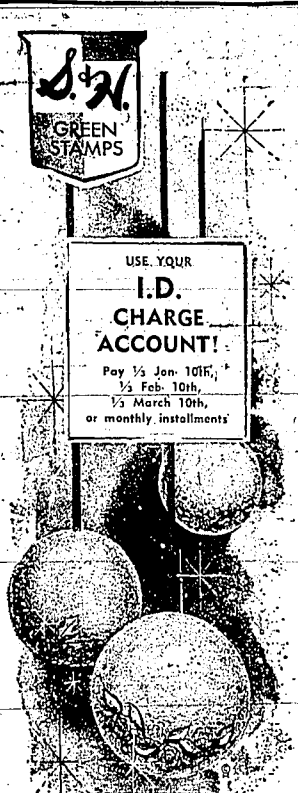

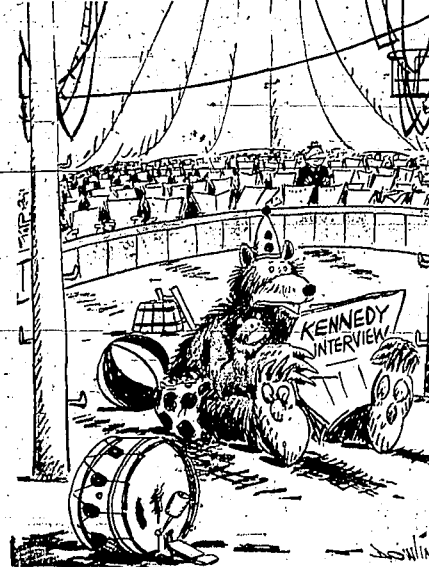

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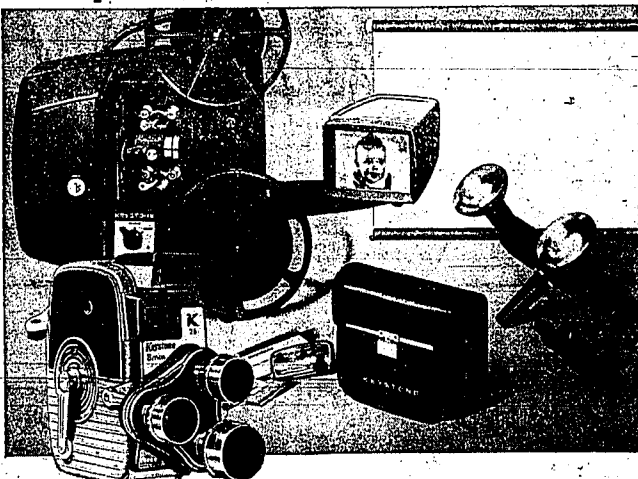
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Council Says Fitness Test Results Poor

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 — Physical fitness tests in public schools have shown appalling results, the President's Council on Youth Fitness reported today.

About half the 200,000 youngsters taking part in pilot programs failed the minimum test for fitness, the council said, and only about 10 per cent passed a more strenuous comprehensive test.

However, the report added, it has been found that marked improvement can be obtained by following a simple program that includes at least 15 minutes of vigorous activity every day for at least 100 days.

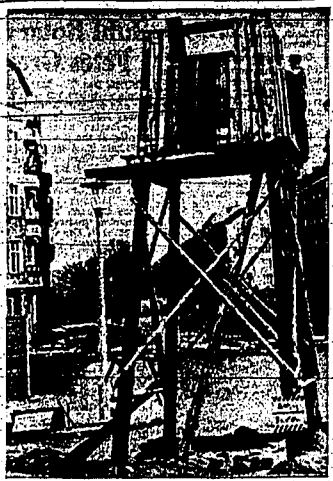
The pilot programs are being conducted by local school authorities in Muskogee, Okla., and West City, Okla.; Belcourt, N. D.; Springfield, Mo.; Savannah, Ga.; 20 school districts in Pennsylvania, and in U. S. Army dependents' schools in eight countries.

The minimum test includes three exercises—pull-ups to measure flexibility and abdominal strength, and squat thrusts to measure agility.

Muskogee's 557 pupils took this minimum test at the start of the school year and 47 per cent failed in Midwest City, 5287 took the test and 2767, almost 53 per cent, failed.

