### Ban Efforts Fizzle at U.S. Base Abroad

WETHERSFIELD, England, Dec. 9 (AP) — An attempt by ban-the-bomb demonstrators to breach the gates of a U.S. air force base here fizzled today, fewer than 200 showed up and found themselves outnumbered by servicemen and police. Thirty were arrested.

Demonstrators at two other U.S. bases also found hard going against tough police, who arrested 100 at one place, 10 at another.

The Wetherfield demonstrators, arriving by train at 11:30 a.m., and one-half mile away, had difficulty in reaching this NATO base. They thumbed lifts from sympathizers and walked through a gate for a few minutes. They were allowed to go up the drive only for three quarters of a mile to a point near the officers' mess, where they were met by strong police and royal air force cordons.

More than 1,500 demonstrators turned up outside headquarters of the United States Air Force at this base. The demonstrators were met by a British officer at the entrance. At the base, demonstrators in Oxfordshire based at Oxford university grounds arrived for a sit-down protest but

police picked off 10 parade marshals and the demonstration flopped.

Nowhere did the demonstrators achieve their objective of warning out to runways and halting jet-bound flights. There were nearly 200 arrests in Manchester at a ban-the-bomb demonstration there. Other protest rallies were held in the provincial centers of York, Cardiff and Bristol.

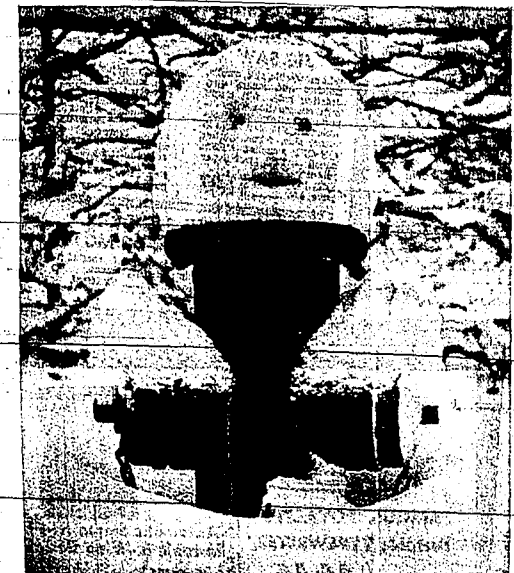

### T.F. Man Recalls Attack on Pearl Harbor 20 Years Ago

A vivid account of the attack on Pearl Harbor 20 years ago last Thursday was given by Richard Hansing, 143 Caswell avenue, in an interview.

Hansing was stationed aboard the USS Nevada on that Sunday morning when the Japanese plunged the United States into war.

He had just completed a four-hour watch and was eating breakfast when he heard a loud explosion directly above him. At the time, he stated, "No one seemed to know what had happened, there was a mass state of confusion." He added that it wasn't until he had gotten to his battle station and seen the Japanese planes that he knew the United States was at war.

He joined the navy on Nov. 9, 1920, and was sent to the USS Nevada a short time afterward. In 1941 he was promoted to fireman first class and worked in the engine room aboard the Nevada at the time of the attack.

### Operation in Congo Costs Ten Million

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Dec. 9.—The general assembly got the bad news today, it will have to continue paying out 10 million dollars a month to keep the U.N. Congo operation going.

A leading secretary-general U.N. Thant told the 160-nation world body that the blowup in Katanga made it impossible for him to estimate how high the Congo cost would run in 1962. But he made plain it would not go below the 10 million dollar mark for months to come.

"The lack of guiding the Congo operation becomes possible of achievement," Thant said in his 600-word message "only if I can count on the good will of member governments and especially their readiness to provide financial support."

Thant has been trying to drum up approval for his plan to float a 200-million-dollar bond issue to keep the U.N. out of bankruptcy until September when the next assembly convenes.

This would mean borrowing three times the amount of the annual U.N. budget. It results from refusal of the Soviet Union and other nations to pay a cent toward the Congo bill or for the U.N. emergency force in the Middle East.

The United States and six other nations have proposed that the world court be asked to rule on whether Russia and other nations have a right to refuse to pay their share of the Congo bill.

The United States, in addition to paying its Congo assessment of nearly 38 million dollars is contributing more than 13 million dollars to help defray 50 per cent or more of the assessments of the small nations.

