

Katanga Bullets Hit U. S. Plane; No One Injured

ELIZABETHVILLE, Katanga, the Congo, Dec. 7 (UPI)—Katanga soldiers hit a low-flying United Nations air force plane with rifle and machinegun fire today and set it alight. The downed plane crashed at Elizabethville airport and the crewmen escaped unhurt. With the shooting, U. S. servicemen were brought under fire for the first time in the 18 months of Congo turmoil. In the only other instance of violence against American military men, 15 U. S. air force technicians were beaten by Congo troops at Stanleyville last year.

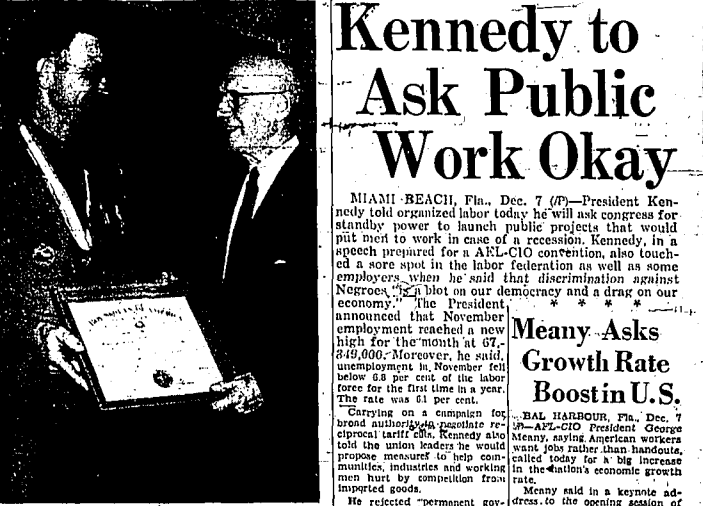

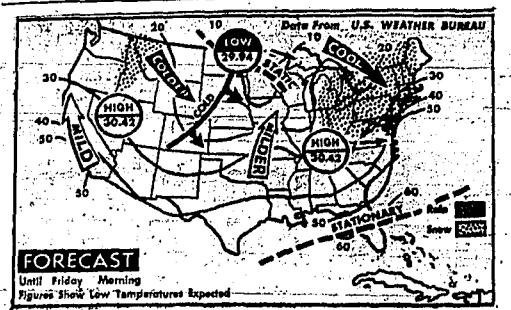

Labor, Firms Asked to Aid U. S. Growth

MOLINE, Ill., Dec. 7 (AP)—Labor Secretary Arthur J. Goldberg has urged business to "redouble its effort for top efficiency" and labor to abandon its "laissez-faire" attitude in a cooperative effort to spur the U. S. economy into a "desired rate" of production.

"Both management and labor must face the challenge of cooperation for progress," Goldberg told the Moline Association of Commerce here last night.

"Our economy is not producing at the desired rate," Goldberg said. "This means, for the businessman, lower profits. It means for the government, lower revenue. It means for the working man, less employment opportunity."

He would seem clear then, that it is up to business, government and labor to work together to put the economy to work and make it more modern.

"Our business must modernize. It must improve its techniques and products. It must automate and redesign for top efficiency," the labor secretary said.

"Labor should consider some of its working practices in this light and abandon false restrictions that hamper the expansion and improvement we need."

Goldberg said that management, on its part, "must not reject out of hand every proposal for change that might compensate for the disruption of lives and careers that sometimes accompany technological change."

'I Need Help'

LOS ANGELES, Dec. 7 (AP)—Henry Kramer, 66, walked up to a teller at the Security First National bank's branch in downtown Los Angeles Wednesday and handed her a note saying:

"Give me all the money you have and make haste about it. Xmas is too close to lose any time. The crib is empty. A fat accomplice."

Then he asked the teller to call police, which she did. He booked a supervisor of robbery, Kramer sighed:

"I own a store I've owned and operated a corner grocery store in Baltimore but the weight of problems is too much for me."

