Sheriff A. E. Heller said.

### Expansion of Idaho Higher Education Facilities Slated

BOISE, Nov. 25 (AP)—Dramatic expansion of Idaho's higher education facilities and a state-wide program for public schools is forecast by Dr. J. M. Bergquist, state superintendent of public instruction.

The Gen state's top public school official said he believes that within a decade, Idaho will have two tax-supported universities, one four-year college and four two-year junior colleges.

Mr. Edgar, an escapee patrolman, said the escapes that were considered most dangerous occurred in the second floor quarters. When two supervisors tried to stop them, the inmates knifed and stabbed the matrons, screaming "let's go."

They made for the kitchen and grabbed knives, forks and ice picks. They fled the home through the kitchen windows, which have no bars.

The superintendent said the girls apparently had planned the escape. A key to the electrical box had been missing since Thursday. They turned on the light after they had broken through the window.

There were 83 girls in the correctional institution, ranging from 11 to 17. Mrs. Stanbeck said those who fled were incorrigibles who had made trouble at the institution before.

### Sonic Booms Don't Bother Until Known

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—When it comes to sonic booms what people don't know doesn't seem to hurt them.

"That was the gist of a report yesterday that secret tests of boom effects over several big population areas had produced surprisingly few complaints.

The boom occurs when a supersonic aircraft exceeds the speed of sound and sends shock waves earthward.

Officials in on the program said that only since the initial test program was completed and people became aware such tests were going on did the complaints begin to come in.

Previously, it was reported, when the public was unaware it was being subjected to such tests, people paid little attention to the disturbance.

NEWPORT NEWS, Va., Nov. 25.—The giant carrier Enterprise went on active duty today and many Secretary John B. Connally said she would retain at least for the near future, as the country's only nuclear carrier.

"There is little doubt that we will desire more nuclear carriers at some date in the future," when a way is found to cut both the size and cost, the navy secretary said.

But until then, he said, the Enterprise "is one of a kind—not in any sense a prototype for a family of ever larger, more expensive sister ships."

Top navy brass, invited guests, crew members and their families packed the cavernous hangar deck of the carrier to witness the commissioning of the 444 million dollar vessel.

The commissioning of the Enterprise of the proud name Enterprise of the jet and the nation's first fast fission reactor famous World War II Enterprise were hoisted during the ceremony.

# Many Haven't Applied for Social Security's Benefits

Several hundred Magic Valley residents, eligible for social security benefits under a more liberal retirement clause, have failed to apply for the added benefits, Wesley P. Watson, Twin Falls social security office manager, reported.

"In an effort to contact those eligible for payments who have not yet applied, the Twin Falls office will be kept open one evening a week for the next three weeks," Watson said.

"Persons affected are those still working and earning enough so they could not get payments under the old law but are eligible for benefits under the new law regarding retirement," he explained.

The office, located at 158 Second avenue west, will be open from 7 p.m. during the next three weeks, Nov. 30, Dec. 7 and 14.

"To figure out how much we can pay a person, we have to know two things," Watson asserted. "What his monthly benefit amount is and second, how much he will earn this year."

Once this is determined, "we can decide whether he should file an application for payments," he stated.

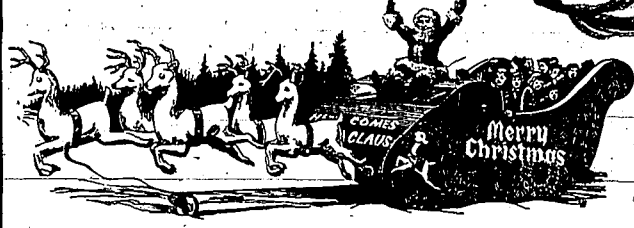

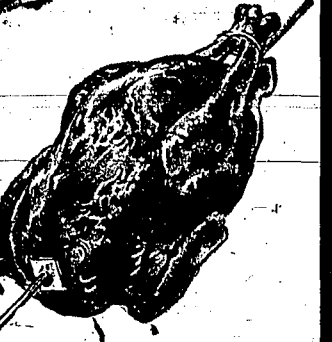

## No Danger Is Expected for Nation From Latest Fallout

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 25**—The additional amount of strontium-90 from recent atomic tests would be expected to increase the level of strontium-90 in bone guides of safety in effect for the U.S. general public, Sen. Henry Dworshak said today.

