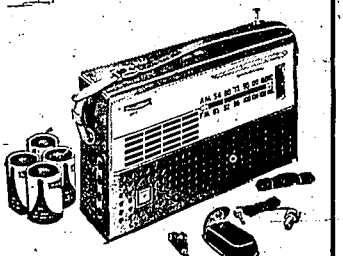

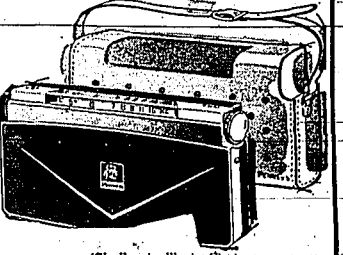

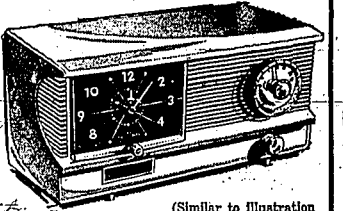

# Senator Says Idaho Should Pass Gas Law

BOISE, Dec. 11 (AP) — Sen. Henry Dworak, R., Idaho, has introduced legislation to encourage the state to collect gas taxes from the federal government.

Dworak said the U.S. awarded a contract to Phillips Petroleum Co. to build a plant in Idaho to produce synthetic gas. The gas then would be piped to the state, where it would be used at the test station, Dworak said.

Dworak estimated that state revenues at the full Idaho gas tax rate at the gas supplied at the test station would be \$100,000.

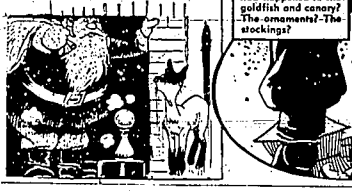
# American Writes Chessman Ballet

# Congo Conflicts Strain U.S. Relationship With Britain

LONDON, Dec. 11 (AP) — The bloody internal conflicts of the Congo have kept spreading until they now touch British interests in the United States, Britain's Central African federation is denouncing that the U.N. keep its hands off Moise Tshombe, the Congo-based Katanga president.

The federation includes the Rhodesia and Nyasaland.

Under considerable pressure, Britain reluctantly agreed to provide 24 1,000-pound bombs to Indian air force planes operating as part of the U. N. command to self-defense in Katanga.

The British government insists the United Nations has the right only to self-defense in Katanga. The risk, the British believe, is that if Katanga is driven into the arms of Premier Cyrille Adoula's central government, the Congo situation may be the ultimate winner. Gizenga holds the nominal position of deputy premier in the central Congo government.

### Speaker Says Forest Plans Will Conflict

**SALMON, Dec. 11**—The U.S. forest service in the middle of the controversy among various interests over use of forest lands—and that is exactly what the forest service should be. This view was expressed here by Floyd Herron, Utah, regional forester in charge of the Intermountain forest region. He spoke at the annual convention of the Idaho Outfitters and Guides association.

The various interests are bound to be in conflict on the ultimate use of forest land, and explained that under a congressional mandate in the multiple use of 1960 the forest service's middle position "the only position we can take if we are to discharge fairly and squarely our responsibility to all parties who want to use these public properties."

Herron did not mention the wilderness bill which is now before congress. But he defended the concept that multiple use doesn't necessarily mean that all forest lands everywhere should be opened to all uses equally. He pointed out that some areas may be better suited for a particular type of use.

"Multiple use," he said, "in no means an assemblage of single use. It requires conscious coordinated management of the various renewable resources, each with the other without impairment of the productivity of the forest."

### Tower Blasts Labor Ruling On Swimming

**WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Dec. 11**—Sen. John Tower, R., Tex., accused the labor department of "un-American activities" in its calculated harassment of the Mexican farm labor (bracero) program to force farmers to use unlicensed labor.

He also accused the Kennedy administration of "un-American activities" toward socialism and collective farming.

The charges came in a telegram he sent last night to Secretary of Labor Arthur Goldberg. "Tower was angry because the labor department ultimatum" to the city of Slaton, Tex., to open its municipal swimming pool to unlicensed labor was on the black list as a community eligible to hire braceros.

"I was shocked and indignant," he said, "and I am shocked and indignant to find the action arbitrary, arrogant and dictatorial, and call on you to order the ultimatum rescinded and withdrawn and take such disciplinary measures as are appropriate under the law."

The labor department gave the city Slaton 30 days to order a halt to discrimination at the swimming pool, which is now closed for the season.

The order was in a letter signed by Tracy O. Murrell, director of employment security for the department's regional office in Dallas.

"I explained he had no choice because of terms of an agreement between the United States and Mexico that profits of workers cannot be put into any area where there would be discrimination because of nationality or ancestry."

