U. N. Starts Big Attacks On Katanga

ELISABETHVILLE, Katanga, Dec. 15 (UPI)—United Nations forces backed by jet planes and armor smashed close to the heart of Elisabethville today in an all-out offensive against the forces of Katanga. Details were generally scarce, but U. N. jets blasted Katanga's installations in the southern part of the city. U. S. military anti-airborne cars crunched forward in the north and northwest sectors. The U. N. attack seemed to be aimed at winning key points in this capital of secessionist Katanga province before there is a cease-fire agreement of peace talks.

A spokesman at U. N. headquarters in New York confirmed that a full offensive against Katanga was launched yesterday. The spokesman said the first phase of the operation was successful and that U. N. forces were "no longer aimed at winning key points in this capital of secessionist Katanga province before there is a cease-fire agreement of peace talks."

A U. N. spokesman here said there were no plans for a major military operation against the city. Katanga President Moise Tshombe appealed to world leaders to help end the U. N. attacks against his forces. He offered to meet with General Congo Premier Cyrille Adoula in an effort to reach a peaceful settlement. U. N. Canberra jet made five passes firing its cannons at Elisabethville. Katanga gunners shot about a mile outside the city limits. Newsmen sought a vantage point near a downtown hotel as the plane stopped on the ramp. The advance party of U. N. troops halted by mid-afternoon, but observers expected it to be back in the city by night. Heavy mortar barrages and snipers were active in the morning.

They said a major effort also would be made to assure that the South Viet Nam troops make the most effective use of American help.

Nazi Is Sentenced To Hang to Death

JERUSALEM, Dec. 15 (AP)—Adolf Eichmann, Nazi Germany's expeller of Jews to the gas chambers, was sentenced today to hang in Israel for "a crime of unparalleled enormity." Moshe Landau, president of the special three-man Israeli court which tried and convicted the former Gestapo colonel, intoned: "This court sentenced Adolf Eichmann to death because of the crimes against the Jewish people; crimes against humanity; war crimes." Eichmann, now 55 and balding, stood stiffly erect for 15 minutes while the tribunal first gave the reasons and then pronounced him to the gallows. Six hundred persons packing the courtroom were silent through the proceedings.

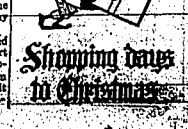

Johnson Hits Persons Who Blast Judges

HOUSTON, Tex., Dec. 15 (AP).—Vice President Lyndon B. Johnson said today that demanding impeachment of judges who render unpopular verdicts "paves the way for the communist dictatorship we seek to avoid."

Johnson's statement was made in a prepared speech for ceremonies installing federal Judge James Noel. It appeared to be an attack on such groups as leaders of the John Birch Society who have called for impeachment of U.S. Chief Justice Earl Warren.

The Vice President defended the right of dissent in a "speech of decency" as opposed to coercion.

"It is one thing to declare a court decision wrong and to seek its reversal," he said. "The men who wrote the constitution recognized that over the best interests of human beings were fair and just. They provided ample means for appeal."

"It is another thing to declare a judicial system wrong and to demand that all judges who render unpopular verdicts be impeached," he said. "This train of thought merely paves the way for the communist dictatorship we seek to avoid."