A report from the atomic energy commission...

Noting the widespread interest in Idaho concerning fallout and atomic testing, Sen. Dworshak requested information concerning fallout from the recent Soviet tests.

At least 25 per cent of the radioactive material from the recent Soviet 30- and 50-megaton atomic device detonations went into the atmosphere, Senator Dworshak, a member of the joint committee on atomic energy, was told.

Dworshak reported that the AEC information indicated that this radioactive material which was deposited in the atmosphere will be diffused widely and will come to Earth gradually perhaps over a period of a year or more.

These tests, however, will not raise levels that could be produced in the United States by these detonations as will be discussed only in very general terms. They reported that the entire Russian test series up to the 50-megaton detonation would add perhaps 40-50 milligrams of strontium-90 per square mile to the 70-milligrams per square mile present in United States soil from all previous nuclear tests by all nations.

Continuing, the report noted that the explosion of a 50-megaton device would deposit substantial additional amounts of strontium-90 per square mile in United States soil.

### East Europe Erases All of Stalin Traces

**WARSAW, Poland, Nov. 25 (AP)—**Communist East Europe last week plunged into a frenzied purge of all remaining traces of Stalin's memory and flung bitter epithets at the Stalinist loyalists for refusing to join them.

Only Poland managed to maintain its composure and stand aloof from the feverish rush to get in line with the new Moscow campaign to erase the memory of Stalin.

The Poles pointed out that they had traveled this route five years before and were just waiting for the others to catch up with them.

Reports of the de-Stalinization drive reaching here from other satellite countries give this picture:

**Czechoslovakia:** The industrial Czechoslovakia busily set to work removing hundreds of streets, squares and factories that had borne Stalin's name. The host of the late Stalinist president Klement Gottwald was ordered removed from his mausoleum.

The massive statue of Stalin that has stood in Prague since 1955 was ordered razed. Communist chief Antonin Novotny revealed that his country had already cut off all economic assistance to Albania.

**Hungary:** Appropriate measures to liquidate embarrassing monuments to Stalin were authorized by a plenum of the Hungarian communist party's central committee. The party deleted a thinly veiled slap at Red China, which supports the Albanians. The Hungarians declared this is no time for palinates as far as Albania's party chief Enver Hoxha is concerned and called for tougher measures against communists and reactionaries.

**East Germany:** The old Stalinist Walter Ulbricht, woe through the motions of disbanding his former mentor and patron by tearing down his image and name all over Communist East Germany. Propaganda organs denounced Stalinist measures, which they admitted had prevailed in the East German communist party, but defended Ulbricht's leadership of the party.

### Foreign Aid Directed by N.Y. Lawyer

**WASHINGTON, Nov. 25 (AP)—**Powell Hamilton's job is to spend \$5 billion dollars for foreign aid in the next year. And he says in spending it he'll stress the principle that recipient nations must do all they can to help themselves.

"The way has ever been found," he said in an interview, "to help people who do not want to help themselves."

Hamilton, 50, is a wealthy New York City lawyer who says he accepted the \$250-million-a-year job because he was impressed by President Kennedy's concept of foreign aid, and because of the challenge of the job itself.

"Also, it is a great job when you think of it in terms of its real objectives: the building up of the military strength of countries as considered as our allies, particularly in the danger areas, and such help as we can give in strengthening the economy and accelerating the improvement of living standards in countries that are not so independent."

Hamilton's title is administrator of the agency for international development, a new entity which incorporates the work of the international cooperation administration, the development loan fund, foreign currency operations of the export-import bank, and other activities.

