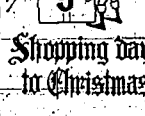

## Death Asked

JERUSALEM, Dec. 13 (AP)—Attorney General Gideon Husner today asked the death penalty for Adolf Eichmann.

Husner made his demand at the start of the 120th session of the trial in which Eichmann was found guilty of 15 counts of helping to carry out the Nazi campaign of exterminating six million European Jews. Twelve of the counts carry the death penalty.

The special three-judge court pronounced Monday after a long recess to prepare its verdict. It pronounced him guilty immediately, and then spent two days reading its reasoned arguments for the verdict.

With that out of the way, the state demanded Eichmann's life. In the heavy hush of a courtroom jammed to capacity, Husner said:

"I demand the death sentence as the only possible penalty for the person who headed the whole anguinary apparatus."

**Safety Urged In Atom Test At Idaho Site**

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13.—Proposed destruction of a nuclear test reactor in eastern Idaho to enable scientists to study the reactor is being opposed by a group of scientists who say the reactor should be done safely, Gen. Henry Dworkahak, R. Ida, said Tuesday.

Dworkahak said the proposed test involves an experimental reactor at the National Reactor Testing station near Idaho Falls, which will be allowed to run until it partly destroys itself, so that scientists can study the results in the interest of safety, Dworkahak said.

Dworkahak said he had urged the atomic energy commission to give assurances that the experiment would be conducted safely.

President of the Idaho Institute of Engineers, H. H. Thome, said, has expressed fear over the experiment.

"This is the first accident which occurred at the Idaho installation last January, there is widespread concern over the proposed destruction of the reactor, which may endanger the lives of civilians in eastern Idaho," Dworkahak said in a letter to the AEC.

Dworkahak said the AEC assured him that a complete safety study would be prepared for the test and will be thoroughly and independently reviewed before the authorization to proceed is granted.

# Kennedy Sets Six Speeches In Brief Trip

WASHINGTON, Dec. 13 (AP)—President Kennedy will cover 370 miles by plane, helicopter and automobile in his week-end trip to Florida, Louisiana, Mississippi and Colombia.

He also plans to work in a half-dozen cities in the fast, tight-knit journey.

Two major addresses are to be delivered at an agrarian forum site outside Caracas, the first stop on Saturday afternoon, and at the San Carlos stadium in Bogota Sunday night.

Kennedy has allotted time for press talks with his hosts, President Romulo Betancourt of Colombia and President Alberto Lleras Camargo of Colombia.

In both South American nations, Kennedy will discuss the peace and development projects of the Alliance for Progress—the chief executive's 10-year program for U.S. cooperation with Latin America in economic and social development.

Traveling with Kennedy will be 100, including Mrs. Kennedy and Chester Buzbee, Kennedy's special adviser on African, Asian and Latin American affairs.

# Gen. Walker Slams Foreign Policy, Military Censorship

DALLAS, Tex., Dec. 13 (AP)—Former Maj. Gen. Edwin A. Walker sharply criticized the United Nations, U.S. foreign policy and censorship of the military Tuesday night in his first public address since becoming a civilian.

He addressed a cheering crowd, estimated by a Dallas Memorial auditorium employe at 5,600.

"I welcome the opportunity to stand before you as a symbol of the capability to coordinate the inspired and unchallengeable power of the people with the strength of our military forces. Such unity of purpose and spirit would cause an immediate expunction of reds and pinkies from Dallas to Moscow and Peking," Walker said.

The 51-year-old Texan, who resigned from the army after being reprimanded and relieved of command of the 24th Infantry division, was interrupted frequently with standing applause.

Walker referred to army charges that he had criticized high government officials and attempted to influence the votes of soldiers in a right-wing indoctrination program.

"I have been charged with nothing. I have been found guilty of nothing. I have been punished for nothing. I have no grievances or regrets," Walker said.

U.S. decisions. Under these conditions, the oath becomes falsified and fictitious. I could no longer receive my uniform and be a collaborator with the release of our sovereignty to the U.N."

Walker said censorship of the military had accomplished three goals of the communists—to reduce the size of U. S. armed forces, limit their use of weapons and undermine their training, morale, and sense of purpose.

# Rockefeller Denies He'll Quit Politics

**NEW YORK, Dec. 12 (AP)—** Gov. Nelson A. Rockefeller—shaken in recent weeks by the tragic disappearance of his youngest son and by his impending divorce—vehemently denied Tuesday night a published report that he plans to leave public life.

