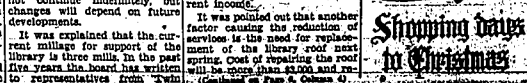

**NAM Official Warns Against U. S. Drift Toward Socialism**

**NEW YORK, Dec. 8**—The outgoing president of the National Association of Manufacturers warned today that if the "unconscious drift toward totalitarian control of the economy continues, Khrushchev's prediction that our grandchildren will live under socialism could come true.

John W. McGovern told the wind-up session of the NAM's 66th annual congress of American industry that neither the American people nor congress nor the administration desires socialism any more than did the previous Republican administration.

But, he said, "The drift toward centralized management has continued steadily under both our political parties, despite the earnest efforts of individual leaders in each to halt and reverse the trend."

Persons who press for more and more government intervention in the lives of individuals for the most part do not want socialism either, McGovern said. "They are basically planners who are convinced that they know

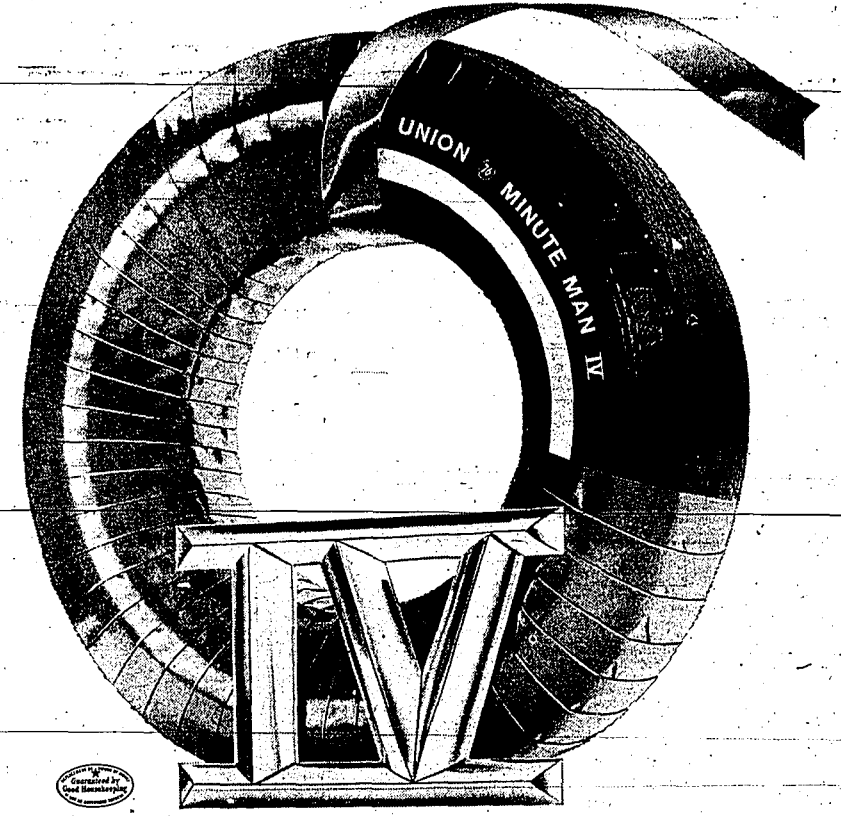

Library Trouble - When it's necessary to start curtailing service hours of a community library, it's time for the community to decide if it can afford shorter hours for its library.

The Twin Falls library board has been considering all possible economy in operation. The reduction of personnel, because funds just aren't sufficient.

Such is the case for the Twin Falls library. The maximum levy proposed by the millage rate is not been increased to keep pace with costs that have zoomed in recent years.

Next spring, the roof will have to be replaced on the present Twin Falls library building. The cost of the estimated \$43,000 to the library board in faced with the necessity of curtailing expenses here and there in anticipation of the necessary repair work.

That won't be the end of library problems. Architect Harold Gerger has outlined a remodeling program for the board. They include repainting the ceiling in the main reading room, revarnishing window stools, repairing outside windows and refinishing the front doors.

Even these problems might be classed as somewhat minor because the library has grown to the point where the present quarters are no longer considered adequate. The time will have to face up to problem of at least an addition to the present building.

Inasmuch as reading is the basic requirement for all education, it's time Twin Falls considered the plight of its library.

HOLIDAY PROJECT - If the annual Christmas basket program is to continue in Twin Falls, some sort of permanent arrangement is necessary.

