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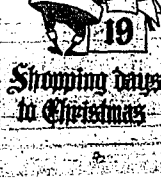
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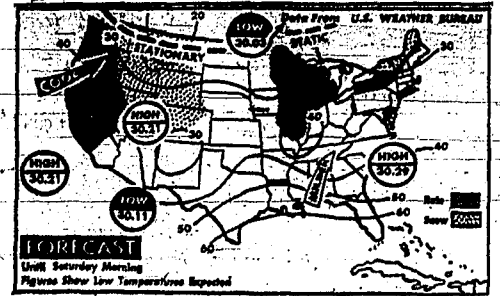

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### Faster Mail Delivery for U. S. Hoped

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—The postman may not call on every door today during the pre-Christmas rush but the postoffice department says delivery will be as quick as ever—maybe quicker.

A department spokesman said yesterday a new scheme of routes and time up mail deliveries will be tried on a nationwide basis for the first time this holiday season.

He told it in comment on a story published by the Meriden (Conn.) Journal which learned of it from the New England regional director of the postoffice department.

"We'll save substantial amounts of money without curtailing service," the spokesman said.

He said the system would make possible delivery of the usual mountains of Christmas mail by fewer carriers.

"The key to the plan, he said, is the use of the regular carrier on a route to bring up the mail and assign temporary extra carriers to the route fragments, "catch" the temporary carriers with the entire day's accumulation of mail addressed to their route fragments.

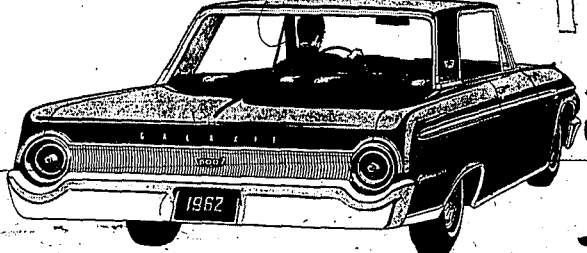

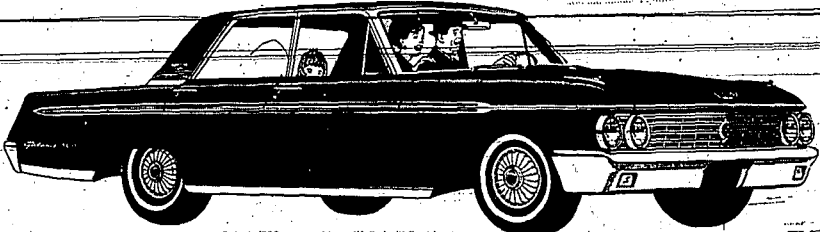

### Russ Vetoes Kuwait's Bid On U.N. Post

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 1.—The Soviet Union split the United Nations yesterday and vetoed a U.N. resolution recommending admission of Kuwait as a member of the 104th member.

Soviet Delegate Valerian A. Zorin cast the only negative vote in the 11-nation security council against admission of the oil-rich desert sheikhdom. All other members voted in favor. It was the Soviet Union's 14th veto.

A proposal by Zorin to postpone consideration of the application was defeated when only he voted for it. The other 10 members abstained.

The latter the U.N. delegate, said he could not accept Zorin's proposal. He said he had killed the resolution, which he said had the support of all Arab states.

The lone negative vote by Zorin constituted a big power veto. He said the resolution was defeated.

Mr. Patrick Dean, British delegate, described the Soviet action as disgraceful.

### It's Inherent Right of Soldiers to Get Pay

WASHINGTON, Nov. 30.—Secretary of the Interior Stewart Udall said yesterday this country may have to develop other hydroelectric sites in the Pacific Northwest if Canada does not ratify the Columbia river treaty.

The secretary declined at a news conference to set any specific deadline, saying this might seem to be an effort to bring undue pressure on Canada. But he said "We might have to move in the next session of congress with other dams."

Udall at first said he would not comment when asked if he had anything to say regarding recent charges by Canadian Justice Minister Bill Davies that the secretary was engaging in a "pressure play" over the treaty. "I wish he had read just what I said in my report. There is no pressure on my part or any people in this government to put pressure on Canada," he said.

"If Canada makes its plan it is not the least bit better than any other alternative," he said. "If developments require it, and, in fact, we already are doing so."

The error was discovered by a constitutional convention committee on declaration of rights, suffrage and elections.

Section 8, article 2 of the present constitution reads: "Neither slavery nor involuntary servitude, unless for the punishment of crime, shall ever be tolerated in this state."

