20 CHILDREN DIE IN TRAIN TRAGEDY

Chief Hits T.F. Clerk Aid Talk

BOISE, Dec. 14 (AP)—The head of the Idaho public assistance department said today he believes criticism of his agency voiced at a convention here was based on inadequate information.

"I can't help but feel," said Bill Child, state public assistance commissioner, "that persons based his comment on personal knowledge of one or two great situations in many communities of the state and not the nation."

The indictment of aid to dependent children which he has expressed is a proper expression of it is based on a sufficient body of evidence to justify the criticism. I don't believe he has that knowledge at his disposal and I have no doubt that what he said is not true."

Child said he is sure the bulk of the money being paid out under the program is being used constructively and for the best interest of children.

Child added that many youngsters that are held together and thus are enabling kids to remain in school. He said that he was sure that there were some opportunities as other children would have become delinquents without these parents.

Sivers made the comments Wednesday in a speech to the annual meeting of the Idaho and Northwest chapters of Idaho.

Sivers noted that the Idaho department is "encouraging the perpetuating atrocity of inbreeding" in its child support program.

Sivers, speaking at the annual meeting of the Associated "Parents and Friends of the State's Dependent Children Program in Boise, said that the program costs over four million dollars a year.

Sivers said that the program could be handled more efficiently within the framework of the state government and the taxpayers would get a better bargain for their tax dollars.

Death Takes Famed Artist At Age of 101

MOOSICK FALLS, N. Y., Dec. 14 (AP)—Grandma Moses, the aptly-named 101-year-old primitive artist, whose work has appeared on 100-million Christmas cards, died yesterday, 12 days before Christmas.

Grandma, who achieved worldwide fame after taking up painting in her late 70s, suffered from a chronic heart ailment. Her health gradually faded at a nursing home, the Woodstock Falls health center, where she had been since July.

In death as in life, she attracted the attention of people from all walks of life. Telegrams expressing condolence streamed into her family home at nearby Eagle Bridge, where she had worked.

Grandma—Moses—was born Anna Mary Robertson on a farm near Greenwich, N. Y. She went to work at 12 as a hired girl, and at 27 married Thomas Salmon Moses. They settled first in Virginia but later returned to upstate New York.

The couple had 10 children. Her husband died in 1927. Later in life, her doctor ordered her to give up farm work. She chose as a hobby the weaving of pictures out of yarn. Eventually, she became a professional painter.

U.S. Civil Defense Plan Will Include Fallout Shelter Funds

WASHINGTON, Dec. 14 (AP)—The federal civil defense program to be sent to congress next month will cost about 700 million and include incentive payments for construction of fallout shelters in schools, hospitals, and public welfare institutions.

The U.S. Civil Defense Administration announced today that the program provides federal guidance but no money for individual, home shelters. The federal incentive program, Gilpatrick said in a statement, is planned on the basis of aid for construction of shelter areas for about 20 million persons in the fiscal year, beginning next July 1.

School Bus Struck By UP Streamliner Heading to Denver

GREELEY, Colo., Dec. 14 (UPI)—A speeding streamliner showed up at a rural crossing at an unexpected hour this morning and smashed into a school bus. Twenty children were killed and 18 other persons injured, three critically.

The train, a Union Pacific passenger unit, nearly two hours late in its run toward Denver 60 miles to the south, crashed into the right rear of the bus in sub-zero temperature. Children—dead and alive—were strewn over the frozen ground, covered with two inches of snow.

The 20 bodies were taken to an unused national guard armory in Greeley, where officers held grieving parents back. Weld county Coroner Ross-Adams said the bodies were so badly mutilated it would be too much for the parents to endure.

Parents lined up in the county court house to give investigators lists of names of children and their children's names, ages and wearing apparel to help in the identification.

Witnesses said the bus driver, Duane Harms, 23, Greeley, and 37 children were on the bus when it approached the crossing about 8 a.m. Witnesses said the bus apparently stopped, then pulled forward into the path of the train. School officials said the train was going south at 100 miles an hour.

Harms was treated for shock at a hospital and then released. Officials questioned him later in the day. "My parents got up yesterday and there were warning signals at the crossing and no electric warning system. There was no damage to the train and no one aboard was injured. The train continued into Denver after the accident."

The train sheared off the rear section of the bus after striking it at about 200 feet. The rear section was reduced to a twisted mass of metal.

Several families had more than one child on the bus. The crossing was on a slight rise, but there was a clear view of the tracks from both directions.

Harms was custodian of the Delta school three quarters of the day yesterday. The school festooned with Christmas decorations.