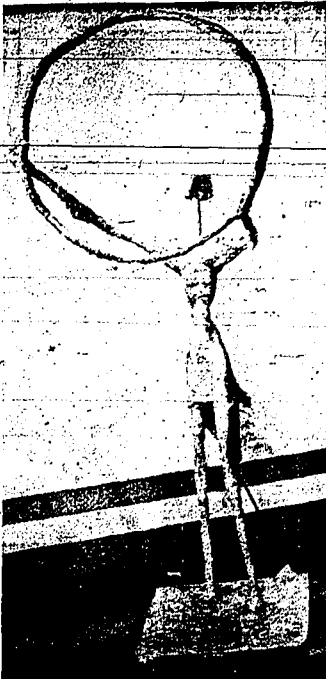

**BUFFALO, N. Y., Dec. 11**—When the members of the Zonta club's committee on the statue of women were told by the city's department to go ahead and get artists' proposals for a statue depicting "the spirit of womanhood," they invited four artists to submit models.

Larry W. Orsini, a sculptor and art teacher, won.

What followed shouldn't happen to an abstract dog.

Orsini worked his proposal up in a wax model two feet high. The final version in bronze will be 12 feet high.

It isn't easy to describe. It's an elongated figure—thin, you'd have to call it. There's this sort of latticed skirt, like Daisy Mae's. The figure is holding aloft a giant hoop.

"Exciting," said Parks Commissioner George W. Martin, who commissioned it after getting articles' opinions that supported the Zonta club committee's choice.

"Great possibilities," said Gordon M. Smith, director of the Art Gallery.

"Hideous," said Albert Chestnut, one of hundreds of citizens who ranted their opinions to local newspapers last week.

"Where in the terminal stage of a dental and waxing of the," said another, Mrs. J. H. Egan.

But to Art Hagan, still another letter writer, it had a message. "Reminds me of my first wife's mother," he said.

The uproar pulled the project up short. The Zonta club planned it as a memorial for the late Marian De Forest, playwright and radio script writer who founded the now National Women's Service club here. Wilkes Circle, a Northside street intersection, was selected because funds for its development were left to the city by the late Clarence Wilkes, business and political leader. earmarked for "girls' commission," is worth \$60,000.

But residents of the area are in the forefront of the protest army. Now the city planning board will get the issue, and already has served notice it will have no part of the artistic imbroglio. It will only pass on the suitability of the site.

And how does all this affect Orsini himself?

"If we put up a figure everybody understands and like, people would just look at it and say, 'Uh-huh, they got the statue up. That's nice.' But if you put up a controversial piece, you've got people thinking."

**Solon Claims Idaho Cattle Industry up**

**WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 11**—Production of beef in Idaho in 1961 is expected to reach an all-time high, Congressman Orville Friesel predicted today.

Idaho's first district congressman said that livestock catches slaughter in the state will reach an estimated 215 million pounds this year, compared to 206.6 million for 1960 and 177.2 for 1959.

"These figures, based on agriculture department estimates," he said, "certainly reflect an upturn in our farm economy and serve as a hopeful indicator for the future, since cattle is a major Idaho industry."

Figures for the January to October period for 1961 show cattle slaughter in Idaho at 176,200,000, or roughly five million pounds ahead of the same period last year, she noted.

### Belgians Hit U.N. Katanga, Congo Policy

**BRUSSELS, Dec. 11 (AP)**—An estimated 1,000 Belgians demonstrated in Brussels today against the United Nations action in Katanga.

The marchers, carrying banners and posters saying "United Nations Murderers," "Thank Killer—Kennedy to the Gallova," "Long Live Thomas" and "United Nations Kill Peace," marched around the city center toward the tomb of the unknown soldier and the King Albert monument where they held rallies.

The demonstration was organized on the anniversary of the U. N. Human Rights declaration and sponsored by the Katangese Friendship Association.

Several hundred demonstrators marched to the U. S. embassy in Brussels, shouting "U. S. Assassinate U. N. Genocide." Some demonstrators fought with policemen near the embassy.

### Aide Predicts Gold Outflow Rise in 1962

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 11 (AP)**—Treasury Secretary Douglas Dillon expects the U. S. gold and dollar drain dollar outflow to increase in 1962 to between two billion dollars and five billion dollars.

Although this would be higher than the estimated 1961 balance of payments deficit of more than 1.7 billion dollars, Dillon is saying in private conversations the U. S. has no concern for a sharp increase in the deficit of the preceding three years, each of which exceeded three billion dollars.

Moreover, he is confident that long-run influences are working in the direction of further reductions in the deficit, with the possibility that it can be wiped out entirely within a few years.

Conservative of this opinion is the expectation of large sales of U. S. military supplies to other countries.

The defense department also is considering use of German army personnel in operating U. S. military depots in Germany, which supply troops of both nations. This would reduce U. S. costs of maintaining the depots.

West Germany already has agreed to purchase some 500 million dollars to 600 million dollars worth of American military materiel a year. The French have said they want to buy unspecified amounts of U. S. B-made aircraft, electronics equipment and other items. U. S. officials plan to talk to the Italians about similar sales.
