ELIZABETHVILLE, Katanga, Dec. 6 (AP)—Air forces went into action today in the fighting between the United Nations and Katanga. The U. N. announced two of its 15 jets had destroyed a Katanga jet and three other Katanga planes in an aerial attack on Kolwezi base. On the other side, a Katanga plane—a bomber—was shot down from a German-made Dornier transport—piloted by the main Elizabethville airport held by U. N. troops, and dropped three bombs. A U. N. spokesman said there were no serious casualties or damage.

BERLIN, Dec. 6 (AP)—A daring, railroad engineer and 24 friends and relatives hijacked an East German train Tuesday night and roared into West Berlin under cover of a 50-mile-an-hour post-station assistance, but Britain was declaring the U. If the nations of the West can agree on a common program of action as extraordinary in economic history as the North Atlantic Treaty organization was unprecedented in military history, the President said, "the long-range communist aim of dividing and weakening us all is doomed to failure."

Stimpahl's physical fitness program, which was launched here in 1958, involves 15 minutes of twice daily exercises. They are usually pushups, squat thrusts and pullups. A regular time is set aside daily for the exercise.

Kennedy Says 'Full Support' Will Go to Fitness Program

NEW YORK, Dec. 6—President Kennedy today threw the "full support" of his administration behind a national youth fitness program which he said "will enable our athletes to win the Olympics and also improve the nation's health and physical vitality."

Speaking last night at a dinner of the National Football foundation and the Hall of Fame, the president said "The sad fact is that it looks more and more as if our great national sport is not as popular as it once was."

"We have become more and more of a nation of spectators," he said.

"I do not say this in order to decry excellence in sports or anywhere else," Kennedy continued. "But excellence emerges from mass participation. This is shown by the fact that in the Olympic games we are steadily falling behind the nations which stress broad participation in a great variety of sports."

The United States has maintained its traditional superiority in track and field in the Olympic games yet has lost the unofficial team championship to Russia because of points piled up by Soviet athletes in gymnastics, wrestling and other sports considered "minor" in the United States.

"Let me say that this administration intends to give full support to the Olympic development program," the President said. "We will not subsidize our athletes here in this country. But we will, through greater participation and improved physical fitness, produce a standard of excellence which will enable our athletes to win the Olympics and stand out on an amateur basis."

Mr. Kennedy said progress toward this goal already has been made by the President's council on youth fitness, which is under the direction of Bud Wilkinson, coach at the University of Oklahoma. He said Wilkinson and the council staff "have worked out a basic physical fitness program for our elementary and secondary schools in cooperation with the nation's leading educational and medical organizations."

Airline Asks Board to Halt Coach Switch

Nixon Claims Russ Doesn't Want Battle

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 6.—Former Vice President Richard Nixon said Tuesday night Khrushchev does not want war but wishes to conquer the world without a shot.

He described Khrushchev—his kitchen debate opponent—as a cold calculating, sober, unrelenting opponent when something matters, unlike the show-pony image created by the Soviet premier at the United Nations.

Nixon told more than 1,200 persons attending a 420-plate Executive club dinner that Khrushchev was influenced only by the "facts of power."

"He is not going to start anything in the world unless he is going to gain more than he loses," Nixon said.

Elaborating on the theme, the former vice president said that Khrushchev "has more to fear, more to risk as far as war is concerned."

He said Khrushchev was restrained by the Russian people's fear of war, satellite revolt, China's power and the power of the United States.

Nixon said he was not one of those who thought China and Russia would soon turn on each other but, he said, if Russia went to war the devastation would be terrible.

If that happens there would be 600 million Chinese ready to come in the back door, he said.

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 6.—James Nixon, 6, repeatedly begged his father to allow Anne, the family pet collie, to stay in the house. A few days later Nixon was in.

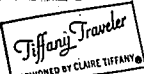

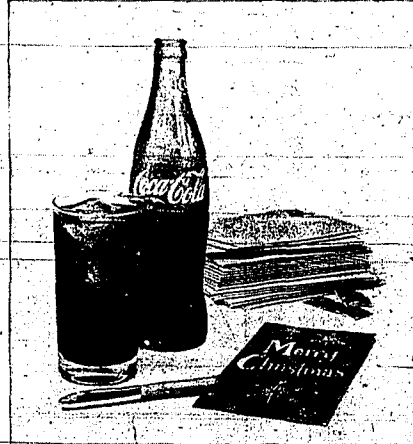

Unions May Ask Shorter Work Hours

MIAMI BEACH, Fla., Dec. 6 (AP)—The AFL-CIO said yesterday that if high levels of unemployment persist labor unions would press congress for legislation to cut the present standard of 40-hour weeks.

The federation's executive council, in a report released in advance of convention sessions here, also called on unions to redouble their efforts to reduce work hours through collective bargaining agreements.

The report said little headway had been made in the past two years in getting employers to accept share-the-work proposals.

"However," it added, "there was increased discussion of shorter hours in various negotiations and, especially if unemployment pressures mount, the groundwork has been laid for rapid acceptance of shorter work weeks in the years ahead."

President Kennedy, due to address the opening AFL-CIO convention session Thursday, has opposed any legislation to cut work hours, saying that all-out production is needed in the present stage of world affairs.

The AFL-CIO council said a cut in working hours should be accompanied with the same or increased weekly pay in order to maintain employment.

In another development, AFL-CIO President George Meany had a conciliatory meeting with a delegation from the Negro-American Labor council—an organization with which Meany has been at odds over racial policy. Meany promised to try to establish close working relations between the council and the AFL-CIO.

The council has criticized the AFL-CIO for its efforts to stamp out discriminatory practices against Negroes. Meany has contended the council is helping reduce racial bias, was stirring up bad feelings between the two groups.

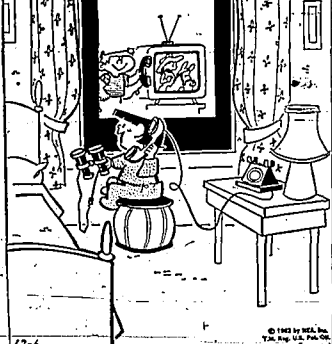

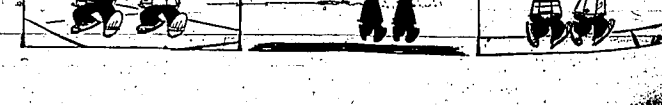