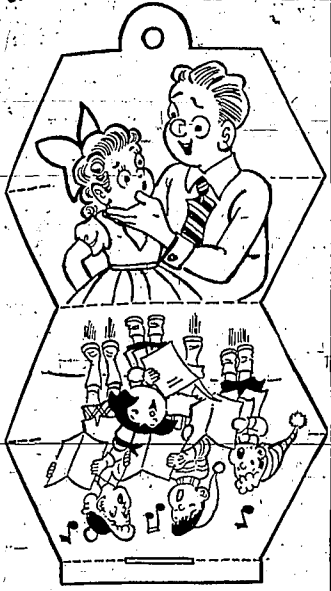

**Manager Has Good Advice For Retirees**

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 14 (AP)—The best thing to save for retirement is yourself, says an expert on the subject. Joseph R. Murphy, who has advised people on retirement for 25 years as manager of the Atlanta office of the social security administration, is getting ready to retire himself Dec. 31. "Unless you have your health and good life expectancy when you retire, you've defeated all your other purposes," he says. "Too many people are afraid to retire because they don't have all the income they want. These people never retire until it's too late to enjoy it." Murphy says it's a wonderful feeling to approach retirement, but to a large extent the whole thing is a myth. "There's no such thing as retirement," he said. "Rather there is a change of focus, eliminating the demanding duties and fixed schedules."

**Venezuelan Agitator's Jailed To Assure Kennedy's Safety**

CARACAS—Venezuela—Dec. 14 (AP)—Police Wednesday night launched a round-up of agitators trying to stir up trouble during President Kennedy's visit. Authorities announced the arrest of 50 persons accused of painting "Kennedy No" signs on walls and said nightly roundups of others trying to stir up disorder would continue under a special police command set up for that purpose. The crackdown followed the planting of four crude bombs in various parts of Caracas Wednesday by terrorists bent on spoiling Kennedy's trip here to boost his Alliance for Progress program for Latin America. Only one of the bombs exploded, injuring two persons. Brig. Gen. Antonio Erlendo Linares, Venezuelan minister of defense, told newsmen that the Ca-

The demonstrators chanted that the water is salted and is causing sickness among the people. They also chanted that the water is being used to grow alfalfa and other crops which are sold to the U.S. All stores will be closed for the demonstration today.

**Spectaculars**  
Reviewed in  
**Two Reports**

Nature has often surprised men with strange spectaculars. Two of these are reviewed in recent editions of the Times-News. The regular science spectacular, the eclipse of the sun, is scheduled for coming months. These are subjects for Science at Work:

**PILLAR OF DUST**  
It was 10 o'clock the morning of Aug. 27, 1883. Already the uninhabited islands had shaken with rumblings. Then came the tremendous explosion—so loud, it was heard more than 2,000 miles away, in Australia.

The column of rising gases carried dust as high as 50 miles—and in 13 days the winds had carried it around the world, covering an area of 300,000 miles. The dust colored sunsets all over the world through the fall and winter.

That cataclysm of nature was the fantastic eruption of Krakatau, a volcanic group of islands south of Indonesia.  
So much molten rock poured forth that the volcano collapsed and its 1,500-foot peak became a pile in the shape of a four-foot deep, tidal-waves 50-feet high swept Java and Sumatra, taking 30,000 lives.

Now geologists are studying the new volcano which began to grow in the region of the island called Anak Krakatau, or child of Krakatau.

It began to increase in activity in 1920, but from the composition of its eruptive material, scientists feel there is no danger of another catastrophe in the foreseeable future, says a report in technology review of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology.

**PILLAR OF LIGHT**  
Only a year before the Krakatau explosion, the world was treated to another nature spectacular—the great comet of 1882. You could see it with the naked eye, in the early twilight. As the days of early September waned, it became brighter and brighter and then on Sept. 17, reached its closest point to the sun.

Writes David Gill, Cape Observatory, South Africa:  
"The sun rose a few minutes afterward, but to my intense surprise the comet in no way dimmed in brightness, but becoming instead whiter and sharper in form as it rose above the mists of the horizon."

It is one of the most unusual in a list of comets observed over some 2,000 years included in the catalogue of cometary orbits, compiled by the British Astronomical association. There are some 80 entries from the period 240 B.C. to 1800 A.D.

**SHADOW OF MOON**  
In February, the shadow of the moon will fall over the east coast of Asia and then move to the west, lifting finally after it strikes the west coast of North America.

Australia will be the only continental mass over which the shadow will largely pass, and the only continent where the partial eclipse can be widely observed.

