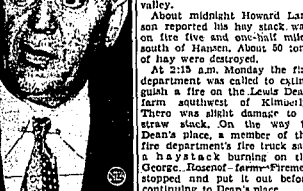

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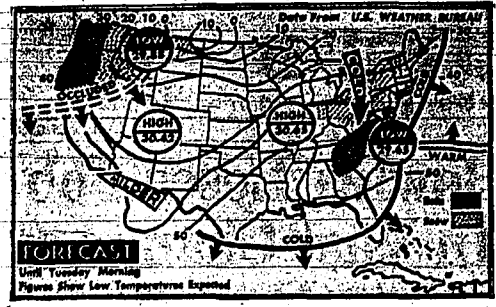

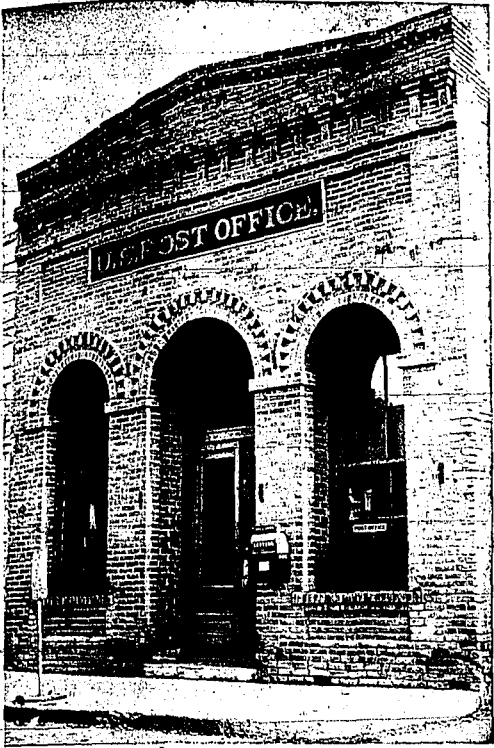

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Cities Swept By Fights in Algeria War

ALGIERS, Nov. 27 (U)—Looting, shooting and grenade-throwing by anti-De Gaulle Europeans and Algerians in recent days has killed 16 persons and injured 87 in one of the bloodiest week-ends of the seven-year Algerian war.

French troops and police were snatched in the middle as terrorism swept Algiers and the big western port city of Oran.

Waving clubs, a screaming mob of Europeans broke into a jail in Algiers, lynched one Algerian woman and savagely beat another before police reinforcements drove them off. The women had been arrested after a grenade wounded three Europeans in a sidewalk cafe.

In Oran, 250 miles to the west, bands of European youths roamed the streets, attacking any Moslems they encountered in revenge for the killing of Jean Riviere, who was shot in the neck as he walked along a street.

Three Algerians were reported killed and six injured in these attacks. Nearly 60 plastic bombs, favorite weapon of right-wing European extremists, exploded in Algiers during the week-end.

Clandestine broadcasts by the right-wing Secret Army Group, led by fugitive French military officers opposed to President Charles de Gaulle's self-determination policy for Algeria, stirred up the mob.

U.S. Ambassador To Warsaw Ends 3-Year Meeting

WARSAW, Nov. 27 (AP)—Ambassador Jacob D. Beam today row ends a three-year marathon discussion on Sino-American problems with a final conference with Communist Chinese Ambassador Wang Ping-Nan.

It will be the 35th session between the American ambassador and the stubby veteran Chinese Communist since they first met in Beijing in 1954.

What the series has achieved is known only to certain government officials in Washington and Peking.

Throughout the talks, there has been only one series of statements—that the U. S. ambassador objected to the imprisonment of Bishop James D. Walsh by the Chinese and that the Chinese ambassador rejected the protest.

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Reds Change Sentence for Spy Visitors

MOSCOW, Nov. 27 (AP)—The Russians are imposing a new sentence on spies convicted of spying. They are to be executed.

Since September, one American and two Dutchmen and two Germans have been hanged off to Soviet prisons.

The Germans and the Dutchmen got longer sentences than the Americans. Gary Powers, the American spy who was given 30 years for flying over the Soviet Union in 1950, Powers, now in prison in Vladimir, 100 miles east of Moscow, must do three years in prison and the rest of his life in a labor camp.

The same type of 10-year sentence last month handed out to 13 court sentences for espionage to 10 Dutch tourists, Leo de Jager, 25, and Ernest Heyden, 29.

Last week two Germans, Peter Gontars, 22, and Walter Nau, 27, drew 15-year sentences for espionage for spying for the United States.

The same charge faces Mr. and Mrs. Adolf Werner, two West German tourists who go on trial Tuesday.

