Nehru to Use Force At Border

NEW DELHI, Dec. 5 (UPI)—Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru will resist any Chinese communist troops if they carry out Peiping's threat to cross the MacMahon border line into India.

Nehru disclosed that Peiping had warned India it would cross the border if Indian military activities continue along the frontier and that Peiping has a number of troops seeking to occupy the vast area between the crest of the Himalayas and the border.

Nehru said India's role had been to defend the border and to prevent the Chinese from crossing it. He said that if the Chinese crossed the border, India would be forced to use force.

The MacMahon line was established by Britain in the Sino-Indian border in 1914. It runs from the Indian border to Burma and divides India's border from the Chinese border.

During the debate Nehru said that the Chinese had crossed the border in several places and that India was prepared to use force to prevent further crossings.

U.S. Pushing New Project In Space Bid

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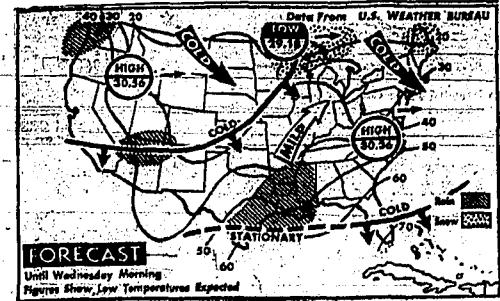

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Industrialist Admits Guilt In U.S. Court

BOSTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Bernard Goldfine was back in jail today with the big question still unanswered: Has he disclosed names of those who benefitted from his \$200,000 trust fund?

A baggy, sticky-looking Goldfine and his secretary, Mildred Kohn, appeared in federal court here yesterday and admitted charges of perjury because of the case was continued for sentencing until Jan. 2.

There was no hint during the brief proceedings whether Goldfine had complied with the government's demand that he make a candid disclosure of a list of names of those who received his largesse in return for favors.

His lawyer, the 71-year-old millionaire faces another 18-month sentence—this time for evading income taxes next May.

In Washington, the justice department has refused to confirm reports that it is still denying information already supplied by Goldfine and Miss Paperman on "big" political names included in the trust fund.

Goldfine and Miss Paperman were in court yesterday after the arrival of letters to him in the Danbury, Conn., federal correction institution.

Both admitted the charges and Judge George C. Miller sentenced them to 18 months in prison as a result of the income tax evasion case.

Goldfine became a national figure in 1958 when he was involved in a scandal that reached all the way to the White House. Sherman Adams, then assistant to President Eisenhower, was accused of a congressional hearing disclosed that he had accepted gifts from the wealthy textile manufacturer.

Kennedy Orders Cold War Medal

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—President Kennedy yesterday authorized an army and air force campaign medal for the cold war.

By executive order, Kennedy created the "armed forces expeditionary" medal for the two services. It will be awarded to service personnel who "encounter foreign armed opposition, or are otherwise placed, or have been placed, in such positions that, in the opinion of the joint chiefs of staff, hostile action by foreign armed forces was imminent even though it did not materialize."

The White House explained that the navy and the marine corps already had expeditionary medals which can be awarded during the current crisis.

Civil Air Patrol Change Pending

Plans for reorganization of the Twin Falls civil air patrol squadron will be discussed at 8 p.m. Wednesday evening at the main field, Dwight D. Eisenhower command center.

According to those there will be no change in the unit's structure as far as equipment and personnel are concerned. He added the members are meeting just to discuss the reorganization.

Free Pills

LONDON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The British health ministry has ruled that women may obtain birth control pills free under the National Health program if their doctors prescribe them.

Each pill costs less than 14 cents and a woman must take a pill a day for 20 days of the month to be protected against conception.

CHICAGO, Dec. 8 (AP)—Two businessmen have attacked a government exhibit at the south Dakota State Fair as a libel on the Eisenhower administration farm program.

Oscar J. Blumenthal and his son, Oscar, Jr., president and vice president, respectively, of the Fusco corporation, a Worthington, Minn., farm equipment firm that manufactures farm equipment, said Monday they have asked congress to investigate the exhibit.

The exhibit, staged by the state branch of the agricultural stabilization and conservation service at the fair in Huron, S.D., consisted of a model railroad.

