Chief Says Active Duty May Be Cut

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (UPI)—President Kennedy, declaring the nation's new citizen-soldiers were called to arms "to prevent, not fight a war," held out hope today that some may return home before their full-year duty is out. He made an impassioned plea in his news conference for each of the 165,000 reservists and national guardsmen ordered to Berlin crisis duty to remember that he is contributing to the security of his family in a most direct way.

Larger Army Would Mean Bigger Draft

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (UPI)—President Kennedy's call likely will stay at a relatively high level—and may not even fall if the army is increased by two regular divisions. Pentagon sources said Tuesday the White House informally has agreed with Secretary of Defense Robert S. McNamara's recommendation that the regular army be increased from 14 to 16 divisions. Congressional approval would be needed.

Money to man and equip the two new divisions—perhaps as much as \$20 million dollars—probably will be included in the budget President Kennedy sends Congress in January for the bookkeeping year starting next July 1.

Silver Switch May Be Eliminated

WASHINGTON, Nov. 29 (AP)—A familiar item of currency since 1878, will disappear from circulation if congress approves President Kennedy's new silver policy. All \$1 and \$2 bills are silver certificates, as are some \$5 and \$10 bills. All of these would be converted during the year to be replaced by federal reserve notes which are backed by gold. While congress would have to approve this part of the Kennedy plan, the president ordered Tuesday

In fact Sen. Frank Church, D., Idaho, said this is the most important piece of legislation he has taken to help the mining industry in Idaho and other western states.

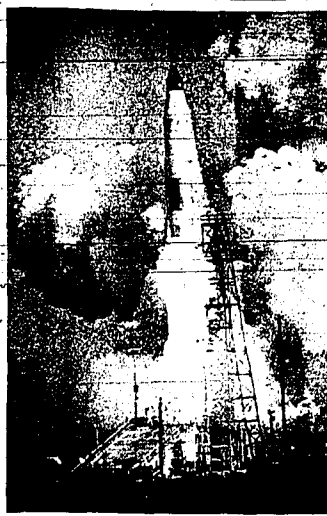

Chimp Parachutes Into Ocean After Space Ride Shortened to 2 Orbits

CAPE CANAVERAL Fla. Nov. 29 (AP)—The United States rocketed Enos the space ape into orbit today, then recovered him alive from an Atlantic ocean landing place after trouble in his capsule forced early termination of the 17,500-mile-an-hour flight.

CAPE CANAVERAL, Fla., Nov. 29 (AP)—Space chimp Enos, his intended three-orbit trip cut to two because of trouble with capsule systems, parachuted safely into the Atlantic 500 miles southeast of Bermuda today. Two destroyers, the Stomax and the Compton, steamed toward the landing area as several aircraft took up the search for the capsule which was brought down after scientists decided to terminate the flight.

The destroyers were reported to circle 30 miles from the floating capsule and expected to arrive at 2:40 p.m.

The capsule landed at 1:20 p.m., three hours and 21 minutes after launch.

Marine Named

NOFOLK, Va., Nov. 29 (AP)—Marine Lt. Col. John H. Glenn, Jr. has been selected for America's first manned orbital flight, the Norfolk Enterprise said it was told by informed air force sources today.

A newspaper quoted the sources as saying the attempt to place a man in orbit has been scheduled tentatively for Dec. 29.

Glenn will ride an Atlas rocket into the sky from Cape Canaveral at 10:07 a.m.

The national aeronautics and space administration reported radio signals from the capsule indicated the chimp was in good condition when he landed.

A F-5M search aircraft sighted the capsule as it parachuted into the water and sent radio messages after the capsule hit, the plane reported that it was floating upright.

A 1:10 p.m. announcement at 1:10 p.m. said that "as the spacecraft traveled across the Pacific ocean the heat and gas meters and other detectors indicated 'in-flight' temperature said an attitude control action other than normal."

The announcement said a signal was sent to react the satellite clock in the cockpit so that it would fire the reverse rockets gradually across the southern United States to the landing.

A signal was flashed from the space station which fired the capsule's retro-rockets to brake it down to 17,500 miles an hour and stop the descent.

A fleet of recovery ships is in the area south of Bermuda. The ships are to recover the capsule for just such an event.