Perhaps the present arrangement will serve to assure continuation of the program. Volunteers from the YWCA, Y and Scouts are taking over the work for this season. Their experience in the next two weeks will have a lot of bearing on whether the same setup will be involved in the project next December.

Any way, establishment of a permanent Christmas basket committee merits consideration.

Rep. Jackson E. Davis, R. O., made the statement in a speech at the annual symposium of the Tax Institute, Inc., here.

Criticizing current tax levels, Davis said total federal tax collections 20 years ago were 17 1/2 percent of what they are now, but doubted that government services are 11 times better.

### Step Closer

### Over Job Total

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—Administration officials were cited today over the first substantial improvement in the unemployment rate in a year.

The labor department reported yesterday that while total unemployment went up to about four million last month, the seasonally adjusted jobless rate dropped to 6.1 per cent of the labor force.

This compares with slightly more than 6.8 million jobless workers in October and a seasonally adjusted rate of 6.8 per cent for that month.

### Plant Blast Starts Fire In Utah City

**SALT LAKE CITY, Dec. 8**—A blast apparently caused by burning chemicals shattered part of a manufacturing plant here last night and touched off a major blaze during a snowstorm.

A chemical machine operator, whose name was withheld, suffered a severe leg injury when he was struck by a piece of machinery as it exploded. He was taken to a hospital and is expected to recover.

The plant, which is owned by a local firm, is located in an industrial area. The blast caused significant damage to the building and surrounding area. Firefighters arrived quickly and worked to contain the blaze.

The rules are designed to protect consumers from fraudulent claims about the effectiveness of fallout shelters. The commission stated that many sellers are making exaggerated claims about the safety and durability of their products.