### Proposal on Gambling Is Called Sham

BOISE, Dec. 11 (AP)—State Democratic Chairman John Walters charged Wednesday that the program to legalize gambling in Idaho "is a cheap sham."

Walters, who is expected to seek his party's nomination for governor next year, said objections to his proposal that the gambling issue be put on the ballot as an initiative "border on the ridiculous."

He referred to statements by Vernon K. Smith, Boise attorney and president of Tourists for Idaho, Unlimited. Smith's group seeks to legalize gambling on a local option basis through election of a governor and state legislature favorable to the program.

Smith has also indicated he may enter the Democratic gubernatorial primary.

Walters and Smith exchanged statements last week over the gambling issue. Walters said an initiative would be the best way to settle the question. But Smith replied that "initiated would be too costly to the taxpayers."

"The suggestion of an initiative, it seems to me," Walters said Wednesday, "should be welcomed by all parties concerned. Instead it provoked a long, vituperative attack from Mr. Smith, the spokesman for the gambling interests."

"Digging through his torrent of words, I find his objections to my statement boil down to two. First, that I do not set the policy for the Democratic party. Second, that an initiative is a cumbersome and expensive procedure."

"I certainly agree that I do not set the policy for the Democratic party. This is done at our platform convention. But in our last platform convention the gambling plank was rejected by about a 10 to one margin."

"Since that time it has been roundly condemned again and again publicly by our legislators and the members of the state central committee."

"As state chairman it is clear I must reflect the position and I personally am most happy to do so. However, these fundamental facts apparently are not understood by the politically inexperienced volatile Mr. Smith."

"The second objection, that the initiative is too cumbersome and expensive, borders on the ridiculous. The cost is probably less than what would be required to appeal one gambling or one drunken driving conviction to the supreme court."

"It is less than one cent per voter and this, Mr. Smith, says, is too much to ask the voters to pay to express themselves on an issue which he contends will solve all their tax problems."

"In lieu of a direct expression by the people through an initiative measure, what Mr. Smith apparently proposes is that the Democratic party elect him governor on the basis of a program it strenuously opposes and then let him try to put this through the state legislature which as of now has shown itself about six to one against it."

"This is a cheap sham," Mr. Smith so naive that he does not know what the chances of such a program are with the Idaho state legislature. Has he not read the many statements of the legislators against gambling? Does he think we can change over two-thirds of the legislature next November when he could not even get himself elected state senator a short time ago?"

"I repeat my earlier statement which provoked Mr. Smith's worthy response, that the Democratic party wants no part of a gambling plan and that the proper way to decide the question is for the supporters of the program to place it on the ballot as an initiative. I hope they have the courage to do so. I assure them the voters of Idaho will not object to spending about one-half cent each to express themselves on the matter."

Lamb, turkey, ham and assorted beef roasts will be held over at Sears as the week-end's low-price counter buy—depending on where in the country you live.

In the Northeast for example, shoppers at many supermarkets and grocery stores will find a 10 to 12 cent a pound cheaper than a week ago and as much as 18 cents under a year ago.

One large chain is pricing select roasts at 55 cents a pound, and the better roasts at 40 cents.

In the Southeast, ham will be widely featured, with turkey as an attractive alternative.

Because of their continuing abundance, turkeys also will be good candidates for a place on the Sunday dinner table in Midwest and Southwestern homes.

On the West Coast, budget-minded shoppers will have to choose carefully. They'll see almost all higher price tags on most meat offerings.

In all regions, beef chuck and steaks promise solid competition for the buyer's dollar. Pork loins, roasts and other cuts of pork will be pushed at some markets, mainly in the central Plains and Southwest.

Eggs, still plentiful in most areas, remain at bargain levels over most of the nation.

On produce counters, there will be plentiful supplies of boxed sprouts, celery, cabbage, tomatoes, onions, cauliflower, potatoes and many other items.

Avocado, oranges, apples, tangerines and grapes will be among featured fruits, together with grapefruit, cranberries and lemons in some sections.

Citrus fruits already are abundant in the Southwest and are beginning to come in strong at many points.

Chains and small grocers are increasing their offerings of nuts, especially pecans, almonds and peanuts—with pecans often priced at bargain rates.

In the fish line, filets of flounder, sea scallops and smelts will compete for attention along the East Coast.

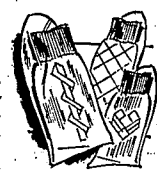

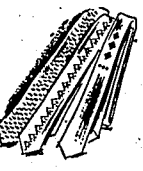