The administrator, who reports directly to Secretary of State Dean Rusk and to Kennedy, occupies offices in the state department. Stories of some past boob-boosts attributed to foreign aid officials seem quite well-known by Hamilton.

Hamilton says "We are going to make mistakes, too, but even a banker has losses some times. I couldn't possibly see every project we help on, but I told congress I'm going to be accountable, and the text will come next spring when I go back to congress to talk about future foreign aid programs."

The foreign aid bill carries \$3,100,000,000 of new money for fiscal year 1962 starting last July 1. In addition there was more than \$100 million dollars felt from last year, 300 million dollars available in treasury and other funds bringing the total to nearly \$5 billion dollars.

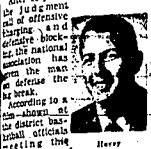

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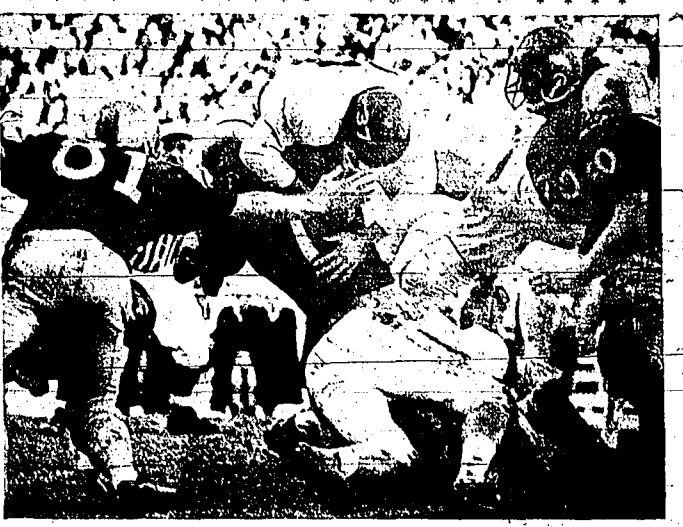

# WISCONSIN SURPRISES MINNESOTA 23-21

## Defeat Explodes Gopher Bid for 2 Big Ten Titles

**MINNEAPOLIS, Nov. 25 (UPI)**—Pass-master Ron Miller led Wisconsin to a 23-21 upset over third-ranked Minnesota today to explode the Gophers' dreams of a second consecutive Big Ten football title. Thus Ohio State won the conference championship outright with a 14-0 record on the strength of the Buckeyes' crushing defeat of Michigan. Defending national champion Minnesota, favored by more than a touchdown against the Badgers, finished second with a 6-1 mark.

Miller, the conference's leading passer, tossed two touchdowns, one to cap a dramatic drive in final seconds of the first period after Minnesota had captured a brief 15-14 lead.

Minnesota, a 6-1-1 record, American candidate Sandy Stephens, struck for a touchdown in the last two minutes, but failed to earn a tie when Stephens' passing effort for a two-point conversion missed.

Miller's first-touchdown throw, a 75-yard pass, found the Gophers' first play from scrimmage when Stephens passed to Tom Hill on an 80-yard scoring play in the first quarter.

The defeat snipped a six-game Kansas winning streak and may have knocked the Jayhawks out of a post-season bowl berth. Kansas, a two-touchdown favorite, scored midway through the first quarter with sophomore fullback Ken Taylor jumping over center for the final yard in a 13-yard drive that was set up by a Missouri fumble.

Missouri scored 53 yards in the second quarter, with halfback Bill Tobin kicking a 17-yard field goal.

With the score at 7-3, Missouri began its winning touchdown money line in the third quarter after taking a Kansas punt. Senior quarterback Ken Taylor contributed three key passes.

In the long touchdown drive and Tobin kicked left end for the first three yards with 14:02 left in the game. Tobin's kick made it 10-7.

Both teams kicked away scoring opportunities. Missouri fumbled away scoring drives at the Kansas 25 and eight-yard line, and Kansas was stopped on one occasion in the Missouri 14 and another time at the Tigers' 16.