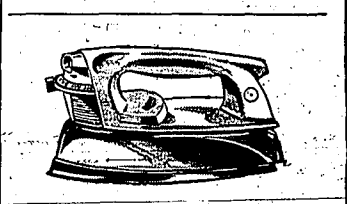

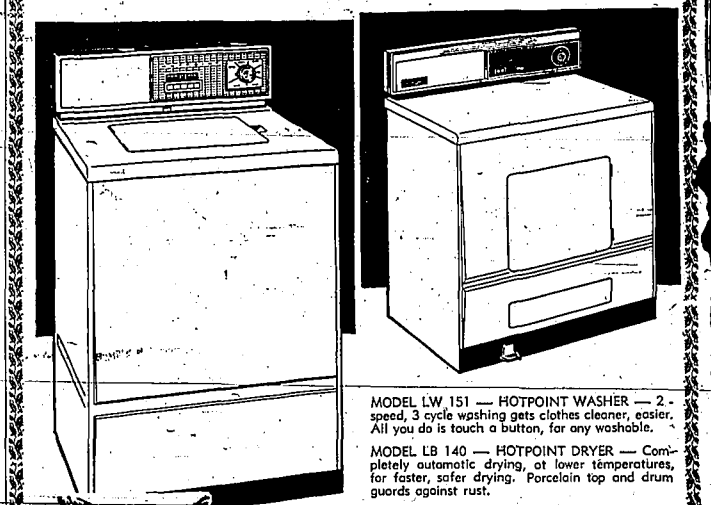

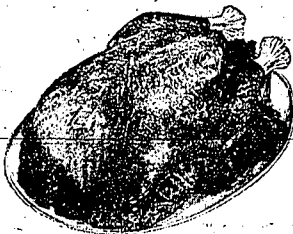

Best notes that of the 541 councils in America, over 250 councils have built their own service and administration centers, including Boise, Pocatello and Idaho Falls.

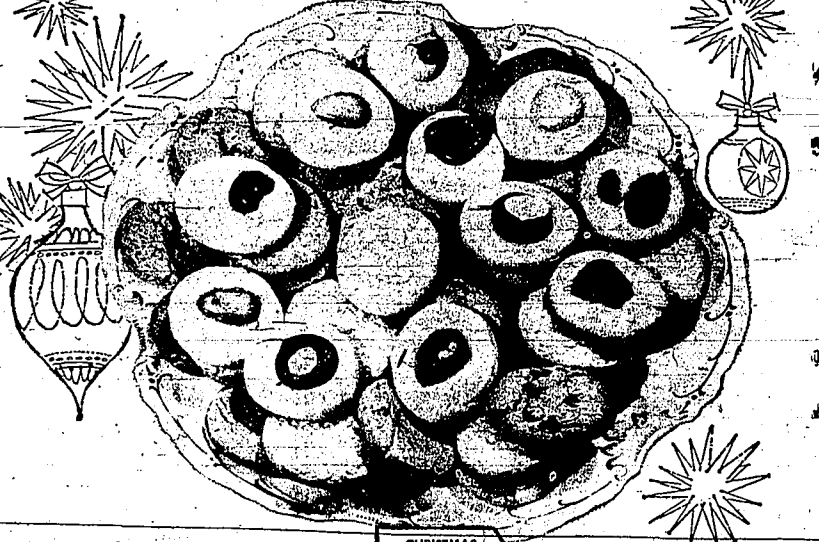

But the New Orleans classic plucked the choice plum of the 1961 collegiate football season—a national champion Alabama.

Southwest conference—was picked. The game is expected to be a sellout. The Sugar Bowl which is Tulane stadium 364 days a year, seats 81,583 and tickets are available.

The Sugar Bowl committee reported it was sold out the day tickets went on sale. Arkansas got 10,000 tickets and all are gone.

"We've already got more orders than tickets," is the word from Alabama.

Two other "old regular" post-season classics report similar success with ticket sales. The Cotton bowl, where Texas meets Mississippi, has filled its 75,504 seats, and the Rose bowl is also considered a sellout for its 101,000 capacity.

LSU, which ended the season with a 9-1 record—and the No. 4 spot in the final Associated Press rankings, metts Colorado in the Orange.

"The Tigers' no soap" to the Sugar bowl in early November started the brief pessimism about the game for the classic. At the time, the Rose bowl was flirting with Alabama in Crimson Tide coach Paul Bear Bryant reported so anxious for the California trip he would walk to Pasadena.

For a brief minute, the Sugar bowl looked like it was out in the cold. We're very satisfied that Tulane, with a 1-9 record, be invited to play an opponent with an equally dismal record.

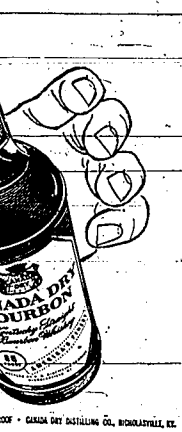

LONDON, Dec. 15 (AP)—Britain called Thursday for an open Wimbledon Lawn Tennis championship—even if the international federation rejects ideas of mixing amateurs and professionals generally throughout the world.

Cyril Banks, chairman of the British Lawn Tennis association, told his annual meeting: "Surely the ILTF (International Lawn Tennis federation) will in some way grant these countries, who are willing and able to carry out the experiment of an open meeting, the necessary permission and authority."