In a statement authorized through his press secretary, the governor said he plans to complete his current term and to run for reelection next fall. Rockefeller scheduled a top-level Republican conference in Albany on Dec. 27 to map 1953 campaign strategy.

Republican leaders in the state backed up the governor's statement.

The copyright story Tuesday night in the New York Daily Mirror said the governor had informed top GOP leaders of his intention not to run, but in the end of the possibility he might resign even before his term ended.

In two subsequent editions, the News also published Rockefeller's denial.

The News said Rockefeller's decision was based on the belief his impending divorce from Marion would make it all but impossible, even if he gains the Republican nomination in New York, to face the election in 1954.

The News said Rockefeller is determined still to keep his job, but the tragic loss of his adventurous 22-year-old son, Michael, last month in St. Quire.

# Persuasion Is Eyed on Trade Plan

The Kennedy administration is approaching the common market, a European economic pact, with the prospect of persuasion from the standpoint of persuasion—perhaps eventually a persuasion—but with definite signs of persuasion—perhaps even persuasion to persuade.

There is an understanding of one thing—whether it is any persuasion or a general understanding like a general understanding that the hard to say. There will be new European needs and attitudes, and some of them will run counter, as some of them now run counter, to the habits and needs of the United States.

A situation will be created in which the capitalist world will have the potential for self-determination which is what the communists always have predicted.

At the same time, properly channeled, the capitalist world will have the power to defeat all challenges to its progress.

## Trade Sought

BERLIN, Dec. 13 (AP)—East German Trade Minister Julius Bolkow said yesterday that his country wants to expand its trade with capitalist nations.

Bolkow said the campaign to make East Germany's economy independent of western raw materials does not mean it is interested in trade with West Germany and other western nations.

# OSCAR Greets Radio Hams; Off-Shoot of U. S. Satellite

VANDENBERG AIR FORCE BASE, Calif., Dec. 13 (AP)—OSCAR, a 10-pound radio robot, is greeting the world, beeping "hi" to radio hams from Byrdland, Antarctica, to Kodiak, Alaska.

OSCAR—short for Orbiting Satellite Carrying Amateur Radio—was launched Tuesday aboard a Discoverer satellite and about 90 minutes later was transmitting the four dots and two dashes that spell "hi" in Morse code.

The Discoverer 36 satellite also carried its usual cargo—a capsule of secret instruments that will be ejected within a few days. The air force has plans ready to meet the capsule as it parachutes near Hawaii—a feat achieved seven times to date. Three other capsules have been lifted from the ocean.

Most of the attention is centered on OSCAR—carried aloft in the rocket's tail in place of ballast. The capsule is in the nose cone.

OSCAR, the world's first satellite built entirely by private citizens, will transmit for about 30 days, or as long as its batteries last.

It was conceived and built by space engineers whose hobby is tinkering with short-wave radio. Project chairman M. C. Towns of Gunnville, Calif., said this was the first time a satellite has transmitted on the international amateur frequency of 14.5 megacycles.

The air force has no official connection with the project.

Project sponsors say future OSCARs, if approved by the air force, could open up new lines of communications in national emergencies.

All the world's amateur radio operators—about 300,000—have been invited to help track OSCAR.

OSCAR was ejected on Discoverer's first pass over the antarctic, the air force said, and was circling the globe every 91 minutes at an altitude ranging from 150 to 250 miles slightly behind its mother satellite.