Even at Indian reservation schools in Belcourt, N. D., the council said, "more than 50 per cent of the 460 students tested failed the minimum test."

The council said that after it was following the recommended 15-minute-a-day program, there was a 34 per cent improvement in the test scores at Muskogee, and significant improvement at Belcourt. The comprehensive test includes pull-ups, sit-ups, shuttle run, and a 400-yard dash, softball throw for distance and 600-yard run-and-walk.

Doctor Backs U.S. Medical Aid Proposal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 — Dr. Isidore W. Ruskin of California wrote in a Democratic party publication today that he favors the Kennedy-backed proposal for medical care for the aged through social security because "it is progressive social legislation whose beneficiaries would retain their dignity."

Dr. Ruskin said the Kerr-Mills aid plan for the medically indigent voted by congress last year is "utterly inadequate," and that "retiree-beneficiaries to depend for federal grants to the state to help give medical care to the aged."

The Democratic publication of the Democratic National committee said in a caption over Dr. Ruskin's article that he is a member of a group of California doctors supporting the President's proposal and opposing the American Medical Association position.

Under the controversial Kennedy plan, 14.5 million persons over 65 would be entitled to up to 40 days of hospitalization, 180 days in a nursing home, and 240 home health visits.

It would be financed through an increase of one-fourth of one per cent in the social security taxes of both employers and employees, and an increase in the payroll base on which the tax is applied, from \$4,200 to \$5,200.



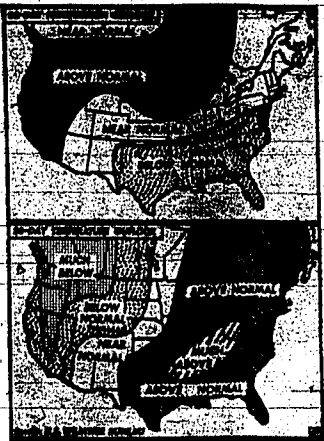

Reds Cited For Failure To Register

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—The communist party of the United States has been indicted for failure to register as an agent of the Soviet Union. Conviction could mean hundreds of thousands of dollars in fines.

The indictment was returned Friday by a federal grand jury at the request of the justice department. The 12-count charge accuses the party of failing to register by Nov. 20 as required by the subversive ac-

tivities control act of 1950. The act was upheld by the U.S. supreme court earlier this year after a 10-year court battle between the party and the spy-erminant.

In announcing the action, Atty. Gen. Robert F. Kennedy said the party apparently has been beating a hasty retreat underground in anticipation of the indictment.

Future indictments against party officers and party members also are possible. The law required party officials to register Nov. 30, which they did not do. Party members are supposed to register by Dec. 20.