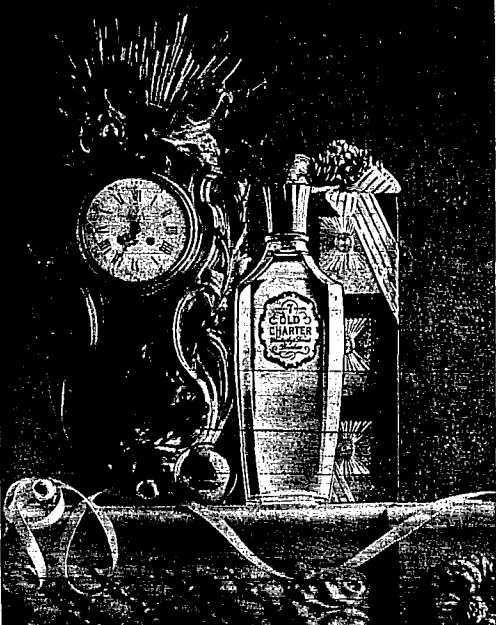

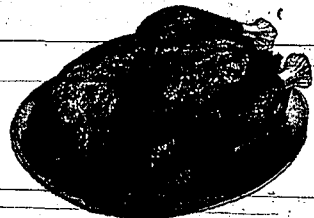

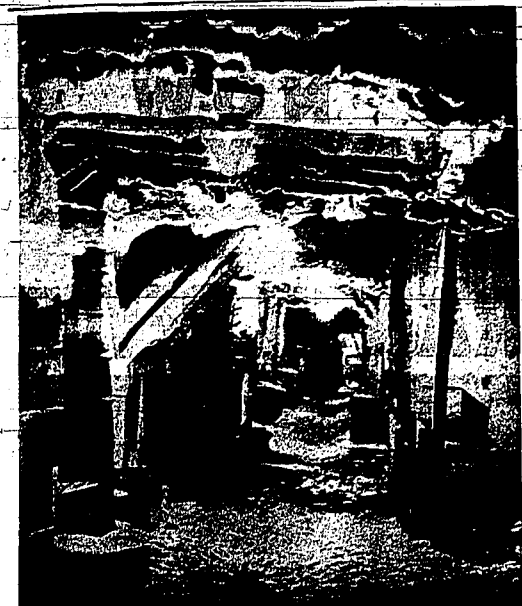

### "Plush" Surroundings at South Pole Would Surprise Original Conquerors

By FRANK GAREY  
SOUTH POLE STATION, (Circled) Dec. 8 (U)—The original conquerors of the South Pole might flip their fur parkas if they could see some of the goings on down here these days. Men like Norway's Roald Amundsen, whose expedition reached the pole on Dec. 14, 1911; the Englishman, Capt. Robert E. Scott, who was beaten by Amundsen only by a month, and even Adm. Richard E. Byrd, the American who first flew over the pole, might be aghast to find: Movies every other night at the lonely station. Hot meals in some of the buildings. An ice cream machine in the mess galley. And huge aircraft dropping supplies by parachute or letting down on an ice cap once secured to provide fuel for dogs. It took Amundsen's party of five explorers just short of two months to make the 80-mile overland journey from the Bay of Whales on the coast of the treacherous Ross sea to the pole, even though their tough Eskimo dogs sometimes made as much as 50 miles a day. Today, huge navy Hercules jet-prop, ski-equipped planes carry cargo and personnel to the pole from McMurdo sound—an airfield distance of 750 miles—in less than three hours. And great air Globemasters make a regular, roundtrip between the two points, air-dropping tons of cargo on each trip. The planes soar high above the scattered and heavily crevassed areas where Amundsen blazed the trail. Those pioneer explorers would still find some of the dangers they themselves faced—at least in potential form. Amundsen and his early followers would still find the extreme cold of the world's most frigid spot—with temperatures ranging down to 110 degrees below zero. And they'd see men working outdoors in them. At the station, the old miners would find a complex of buildings as well heated and almost as well lighted as a Manhattan apartment—a far cry from the tent Amundsen and Scott used for shelter. They'd even find dangers they themselves had not faced. Amundsen and Scott and many of their early followers faced death and danger on the trail. It's true. In fact, Scott and his four companions all died on the trail on their return trek from the pole. But as the modern pole station men could be killed by accidental explosion of hydrogen gas used to heat weather balloons. Mazes of electronic gear needed in weather, communications, cardiovascular physiology and even space travel research—present a constant fire hazard. An American flag, white on a 10-foot candy-striped pole which is topped by a silver globe. This flag marks the camp site. About an eighth of a mile away is a flagpole marking the South Pole itself—and about 20 feet from this is still another flagpole. The latter is used to accommodate foreign visitors who might want to raise the flag of their own countries—and have their home.

Freeman suggested that a delegation of the association's leaders visit him in Washington after the convention.

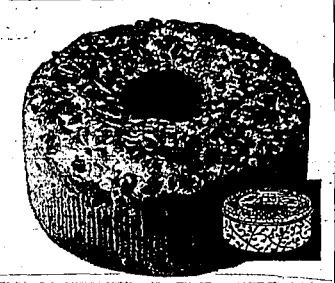

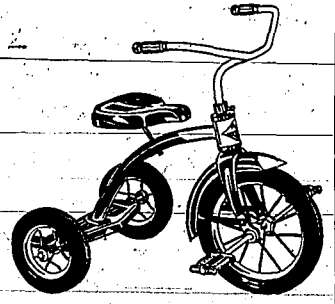

### Rendezvous In Space Is Latest Idea

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 6 (AP)—The space agency has announced plans last night to develop a two-man space craft capable of making a rendezvous with another vehicle while both are in orbit around the earth.

Cost of the program was estimated at about 500 million dollars, including about a dozen of the space craft, together with other rockets and equipment needed.

The national aeronautics and space administration said that a rendezvous in orbit is one way of carrying out manned operations on the moon; another way would be a direct flight using the huge Nova booster rockets now under development. NASA said both methods will be explored.

Robert Gilruht, director of special maneuvers, said NASA will negotiate with the McDonnell Aircraft corporation, prime contractor for the Mercury space craft, on a two-man version. He said the two-man craft will be of the same shape as the Mercury but will be slightly larger and will weigh two and three times as much as the present one-ton Mercury.

NASA announced Wednesday that the first attempt to send a man in orbit around the earth in a Mercury will be made next month.

### Petite WAVE First Woman For Sea Duty

OAKLAND, Calif., Dec. 6 (AP)—A trim, businesslike brunette boarded a ship today to become the first woman ever assigned to sea duty as a line officer of the U. S. Navy.

She's hazel-eyed Lieut. Charlene L. Sumner, 27, who recalled a cocktail party in San Diego. Miss Sumner, a WAVE for the past seven years, says she'll be assigned to the transportation division aboard the USS W. A. Mann.

Miss Sumner says she's more interested in military life than in a social life. She'll leave her navy career starting with a social life. "I was talking to a captain and I mentioned I would like to go to sea. And he said he could arrange it for me," says the trim officer.