The problems included, he said, loss of business in markets, taxes, separation from his wife "and 54 hours a week in the store."

Expert Says Pilfering Is Costly Whim

CHICAGO, Dec. 7 (AP)—Shoplifting is mostly obedience to an impulse by otherwise honest people whose petty pilfering will cost America's merchants more than 600 million dollars during Christmas.

The conclusion and estimate of loss is by Norman Industries, Inc., of Chicago, a theft-prevention consulting firm.

Norman Kiven, president, said the peak of Christmas shopping loss will be in the week when the rush is over they are actually operated in the red.

One large store in the Midwest recently reported its approximate 57 shoplifters in a two-week period before Christmas shopping began. The average value of theft in those cases involved merchandise valued at \$11.64.

Kiven said his statistics show that only about 10 per cent of shoplifters are professionals. He described the others as ordinary people of whom 50 per cent are women.

Contrary to what most people think, Kiven said, "the middle income and richer customers are responsible for greater losses. Virtually 90 per cent of them were sort to the impulse to steal if they believed there was the slightest chance they would be caught. People with smaller incomes are satisfied with the smaller impulse-type merchandise."

NAACP Official Praises Program

PHOENIX, Ariz., Dec. 7 (AP)—A top official of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People says action by the Kennedy administration in the area of civil rights has been "impressive."

Roy Wilkins, NAACP executive secretary, also praised the mass reporting of needs for what he termed bringing the race issue to "the public in an understandable manner."

Wilkins spoke Wednesday night at a dinner meeting of the Philadelphia chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, professional journalism fraternity.

African Says Ideas Wrong On U. S. Life

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—The United States is a country where most people are cowboys and the rest are millionaires, no one has to work, and all Indians wear feathers and want to fight. Or so it seems to most Africans, says Victoria Mutawairo, an African school teacher from Southern Rhodesia.

And, she adds, "I think Americans have just as wrong an impression of Africa."

Mrs. Mutawairo is one of 18 women educators from nine African nations who are taking up a three-month tour of this country.

"My biggest surprise in this country was that Americans work hard, they actually sweat," she told a news conference Wednesday.

And where do Africans get their ideas about the United States?

"The children at home admire Americans and American ways," Mrs. Mutawairo said. "They try to copy them, and their models are the films they see on television. The girls try to walk like the way American girls walk, and the boys want to wear American style trousers with narrow leg bottoms."

If the Africans were surprised by the real Americans, Mrs. Mutawairo said, she and her colleagues were equally surprised by a true picture of Africans.

When I talked to your school children, they said they were amazed that I could speak their language, that I was fluent in it. Afterward they had a million questions to ask me. They wanted to know what Africa was really like."

Go Ahead!

RALEIGH, N. C., Dec. 7 (AP)—The North Carolina prison commission has said the inmates probably won't pick up any more bad habits just by watching crime movies and television.

The commission voted Wednesday to allow prisoners to view movies dealing with crime, and to take away from prisoners the right to censor night-time TV viewing.

"We're trying to protect these people from something we can't even protect our children from," said commission member M. B. Davis. "You can't beat Madison Avenue."

Ban of News Was Mistake, Agency Says

WASHINGTON, Dec. 7 (AP)—Federal aviation agency officials say their clampdown on news of presidential flights was all a big mistake.

The FAA revoked the order Wednesday to allow newsmen from the White House only hours after the new policy had become known.

FAA officials said the original order had been "inadvertently" published Nov. 29 without the approval of the White House. It forbids all FAA personnel from giving out any information before officials and staff of the President Kennedy, his family, and Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson.

However, the White House had continued to provide newsmen with full details of Kennedy's flights, including estimated arrival and departure times.

The FAA spokesman said the order was supposed to help the secret service.

The FAA clampdown came to light after newsmen called the lower at Idlewild airport in New York City for the White House's departure time of Kennedy's flight to West Palm Beach Wednesday. The FAA spokesman said he would be given the information.

