BLISS, Dec. 12 — It costs the state \$720 a year to maintain a pupil in school compared to \$42.17 for a juvenile who gets in trouble with law, members of a panel pointed out at a joint meeting Monday night of the Twin Falls school board and the Wendell Citizens' committee.

Butler, chairman of the local committee, moderated the panel at the Bliss school. Participating were Wendell citizens, members of the school board; Camden Meyer, superintendent of Minidoka county schools, and the state board of education.

It was stressed that any school is only as good as its teachers and parents are. Responsibility for education for their children. They also should see that teachers are qualified and adequately paid.

The speakers noted the cost of the school for the young person who has to face society and earn his living in a competitive world.

To be better able to equip himself, a larger and more efficient school is needed.

Consolidation of the three schools into vocational centers could be offered for those who do not attend college.

It was pointed out pupils will adjust to consolidation much easier if they are not prejudiced against the present time.

It was also noted that some college freshmen from high school is a major contributing factor.

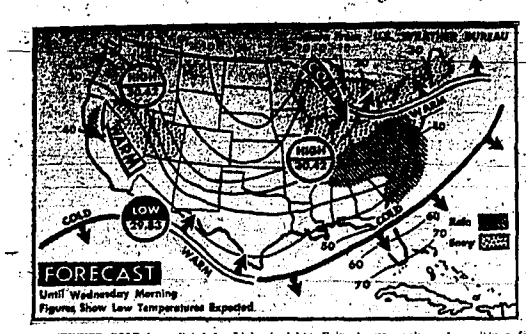

# NATIONAL WHIRLIGIG

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 11**—The central intelligence agency is embarrassed over Cuba again, and this time the embarrassment is shared by some of the older CIA hands, since the agency is still smarting from its part in the Cuban revolution. Moreover, its new director, John A. McCone, is in the process of making some drastic changes in policy and personnel.

CIA's latest headache stems from Finland's disclosure that he is and has been a Marx-Lenin Communist. Although he has not disclosed this fact during his long struggle for power,

**FELL FOR CASTRO**—Why should this bring blushes from CIA? Because on Nov. 5, 1959, 10 months after Castro went to Havana, the CIA, under the leadership of CIA Gen. C. P. N.Y., pointed out recently that Chester Bowles, as now a man in the state department at the time, was an article in "Communist," a New American magazine, in which Bowles said: "It is anyone's guess whether or not Fidel Castro is 'an agent' of the Soviet Union."

### 13 Arrested For Plot on Jap Leader

TOKYO, Dec. 12 (U) — Police today claimed "to have smashed an ultra-rightist plot to assassinate Prime Minister Hasegawa and other leading members of Japan's pro-American government. Thirteen men were arrested and weapons and uniforms seized in previous raids. Police said the conspirators planned mass murder because they felt Hasegawa's government was responsible for preventing a communist revolution in Japan. Authorities said a Japanese industrialist apparently financed the plot.

Lt. Arata is 90 per cent comatose, police said, and an attempt is being made to learn if there is a man behind the scenes. Daidai Imoto, chief of public safety, said the conspirators were given a spur by the success of the South Korean military junta that took over the South government in May. Unconfirmed reports circulated that the plan called for attempts on the life of Hasegawa and cabinet members and bomb attacks on police headquarters, the giant Sanyo labor union and communist party headquarters. Officials said the 13, who included a previous convict, tried to win over members of the nation's 20,000-man self-defense force but failed. Police raiders in Tokyo and at various places on the island of Kyushu in southern Japan seized rifles, gas masks, swords, belts and work uniforms of the type worn by the self-defense force.

The raiders had their activities being a study group known as the Society for Japanese History and financed by Toyokazu Kawamura, 50, president of Nishikawa and Kawamura Industries company. Three hundred belts and 150 gas masks were found in his Tokyo home.

### Lamb Dealers Plan to Halt Buying Move

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (U) — The use of a telephone answering service by physicians was cited today as a major factor in the tragedy of a 4-year-old boy who died while police tried for an hour to reach emergency doctors.

Dr. Robert H. Niebling, health director for Eastern Suffolk county, said he reviewed the "interposition" of answering services between doctors and patients and has three other physicians who said they charged in a complaint under the packers and stockyards act.