"The majority of countries favor this course and protest should not forever be held up by a minority."

A special committee of the international federation presently drew up a program that could bring professional stars like Australia's Lew Hoad and America's Pancho Gonzalez into competition against the world's top amateurs.

The international committee suggested that everyone in the lawn tennis world would be known as players. Phrases like "amateur" and "professional" would be scrapped.

"The idea that all lawn tennis players became 'players' will be voted on by a meeting of the international federation in Paris in July."

Be Extra Careful With Tree

CHICAGO, Dec. 15 (AP)—Take extra precautions against fire during the Christmas season. Fire prevention experts offer these do's and don'ts.

Don't set trees close to stairways where they could block escape from upstairs in case of fire.

Select a tree that is freshly cut by feeling the needles to see that they are attached firmly. Keep the tree outdoors until just before Christmas, and in a well of water so it remains fresh.

Set up the tree in the coolest part of the room, as far as possible from radiators, heaters and fireplace, to prevent over-drying.

Fill the water container daily in the tree stand.

Use only glass, metal or fire-resistant tree trimmings.

Keep electric trains away from the tree and discard any with frayed wires.

When you open presents, get rid of wrappings immediately. Turn off tree lights when leaving the house.

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Rehash of "Alamo" Story Is Best Account of Battle

A Time to Stand, by Walter Lord (Doubleday). A new description of the heroic American struggle with telling overtones for today—the fall of the Alamo.

This conversion of the story of the Alamo into an independent, self-contained, and somewhat dated, Gen. Sam Houston ordered it abandoned and destroyed, but the story of the Alamo decided (in Gen. Bowie's words) that they would rather die in these clutches than give up the fort. It is a story that they wanted, not quite 200 years ago, who believed liberty was worth the price.

The story of the Alamo is an inevitable attack and for the Alamo they hoped would come from their friends, but the result was ineffective 33-day siege, Mexican troops overran and massacred the Alamo in less than two hours.

Lord approached the story of the Alamo with the same meticulous care he applied earlier in the sinking of the Titanic ("A Night to Remember") and the Battle of Pearl Harbor ("Days of Infamy"). His diligent search unearthed some obscure material which shed new light on some facets of the story. The result is probably the best single account of the Alamo and the motives and attitudes of the heroes who died there rather than retreat.

Eighteen new books have been added to the collection at the Twin Falls public library, according to Mrs. Arthur L. DeFolter, library cataloger.

Two timely Christmas offerings are "Christmas in the City" by Ed Ricketts Sumner, and "Christmas," the 1961 edition of an annual American Christmas literature.

Green Trees Back in Style Again

CHICAGO, Dec. 15 (AP)—Green Christmas trees—not pink, not blue, or silver, but green—are back in style this year.

They're flannel, polka-dotted, ornamented, fresh and green.

That's the word from Chicago's "Christmas tree king"—Gust Reilas.

Reilas also said those flocked trees, sprayed and coated with multi-colored gumbo, are on the way out.

"I don't even flock trees anymore," Gust said. "It's too much work."

This year Gust plans to sell nearly 25,000 regular old-fashioned green trees, then catch a fast train for sunny Florida.

Trees will cost more this year than last, the "king" said. A six-foot tree should cost five or six dollars—roughly one dollar a foot. (Remember when the best tree on the lot could be bought for \$12.50?)

American Forest Products Industries reported that 45 million Christmas trees will be sold in the U. S. this year season, at a very green profit of more than \$2 billion dollars.

But Gust and other Christmas tree dealers were quick to point out that it's not a matter of everything coming in and nothing going out.

Christmas trees take from five to 10 years to grow large enough to sell. Growers must stand the cost of cultivation, protecting them against disease, weeding them out and, in some cases, eliminating them by hand for better shapes.

The dealers also must foot hefty harvesting and transportation bills.

Some eager-beaver growers even harvest their trees in September and store them in refrigerators—another expense item when a man is dealing with 25,000 trees.

Signs Deal

Janet Leigh Enjoyed Trip To Americas

HOLLYWOOD, Dec. 15 (AP)—Probably the prettiest people-to-people ambassador ever sent south of the equator is Janet Leigh, who recently returned from South America enchanted by her role.

"I spent almost two months in Argentina and Brazil making friends with people," she said. "And I'm sure I learned more than they did."