That means a criminal could be made a slave. The committee said it would move the comma after "servitude" and put it after "slave."

U.S. Studies Progress Noted in Try to Eradicate Screwworm Fly

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—Rural industrialization is a prime method of keeping rural families on the farm, according to a series of studies sponsored by the agriculture department. The studies also showed that the introduction of industries into rural areas shifts labor to more productive effort in communities with extensive under-employment and raises cash income. These findings resulted from studies of industrial plants in five rural areas. The location of the plants and the work performed were studied in Southern Louisiana—Wichitania; Northern Mississippi—Purdum; Central Utah—Rubber products; East central Iowa—Small gas engine plants; Northwestern Utah—Solid-fuel for rockers and guided missiles. The findings suggest that rural industrial plants generally are beneficial to low-income areas, and though certain plants do occur, traditional patterns of rural life are not unduly disturbed.

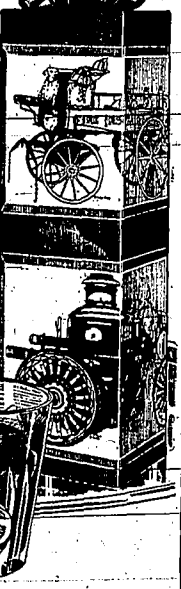

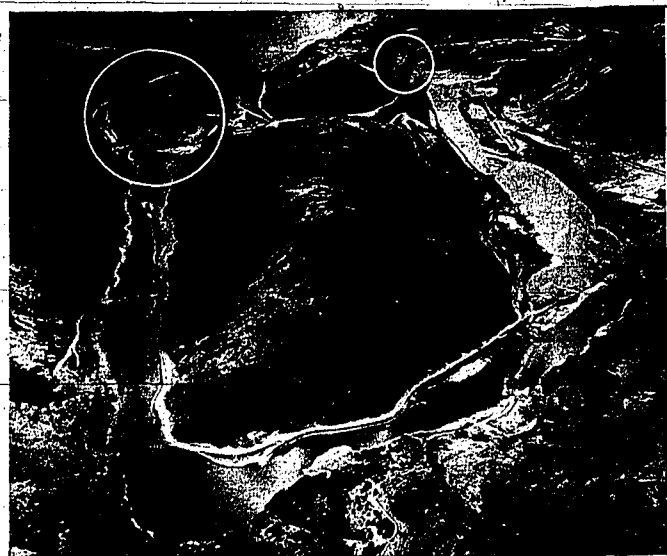

### Idaho Power Completes Oxbow Dam Project, Starts up Last of Generators

OXBOW, Idaho-Oregon, Dec. 1.—North America's deepest gorge was tamed for the second time Tuesday as Idaho Power company completed its big Oxbow hydroelectric project in the nationally famed Hells canyon reach of Snake river.

President F. E. Roach said Oxbow's completion seals with start-up of the fourth and last initial generator at this project, the early-stage dam development of the Hells canyon, and unique horseshoe bend of the mountain-wreathed Snake between Idaho and Oregon.

"Might of the 220,000-kilowatt Oxbow project makes Idaho Power's new three-dam development two-thirds complete, with only the already-started Hells canyon dam remaining. Browne dam, 450,000 kilowatts, was completed in January, 1939, as the development's first unit.

Since mid-1941, Idaho Power has taken two major steps in the early-stage dam development of the Hells canyon project, which will rise where the gorge is more than a mile deep.

The utility has completed a modern steel bridge across the Snake near Odessa, and is pushing a heavy-duty access road 23 miles downstream along steep mountain slopes to the project site.

Harnassing the Oxbow site required construction of two 32-foot-diameter tunnels to carry water through a towering mountain from the reservoir on one side to the powerhouse on the other.

Roach called the start-up of Oxbow's fourth generator a tremendous milestone in our multi-purpose development of the Hells canyon reach for more than one million kilowatts of electricity to supply not only our own service area but the rest of the Pacific Northwest as well.

"Completion of Browne and Oxbow is the start of work on the Hells canyon project are clear proof that Idaho Power is

keeping faith with its promise to fully develop this 100-mile stretch of the Snake and provide dependable supplies of electricity as rapidly as possible," he said.

"Thus far in our development, he pointed out, "we have invested millions of dollars in two great sources of electricity provided for thousands of men and generated additional taxes for local, state and federal governments."

"Moreover, we have provided important public benefits of flood control, navigation and excellent recreational areas—all without cost to the taxpayer.