The first tourist to feel the weight of a military court was Martin Williams Mahinen, a Sept. 9 court verdict, which carried an eight-year sentence on a spy.

Cancer Study Report Finds Acid Change

NEW YORK, Nov. 27 (AP)—A new research report said studies have produced a "unifying concept" of cancer as a genetic change in chromosomal nucleic acid.

The "ultimate" cause of all types of cancer—whether internally or externally induced—was proposed as a change in the chemical change in chromosomal nucleic acid.

The report, covering two years of research, was released last night by the Sloan-Kettering Institute.

... scattering xenobiotics corresponds to a genetic mutation can develop into a cancerous cell during cellular reproduction and thus needs no external agent.

DNA (deoxyribonucleic acid) is the chemical substance of the chromosomes that play a key role in both heredity and vital functions of the human cell. Its structure, which is a double helix, is made up of chemical components form a heritable information needed by the cell to store and transmit.

The report said cancer now appears to be caused by a particular kind of mutation that occurs in DNA structure which alters the informational code.

He urged the secretary of the treasury to "withdraw from the Eisenhower exhibit."

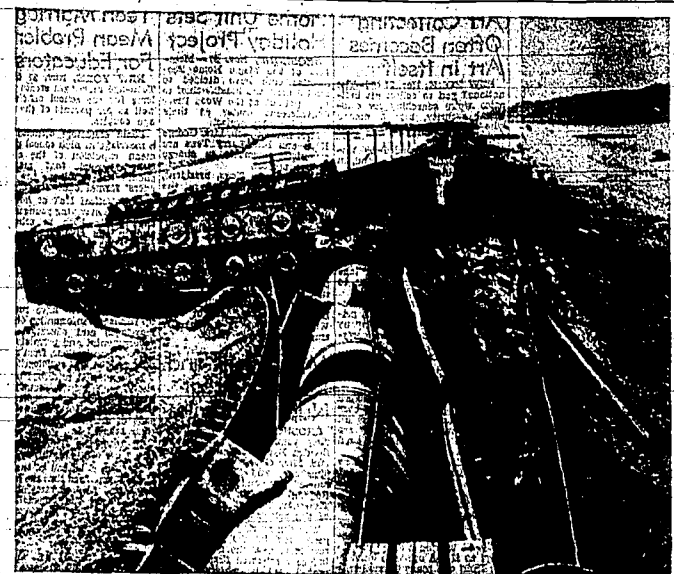
Report Issued

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Postal Rates Hike Chance Called Good

WASHINGTON, Nov. 27 (AP)—President Kennedy's proposed general postal rate increase has "very good chance" of getting congressional approval next year, according to Postmaster General J. Edgar Day.

Day said the rate increase would be among the first high priority items Kennedy sends to congress when it convenes again in January.

Congress this year refused the administration's request to raise rates on penny a half category of letters and postcards. As a result, the postoffice department has predicted an \$83 million dollar deficit in the fiscal year ending next June 30.

In a television interview yesterday, Day said congress refused to raise the postal rates this year because it was too busy considering other important bills.

"But many of those administration programs are now law," Day said. "I think that a postal rate increase is going to be one of the first and one of the highest priority items in the program."

Day said Kennedy had not complained of slow mail delivery since last winter, when the President mentioned that it took a letter in which he was interested eight days to get from Boston to Washington.

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Train Derail Blocks Utah Rail Traffic

WENDOVER, Nov. 27 (AP)—The main line of the Western Pacific railroad was blocked Sunday when 14 cars of a freight train derailed at Salduro, Utah, on the Bonneville salt flats about 12 miles from Salt Lake City, Utah state line. No injuries were reported.

Railroad officials said about 1,200 feet of track on the main line and a similar amount on an siding were torn up. They said they expected it would take 24 hours to clear the track and restore service.

Priorities traffic was routed over tracks of the Southern Pacific railroad for much of the distance east of Elko.

The derailment occurred about 8:20 a. m. Involved was a west-bound train of 33 cars.

The Western Pacific runs between Salt Lake City and the San Francisco Bay area. Two major railroads—Southern Pacific and Santa Fe—currently are battling for control of Western Pacific.

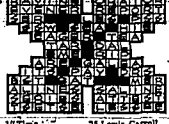

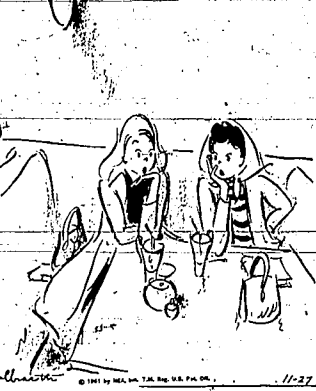


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