### Plea for World Christian Unity Made by Pope John

VATICAN CITY, Dec. 9.—Pope John is about to announce the opening of the first ecumenical council in nearly 100 years, to begin in about a year—the publication of Pope John's encyclical in the Vatican's Osservatore Romano coincided with the conclusion of the third assembly of the World Council of Churches in New Delhi, which also was concerned with the problem of Christian unity.

Pope John is expected to invite the Roman Catholic church sent five observers to the assembly.

Pope John is expected to invite Orthodoxy and Protestant churches to send observers to the ecumenical council. It will deal primarily with internal affairs of the Roman Catholic church, but Pope John has expressed the hope that it would also prove to be a step toward Christian unity.

Leo I became a saint of the Roman Catholic church in his time he faced doctrinal heresies both in the West and the East while declining Roman empire faced the assaults of barbarian hordes. He was especially remembered for maintaining the unity of the church.

In his sixth encyclical, "Aeterna Patris," the eternal wisdom of God—Pope John called the great pontiff and called for union of the world's Christians to face modern perils.

Awaited for weeks, the encyclical was dated Nov. 11, in commemoration of the 15th anniversary of the death of Pope Leo in 461. His reign began in 440.

Pope John did not mention the word communism. But Vatican sources said the pontiff obviously also intended the encyclical a call to the world's Christians forces to band together against the threat of atheistic communism.

In his conclusion, Pope John said:

"May we be permitted to renew the most ardent wish that went forth from the soul of St. Leo; that is, to see all those redeemed by the most precious blood of Jesus Christ reunited in the same military church, retaining compactly and intrepidly the powers of evil which from so many sides continue to menace the Christian faith."

At another point Pope John implored:

"May the Lord deign that the dawn will soon rise of that blessed day of universal reconciliation."

Pope John's encyclical made it clear, however, that by Christian unity the Roman Catholic church still believes in unity, Pope Leo, who called an ecumenical council dedicated largely to Christian unity, also held that

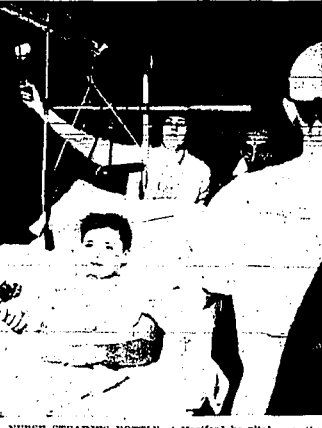

### Epidemic in Philippines Claims 300

MANILA, Dec. 9 (AP)—Government health authorities today appealed for world help to combat a cholera epidemic which already has claimed more than 300 lives in the central and southern Philippines. Elpidio Valenzuela, who termed the disease "cholera enterica," said his department has sought help of international organizations to check the epidemic.  
Valenzuela yesterday met with representatives of the United Nations International Children's Emergency fund, the Agency for International Development and the Committee on American Relief to Everywhere (OAREE), all of which pledged equipment and medical aid.  
President Carlos P. Garcia, at the same time, ordered the release of some 200,000,000 pesos (\$4,000,000) from the funds of the Philippine charity sweepstakes to help finance efforts to stamp out the epidemic.  
The death toll in the epidemic has so far reached 312, according to news reports today from southern Philippines provinces. In Samar province alone, 206 persons have succumbed to the disease.  
It also was reported that 558 other persons were stricken with cholera, including 40 athletes participating in an athletic meet in Iloilo province.

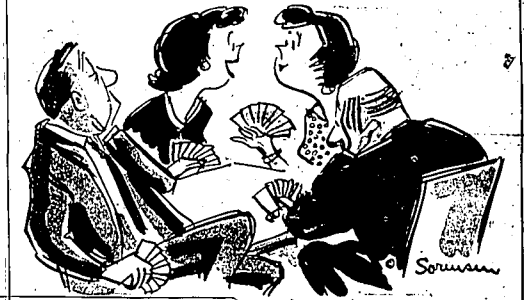

Brad Humphreys and Larry Kuykendall were the difference Friday night when the Bruins topped the Filer crew 41-33.