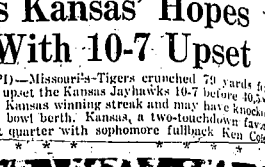
Neither team was able to show the first time it had the ball, but Kansas caught an early on a fumble by Missouri's quarter-back Jim Johnson at the Missouri 16.

The game was the most important in the Ohio State attack, for it was from this interception that the Buckeyes scored their winning touchdown.

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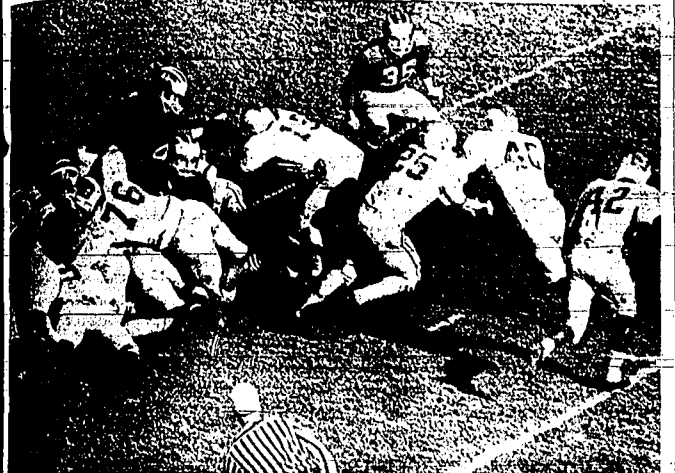

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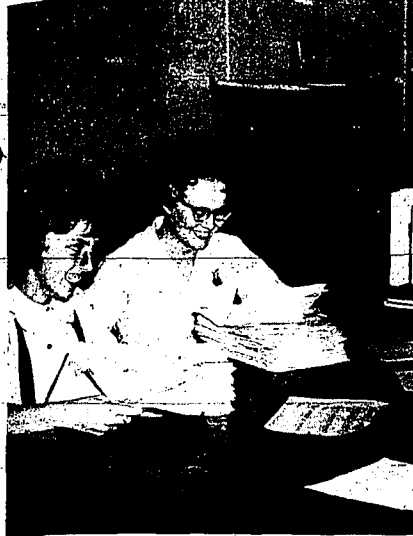

**Street Sweeper Prompts Many Fascinating Queries**

Practically everyone, from those who topic to the writer, has stopped at some time in his life to watch a mechanical street sweeper at work. The operation of the machine, which looks like a short, fat man with a big machine, has puzzled many a person.

What makes it go? What makes it work? And, most of all, where does the dirt go? Don't it simply runs the street, scooping debris, like a huge mechanical vacuum, or does it have its limits?

These and other questions were asked by Henry Wambolt, city employee, the man who operates and maintains the machine.

Probably by one of the city streets as well as Wambolt. Daily he climbs into the cab atop the machine and drives back and forth across the city while the brushes frantically clean up the debris left by wind, trees and humans.

Wambolt drives about 500 miles on the city streets each month and during the course of this work the machine will sweep up about 800 yards of debris, which later is hauled to the city sanitary fill. From 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., on most week days, he drives on a scheduled route through the city.

Saturday, the proverbial night "on the town" for most citizens, is somewhat of a headache for Wambolt and his machine. It seems humans are messier on Saturday night than other nights of the week.

It might be the night to have fun, but it also is the night to "lower the streets." In order to keep up with the litterbugs, Wambolt is up at 5 a.m. Sunday, the warm-up machine and spends two hours tidying up Sheehone street and Main avenue, the two streets that catch the attention of the litterbugs.

Certain days and seasons have their own characteristics, according to Wambolt. He works on Sunday morning the street

**Survey Indicates Parents Support Driver Training Course in School**

The students in Twin Falls junior high school and high school will be offered a driver training course early in the December semester, according to Dr. J. H. Hagan, superintendent of the Magic Valley school district No. 411.