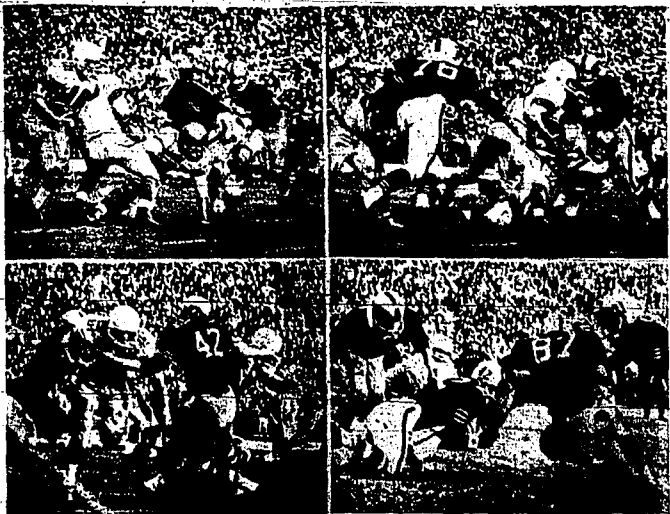

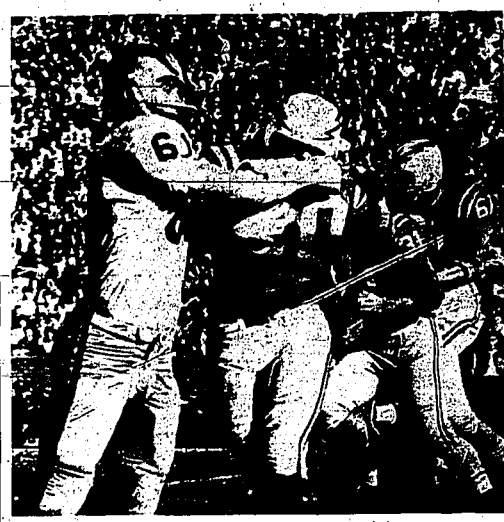
Colorado Drops Air Force 29-12

Two Officials Quit as NCAA and AAU Continue Fight for Control

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (AP)—The Amateur Athletic Union lost two of its best-known officials today, but may have moved a step toward compromise in its power struggle with the National Collegiate Athletic association. The AAU convention, finally notified to the long-expressed desires of Dan Ferris to step out after 51 years in the AAU, Ferris quit as secretary in charge.

Sober, longtime chairman of the AAU track and field committee, dramatically offered his resignation to the convention. He said: "I would gladly retire from the picture if that would permit the other side to save face. I will recommend that a new chairman be named in the hope that with the main target removed—from the scene, it may be possible for some serious honest efforts to be made to resolve the situation."

To replace Ferris and secretary-treasurer James Simms, who also has asked to retire, the executive director and named army Col. Don Hull to take the \$15,000 a year job as soon as he can retire from the service.

Hull, a 48-year-old former paratrooper, said he felt that the two major amateur sports groups should make a strenuous effort to solve their differences.

The NCAA is charged to boycott AAU events unless it is given more representation in international affairs.

Both the college basketball and track coaches associations have proposed separate federations designed to take over the authority now exercised in those sports by the AAU.

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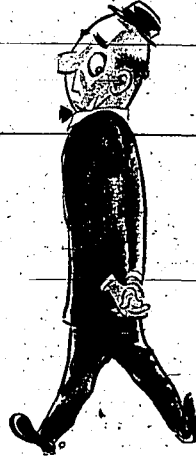

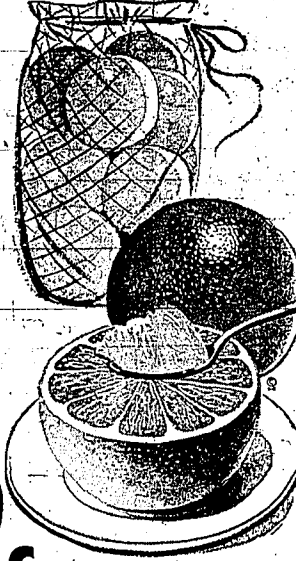

white collar workers, do. In fact, they have put in an hour or more of work by the time many workers... Most of them are at work by 8 a.m., although the doors don't open for the public for two more hours.

Bankers differ in their business practices, but they do follow a general pattern of getting the work accomplished.

Some of them will handle the night deposit bags... This can take several letters one to two hours.

Another job is to file the checks posted the day before... Each teller is responsible for preparing the monthly depositor's statements for a certain group of depositors, now done during the early morning and late afternoon hours.

So, by the time the doors open and the horde of customers pours through the door, the tellers already have accomplished half of the morning work.

And this also is true of the bookkeepers... During the early morning they sort and place in alphabetical order, the checks drawn and the deposits made on the previous day.

All the work is compounded on Mondays and after holidays... Bank employees pay dearly for a holiday, for the work piles up and must be put out of the way in regular time.

At least one Twin Falls member has found a way to deal with adolescent energy... Her method? She formed a band and they play everything from a balloon that squeaks to Cub Scout den mother, who leads popcorn cans that rattle.

"Right now they might sound like something rattling around in a can," she says. "But they are beginning to get the beat and they work very hard." One of the things she has enjoyed about working with the Cub Scouts is that they are so receptive to anything suggested. Thus, on the fact of it, the United States has already conceded the first blow to the enemy if world war comes again.

The United States is attacked, the target probably will not be a military outpost 2,000 miles from the mainland. It will be the United States.

Physical Condition Program Needs Outlined by Athletics Director Here

In recent months, much has been made of the physical conditioning of America's youth. President Eisenhower and John F. Kennedy both have noted that many of our youths lack the physical conditioning necessary to lead a healthy life.