The department identified the dealers as Dwight L. Heath, Lamar, Colo., and Perry Holby, Eden. They were ordered to cease and desist from:

1. Agreeing to refrain from bidding on cheaper lambs against any competitive lamb or sheep buyer.
2. Arranging with any competitor concerning the prices to be paid for sheep or lambs.
3. Purchasing sheep or lambs under any such arrangement.
4. Entering into a relationship with any sheep or lamb buyer which has the effect of limiting competition between them.

The two dealers were among 12 firms charged in September with engaging in practices which had the purpose or effect of manipulating lamb prices. Holby, doing business as Perry Holby company, and Heath, as Harry Heath and Son, neither admitted nor denied the charges. They waived oral hearing and consented, for settlement purposes only, to the issuance of the official return.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP) — Representatives of the domestic sugar industry meet here Dec. 13-14, reportedly to hear suggestions from government officials for a change in sugar policy by the United States. 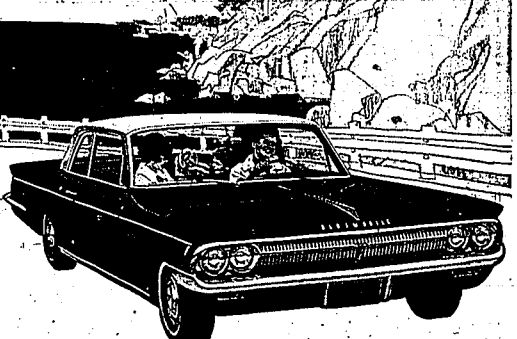

# Leaders Say Court Order Not Problem

By The Associated Press Southern officials generally found little, if any, significance in the U. S. supreme court decision overturning the conviction of 16 all-in demonstrators, but Negro leaders viewed it as the dawn of a new day for their race.

Jack Greenmill, attorney general of Louisiana where the trial originated, said it seemed to him Monday's unanimous ruling was based merely on grounds of lack of evidence.

"The constitutionality of Louisiana's so-called all-in laws has not been passed on and so far as the state is concerned, they are valid legislation," he said.

The Negroes, all students of Southern university at Baton Rouge, were convicted under a Louisiana law making it a breach of the peace to "act in such a manner as to unreasonably disturb or alarm the public."

Chief Justice Earl Warren, who delivered the court's opinion, said evidence was sufficient to prove the demonstrators "disturbed the peace, either by outwardly boisterous conduct or by passive conduct likely to cause a public disturbance."

The ruling left unanswered broad constitutional questions raised by the all-in, including freedom of expression and equal protection.

"THE SOUTHERN REGIONOM Council, a biracial group with headquarters in Atlanta, estimated 2,000 all-in demonstrators have been arrested in the South in the past two years. It figured "Freedom Riders" arrests at 500.

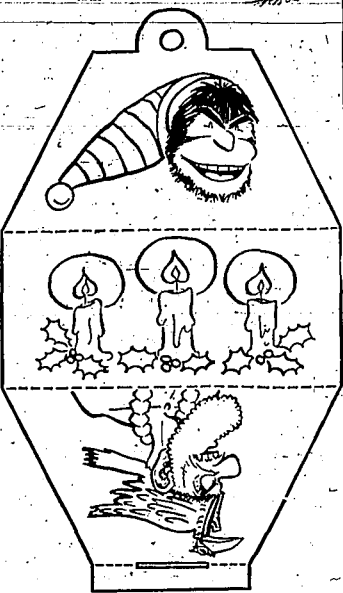

# Israeli Court Ends Recital Of Document

JERUSALEM, Dec. 12 (AP)—The special Israeli court concluded the reading of its judgment on Adolf Eichmann today with a summary finding the former Gestapo colonial guilty on all 15 counts of an indictment handed down last April.

Judge Benjamin-Halevy concluded the reading of the 300-page judgment on the second day.

"He who delivers a soul for extermination bears a legal and moral responsibility even greater than he who does him to death," he declared.

This harsh indictment was written into a section of the opinion which explored how Eichmann rounded up millions of Jews and meticulously conducted the complex task of transporting them to the death mills.