N. Y. Patrolmen Get Nightsticks

NEW YORK, Dec. 7 (AP)—Police patrolmen, who have been the victims of numerous recent attacks, will be given a "nightstick" duty, had the authority to get tough today.

Police Commissioner Michael J. Murphy yesterday ordered 1,400 daytime patrolmen to carry nightsticks.

The nightstick is for your protection, the commissioner told the officers, and it necessary, he commanded, "use it."

An accompanying memorandum issued to the patrolmen said, "taking a prisoner is not a personal contest between you and him. Forget the Marquis of Queensberry rules."

Surgery Set

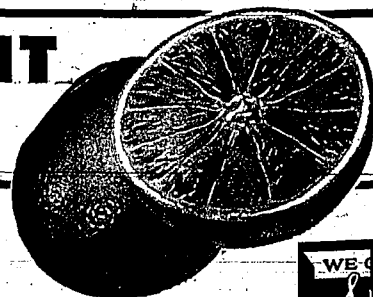

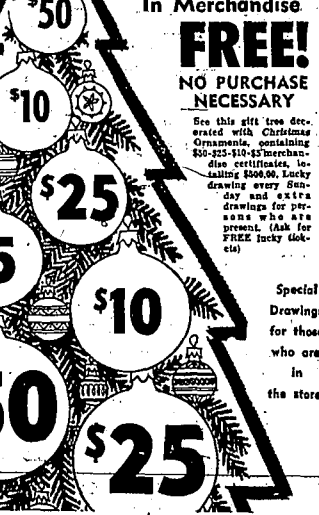

Chief Alleges Welfare Plan Doesn't Work

NEWBURGH, N. Y., Dec. 7 (AP)—State social welfare administrator Raymond W. Houston said last night that Newburgh's own figures show its controversial relief restrictions have failed to keep costs down.

Houston, who had battled City Manager Joseph M. Mitchell over the welfare plan, took part in a panel discussion sponsored by the Unitarian fellowship for social justice.

He said that despite the claims of Newburgh officials, their own figures show the local cost of public welfare next year will be higher than 1961, and the preceding two years.

"The official budget for welfare in Newburgh for 1962 shows gross total expenditures—including federal, state and local funds—of \$2,000,000. Total revenues from federal and state aid and other sources are shown as \$510,000," Houston said.

"If those figures are correct—and they are Newburgh's figures—the cost to Newburgh for 1962 will be the difference between \$890,000 and \$310,000, or \$580,000," he continued.

"Much as all of us regret it, the projected 1962 cost, \$579,040 will be higher than the \$490,000, 1961, and 1961 costs," he said.