"The most important and surprising thing to me is that we know and understand so little about one another. I had many misconceptions about South America, and the people I talked to also had peculiar ideas about us."

Janet made the trip with her husband, Tony Curtis, who was making a new movie in Salta, Argentina.

Many so-called good will ambassadors from Hollywood spend their time abroad at fancy embassy teas and social functions, not Janet.

"I went to hospitals, orphanages and held press conferences," Janet said. "My whole approach was to meet people on their own terms and in places where they felt most relaxed and at ease."

"I was determined not to talk to them about democracy. I tried to be the kind of person they could like."

"The question they asked me most, often was, 'Why are you visiting us?' They found it extraordinary that a Hollywood actress would travel all that distance just to get to know Brazilians and Argentines."

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Shoe Industry Probe Comes After Complaints

WASHINGTON, Dec. 15 (AP)—"We're now spending well over four billion dollars each year to buy shoes. But do we get what we pay for?"

An angry shoe repairman from Medford, Ore., says no. And he's been saying so so forcefully that the federal labeling commission now is drafting a labeling guide that could, if it sees through as proposed, save you money and raise a hob with the shoe industry.

The cobbler's name is Wilbur Gardner. He started asking questions three years ago, after finally being fed up with trying to repair shoes whose synthetic components—masquerading as leather—had stretched seams and stitches beyond redemption.

What Gardner found was a big but quiet change in shoe-making in the U.S. Added to what the FTC found, the picture

looks like this:
If you're the average consumer, you expect—and pay for—leather shoes because they look smart and feel like leather.

But modern chemistry can simulate all these qualities today in emulated plastics and other synthetics. And so well that experts often have to make incisions to tell the difference.

They, about 70 per cent of shoes in shoe stores have synthetic soles. The percentage of plastic insoles and shoe linings is rising rapidly, too.

And, off the record, one of the largest chemical companies has told this reporter that by early 1963 plastic uppers—be the outside of the shoe—will be introduced widely into the market. "Looking so much like leather that you'll have to burn the shoe to tell the difference."

Are the synthetics as good as

leather?
Yes and no, shoe people say. Some materials resist abrasion better, suffer less damage from weather, hold their shape a lot longer.

On the other hand, these virtues may prevent easy eradication of perspiration and keep the shoe from learning to conform to your foot with wear and use.

Whatever the arguments, one thing is sure: most synthetics are less expensive than leather. It's a lot easier to get uniform quality from a vat of chemicals than from a cobbler or an alligator. And you don't need as many human hands to make the final product, either.

Driven by competition within their industry, it is not surprising that manufacturers are turning to synthetics. But there is any cost reduction, it is not reflected in shoe prices.

And more important, says dobber Gardner, the consumer today doesn't know what he's getting. All he really sees is styling. Most often the salesman doesn't see much more. And what labeling will do to the four billion dollar sales picture has a good part of the industry worried.

"A cobbler, shoe distributor said bitterly, 'should stick to his last.'"

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (AP)—One out of every eight dental patients has a tooth extracted and two out of 11 have X-rays, a survey by the American Dental Association shows.

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Decorations, Toys for Christmas Could Poison Children

IDaho STATE COLLEGE, Dec. 15—The festive decorations and toys that traditionally add to the gaiety of the holiday season can be potential poisoners of children and adults, Dr. C. Allen Bradley, director of Idaho State college poison information center, warns.

Though most decorating materials and toys manufactured in this country today are non-toxic, Dr. Bradley said that people should carefully check labels of all products and be especially careful in purchasing foreign-made products.

"For instance, such as spray snow or flameproofing, is labeled toxic, use and store it accordingly," he said. "Such products should be used only outdoors or in a well-ventilated room and, with other potentially-dangerous preparations, stored well out of the climbing reach of children."

In the case of spray snow,

the snow particles themselves usually are not poisonous, Dr. Bradley said. The danger comes from the liquid in which the snow is mixed for applying and inhalation or ingestion of this propellant can cause nausea, vomiting, headache and central nervous system depression. Once it has dried, the snow should not be toxic.

All effects may result from excessive inhalation or ingestion of the fluid used in "bubbling"

Christmas tree lights and from the ingestion of the metallic salts used to produce colored flames in fireplace fires. "Dancing Moth Balls" popular as both a decoration and a game for children, are quite dangerous because of the toxicity of moth balls when eaten," Dr. Bradley said.