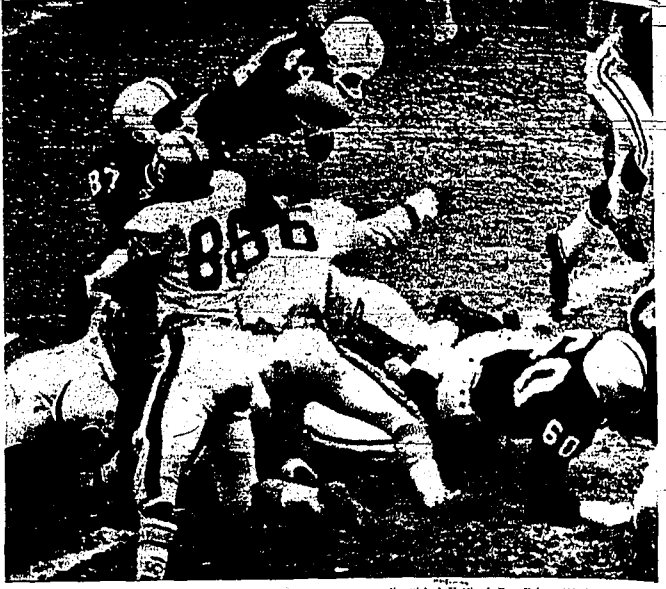

The first knockdown came early in the round as Fullmer sent the Cuban Kid staggering into a neutral corner, where Paret slumped down and sat on the lower rope.

Paret, succumbing to only his second knockout, weighed 162½. The brawl was started before the estimated 6,000 fans in the Las Vegas convention center. Fullmer, ahead all the way, finally polished off Paret with three knockdowns in the 10th, the last for the full count. 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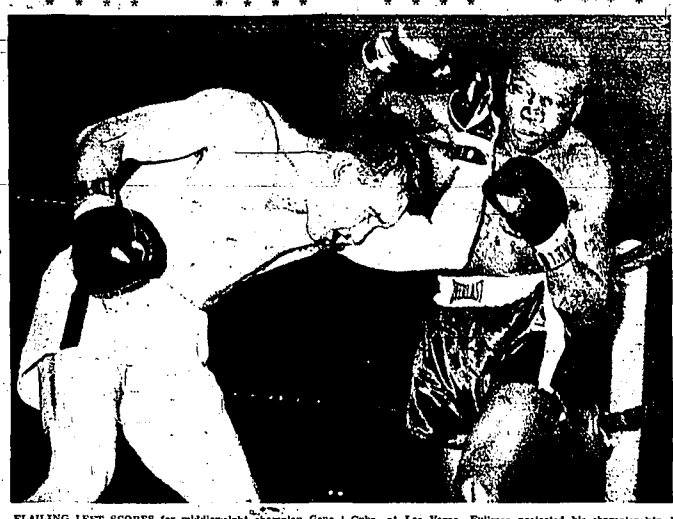

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# T.F. Scouts Building Emergency Telephone System for Residents

Members of Boy Scout troop 61 are working on an unusual community service project. It is an emergency field telephone system which will be available to the public when they have finished the construction.

The troop is led by Jack Coates, Scoutmaster, and D. R. Rogers, Assistant Scoutmaster. The boys started the project last spring and expect to finish it this winter.

They are using equipment from the old Buttil telephone exchange that was outdated when the company switched to the dial system. The main job is altering the original switchboard to a size that can be carried to a emergency situation. Rogers was in the army signal corps during World War II and is familiar with the system. He is supervising the work but the actual work is being done by the Scouts themselves.

By taking an active interest in the project, a Scout can earn up to three badges. They can earn their communications, electric and radio badges. Rogers says most of the boys have become interested in the work and have applied themselves.

Although the project was started in the spring, it was put aside during the summer months and only recently was resumed. The troop is sponsored by the Episcopal church and the boys meet on the second floor of the church on Monday evenings.

Since starting the project, the boys have cut their way through a maze of switches and wires and are learning how a field telephone works by taking it apart and then putting it together again.

It is rather an inexpensive project. The board was purchased from a junk dealer for \$10 and much of the other equipment they obtained through army surplus outlets for nominal prices. There will be 40 connections on the board, and the entire switchboard will be housed in a special box that the boys have constructed. It is about the size of an army footlocker.

The entire board will weigh about 65 pounds, according to Rogers. The troop already has about one and one-half miles of army surplus field wire to use. There are six telephones. The system operates by a 12-volt battery power.

Rogers explains he has divided the boys into crews to work on specific projects.

When it is finished it will be loaned to any group that needs such a system.