A survey, to sample the opinion of 66 parents concerning the course was undertaken recently. One thousand survey sheets were sent home with junior high school students. The parents answered the questions on the survey and signed it and returned it to the school. Over 100 of the survey sheets were returned to the junior high school office.

One of the questions on the survey was, "Would you give consent for your child to be enrolled in driver training?" The response was overwhelming in the affirmative. Of the 100 surveys returned, 95 percent would give consent and 65 percent would not.

The course must be given outside of school hours, as recommended by the state board of education.

The second question asked, "Would you permit your child to be enrolled on Saturday or Sunday school?" Again the response was in favor of having the course, even if the student had to take it on their own.

The third question was, "Do you feel this course should be offered to 14- or 15-year-old students?" This question was answered in the affirmative by 100 percent of the new law that states that after July 1, 1962, no child under 16 years may receive a driver's license if he has not completed a driver training course.

The fourth question was, "Would you allow your child to drive your automobile after he or she successfully passed this course?" The respondents were in favor: 87 to 45.

The last question was, "Do you feel this course should be offered in the senior high school only?" The voting was in favor of having the course in the junior high school, 519 to 142.

Regland notes the school board considered the class during regular Monday night meetings and decided to start the classes next semester.

Driver training classes last for 20 hours. Six hours must be spent actually behind the wheel. Classes probably will be held at the high school parking lot. The course is an elaborate

day course on the subject. According to George Staudler, principal of the junior high school, there are four licensed instructors in the district.

The course is a no-credit course. Both written and practical exams are given. If a student fails the course he can't apply for a license until he is 16 years old.

**Self-Sacrifice Is Prime Ingredient of Symphony**

Every worthwhile venture usually is seasoned with at least a pinch of self-sacrifice. And the Twin Falls civic symphony is a good example of a local organization that has been highly favored with this condition.

The fact that a community of this size can muster a 45-piece orchestra is commendable, but in order for the orchestra to exist it is necessary that a good share of the members make more than the average sacrifice.

To play in an orchestra requires hours of rehearsal time—hours that many persons would rather spend with their feet propped up on a hassock. And it means work—work that most persons aren't willing to do on top of their other chores.

There are 18 members of the orchestra who work 8 to 4 time at jobs that have nothing to do with music, and the number doesn't include the housewives who each day tackle one of the toughest jobs in the world.

The jobs these persons hold are varied. There are businessmen, eatmen, clerks, professional men and others who work at a multitude of jobs. And the group is composed of citizens from surrounding communities, as well as from Twin Falls.

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**Manufacture and Export of Toys Is Deadly Serious Business for Japan**

TOKYO, Nov. 25 (AP)—Grossing merrily, the spaceman breathes sparks, his eyes flash. Overhead hovers the latest model U. S. helicopter; its rotor blades whirling.

In the background, someone abruptly stops out. "How dry I am on a tinky piano." Macy's toy department?

For the toy business of a huge store in Tokyo.

Japanese toy manufacturers have pulled out all the stops. They have created battery-operated toy washing machines that wash, drying machines that dry, bears that answer telephones—the correct number is dictated by the machine's music on battery power, bulldozers that bulldoze.

Japanese by the thousands spend hours at the toy counters, happily pinching, barking, driving and pushing their tiny buttons and watching red fire

half million dollars worth of toys last year and exported 80 percent of them. Japan's toy industry is a whole export between 75 and 80 percent of its production. Most of the exports are tailored specifically for the American market.

Toy-makers in other countries plainly are upset by all this.

Ottawa, British and American manufacturers have complained the Japanese are copying their designs and flooding the market with cheap imitations produced with cheap labor.

U. S. toy makers have charged some Japanese have used "unfair" methods in attempts to dominate the U. S. toy market.

In a nation hungry for export markets, that is something worth exploiting.