She got a fleeting taste of navy life earlier this month on a radar plotter ship tied up at the pier at Sausalito. She emerged from the experience with confidence.

"I have met the captain of the Mann, and the executive officer. I'm sure everything will work out all right," she says.

Miss Sumner, a graduate of the University of Chicago, will have some training nearby during the long Pacific journey. Two nurses are assigned to the transport and many of the passengers will be women dependents of servicemen.

Is the lieutenant apprehensive about giving orders to men? "Back up," she brusquely ordered a news photographer who recently got a bit too close for some leg shots.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6 (AP)—Three young conservatives today variously described the American college as a collection of "hot-house liberals"—a "left-wing-brain-lab"—and "lack-of-in-patriotism."

The comments came from Scott Stanley, student at the University of Kansas; Roger Claus, a 1961 graduate of the University of Wisconsin; and William S. F. Center, national organization director of Young Americans for Freedom.

Stanley told the businessmen they were not active enough in fighting through the colleges to serve the free enterprise system.

Urging industrialists to "get in the hot seat," Stanley continued: "What text is being used in your schools? How many of you know how many of your sons or daughters since you sat down with someone of college age—or even your sons or daughters—and talked to them seriously about our system?"

"Young conservatives—through their conservative clubs—are now daring to say 'No.' You can help stop financing your enemies, and help us," he said.

Several farmers employed at the plant have worked there 10 or more seasons.

### Kennedy Administration Working on Farm Legislation for Coming Session

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The administration is hard at work preparing farm legislation it wants to put before congress early next year, possibly in a special message by President Kennedy.

Among the pressing problems are those concerning the poultry industry where production is high and income to farmers is low. Other problems concern cotton and long range feed grains and wheat programs. Any legislation on cotton, feed grains, and wheat probably would apply to the 1963 and subsequent crops, because the 1962 programs appear to be set.

The administration is expected to ask congress to remove poultry from the list of commodities now ineligible for marketing orders. Also sought would be permission to apply supply-management provisions in a marketing order for poultry. The form of marketing order would be of the producers' own choosing under a self-help program.

Members of a poultry industry advisory committee are meeting here in closed sessions to consider ways and means of pulling themselves and their fellow producers out of a financial bog. In greeting them, Secretary of Agriculture Orville L. Freeman asked them to "soak, feel, and take the way" to some workable solution of their problems of over-production and low producer returns.

Freeman said the poultry industry has done a fantastic job of organization, research, production and efficiency in providing the consumer with a fine product. The law in the picture is that producers aren't making much money. Freeman said many producers are being forced out of the wall because there is no rational movement from the producer to the consumer where-in the producer gets a fair return.

He told the leaders to "take the leadership—run with the ball."

In another pool, the group voted against any government controls on potato acreages. This was in line with action taken by other marketing groups throughout southern Idaho during the past few days, according to a group spokesman.

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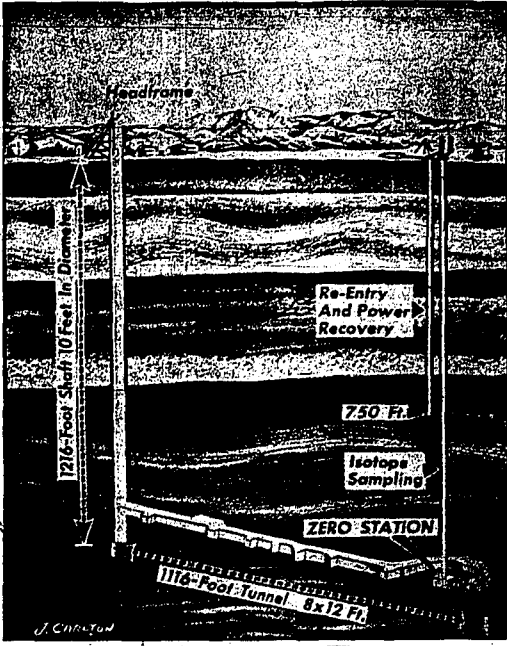

### Cigar Firms Seeking Havana Tang in Non-Cuban Tobacco

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 — What this country needs, according to some large cigar firms, is a good Havana cigar that doesn't come from Havana.

However, the agriculture department said today, there is a marked difference between what the country's cigar-smokers need and what they might get.