He urged that all parents with small children be especially careful in using colored paper products, such as crepe paper and

manufactured paper decorations and ornaments, since dyes used in some of these products may be toxic.

Many types of paints, solvents, flameproofing preparations and other liquids found in homes at Christmas time contain poisonous ingredients and should be used and stored with extreme care.

"The main rule of thumb should be to purchase only products labeled 'non-toxic' whenever possible. When it isn't possible,

store products known or suspected of being toxic away from children and use them according to package directions," Dr. Bradley said. "And, of course," he continued, "always instruct children that the decorations are to be seen, but not touched or eaten. This rule should also apply to the trees, garlands and branches, especially those with berries, used extensively in home Christmas decorations, the director said.

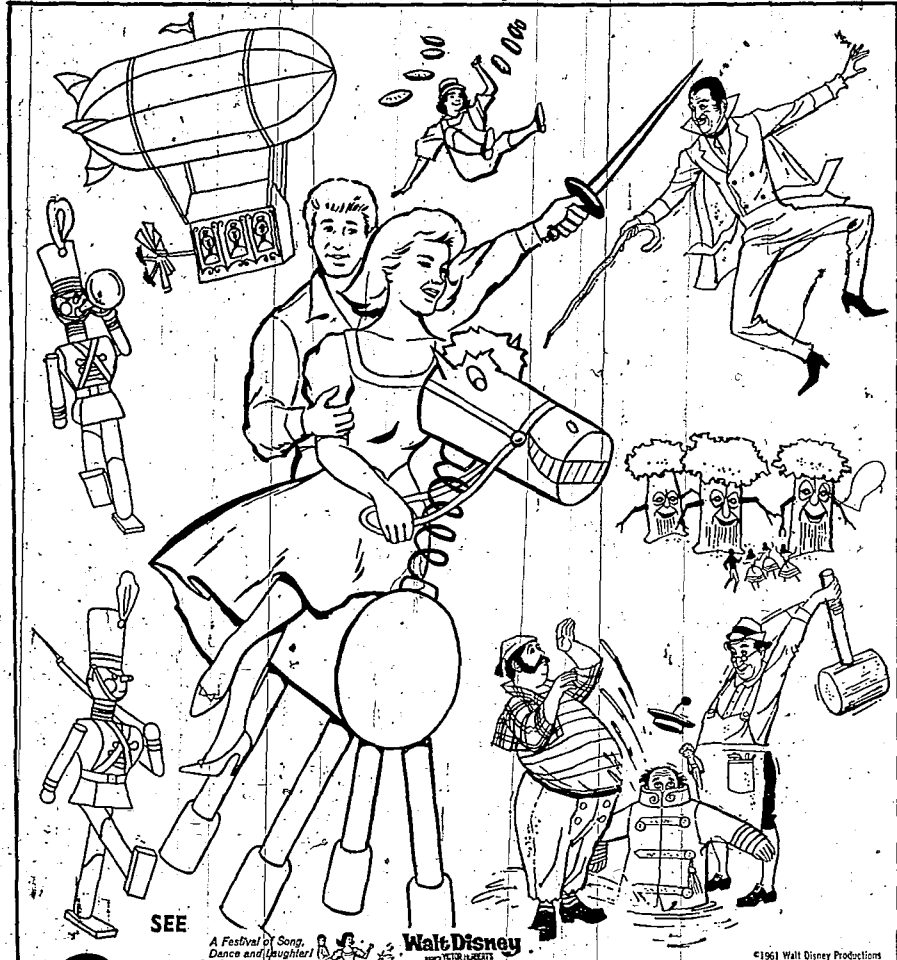

Being Star Has Its Disadvantages

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (UPI)—There's a good deal more to being a star than fame and glamor. Robert Morse is discovering that stardom has its frightening side, too.

"I'm beginning to understand," he says, "why stars put on dark glasses and want to hide."

Since "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying" has become Broadway's biggest hit in years, Morse has become the least of the team. The boyish looking actor unquestionably is the most popular performer in the most popular show.

Of course, he has been striving for this state of affairs for a long time. But now he finds that it has its drawbacks.