When the capsule was made to drop the capsule came down in excellent condition and performing well. The chimp was seen to be well and alive across from the jet and slips of water as his reward.

There was no further explanation from NASA on just how the inverter and controls were affected by the malfunction.

An inverter is a device used to switch electrical current from AC to DC to run certain spacecraft systems. This apparently was overheated.

The attitude control system relies on electronic gyros to determine whether the spacecraft is on the proper course.

If it is not, signals are sent to hydrogen peroxide-driven jets on the side of the capsule. The jets are used to bring the spacecraft back on course.

Officials announced that the Cape Canaveral tracking facility made contact with the descending capsule at 1:18 p.m. and all indications were that Enos was in good condition.

Democrats Refuse to Indicate Plans on Commission Claims

BOISE, Nov. 29 (AP)—Democratic members of the Idaho board of examiners declined today to indicate whether they will take any action on the controversial children's commission claims or await until next Tuesday to the state supreme court why they have not done so. Lt. Gov. William P. Brevlow of Craigmont, a Democrat, became acting governor and thus chairman of the board with the departure from the state of Gov. Robert E. Smylie, Republican.

Brevlow said he had on his desk a copy of a letter Smylie wrote Tuesday reviewing the status of the claims. The letter included primarily the November payroll for the children's commission.

But Brevlow said he had not discussed the situation with the other Democratic members of the board, Secretary of State Arnold Williams and Atty. Gen. Frank L. Benson.

Neither Williams nor Benson attended a special Tuesday afternoon meeting of the board, called by Smylie after the supreme court instructed the examiners either to consider the claims or explain their refusal to do so.

Both Williams and Benson were out of the office in the statehouse at the time the meeting was scheduled to begin, but Benson returned later in the day. He declined comment then and remained silent today.

The bullet-riddled bodies of the two Carey women were found in a garage and Mrs. Delrampe's body was found in a bathroom. The Associated Press reported Mrs. Delrampe's grandson, John Randall Woodridge, 17, is charged with the triple murder.

France Plans Cabinet Meet About Strike

PARIS, Nov. 29 (AP)—President Charles De Gaulle summoned his cabinet today to discuss the massive strikes that idled a million workers, crippled the rail and road traffic and cut off electricity and gas throughout most of France.

There was no immediate indication whether the Gaulle would yield to the strike pressure and ease the stiff economy measures De Gaulle has instituted to strengthen France and help pay for the cost of war in Algeria. His austere measures have resulted in demands by the opposition that he resign.

A 24-hour rail strike ended this morning, winding up the biggest labor walkout in France since De Gaulle came to power in 1958.

Coast County Orders Work For Welfare

SAN JOSE, Calif., Nov. 23 (AP)—The Santa Clara county board of supervisors has ordered all able-bodied men on general relief to join county work programs to ease their assistance checks.

Howard W. Campen, the county executive officer, said the new relationship to the program, adopted by Newburg, N.Y., which contained a similar provision, Campen said about 50 men would be assigned work at county property about the middle of December.

He said the men would be credited \$1.25 an hour toward their assistance payment and would have ample time off to look for private employment.

Campen said the program was aimed mainly at seasonal agricultural workers who swell the county's assistance rolls during the winter.

He added the average monthly assistance check was about \$100 and the county spends about \$1,200,000 a year on the program.

U. S. Awards Contract on Space Craft

WASHINGTON, Nov. 23 (AP)—The national aeronautics and space administration awarded Thursday a contract for the design and construction of a three-man space craft that is expected to be ready to carry the first American to the moon.

The contract for this part of the lunar program of this Apollo program is the most ambitious U. S. space venture yet undertaken—sent to North American Aviation, Inc. of Los Angeles—NASA said it was expected to cost more than \$100 million dollars.

Ultimately, however, the Apollo program is expected to cost 10 billion dollars or more.

President Kennedy, who has set a goal of putting an American on the moon by 1970, said in a message to congress last July: "No space project will be more exciting, more important for the long-range exploration of space, more difficult or expensive to accomplish."

The current schedule calls for launching Apollo space ships into orbit around the earth in 1968. North American should pose a bid for the first one for testing purposes within about six months.