American students have done poorly on physical tests, particularly in comparison to European youth.

Paul Ostyn, director of athletics in class A district No. 41, was questioned about this subject.

Ostyn points out that much could be changed to improve physical education in Idaho, but that the physical plants and lack of personnel would hinder most schools. Even though Idaho lags behind some states in physical education classes, the students tested here ranged average or above average in recent tests.

A report, "Witness of Idaho Youth," has just been released by the college of education, department of physical education, University of Idaho. The report summarizes the results of a state-wide testing program undertaken two years ago.

The survey also points out that a somewhat similar comparison might be drawn with the fifth and sixth grade students.

The report concludes by noting, "In a state such as Idaho where major industries are farming, mining and lumbering, boys and girls of school age should be expected to rank higher than the results of this survey indicate."

Ostyn points out that physical education is a relatively new subject in Idaho. Until World War II, there was no state law that stated physical education would be taught in the schools. In spite of this, about 50 per cent of the schools did have a program, according to Oostyn.

The President's council on youth fitness was created by executive order under President Eisenhower in 1950. His concern for youth fitness grew when the results of the 18-year Hans Kraus Sonja-Weber study were published.

"This survey showed that nearly 60 per cent of the American children failed basic physical fitness tests, compared to a failure rate among European children of less than nine per cent."

He points out how this could be done in Twin Falls.

"The physical education program in the district now is rather limited, due mostly to lack of space and personnel. In grades four through six, the children have, at the most, about 20 minutes a day devoted to a physical education type of training."

But Ostyn says, more likely, the students get about 20 minutes every other day. This is a period, in addition to the regular recess period.

In the seventh and eighth grades, the students all take health and physical education, but the boys and girls alternate in the gymnasium and only get actual physical training on alternate days.

After a student finishes the eighth grade, only one more year of physical education is required. Any other physical conditioning is the result of athletics or other extra-curricular activities, such as the "Girls' Athletic Association."

"This additional year usually is taken during the freshman year—leaving three more years of school when it is possible students will get absolutely no physical education training."

"Actually," Ostyn says, "the physical education program is very poor in Idaho—mainly because of the plant facilities the state has to work with."

"The district is short of facilities in Twin Falls, but Ostyn says another year of physical education could be added to the schedule with the present facilities, but probably would necessitate the addition of another instructor."

In discussing the subject, Ostyn outlined a program that he believed would benefit the youth of the community and serve to raise their standard of conditioning.

He notes that the program he would favor would be along the lines suggested by President Kennedy, a program that stresses gymnastics and calisthenics.

This type of program would place more stress on improving the physical conditioning of the

individual student, rather than improving team play.

In the first and second grades, the students should be presented with games, and the program should be kept on the "fun" level. In grades three through six, when the students are better coordinated and stronger, the emphasis would be on body development.

Such things as calisthenics, stunts, tumbling, relay races, folk dancing and team sports would be included in the program. He believes the students should have one year of physical education every other day. And they should have facilities to dress and shower.

Ostyn points out that it would be good if a full-time man or woman was available for every two elementary schools. This would take the load off the academic teachers and place the operation of the program in the hands of a trained person.

And Ostyn adds that the elementary schools should have room to carry out the program inside the building during bad weather.

In the seventh, eighth and ninth grades, the students should have an hour of physical education every day—a program similar to the present program, but with more emphasis on strength building, yet still living in team play.

Ostyn says, this means more emphasis should be placed on pitting a student against himself, rather than against another student. In other words, the object would be for Johnny not to try to beat Billy, but for Johnny to try to better his own record.

Records should be kept of the student's progress and he should be judged on his progress.

"Ideally," Ostyn says, "we should have physical education every year, but the plant facilities don't permit."

This program would be topped with two more years of physical education in the high school. This would also be a calisthenics program.

Any Ostyn says the classes should be required for all boys and girls. This might sound like an elaborate program, but Ostyn points out many states offer a four-year required physical education program in high school.

The President's council on physical fitness offered a specific program to the schools of the nation.

The council points out that 25 per cent of the population of the country is composed of school children. A giant step towards improving the health of the country would be made if the program is followed.