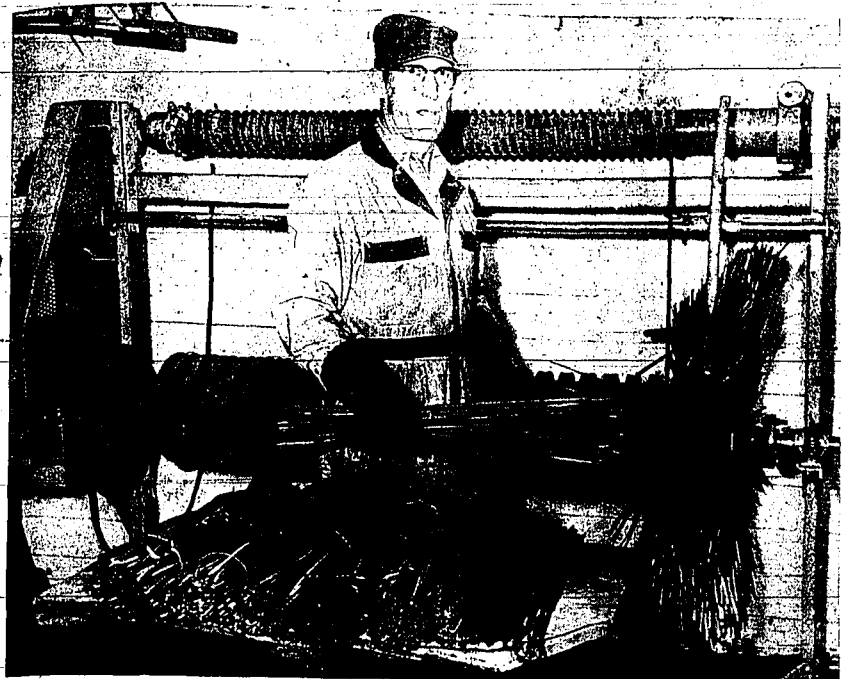

## MAGIC VALLEY PORTRAIT Chairman of Joint Y Board Tackling One of Biggest Community Projects

When he assumed the chairmanship of the Joint Y board, W. W. (Bill) Pressey tackled one of the biggest community projects in many a year. It is the goal of the board eventually to collect enough money so that a working YMCA and YWCA be established and work together. Once this is done, the \$180,000 left by the late Mrs. Edna Lucille White will be available to the joint board. Pressey has been used to build a Christian community center. "The day such a center will exist is in the future, but program to Pressey and a multitude of co-workers the day the cornerstone will be laid draws nearer. The Joint Y board just finished five weeks of canvassing the community for donations. The goal of the board was \$180,000. "With that money, a working unit could be established and the two organizations could start a program for the community that Pressey feels the community has longed for. It has been lacking for many years. To date, all the money collected has not been turned in, but Pressey does say the community has responded well and he is optimistic that the drive will nearly reach the goal set. Pressey stresses that 27 per cent of the money collected for the drive will stay in this community. Another thing he points out is that the Christian Community center will offer a program to both the youth and adults of the community that is "offered nowhere else. "The idea is not to infringe on the youth programs of other organizations, but rather to supply a need for the entire family, not just the young boys and girls. It is hoped, he says, that the center will be able to offer youth activities and a program with room for the people of the community to swim, play basketball, handball, volleyball and other athletic games and sports. A physical fitness program for adults is envisioned, but one that could well contribute to overall improvement of the health of local people. In addition to the physical-fitness aspect of the program of the center would be such programs as handicraft, dancing, and Christian guidance. There will be a chapel in the center, and those who wish to meditate, sing, possibly a reading and music room. Pressey notes that a marriage counselor will probably be available to help couples cope with the rising rate of divorce. In short, the center will offer many full-time programs that usually are offered in Twin Falls. Pressey points out that such a center could play a large role in curbing juvenile delinquency, a problem that grows all over the United States each year. And the adds, "With such a center we could solve our own problems along this line. This is the way to do it, for if we don't take steps to solve our own problems, the government will." Pressey has been active in the YMCA since 1936. He was appointed to the board of directors then and he now serves as president of the YMCA, as well as chairman of the Joint Y board. "He has been active in other community projects. A member of the Methodist church, he has served as head usher there and for the last two years he has been the chairman of the church's finance committee. Pressey always has been interested in sports activities. He has served as vice president and president of the Bruin Boosters