"Now we are moving ahead to finish the job with Hells Canyon dam."

The utility executive also reported that completion of Oxbow increased Idaho Power's total maximum generating capacity from 14 to 16 hydroelectric projects to more than one million kilowatts.

"Our present capacity with Oxbow in full initial production is more than 10 times our capacity in 1940, a good indication of how Idaho Power is continuously expanding its facilities to keep the supply of electricity ahead of demand," Roach said.

Beef, lamb and pork are leading bargains at the nation's supermarkets this week.

Housewives will have a wide choice of meats at good prices this week-end, based on the advertising plans of the big chains and the weekly U. S. department of agriculture survey.

Heavy marketings of hogs and cattle to expand production is producing a good retail supply of beef, lamb and pork.

Meats in all sections of the country are featuring the three meats this week-end. One of the larger supermarket chains will have an all-beef special with price reductions in some areas of 30 cents a pound on such items as rib-roast, sirloin and porterhouse steaks.

Beef, lamb and veal also are on the special coupon in some areas.

Among sea food features are clams and halibut in the Northwest, crab meat and sea trout in the Southeast, yellow perch in the Midwest, red snapper in the Southwest and salmon and halibut in the West.

Egg prices appear to be declining. Large eggs are selling at 30 cents a dozen in Chicago at the lowest level in five months. One chain posted reductions of 10 to 15 cents a dozen on various grades and size eggs in the metropolitan New York area.

Best buys in vegetables are cabbage, onions, potatoes, sweet potatoes, green beans, corned beef, lettuce, squash and tomatoes.

Specials recommended include broccoli and brussels sprouts, mushrooms, green beans, squash, peppers and radishes.

Among fruits in good supply are apples, oranges, grapefruit, pears and in some areas strawberries, bananas, grapes and lemons.

The players also agreed to make all who were active in 1952 beneficiaries of the pension increase. This group, according to Scott, numbers 111.

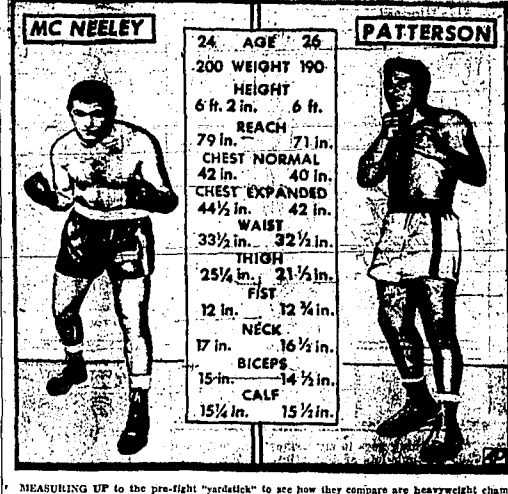

## Minors OK Rule To Cut Down on Bonus Payments

TAMPA, Fla., Dec. 1 (AP)—The minor leagues adopted a new rule Thursday designed to put the brakes on the bonus spree that cost the baseball owners 12 million dollars in 1961. If the majors also pass this rule, as expected, it will be the first time since Saturday at Miami its effects could be felt at the home of every promising high school or college player in the nation.

Although there will be no actual ceiling on the money that can be paid to untried youngsters to sign contracts, clubs will be restricted in the movement of these players that they will think will be profitable. The rule, which is effective for only one year, will limit the amount of cash shelling out \$100,000 for a signee.

Last year Pittsburgh reportedly paid \$135,000 to Hob-Batter, a Long Beach, Calif., schoolboy pitcher.

The main effect will be to save money for the ball clubs, the result of one year of clubs who pointed out that the rule is effective for only one year. The amount of cash shelling out in terms of \$8,000 instead of \$100,000, said another official.

The new legislation was drawn up by a six-man major league committee. The first-year rules are advanced to the big league roster before the draft, only one can be optioned next year. If optioned, he still counts on the major league player limits which varies from 34 in the summer to 40 during the winter.

## Comedy About Cold War Is Daring Attempt for Movie

ROME, Dec. 1 (AP)—The dice are rolling in what Rome's film colony calls the movies' greatest gamble.

Filming of the super-spectacular "Cleopatra," finally is under way. Romans are settling back to watch it if the film that has bounded its production so far has been overcome.

But the magnificent new sets at Cinecitta Studios, a huge movie-making compound on the outskirts of Rome, were not ready on time, causing a postponement of two weeks past the scheduled starting date.