Some large firms, undoubtedly, are setting out to see if they can produce a non-Cuban Havana cigar.

What they want to do is make a cigar that looks like a Havana, tastes like a Havana and smells like a Havana, but isn't made of Cuban tobacco.

The agriculture department said in a statement that this may be difficult. "Most manufacturers of clear Havana cigars," it said, "say no other tobacco will suffice for these cigars."

"On the other hand," the department continued, "some large cigar firms are experimenting and making changing blends which may be feasible."

The department said that the production of the cigars produced in the United States contain Cuban tobacco "to a varying extent."

"It said that in recent years, U.S. cigar-makers have required about 135 million pounds of tobacco a year, of which Cuba provided nearly one-fourth.

### Talk by T.F. Surgeon Is Highlight Of Doctors' Meet in San Francisco

Dr. Fred T. Kolouch, Twin Falls surgeon, was a featured speaker for a meeting of surgeons last week-end at San Francisco. The following article written by Carolyn Anspacher appears in the San Francisco Chronicle.

Three hundred of this country's leading surgeons were warriors in a discussion that conversation can be as damaging to patients undergoing surgery as bacteria infection.

Dr. Fred T. Kolouch of Twin Falls, Idaho, told delegates to the Western Surgical Association that patients in deep anesthetic sleep are so susceptible to suggestion that, inadvertently, he has even sudden silences can quite literally send them to death.

Dr. Kolouch, who has been using hypnosis as an adjunct to surgical procedure for the last 18 months, said there is no question but that patients hear conversations while they are profoundly anesthetized and store the adverse comments away in their subconscious memories.

Dr. Kolouch, a member of the Idaho State Board of Medicine and chief of staff at Magic Valley Memorial hospital in Twin Falls, said many cases of motor collapse and heart arrests during operations have been generated by nothing more nor less than fear.

Dr. Kolouch said he was guilty some time ago of planting pessimism and resignation in the subconscious mind of an elderly woman on whom he was operating for cancer.

"In the hypnosis of anesthetic sleep, she heard me talk about cancer and assumed there was no hope for her survival," he said.

"She herself did not consciously realize this. But she was falling so rapidly, and for no medical reason I could discover, that I hypnotized her and she rejected all the very words I had said in the operating room.

"While she was in a hypnotic trance, I told her she had miscarried and she had miscarried and she had miscarried."

He reported he has employed hypnosis as an adjunct to routine accepted surgical and anesthetic techniques in 140 cases. In said 73 per cent of the patients in these cases benefited greatly from fear-alleviating suggestion.

Except for gastric and biliary surgery cases, he said, hospital stays were materially reduced, the need for pain-killers drugs was drastically cut and patients were saved money.

In this respect, he said, patients undergoing hernia operations averaged 1.2 days instead of three to five days in the hospital and saved an average of \$45 each, and those undergoing thyroidectomies were hospitalized only 2.6 days instead of five and saved an average of \$100.

Dr. Kolouch, who spins a huge loop on a chain as his hypnotic-inducing " gimmick," said respectfully that scientists are not spending enough time studying the patient and his psychic reactions.

Dr. Kolouch, whose techniques are not only accepted throughout the state of Idaho, but already are being emulated by nine other Twin Falls physicians, said the proper use of hypnosis is as

scientific as the maintenance for instance, of a patient's fluid balance.

He expressed hope that time would come when all operating rooms would have music piped in when hospital personnel will be trained in the use of positive fear-quenching suggestions.

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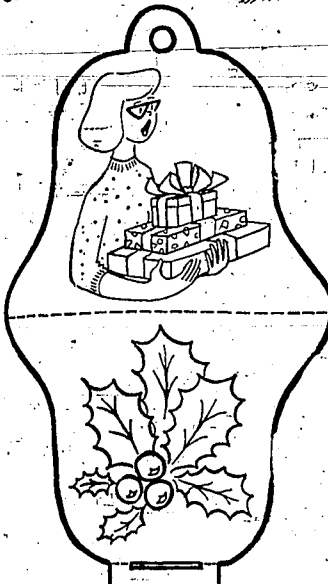

I took it up with the athletic commissioner before the fight and he said that the ring padding and would be tramped down during the preliminaries. When it was done, it was so soft that I had to do something during the preliminaries but nothing was done.