Father Won't Give up Hope For Explorer

ROME, Nov. 23 (AP)—Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller of New York passed through Rome today on his way home from the futile search for his missing son in New Guinea and said he still had not lost all hope.

"The search will continue for another three or four weeks in a jungle area of some 1,000 square miles," Rockefeller said.

"Although there is little chance of finding my son, I am not giving up hope."

Rockefeller's plane made a brief stop in Rome en route to Amsterdam. The governor will depart for New York from there tonight.

Accompanying him on the flight were archaeologist Robert Gardner, who was with Rockefeller's 23-year-old son, Michael, on expedition in New Guinea, and Lieut. Edward Olwin of the New York state police.

U.N. Council Turns Down Cuba Appeal

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Nov. 23 (AP)—After hours of debate, the security council gave a cold shoulder Tuesday night to Cuba's complaint against the use of American warships in the Dominican crisis.

A single member of the 11-nation council including the Soviet Union was willing to back the Cuban charge with a formal resolution.

The effect was to leave the complaint dormant for a while, but the council's agenda in case Cuba wants to try again. But no more meetings were scheduled on the matter.

After more than 10 hours of debate over three meetings, U. S. Ambassador Adlai E. Stevenson urged the council to conclude what he called "this exercise in futility."

He said the United States was proud to support the efforts of President Joaquin Balaguer to restore democracy to the Dominican Republic.

Stevenson said the council had spent its time "listening mostly to Cuba and the Soviet Union complain about an intervention that never took place."

Stevenson also said in a speech in Santo Domingo last week that though he had not asked for U. S. aid and help to back him in his successful showdown with the Trujillo family, he welcomed the presence of the ships just beyond the country's territorial waters.

Cuban U. N. delegate, Maria Garcia-Inda, said she accused the United States of supporting a Dominican government that has no popular backing.

Company president T. E. Roach said the start-up of the fourth generator marks completion of the project that has cost \$10,000,000.

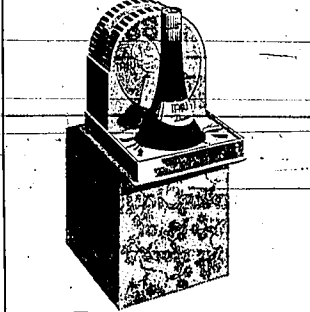

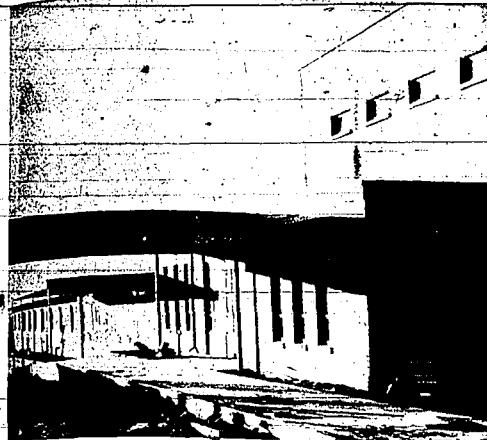

BOISE, Nov. 29 (AP)—Another battle was waged in the running feud between Gov. Robert F. Smylie and Atty. Gen. Frank E. Benson last week and you're likely to hear its political echoes for quite a while.

The news landed in that "no man's land" of legal representation for Idaho's state agencies, informed by two of his assistants he planned to resign in the near future, attempted to resign his long-time assistant, Frank Langley, to their duties.

When he announced the Langley appointment, Benson made it clear he wanted the tax collector to pay Langley's salary just as he has the others. He said he had

not discussed the assignment with any representative of the department because the death of acting collector Vernon Brown had left him with no tax collector or assistant with whom to speak.

This is where Smylie entered the picture. He said that as governor he is the chief executive and thus is tax collector in the absence of one. He said he has been signing orders for the department ever since Brown's recent death.

As acting tax collector, Smylie and notified Benson a successor to the two resigning attorneys—Robert Baker and James Christensen—would be chosen independently. He said Benson would

Canadian Is Udall Critic Of Columbia

PRINCE GEORGE, B. C., Nov. 29 (AP)—Canada's Justice Minister Edmund Davie Fulton charged Tuesday night U. S. Interior Secretary Stewart Udall is engaging in a "pressure play" over the Columbia river project.