Monday Eichmann was found guilty of crimes against the Jews, crimes against humanity, war crimes, and membership in hostile organizations.

### Publicity-Shy Idaho Groups Form Anti-Red Study Cells

BOISE, Dec. 12 (AP)—A political information movement, born of cold war tensions and Communist infiltration such as W. C. Brown's "The Naked Communist" except for a few rooms.

It has no apparent central organization except perhaps in one or two areas. Financial backing comes primarily from a one-time Communist Party member who the money is spent on supplies, it is publicity-shy and has no formal organization.

But it has one primary motive, any those who are in it: To fight communism and its agents in the community by acquainting the man on the street with what communism is and why it is dangerous.

The movement began in the Wallace-Kellogg area about 10 years ago when a group of businessmen banded together to form the Shoshone County Anti-Communist association and learn professional, political and church organizations had to prevent it.

They are urged to take an active part in their own communities in the form of "study groups" and "study cells" which they already being and to tell their elected representatives and officials their views on communism.

From a publicity standpoint, these study groups are sensitive. One active in the work said she was told not to talk to newsmen about the work.

"We've had a bad press in some parts of the country and we don't want it here," she explained. "We don't want to be listed as 'crackpots'."

"We haven't got a closely-knit association, either," she added, "because we don't want to be infiltrated. When you have centralized organizations it's often easy for communists to move into the policy-making end and start issuing edicts from headquarters."

Primarily, those attending the anti-communist study classes are urged to keep themselves with facts and figures so that when they speak out against communism they will have a solid foundation and not just a hazy fifth amendment but not against

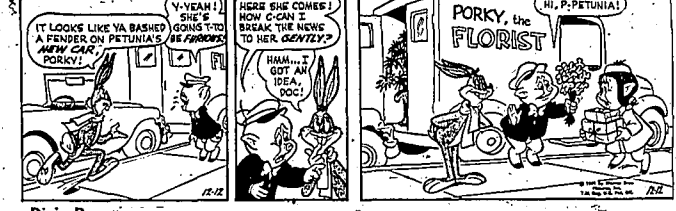

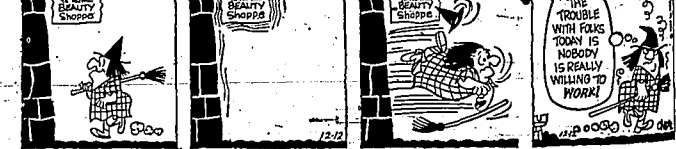

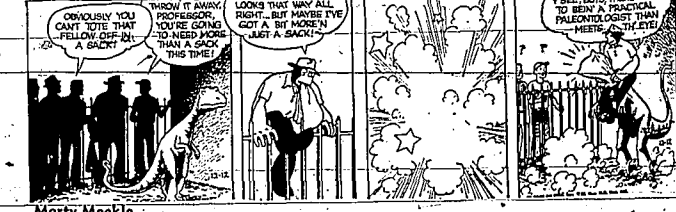

## North States Have Higher Alcohol Rate

WASHINGTON, Dec. 12 (AP)—America's highest rate of alcoholism is found in the northern states, according to a new study from Maine to North Dakota.

But remarkably little is known about the drinking habits of the American people.

These two conclusions were offered yesterday by Dr. Milton Silverman, director of medical research for California's Wine Advisory Board, at a news conference on the medical uses of wine.

Silverman said wine had proved effective in the treatment of certain types of diabetes; for the post-surgical treatment of patients who have had stomach operations; for obesity, loss of appetite, and, in a very special way, the treatment of chronic alcoholism.

But Silverman, a biochemist and pharmacologist, said wine's most important contribution was as a "type of psychological vaccination against the disease of alcoholism."

The scientist said the rate of alcoholism was lowest in countries and racial groups where wine was taken with the meal and considered as normal as a piece of bread.

## Tests Sought

COLUMBUS, Ga., Dec. 12 (AP)—Sen. Richard B. Russell, D-Ga., says he is so concerned over whether U. S. nuclear weapons actually will work that he wants testing resumed in the atmosphere.

"We don't know, actually, if an intercontinental ballistic missile will work with an atomic warhead," he said Monday. "We've never tried one."