The program stresses three points—identify the physically undeveloped children and provide remedial programs to bring them up to par; provide a minimum of 15 minutes of vigorous activity daily for all pupils as part of the regular physical education period; and use continued, valid fitness tests to measure the student's physical abilities and to evaluate the student's progress.

This program has been presented to educators throughout the country and is being undertaken as pilot projects in schools throughout the country and in U. S. army dependent schools.

Hunters Report More Elk Kills This Year Than in 1960 When 16,500 Shot

Hunters to date have reported slightly more elk kills than for the comparable 1960 period by about two per cent. If the numbers continue to mount, Idaho's 1961 harvest will exceed by slightly more than last year's when the completed total of 16,500 elk had been reported by the nation's second largest wapiti producer by several thousand animals.

Idaho for 1961 are the Lochus, north fork of the Clearwater, lower Selway, upper Selway and south fork of the Clearwater. Its opening week-end storm killed more elk kills than any of the remaining individual units outside the "big five."

It also is noteworthy that the Lochus and lower Selway units were more reported elk per square mile, according to this year's cards, than any other units, although the Roundtop and north fork of the Clearwater areas produced almost as well. And bull elk made up slightly more than 50 per cent of the kill reported to date. This varied from a high of 61 per cent bulls in the upper Selway to more cows than bulls in some local units.

Although fewer elk kills have been reported than last year in the Chamberlain and Soldier mountain units, most major areas show more than for the comparable 1960 period. In the Selway, to reiterate, the reported kills are very similar to last year, but Chamberlain and Soldier eastern area running better than the largest part of the 1960 kill for that area and the same thing tends to repeat again this year.

Reports for other trophy areas of big game animals show the following kills made prior to Nov. 21: Antelope, 445; bighorn sheep, 51; mountain goat, 98, and moose, 28. These latter figures are all similar to those of last year excepting for antelope. Fewer antelope permits were issued in 1961, and the 1961 harvest is smaller.

The deer harvest reported to date is running about 90 per cent of last year's for the same date, but many units are ahead of the comparable 1960 kill. Individual units, of course, reflect local conditions.

Antique Spinning Wheel Is Survivor Of Germany's Occupation of Norway

BUHI, Dec. 2—Mr. and Mrs. Buhi own the most widely-traveled spinning wheel in the world—and it probably is the oldest.

When they returned from Norway a few months ago, they brought back an antique spinning wheel that has been in the Buhi family for four generations. Their son, a student at the University of Idaho, starts the fourth generation.

The spinning wheel originally belonged to Joe's grandmother, who lived near Stavanger, Norway, a coastal community near the southern tip of the country. The old spinning wheel had had plenty of wear in its lifetime and barely survived the German occupation during World War II. Joe says he often has thought of the spinning wheel since he has lived in the United States and moved to Buhi when he was 10 years old.

But Joe says he had no idea that the old spinning wheel would be in the family home after the German occupation. "The house was a farm home that was used as a quarters for officers and sergeants."

Joe says one of the first things they did was throw out all of the furniture and other items stored in the attic of the home. Then the attic was filled with sand. This was a precaution against bombs. Naturally, many of the goods were lost.

He questioned his mother about the spinning wheel and she told him it had been destroyed by the Germans. But Joe climbed into the attic to check for himself. The attic appeared bare, but he noticed every corner and finally found all the pieces stored behind a small corner.

The spinning wheel was completely unharmed. He didn't mind.

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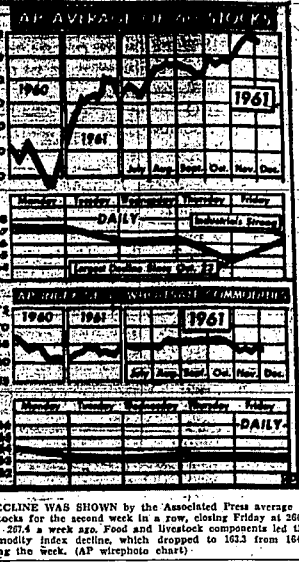

"Again, we beseech the public to investigate before they invest," Orango urged. "If you have a \$1,000 bill to burn, then ignore these warnings. If not, then check out such a proposal before signing anything."