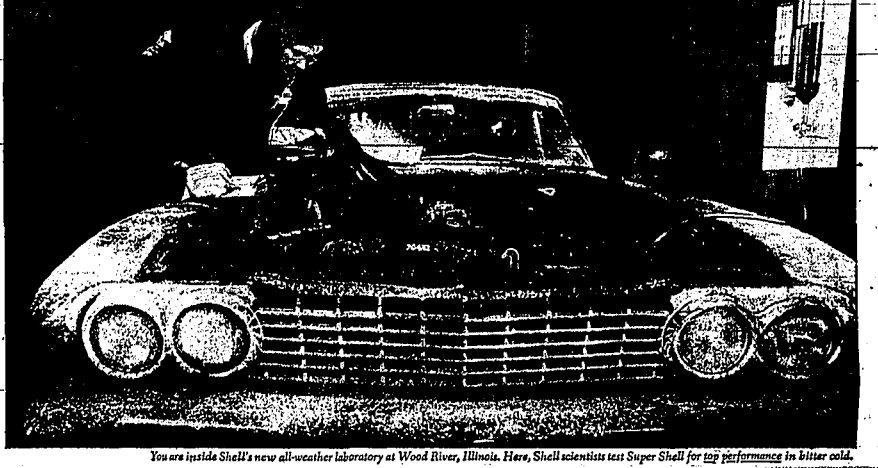

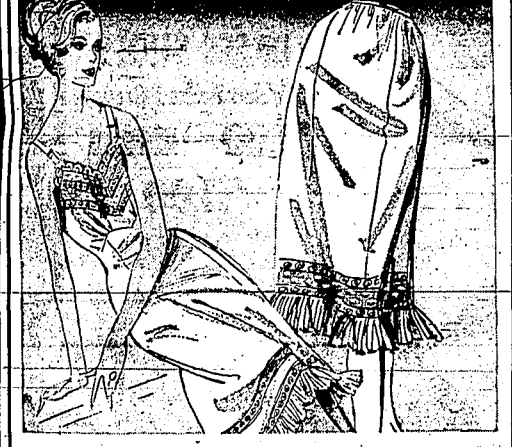

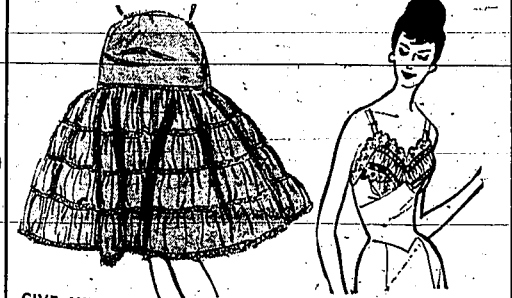

The Christmas program will be held in the gymnasium at 8 p. m. Dec. 31.



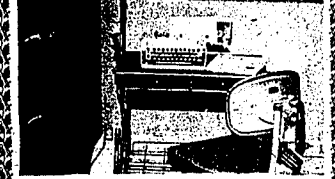

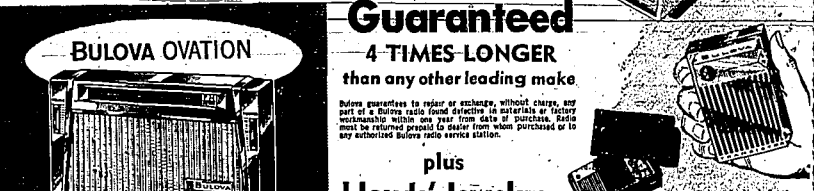

"He could get it this week," Groza said. "He can get those touchdowns and pile up points quickly." Groza has scored only one touchdown in his career, 379 extra points and 147 field goals. Walston has 40 touchdowns, 325 extra points and 74 field goals. "And don't forget that that Hornum!" Groza said. "He has set all points already in five seasons. I'll probably pass both Bobby and me before he is through." Hornum's has 146 points this season and is a cinch to win his third straight individual scoring title. Walston is fourth with 88 points, Groza seventh with 81.

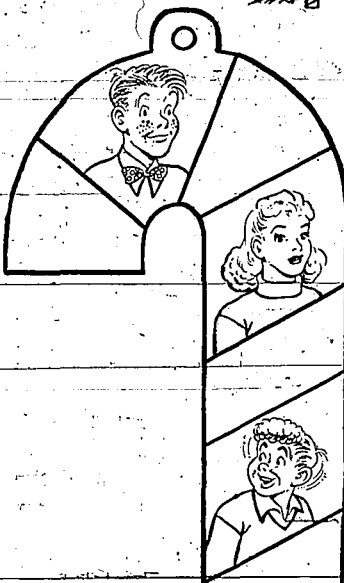

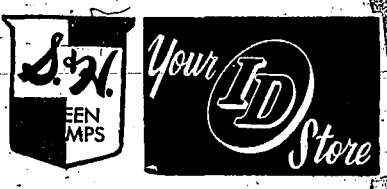

WASHINGTON 479—The world bank is mulling money and men to help develop emerging African nations—and nowhere is it more apparent than in British East Africa.

The bank recently started a survey mission in Kenya. It has surveyed Tanganyika and Uganda, Kenya's neighbors and potential partners in an East African Federation.

A bank spokesman emphasized that "these are not surveys of British East Africa as such—but of separate countries."

The bank has loaned 800 million dollars in Africa. But 200 million dollars went to the long-