"3. Without permission from the commission, I was made to take movies of the fight. Only when I said my fighter would be taken did they agree not to use the camera. I could have made the pictures—but would have been a hard thing to do. The existence of the movies could have been proved, so they agreed not to take any more.

"I was told in advance that I should be careful in the selection of referees. I asked for a referee but I was assured by the commissioner that the man was a good man, a man of integrity.

"Anyone who saw the fight knows that Logan was bleeding like a stuck pig from the middle of the fight on, it became obvious by about the sixth or seventh round, when the commission doctor never even took a look at Logan's eyes, that all that was needed for him to win was to have him on his feet at the end of the 10th round.

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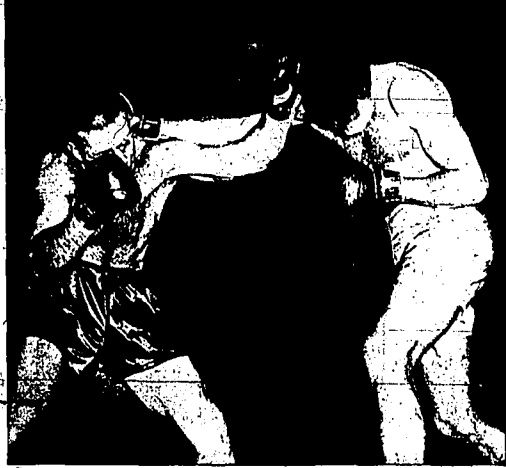

"On the other hand, I don't know if the movies are so different from other businesses today. Look at the auto makers. They all copy each other. Their cars look the same. When I was a kid, the cars had an individual stamp."

The actor, son of opera singer Alma Gluck and famed violinist Efrem Zimbalist, Sr.—director of the Curtis Institute of Music in Philadelphia—is a bitter paradox in the world of Hollywood.

To millions of TV viewers, he has become the symbol of the smooth, charming high-livers of Sunset boulevard. Yet he would rather never have become such a symbol, especially now that his feelings have deepened.

"I came here from the New York stage to be in movies," he said. "I was put under contract, and got the series against my screams. I've always wanted to be out of it."

At present, Zimbalist, a native of New York City, is appearing in "The Chapman Report," a movie adaptation of the best-selling book.

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## Fear of Creche Is Unwarranted

Why not decorate an outdoor creche this Christmas? Most people who shudder from lighting a manger outdoors because it seems like a big production. But it needn't be.

Old lumber or a large wooden crate may be utilized for building the creche, depending how much time is available for the project. If the crate is used, remove one of the long panels and use to create a manger-type roof. The standard length design one would use for a foot shed is the easiest and makes a good looking homemade crèche.

The creche may be any size. One that was four feet high, three feet wide and three feet deep seemed ideal when observed last Christmas. But smaller ones will be just as effective.

The hand-carved figures that one normally associates with the creche aren't necessary to the over-all effect. Small figures can serve as the Christ child, and he can be placed in a straw-filled or pine-filled doll's cradle or an orange crate.

The outside of the crate may be decorated with hay, pine boughs or leaves to hide its identity.

A small star may be set on the shed's roof.

Cut the traditional star shape out of pine, paint it and tack string lights to it with large staples before placing it atop the shed.

Even though you will need no more than the doll and the crib for your manger, additions may be made to it by rummaging through attic and cellar for remnants of models of figures of birds, cats, dogs or other animals.

If you can't achieve electric light effects in the area where you will put the creche, plug-in candles can give you good lighting. Put a small wreath on the back wall of the lean-to. Nail a candle holder to it. Track a reflector to the wall behind where the candle will be placed. Aluminum foil (which will not burn) can serve as a reflector.

# Liszt and Shostakovich Works Are on Same Record

**CONCERT**

Like Franz Liszt, Dimitri Shostakovich composed two piano concertos. That's a Godsend for record-makers — a concerto for each side of one record. Spraying the disk, both Liszt's No. 2 and Shostakovich's two are again newly available and one can only remark that one record is taking up makes a lot of Liszt- or Shostakovich.

The Shostakovich was recorded by Harry Truman's reputed favorite piano player, Eugene List (which is Liszt without the "s") with the Vienna State Opera orchestra. Victor DeSarmas conducted. Liszt plays the American premiere of No. 1 back in 1854 and the charm of his playing is his jaunty feisty air, both with the music as written and the musical rationale of the composer's instrumentation.