# AS YOUR MINISTER SEES IT

In the last few months there have been some exciting comments about funeral services. Some of these were found in articles in leading newspapers and magazines.



It has been said that a definition of civilization is the high cost of leaving. This definition has not been given to the funeral service. It is referring to money and its value, that while they are not die with them, they are concerned about it. Well, of course, afford it or not, we shall go. Life moves toward death and it is our faith, our ultimate belief about life, is tested.

Funerals are not with the few parades of the funeral services in our country. However, like a quarrel a little about some of the stereotyped events which have become a part of the funeral service and which, in my estimation, have no place in the service of remembrance. I am referring to the close of the services in which our morticians move with death-like speed and apparatus toward the casket and with reverent getturo open it for display. And then, a simple parade is made past the casket and in the end an atmosphere of death, not life, pervades.

Recently I attended a service in which the minister, in a sincere attempt to help support to the family in their time of great need, the day was excellent. It was brief; it expressed the heart of our faith in life after death and it left the atmosphere of eternal life permeating the church. But life was soon capped as the closing moment came. For here comes our friends, who have the last word in most of our services, and the ritual of death proceeds as the casket is opened and death is displayed. My personal plea is for the dignity of leaving the casket closed.

It is our faith in the triumph of life over death, not with the body, we will find that a physical display has very little place. Our casket in the church (and funeral home) should be closed in deference to our concern not with the body but with the soul. We look not at the things that are seen, but at the things that are not seen, but the things that

"Service of Remembrance" opening the casket, I do not want to put them out of work just out of a very unpleasant ritual which is unnecessary. Finally my appeal is to the ministers. Actually, I personally believe that the important part of the service is the spirit of God which we can share. A spirit of love, of concern, of deep understanding. And let us, with love, try to help them understand the value of something new and fresh in a service that has been with us since the death of Adam. We must not ask for change for the sake of change. But rather ask for change for the sake of meaning and new hope.

I recall a mortician who always said, "Eventually you'll die. I'm not sure I appreciate such honesty. But to the mortician, and my friends I would say, come and see me now for on the day of my funeral I'll not be there."

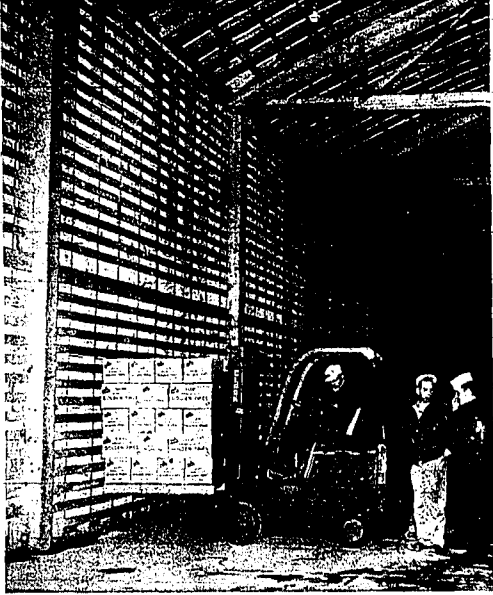

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### North Pole Building Completed by Potato Processing Firm at Burley

BURLEY, Dec. 9—The Ore-Ida processing plant has finished construction of its own North Pole—the huge cold storage plant that has been under construction on highway 30 west of Burley since mid-summer.

The new addition to the plant will double storage capacity. The addition will have a capacity for 24,000 square feet of storage, giving a total of 70,000 square feet. The plant started operation in September, 1960, and Otis Williams, vice president since by the first of 1961 more storage space was needed already.

The addition was started in July. About 45 company workers were employed in addition to workers employed by the contractors. About 30,000 cinder-blocks went into the construction, plus about 1,000 cubic yards of concrete.

Right now workers are putting finishing touches on the refrigeration system that plunges the temperature in the two storage units to between five and ten degrees below zero. Both of the storage areas are used to store frozen potato foods before they are shipped. An 80-ton freezing unit is needed to cool each warehouse.

Annual Waterfowl Inventory Shows Duck Count for Wintering Grounds

BY JIM HUMBLD Idaho Fish and Game Department — Idaho's duck and goose hunting season this year ends Dec. 10, and early the next morning the Idaho Fish and Game Department and other persons will make the annual statewide mid-winter waterfowl inventory.