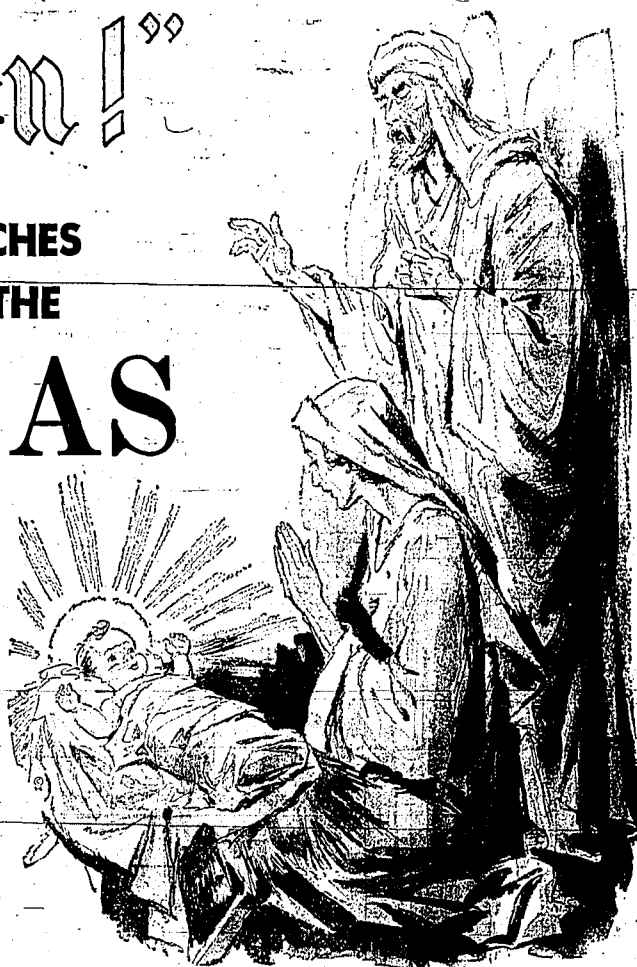

Markets Are Planning to Stress Pork

By The Associated Press
Pork gets the big promotional push in many supermarkets and neighborhood groceries this week. Regional favorites vary but recent ample production of porkers has pushed prices down over a wide area.

One chain's New York area stores offer pork chops at 75 cents a pound, a whopping 24 cents below a year earlier, and pork loins cut at 85 and 90 cents a pound, 18 cents under December 1960.

Smoked hams predominate in other areas of the Northeast and are popular in the Midwest. Other Midwestern pork specialties include roasts, chops and bacon, all of which also are featured in the Southeast.

Heavy supplies and lower than usual prices also keep turkeys and broiling or frying chickens on the special list in the South, east and Midwest, while fryers remain a good bargain in the Far West.

Eggs are seasonally plentiful over a broad area with the large size rated the best bet in the Southeast, Midwest and Far West. Eastern prices are 12 to 10 cents a pound below a year ago, with the biggest drop in poultry.

Produce counters also offer a good selection of bargains. Apples, grapefruit, oranges and tangerines are the top fruit items in most places, with the citrus season in full swing in the Southwest.

Limes and grapes also are in good supply in some sections. Cranberries remain plentiful and other good buys include avocados, coconuts, bananas and d'Anjou pears.

Deo Hunt gave a report on income tax deductions for underground water users. His talk was followed by an open discussion.

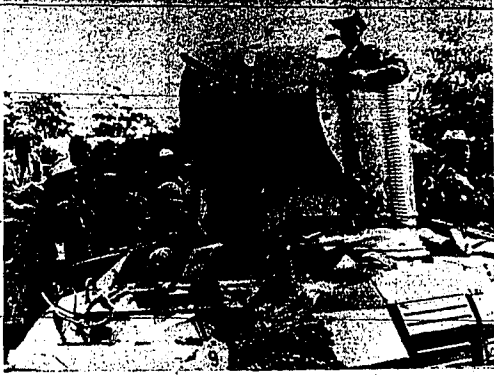

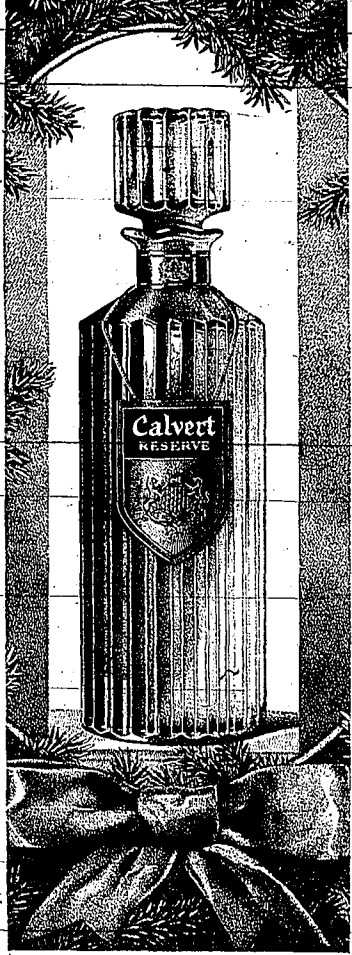

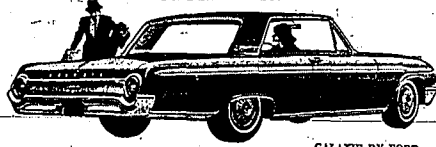