For the past few weeks, precisely at 5 a.m., he and his wife are awakened by a telephone call from "some book." The one-sided depraved conversation follows a set pattern each day. Morse has changed his telephone number, but the calls continue.

Every night, after his performance, he must leave via the stage door which is surrounded by people. So far, these have been seeking his autograph or just wanting to look at him up close.

But Morse can see that this situation is potentially dangerous. "Sometimes," he says, "I'm scared to come out on the stage. One of the people there might not have liked Finch. (That's the name of the character he plays.) And he might start swinging."

Every day's mail brings fresh problems for Bobby Morse.

"Oh, those letters," he says. "I get 'em every day. And then there are the letters from jealous old friends. You know, kids you went to high school with who write and ask for tickets to the show. When you write back, politely, and tell them you can't see them, you get a letter back. They say you're getting a big head or something. One of those old friends wrote back and told me that when he got to New York, he was going to look me up and knock my block off."

Morse, essentially an easy-going, friendly young man, is frankly frightened by his audience confrontation with the menacing side of the public.

"A man's livelihood is privacy," he says, "and it's frightening how people can take advantage of you. I'm beginning to be scared."



ROBERT MORSE has found that stardom has its disadvantages. After being a hit in the Broadway play "How to Succeed in Business Without Really Trying," he has found that stars have their reasons for avoiding crowds.

Of course there are compensations. Morse says the greatest is the chance to make people laugh. He says he gets "a wonderful feeling" every night when he feels the audience is having a good time because of him.

NEW YORK, Dec. 15 (UPI)—This Christmas will mark the 20th anniversary of "White Christmas," the song which Bing Crosby has said is "as much a part of me as my floppy ears."

Crosby, who introduced the Irving Berlin tune in his picture, "Holiday Inn," will observe the occasion by singing it again for the several thousandth time on his seventh annual "Christmas Sing With Bing" over the CBS radio network (6:10-7 p.m. EST).

In its two decades of popularity, "White Christmas" has enjoyed a circulation of 14 million recordings as sung by Crosby and another 14 million by about 83 other artists. More than 100 recorded versions have come and gone.

Sheet music sales during the six weeks that followed the premiere of "Holiday Inn" seemed to go into a paroxysm when the music business was still shaking off the effects of a depression.

"While Christmas has not been confined to the United States nor to the English language, it has been recorded in Italian, French, the Scandinavian languages, Chinese, German, Spanish, several Polynesian tongues, Hungarian and Swedish.

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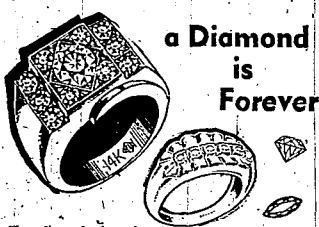

Is Your House "Underdoorbelled?" You Can Add Doorbells for Remote Locations

If your house "underdoorbelled" — a basement filled with noisy appliances or power tools or a little room or more — you know how it's difficult to hear the regular bell.

Installation of another bell or chime is not difficult. Bells are low-voltage devices so that the danger of working with things electrical is reduced.

Play It Safe

But it's wise to take precautions. Remove the wire that protects the circuit to which the bell transformer is connected. If you are uncertain which fuse controls the circuit, pull the main switch.

Remove the cover plate from the bell or chime. You'll notice terminal screws where the wires are connected. Wiring for other bells is simply run from these same terminals.

Use bell wire, which you can buy at any hardware store. Bare the ends of the two wires, make a half-loop at the ends. Loop terminals, slip wire around them and connect. If the bells or chimes make different sounds for front and back doors, you find three terminals. Use three wires.

Make absolutely certain that the same wire runs from the terminal marked "rear" on the old bell to the one on the additional bell.

Bell wire is available as single strand, which you cut up separate lengths. It is also available as twisted double or triple-strand wire. In those combinations, each wire contains a different color of insulation. If you use single-strand wire, use the same color pairs at each end of a string to color-code it.

Wires can be run down the edge of a door, through a hole in the floor to the basement. If a closet or cupboard backs up a wall in which the bell is located, drill through back of the wall and run wires through the closet.

If it's a one-story house with an unfinished attic or crawlspace, you may be able to fish the wires through the ceiling and drop them down through a wall or closet.