The Liszt two were recorded by the super-charged and somewhat moosey Frenchman, Benjamin Francoeur, with the Philadelphia orchestra, conducted in the vestri conducting. You can admire the technical brilliance of his playing (and these concertos require a lot of that) while being aware of his efforts to coax them with a less ripe romanticism than they are usually made to carry. These efforts please (Angel-580).

However, you may be persuaded that Liszt is more honored in this year's anniversary year of his birth, by a record of Vladimir Horowitz. It is called "Homage to Liszt" and Horowitz ransacked over his music, selecting pieces which have won very well. These include two of the Hungarian Rhapsodies, "Paganini's," two of the numbers from "Années de Pèlerinage" and the "Walse Opulente" (RCA Victor 2584).

## POPULAR

It has been about 10 years since autumn leaves began rustling across Roger Williams' piano keyboard. Now Williams' recording of "Autumn Leaves" is still with us.

While "Autumn Leaves" was his first big record, it is only one of Williams' many hits. Most of them have been heard on long-play record, "Roger Williams Greatest Hits" (Kapp KS-3200).

The versatility of Roger Williams, not only can be heard but told. He is soft and gentle with "Tummy Tummy" with "I Got Rhythm," nostalgic with "September Song," saucy with "Liza" and serious with "Tchaikovsky Piano Concerto No. 1."

Williams plays "Near You" with the Eddie Heyward touch in the brass but it's all Williams in the treble. Williams' version of "Around the World" is a noble tribute to the song's composer, the late Victor Young.

"Zino Stuart" (Goulette (R2518)) is an interesting record. It is not Stuart's first and it's not likely to be his last. Stuart seems to have unlimited power and perfect phrasing. His occasional lapse into New York diction and the tremolo in his window-making high notes indicates he is not quite ready for the Metropolitan Opera, but he belongs in a few years. This collection includes "My Heart Belongs to You," "All or Nothing at All," "Take My Heart," "Maria Maria" and six others.

## Hemingway Honored With Film of Early Years

MELLEN, Wis., Dec. 8 (AP)—Hollywood, which offended Ernest Hemingway in his lifetime with its adaptations of his works, is going all out to pay him posthumous tribute in a movie reddy will be an autobiography of his early years.

The picture, being shot here and in Italy, is entitled "Adver-

tures of a Young Man," and is based on 10 of Hemingway's "Nick Adams" short stories, which were inspired by the writer's experiences in growing up.

Friend Rose Script

And to give the film added authority, producer Jerry Wald has hired as chief scripter A. E. Hotchner, Hemingway's personal friend and adapter for television.

The Nick Adams stories were written by Hemingway for Esquire in the early 1920s and derived from his adventures in his home town of Oak Park, Ill., and in Italy, where he drove a Red Cross ambulance in World War I.

The only major stipulation Hemingway insisted on before granting rights to the movie, according to Hotchner, "is that there would be no attempt to magnify stories autobiographically." Officials at 20th Century-Fox have complied by not publicizing the film as Hemingway's personal story.

Said Hotchner, "Hemingway said Nick Adams bore the same relationship to him that Huck Finn did to Mark Twain. He was very definite in saying it was not the story of his boyhood."

"Verbatim Account"

"Over the years, of course, critics have said it is a rehashing account of what he did. And it is true that his early life paralleled the stories. He did live in a small town; he did summer at a lake near here; his father was a doctor; his mother a clubwoman; he did run away from home, and he did go to Italy to join the army. But he felt that by fictionalizing it, it was no longer autobiographical."

Hotchner verified that Hemingway was upset by criticism.

This country is the only one in which children's fashions steadily reflect adult fashions. This year, the kiddies will be turped out in tunics, chic little sandwich board popovers and pinafores.

There are even pants for tiny toddlers. No, not dungarees. These are chic. The crib set gets long pants extending in a complete footie shape like a kitten's face. Or like lace booties. There are even pastel leotards.

For little dresses, the fabrics are rich: velveteens in glowing colors, fine dacron batistes and novelty weave cottons.

## Teen Food Habits Surveyed

WASHINGTON, Dec. 8 (AP)—The agriculture department is concerned about the food habits of teen-agers, particularly girls.

Dr. Mary M. Hill, nutritionist for the department's institute of home economics, said studies show that food habits of youngsters are poor in comparison with the food habits of other age groups.

"Most of these young people will be parents in the next decade," the nutritionist said, "and many of the girls are not as nutritionally fit for the physical demands of motherhood as they could be."