They said one of the trains represented President Kennedy's farm program and bore slogans praising various aspects of his federal farm support and production control policy.

In the foreground was an overturned locomotive, which symbolized the farm program under the Republicans, they said. Tim Blumenthal said the toy engine bore the slogan, "Free enterprise wrecked this train," while another one said, "Do not let farm program opponents sidetrack you into a dead end."

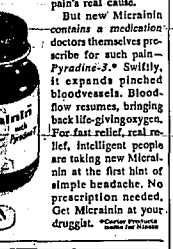

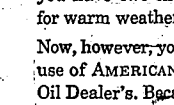

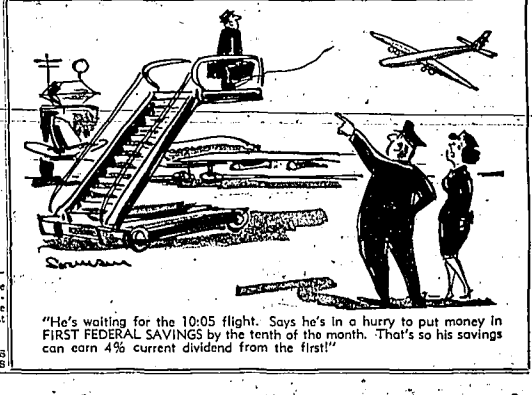

NEW YORK, Dec. 5 (AP)—Orlando Kirk, principal of the 100-student observation of educational institutions and projects in Africa, along with his wife, will leave for Sierra Leone, the West Coast, Nigeria and Morocco today.

On Dec. 11, Kirk will attend a five-day international seminar at the University of Sierra Leone in Freetown.

The educator said he was making the trip because "increasing ties with Africa for American higher education is in the urgent need of the day."

He said that the "urgent need" is for one whose identification is deeply concerned with "world affairs."

"This may be more true with respect to Columbia than with any other institutions," he said.

"Our tradition of international education is part of our regional studies work in the school of international affairs," he said.

Kirk will be joined by the program of Studies in Africa under Prof. L. Gray Cowan.

Kirk noted that some 10 highly qualified scholars were already at work in this program and that "within a few days, these people will be exerting intelligent and purposeful efforts in Africa."

He said that he thought "it will be a very interesting and rewarding experience for all of them."

WASHINGTON, Dec. 5 (AP)—Foreign ministers of the American republics will meet next month to consider economic and political sanctions against the communist government of Cuban Prime Minister Fidel Castro.

The Jan. 10 meeting, site to be designated, was called Monday by the Organization of American States, the OAS Council voted 10 to 2 for a Colombian resolution aimed straight at Cuba, although it didn't mention it by name.

Citing the mutual defense treaty binding the 21 Western Hemisphere nations, Colombia asked a foreign ministers meeting to consider "threats to the peace and political independence of the American states that could arise from the intervention of extra-continental powers."

Only Cuba and Mexico voted no. Mexico based its vote on jurisdiction grounds.

Cuba called the OAS action "an effort by the United States to gain complete control of the new invasion of Cuba."

If the foreign ministers decide Castro's Cuba is a threat to peace in the Western Hemisphere, they can invoke sanctions similar to those levied against the Trujillo Republic. They also can consider other courses of action.

Diplomatic circles said Monday's action was one of the most far-reaching ever taken by the OAS.

Trujillos Flee

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 5 (AP)—Four members of the family of Gen. Francisco Rafael Trujillo, the assassinated dictator, made plans today to leave for Florida.

It was reported that Orlando Trujillo, his wife and daughter, Felix, and Flavia Trujillo, have purchased one-way tickets to Madrid aboard (Guest Airways) and are scheduled to leave Friday.

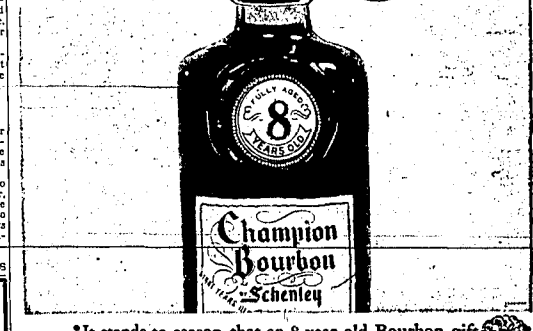

DENVER, Dec. 5 (AP)—Prevention of waste of natural resources is the key to the nation's economic well-being, the president of the National Petroleum Trade Association said today.