The big hurry in getting on with the census, which actually is only an estimate of waterfowl remaining at the end of hunting season rather than a duck-by-duck count, is to get an approximation of numbers on the wintering grounds. Other states, such as Canada, complete their inventory within the same period, when there is little day-to-day shifting of waterfowl between areas. The Mexican census is usually made a week or two later.

In Idaho, the bulk of the birds, perhaps as many as a million or more, are expected to be counted in the southwestern part of the state. Very flat national wildlife refuges, more commonly called Lake Lowell, is the principal nesting area for ducks in southwestern Idaho. Other waterfowl concentration points are the states of Idaho, north Idaho, and the Snake River valley.

The main stem of the Snake River and its major tributaries, as well as some large waters in north Idaho, are included in the aerial count. There are swimmers in ft. fish and game officials note. ## Termites Cause Surprises, Most of Them Quite Costly

(Continued From Page 25) substance that is highly corrosive. This eventually will break down concrete and metal.

One of the main reasons termites are able to avoid detection for so long is because of their living habits. They work at night. For this reason they always work under cover, either in the wood or in spout tubes they construct to travel through in case they have to cross an area they can't bear through.

They are mostly seen when they swarm, and a colony swarms about twice a year. The colony. The termites work their house, by way of tubes.

An insect that feeds plenty of moisture to stay alive, termites working in the house must return to the colony every 14 to 20 hours just to get moisture. If they don't they will die.

When an exterminator rids a building of termites he blocks off the path back to the ground. This kills the termites in the building and sends the ones in the colony from entering the building.

Hansen says people tend to be more aware of termites during the summer, because that is when they swarm. He points out that it is during the winter that they make their initial installations in buildings.

He says this is because they are drawn to heated buildings. Central heating has a role in bringing more termites into buildings because the basements are heated. The termites feel this heat in the ground and move towards it.

Signs sometimes blamed on inferior construction — such as creaking floors, sticking windows and doors — may be indications that termites are undermining the structure of the home. Cracked plaster can be another indication.

But sometimes their desire to be hidden gives them away. Often when there is a crack in the wall, or along a seam, the termites will seal the crack to keep the light out. This can be detected, and they also leave such things as mud tubes, which are another indication.

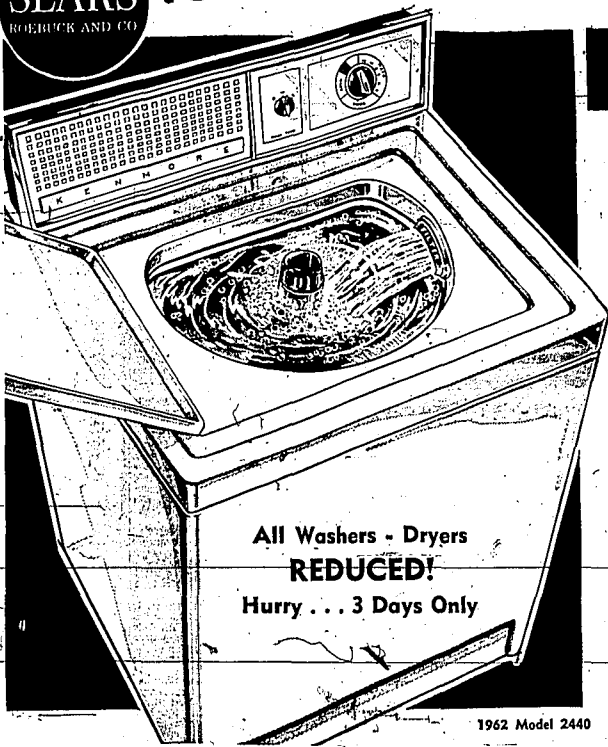
But even the most obvious signs sometimes are overlooked. The little tunnels they construct from one area to another — often are visible. But sometimes housewives mistake them for simple dirt and water stains on the wall of the basement and sweep them away — only to face them again the next day.

Hansen says this was the case in the Dietrich school. The tunnels were swept away until the janitor became suspicious and had the building inspected. His suspicions were justified.

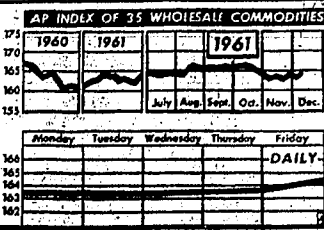