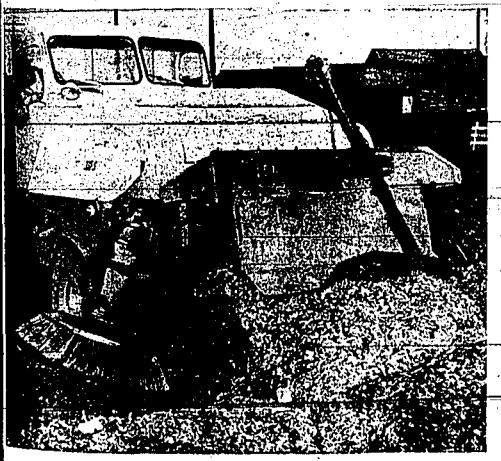

O.H. (Cap) Krenzel attended a reunion recently in Portland and "found" more of the esprit de corps of the 116th Engineers from World War I. Real spirit is sometimes hard to find in a unit on active duty, but Krenzel's has managed to maintain it more than 40 years. The reunion was held at the Mallory hotel and was the largest reunion the unit has ever had. Sixty former soldiers were there, renewing old friendships and talking of the old days. Krenzel is still beaming from the experience of associating with former military colleagues. Asked why it was that the unit

has managed to have the spirit to this date, he notes that members of the old unit came to the reunion from all over the Northwest and as far away as North Dakota. Krenzel belonged to the national guard when the war began, a member of the second Idaho Infantry regiment. After the war began, the regiment was split. Many of the men were

## Gum Chewers Stuck With Problem; They Are Frowned on by Their Bosses

Since the "spout" of gum chewing began about 100 years ago, employers have fought a long and patient battle to keep the end of the mouths of clerks and receptionists. It has been a lost war, and after holding the account of gum sold annually in the United States, it is likely they are losing.

More than 300 million dollars worth of gum is sold annually, and if it was chewed in one bite would weigh 250 million pounds. This makes gum manufacturers happy, but not their employers.

Gum chewing is discouraged throughout the public school system and, later, when a person seeks employment. In an effort to find out why gum chewing is discouraged, the Times-News contacted several businessmen in the community and "pried" their views. To a man they expressed disapproval. As one man said, "Mr. Wisley would go out of business if I had anything to say about it."

Berling Larson, president of the Twin Falls Business college, said the first man consulted, Larson says this is one of the things that is stressed at the college. He says students are taught that chewing can either cause a person to fall to get a job or, occasionally, get him fired.

Although gum chewing seems innocuous enough to the chewer, it can be offensive to the person who watches the facial complexion. "It is indicative," Larson says, "that the chewer is more interested in the gum than in his or her personal appearance. It isn't

approved of gum chewing would be likely to disapprove of the entire business. Arthur Bockwitz, assistant manager of Idaho Department store, like all businessmen contacted, disapproves of the habit. He laughs and says he is afraid gum chewing affects some persons just like tobacco chewing affects others.

"It just isn't a good business practice; too many persons dislike the habit. There is sometimes a good reason for wanting a person's breath—possibly after they have eaten an onion sandwich—but even then it can be done in other ways."

Tom Skinner, a vice president at Twin Falls Bank and Trust, who did the hiring over a period of 10 years, disapproves of gum chewing and points out that it is indicative of other personal bad habits.

He says, "You find that a girl who chews gum is careless about her dress and often careless about her speech. This general sloppiness goes hand in hand."