This is the same group from which must come a goodly proportion of the armed forces and the nation's leaders in the uncertain years ahead, Dr. Hill said. Their creativity and productivity will depend, in part, on their physical and mental health.

Dr. Hill said nutrition problems among teen-agers are not confined to the United States. She said Canada is faced with similar problems.

## Clay Flower Pots Used as Room Divider

Looking for something new in the way of a room divider?

Why not try clay flower pots? The idea comes from Dell Doty, superintendent of forestry, parks and playgrounds for the city of Colorado Springs, Colo. He's not just talking about it, either. He has made this ingenious use of stacked red clay flower pots to build attractive space dividers for the lobby of the new parks and recreation department building in his city. And he thinks the same principle can be followed in making room dividers in the home.

The framework for the divider consists of one-inch hollow square sized tubing stock welded together to form a rectangle. The four dividers in the Colorado Springs building are eight feet high and vary in width, depending on how many rows of flower pots are used. Six rows of three-inch flower pots have been used in one divider, 11 in another, 17 in another and 25 in the other.

## Holiday Is Close as Contact Print

Here's the annual warning that Christmas is closer than a contact print!  
To some it means last minute preparations on a personal photographic greeting card. To others it's a reminder to get going on holiday shopping so that some photo fan will be delightfully surprised on Christmas day.  
And here are some new photo items which are being cashed for this Yuletide season:  
A built-in automatic panicking device for 8 millimeter cameras. In an effort to correct one of the amateur movie maker's worst faults—shaky panning—the "Power Pan" unit has been built into the base of their new camera. By pressing a button, it will automatically turn the camera steadily, evenly and at a correct speed through a 180-degree sweep. Since a flat, steady surface is necessary for the device to work a support must be included with every power-pan camera. It also will work with any tripod on a table or any firm surface. The camera also features an 1/18.10-element zoom lens with two-button control and automatic electric eye settings.  
A magnetic slide projector which "floats" slides into viewing position.  
About half the mechanical action of conventional slide changing is eliminated by introducing their internal magnetic system, say the makers of the Honeywell model 650 projector. It accepts all slide sizes which fit either 2 by 2 or 2½ by 2½ mounts. To be ready for automatic showing, steel clips must be attached to one edge of each slide before it is placed in the tray. They can be affixed to any cardboard, glass plastic or non-magnetic metal slide in all popular sizes. Any slides without the metal clip will be rejected during a slide showing.  
The projector's pushbutton remote control unit can focus, advance or reverse slides and throw a light on the screen to point out anything. It also features a unique optical system which designs to provide equal illumination efficiency for the various sizes of slides it accommodates.

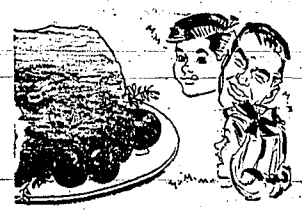
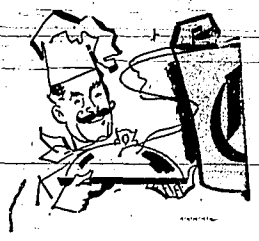

## RECIPE of the WEEK!

### Pork Birds

- 1 pound pork steak\*
- 1 onion
- 1 clove garlic
- 4 tablespoons salad oil, butter or margarine
- 1/4 cup chopped parsley
- 3 cups rye bread crumbs
- 1 egg, slightly beaten
- 1 can (10 1/2 ounces) consomme\*
- 1/2 teaspoon caraway seeds

Ask your Shelby's butcher to pound the pork steak thin and flat as possible. Now cut the very thin meat into 8 equal rectangles about 4x6 inches in size. Dust the slices with a mixture of flour, salt and pepper.

Chop onion and garlic fine. Cook in half the oil, butter or margarine in a skillet for several minutes. Lift out onion and garlic with a slotted spoon and combine with parsley, rye bread crumbs, egg, 1/2 cup consomme, and caraway seeds. Mix thoroughly.

Spoon a heaping tablespoon of the rye bread mixture on each piece of meat. Roll meat around the stuffing neatly and fasten with toothpicks. Heat remaining 2 tablespoons of fat in the same skillet. Add meat birds and brown on all sides. Put in remaining consomme over meat. Cover and cook over a low heat for about 30 minutes or until tender when tested with a fork. Serves 4 deliciously.