Wires for an attic bell should go through the ceiling. On the second floor they can be run along a baseboard to a meter and then to the attic. If bell is near a stairway, the wires may

You'll perhaps need a heavier transformer. Try using the old one first. If the bells don't ring, or ring weakly, get a heavier transformer. Your hardware dealer can tell you the proper size.

Remove the fuse or pull the main switch before replacing the transformer.

Disconnect the old transformer. The transformer will have two wires which are connected to wires from the fuse box. Solid-colored connectors will help you make the new connections quickly and easily.

Terminals on the other side of the transformer are for the bell wires.

35 Millimeter Camera Best for Action Shots of Sports Events

Sports action can be captured on practically any type of camera but today's 35 millimeters have few equals for this kind of photography.

Their attributes include ease and speed of handling, large film capacity, portability, wide selection of both color and black-and-white films and interchangeable lenses.

While few non-professionals may have the opportunity of photographing the World Series, Kentucky Derby or Olympic track and field events, amateur enthusiasts have ample opportunities close to home.

Local high schools and colleges, baseball parks, swimming pools, playgrounds all offer a year-round schedule of competitive events.

In every sport there are moments of action that will provide good material for pictures: a halfback breaking around end; basketball players leaping high into the air for a rebound; sprinters straining as they near the finish line.

Action such as this is easiest to position for and anticipate. Your camera can be pre-focused on the point of expected action and the shutter tripped as the action reaches its peak within the zone.

While your area of action is more or less fixed, your camera position need not be. Extremely low camera shots can result in spectacular photographs. On the other hand, high-angle shots made from a position in the stands or from a balcony often help clarify a given action by showing the entire scene.

Pictures made before or after moments of peak action also can be very effective and often are overlooked. A close shot of two opposing football lines facing each other; a pitcher's intent gaze as he looks for a signal from the catcher; a tangled heap of basketball players on the floor after a spill.

Don't overlook sideline events; coaches nervously discussing strategy; fans yelling; cheerleaders performing their routines. In such situations, the rapid action and large film load of a 35 millimeter camera is of great value.

Try Freezing Holiday Leftovers

What do you do with dinner leftovers? No homemaker wants to waste food deliberately. Food to avoid waste, some nibble the better dishes as we clear the table.

This soon leads to the additional weight of 10 unwelcome pounds around the waistline.

Other times, they delay the decision. They scrape the dishes and dab into little dishes to store in the refrigerator. Eventually, most of these wither and are discarded to make room for more.

With food costs rising, you must do a better job of efficient management of a food budget and this certainly includes a policy toward leftovers.

Kary Huck, director of home economics for a large manufacturer spends a good deal of time researching developments for the conservation of food by proper cooking and preserving techniques.

Some leftovers, of course, have a ready future in tomorrow's meal. Some are dinner hash. But many don't. You can stretch the food dollar by simply freezing the leftover foods and using them later on, Miss Huck says.

Use the freezer or the freezer section of the refrigerator for

storage. Leftovers must be properly wrapped and frozen quickly. Place to use up their foods; within a month or two.

Keep an assortment of freezer containers, such as plastic bags, on hand! A marking pen to jot the date on the package is a help, too.

Don't tuck small portions in a far corner of the freezer. Group small packages in plastic fruit baskets or larger bags. A large plastic bag in our freezer holds small packs of such leftovers as chopped poultry (holiday dinner) chopped green peppers and celery.

Take time to slide the leftovers into proper containers; if you use refrigerator jars, tape them shut.

Stowing leftovers in the freezer won't mean much to the budget unless you return them to the dinner table.

Some more of Miss Huck's tips: Package sliced beef from Sunday's roast for future sandwiches; the same with sliced turkey or chicken. Save ham tidbits for a Western omelet; steak ends for burgundy or beef and noodle.

Necks and body pieces of chicken can be steamed for chicken soup. Make and freeze soup stock from celery tops, carrots, beef bones. Sack and freeze leftover bread and rolls for poultry dressing.

Brighten a midwinter meal with delectable holiday cookies or fruit cake leftovers frozen now. Pecans and other nut meats left from holiday parties can also be saved for future use, when they'll be more appreciated.

If yours is a nonsmoking household, cigarettes leftover from a holiday dinner party can be kept fresh, if frozen until the next time you entertain.