He said the British Columbia government and certain U. S. power and industrial interests seek to "entice" Canada into settling Columbia river power rights for a long term. Udall has joined a propaganda campaign, Fulton said, "because he hopes for a decision that will be an enormous

advantage to his country."

He said the Ottawa government has not changed its opposition to selling any Canadian hydro-electric power outside the country.

British Columbia's Premier W. A. C. Bennett has proposed that Canada's share of Columbia River power should be sold to the Americans for up to 60 years to finance the 456 million dollar program to build three storage dams and transmission lines.

"The Bennett - United States squeeze play won't work — the power will not be sold," Fulton said in a speech to the local Chamber of Commerce.

"The hard fact is that British Columbians now are being asked to sell abroad our best and cheapest power resource—like it or not, you have to face it that this would leave us with more extensive power at home."

Poe and Harris were elected co-chairmen of the committee. Poe added that in order to put this plan into operation, the four highway districts in Twin Falls county have to comply with the proposals set forth in the committee's plan. "So far only two of the four districts have accepted the idea," Poe said. The committee wants to place signs at every intersection in Twin Falls county and assign each rural resident a house number. The numbering will start in the southwest corner of the county and will run in 100 series. Numbers 100 west upward, will be placed from the Owyhee county line and run west. Numbers 100 south will be placed from the Nevada state line and run north. The intersection at the Twin Falls county - Nevada - Owyhee county corner would be 100 south, 100 west.

Food for Americans BY GAYNOR MADDOX

Rich chocolate fudge, erunchy with Brazil nuts spread on top, a smooth and exciting answer to "What can I make my friends for Christmas?" Packaged handsomely, presented with "Merry Christmas" greetings — we'll wouldn't you welcome such a gift yourself?

Brazil Nut Chocolate Fudge
(Yield: Approximately 4 1/2 pounds)

1 tall can (1 1/2 cups) evaporated milk
3/4 cup sugar
2 1/2-ounce jumbo packages or 4 6-ounce packages (4 cups) semi-sweet chocolate morsels
1/4 cup butter or margarine
1 jar (any size) marshmallow cream

1 tablespoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups chopped Brazil nuts, divided
1/2 cup Brazil nut slices
Combine evaporated milk and sugar in a 2-quart saucepan. Place over high heat and bring to a full all-over boil, stirring constantly. Continue to boil, stirring vigorously, 5 minutes. Reduce heat, if necessary, to prevent boiling over sides of pan.

Remove from heat, add semi-sweet chocolate morsels and stir until smooth. Add butter, marshmallow cream and vanilla; stir until blended.
To make fudge squares: Turn hot fudge mixture into buttered 8-inch square pan. Sprinkle with 1 cup chopped Brazil nuts, pressing into surface. When cool, cut into squares.

To make fudge bonbons: Spoon half of remaining mixture into parchment papers placed in small cupcake pans to hold round shape. Top each with a Brazil nut slice.
To make fudge balls: Cool remaining fudge until firm enough to handle. Shape into 1-inch balls and roll in remaining chopped Brazil nuts.

Fecan Meringues
2 egg whites
1/4 teaspoon salt
1/4 teaspoon cream of tartar
1 1/2 cups sifted confectioner's sugar
1/4 teaspoon vanilla
1 1/2 cups coarsely chopped pecans
Beat egg whites until frothy. Add salt and cream of tartar; continue beating until stiff peaks form. Add vanilla, fold in pecans. Drop by spoonfuls on well-greased baking sheet. Bake at 275 degrees F. about 20 minutes.

Mixed Walnuts
(Makes 1 1/2 pounds)
1/2 cup light corn syrup
1 cup sugar
1 cup water
1/4 teaspoon essence of peppermint
10 marshmallows
3 cups walnut halves (10 ounces)
Combine corn syrup, sugar and water in saucepan. Cook over medium heat, stirring constantly until mixture boils. Continue cooking to soft ball stage (235 degrees F.). Stir until a small amount of mixture forms a soft ball when tested in very cold water.
Remove from heat; quickly add essence of peppermint and marshmallows. Stir until marshmallows are dissolved. Add walnut halves. Stir until walnuts are well-coated. Pour onto waxed paper. Separate walnut halves while still warm.