Mankiewicz shrugged. Postponements are part and parcel of motion picture production, he said. But Romans warned the picture better had not run into too many delays. ## Cold Weather Togs Come in Many Colors:

URBANA, Ill., Dec. 1 (AP)—Cold-weather togs for children come in a wide variety of fabrics. Here are some tips from Mrs. Ruth Cabral, University of Illinois home economist, on how to choose them:

For children 8 years old and younger, look for a fabric that's wind and soil-resistant, smooth-surfaced and closely woven for warmth. Poplin and taffeta make good choices.

Newest interlinings are of urethane foam, which gives the greatest warmth for the least weight and bulk.

Deep-pile interlinings of Nylon, cotton and wool are almost as warm but tend to be a little bulky and hence are better for older children than toddlers.

Quilted acetate interlinings offer the least insulation value of all fabrics now commonly used.

A silicone finish on the outer fabric makes it resistant to water and sunbly stains, and the finish holds up well through laundering. If the garment is thoroughly rinsed to get out all the detergent.

## Camera Takes Many Lenses

BY BARTH KINGH  
One of the biggest attributes of the better 35 millimeter cameras is their ability to accept lenses of various focal lengths.

Most 35 millimeter cameras come equipped with a "normal" lens, usually of fairly high speed, and having a focal length in the neighborhood of 50 millimeters.

After the user becomes adept at operating a camera with the standard lens he begins to look with longing at wide angle lenses and telephotos.

The most widely used lenses in the wide angle field range from 32 millimeters to 35 millimeters with the latter the most frequent choice among amateurs. In the long lens field, telephotos ranging from 85 millimeters to 135 millimeters are the top favorite.

Press photographers now rely heavily upon wide angle lenses for the quick "grab shot" of a fast news event. The short focal length of these lenses permits the photographer to "zone focus" and cover a large area in sharp focus.

By stopping the lens down it gives dry cleaning, but cotton or nylon or blends are washable. If the fabric is a nylon-cotton blend, check to be sure the nylon is a 420 type, made especially to blend with cotton.

is easy to cover distances from six feet to infinity. On the few occasions when the photographer needs to get closer, he can quickly spot focus.

Another attribute of the wide angle lens is controlled distortion. By moving in close, objects near the camera become abnormally large while background objects appear dwarfed in comparison.

This quality can be used to good advantage to dramatize a particular point of view or outstanding quality of the subject.

## Department Tests Uses for Cotton

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1 (AP)—A new wash-n-wear finishing process, developed through U.S. department of agriculture research, promises to make cottons even more satisfactory for clothing, curtains and other household furnishings.

The new treatment gives cottons a wash-n-wear finish more durable than many other finishes.

The researchers reported that fabric finished in this way does not wrinkle when tumbled in an automatic dryer and is not yellowed or discolored by bleach.

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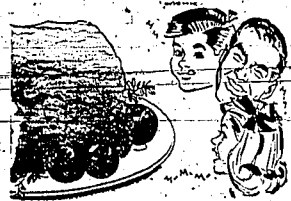

# RECIPE of the WEEK!

## To Roast Standing Rib Roast

ASK Shelby's butcher to give you the actual weight of the roast. This is very important.

Remove meat from refrigerator about 1 hour before roasting to allow it to come to room temperature. Rub with salt and pepper. Place in an uncovered roasting pan (on a rack if you have one), and roast in a preheated 325F or slow oven. Do not cover. Do not add water.

Rare beef takes 20 to 22 minutes per pound  
Medium-rare beef takes 22 to 26 minutes per pound  
Medium beef takes 26 to 30 minutes per pound  
Well-done beef takes 30 to 36 minutes per pound

When roast is cooked to your taste, remove from oven and let it stand for about 15 minutes or so to "rest". This makes the meat easier to carve. It also gives you a chance to make the Yorkshire Pudding.

## Yorkshire Pudding

2 eggs  
1 cup milk  
1 cup sifted all-purpose flour

1/2 teaspoon salt  
2 tablespoons dripping from roast

Just before beef has finished roasting, increase oven heat to 450F or very hot. Pour 1/4 cup beef drippings in the bottom of a baking pan (an 8-inch square pan is fine) and put in oven to get very hot.

Beat eggs with a rotary or electric beater until airy-looking. Beat in flour and milk gradually. Add salt and 2 tablespoons beef dripping from roast. Pour this mixture on top of the hot drippings and bake 10 minutes. Reduce oven heat to 350F or moderate and bake 10 to 15 minutes longer or until pudding is puffy and nicely browned.

Serve immediately, cut in squares, with roast.