Frank M. Porter, in an address in the annual meeting of the Interstate Oil Compact commission, said that petroleum conservation is one of the most important contributions to the period in which we live. He said the domestic petroleum industry now has the standby capacity to meet a demand of as much as three million barrels of crude oil a day beyond current levels.

"Enlightened conservation efforts have permitted the American people to consume petroleum products at record rates, including the production of the Interstate Oil Compact of two years, and at the same time they have been able to build up and expand their reserves of this key source of energy," Porter said.

Porter spoke to the first general session of the 1000 meeting. Other speakers were Alvin C. Hoot, president of the Interstate Petroleum Institute of America; Gov. Stephen McNallen of California; Matthew E. Welch of Indiana and Price Daniel of Texas, and President Dwight D. Eisenhower.

Daniel led the group that discussed conservation of oil. The group is continuing to loom as a major problem the commission must work to overcome.

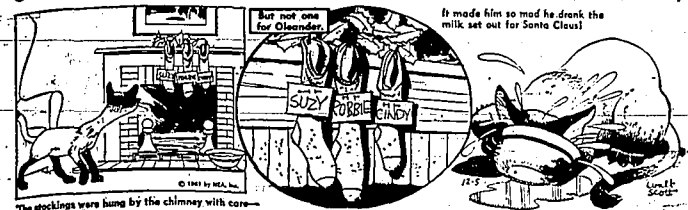

She resigned from the Irish civil service almost immediately after O'Brien was assigned from Ireland's diplomatic corps.

O'Brien resigned from the Congo and to get him removed as U. N. representative in Katanga.

Britain and France denied the charges but otherwise have refused to comment.

Navy Ceremonies Mark Pearl Harbor Bombing

PEARL HARBOR, Hawaii, Dec. 5 (AP)—The clear, strong tones of a navy bugle will sound Thursday at the instant—20 years ago—the Japanese attack on Pearl Harbor began Dec. 7, 1941, 7:55 a. m. in Hawaii.

The bugler's call to colors will mark the start of memorial ceremonies for the 1,102 men who perished in minutes aboard the battleship USS Arizona.

Among those paying tribute to the memories of the last American to die was a group of 108 New England survivors of the Pearl Harbor attack.

Their motions of respect will not be merely symbolic. The remains of the Arizona dead are still entombed in the sunken hulk of the capital ship, only retired U.S. naval vessel still commissioned.

Most of the New England boat lying, about the Arizona, representatives will be on the memorial ceremony with dignitaries including five U.S. representatives and Gov. Paul J. Fanning of Arizona.

At 8 a.m. colors will be sounded, as carillon chimes on Ford island near the Arizona fade out the memories of the vast naval base on leeward Oahu island.

The American flag will be raised as the 14th naval district band plays the national anthem. After invocation and a hymn, Adm. John H. Sledge, commander in chief of the U.S. Pacific fleet, will deliver the memorial address. A prayer will follow.

Church Unity Steps Taken In India

NEW DELHI, India, Dec. 5 (AP)—A major stride toward the goal of worldwide unity of churches, the general assembly of the World Council of Churches Monday night pledged to work for interlocking church councils rather than a single ecumenical organization of all Christians.

The council, which is made up of the 600 delegates representing the council's 108 Protestant, Orthodox, Old Catholic and other denominations, met for the first time that the world church body has spelled out the path to church unity.

The guide outlined various steps for the settlement of problems, such as the study of the Bible, mutual study, baptism, ordination and communion—but it admitted that "we are far from a common mind" on the goal of achieving the "one" we have described.

The study will determine both the cost and the quality of a parochial education.

Parishes will be asked for the first time to produce financial information on educating the estimated 2.5 million Catholics now enrolled in Catholic schools.

Data also will be requested on curriculum, the use of teachers, academic goals and physical facilities.

It has been estimated that parochial school enrollment has increased more than six times since 1900, while public schools have increased their enrollment by 23 times.