Raymond Tate, assistant administrator at Magic Valley Memorial hospital, is the man who screens many new employees at the hospital. He says workers who deal with the public, such as receptionists and secretaries, should refrain from chewing gum.

Tate believes it reflects on the business philosophy of the establishment, that a person who dis-

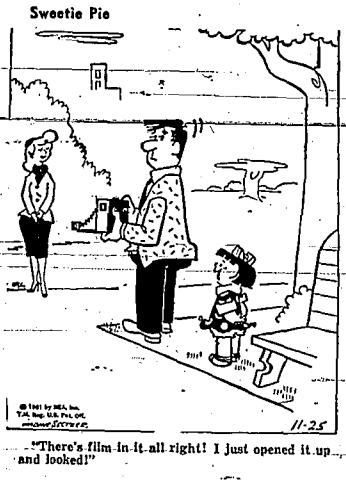

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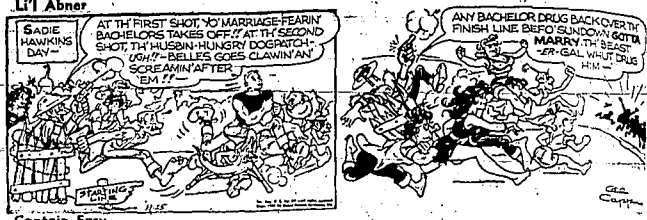

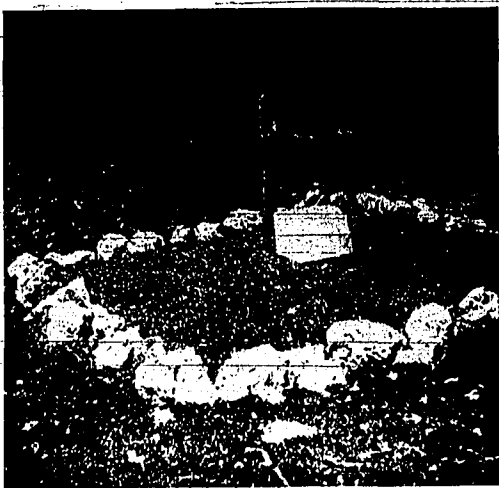

### Remains Found on Pacific Island May Be Those of Long-Missing U.S. Flier

SAN FRANCISCO, Nov. 25 (AP)—Bones and teeth found in a shallow jungle grave on Salpan, a remote island in the Pacific, are being flown to San Francisco to determine whether they are those of Amelia Earhart and her navigator, Fred Noonan.

Dr. Paul Bridwell, Salpan naval commandant, expressed a theory that Miss Earhart and Noonan were forced down in the Marshalls, then taken to Salpan where they were imprisoned. Devine was a U. S. soldier with a postoffice unit on Salpan in 1934-35 and had lived over the island.

Devine said a native woman asked if he was searching for a grave, and then the shallow burial place was pointed out to him. He said he did not connect the grave with the disappearance of the fliers until years later.

Goerner said an expedition he headed came upon the burial site Sept. 21.

"Excavating in the vicinity where the war-destroyed city of Garapan once was," Goerner said, "we found a shallow, unmarked grave containing the remains of a man and woman.

"From teeth uncovered, doctors indicated they were Caucasians and quite possibly those of Miss Earhart and Noonan.

"But we are not sure these are the remains."

Dr. McCown agreed to study the bones on condition he not be given any descriptions of Miss Earhart or Noonan.

Goerner said Bridwell told him: "I think they went down in the Marshalls, close to Howland Island, were captured, taken to Yen and then brought to Salpan."

The Marshalls are 500 miles from Salpan. The bones were buried only two feet deep, in Japanese fashion. He said heavy rains had eroded the earth covering and the bones were brittle.

"Miss Earhart and Noonan may have been kept on Salpan for a year or more," Goerner said. "It was told Miss Earhart died of dysentery and, after her death, Noonan was executed by a natural aviator."

There were no dental plates, as such, but the teeth had fillings indicating the work of American dentists.
