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Rocket Cone Checkup Set By Scientists

SUNNYVALE, Calif., Dec. 18 (AP)—The rocket cone, a space probe that was launched last week to arrive here during and after setting records in both time and distance during its Polar orbit last week.

Scientists at the space systems command here are checking the mechanism inside the capsule. The device, launched from Vandenberg air force base last Tuesday, was part of an experiment to measure the "time hysteresis" of the radiation shielding process of various materials.

Three air force para-troopers parachuted into the Pacific Southwest yesterday to secure the launch instrument and return it to rubber traps and await the arrival of the US Reshaver, an anti-submarine destroyer.

The capsule's return to Earth is the completion of a 1,822-mile mission in which it lasted 98 hours and 20 minutes, a dual space record.

The Reshaver rendezvoused with the frogman Sunday night. The Reshaver's skipper, Cmdr. R. J. Schwartz, Jr., Portland, Me., told newsmen at Honolulu that choppy seas and an overcast night made the pickup "a little harder."

However, he said a three-way radio communications system between the three men was an overhauled craft and the ship guided the Reshaver in for the rendezvous.

Commander Schwartz said the moon appeared just in time to bring the men and the ship into view.

The nose cone from Discoverer 13, which was launched Sunday, was recovered by the Reshaver. Seven were attached by Hickam-based planes and four others were picked up at the sea.

Although the success of his Alliance for Progress hinges primarily on the good will and cooperation of governments in power, Kennedy was openly gratified by his welcome from the people in Caracas and Bogota.

Half a million or more Colombian and Venezuelan students and jammed Bogota's streets Sunday to cheer the Kennedy. Colombian officials called the country reaction the greatest by far in their capital's history.

The Idaho Youth Ranch was the topic of a short talk given to the Royal Bible class of the Christian church, Twin Falls, during the Sunday school service Sunday morning by Earl E. Peck, secretary of the board of directors of the ranch.

He pointed out the ranch is on its way to a new building, the goal that can be reached when the generous people of Idaho and surrounding states give the true picture of what can be done if more people become fully aware of the needs of their wholehearted support.

In answer to the question, "What do we have to do to help?" Peck said, "We have boys, boys from broken homes, boys who are in trouble. These boys are learning to live with adversity and face the problems of everyday life with new hope because they have had a real home for them."

"We have hard-working dedicated, sincere 'Jim Crow' and we have that 'Jim Crow' who 'in addition to full-time teaching in the Kinco school, cleaning the cooling house, housecleaning and laundry for her family and the 10 boys that live at the ranch. We have a good housing for the 10 boys and the Rev. Mr. Crowe's family. We have had and I expect to see the boys busy when they are not in school. The walls, roof, framing for the building, heating and plumbing work is in a modern cottage that will accommodate 16 additional boys. The house parents stands side because there are no funds to finish the walls and ceiling, and the plumbing fixtures, and furnish the rooms. We have boys on the waiting list and no room at the Inn."

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Dec. 18 (AP)—Federal authorities in St. Louis report they have broken up a two-man counterfeit operation and seized \$37,000 in "very deceptive" bogus bills.

The counterfeiters had passed about \$750 in phony \$5, \$10 and \$20 bills, authorities said.

Garry Stigall, head of the St. Louis office of the secret service, identified the counterfeiters as Paul Eugene Kesterson, 43, and Joseph Ziglin, 51.

Secret service agents arrested Kesterson Friday night in Clayton near a tile company where he worked and where he printed the bills, Stigall said.

Agents found \$2000 in completed bills in the shop and two of the photo plates which Kesterson, a printer, had used in making the last batch of bills, Ziglin was arrested at a filling station he operated in St. Louis, where \$35,000 in counterfeit bills was seized.

Negro Chief Rejects Bail, Stays in Jail

AMERICAN, Ga., Dec. 18 (AP)—The Negro international leader, Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., rejected Saturday night bail and stayed in jail in Albany, Ga., after protesting at nearby Albany, Ga., that he will not accept bail and expects to spend Christmas in jail.

"When other Negroes see Negroes sacrificing, they will follow," he said. "I cannot see movement being broken. In my experience I have seen enthusiasm and courage like in Albany in few other places."

King, who said he had been arrested four times in Alabama and twice in Georgia for racial activities, said he had not gone to Albany to take part in demonstrations.

He had just intended to give an address, but seeing that negotiations were broken between Negro and white, I felt I had to join the pilgrimage," he said.

He told UPI in a jailhouse interview that he took part in the protest "as a matter of conscience and because I am a leader."

Food Industry Head Warns Americans on Over-Eating

WHITE PLAINS, N. Y. (INCA)
Proper eating must be combined with more participation in physical activities President Kennedy's goal of better health and more vitality for Americans is to be achieved.

That's the view of food industry leader Charles O. Mortimer who said in an interview: "The application of basic nutrition in our daily lives must be made an indispensable partner of the physical exercise program called for by President Kennedy to upgrade American fitness."

"A campaign to redirect and improve our nation's eating habits must accompany the vital physical movement to change physical exercise habits."

Mortimer, chairman of general foods corporation, has for the past 30 years been principal industry officer of the Nutrition Foundation, an independent, non-profit research and education organization supported by the food industry for 20 years.

"The foundation is now conducting a campaign to encourage the public to realize that eating must be more than a matter of habit," explained Mortimer, who is known for his efforts to get the findings of nutrition scientists translated into dinner plate terms and carried to the public through the press, broadcasting and schools.

"Never before in our history have we so needed men and women with physical and emotional stamina. Using our abundant food supply wisely to build healthier citizens is just plain common sense," he added.

"During World War II, there were shortages. All of us had to learn then how to feed our families adequately despite the shortages. To be well fed, not overfed, is not overeating and sluggish."

Regulate Drugs, Reuther Urges

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Labor leader Walter P. Reuther called today for federal regulations to deal with what he called "serious inadequacies" in the drug industry.

Reuther, president of the United Automobile Workers and AFL-CIO vice president, said drug costs under union health insurance would cost 20 percent of total medical bills.

"Prices are excessive, and waste, collusion and harmful monopoly contribute significantly to this high cost," he said in a statement read by an aide to the senate antitrust subcommittee.

Reuther endorsed legislation by Chairman Estes Kefauver, D-Tenn., to require federal licensing of all drug firms, loosen patent protection on drug discoveries and forbid marketing of any drug that does not work substantially as advertised.

Greatest Deluge of Mail in History Is Expected Soon

WASHINGTON, Dec. 16 (AP) — If you planned to mail your Christmas cards and packages today, the postoffice knew it. It has your number. Based on past experience, the postoffice was expecting on Monday the largest single mail load in history — more than half a billion pieces — as the 1961 Christmas rush hits its peak. Figures show it already is up 22 per cent over 1960.

Officials estimate a mail volume of four billion pieces — 11 could be six billion, they said — in the Christmas period that began Dec. 15. The postoffice is braced for the deluge. And, a spokesman told reporters, barring a hillared or severe weather or some unexpected surge of mail in a specific spot, "we have every confidence we'll have all the Christmas mail cleaned up by close of business Saturday (Dec. 23)." That means all the mail waiting to be delivered in local post-offices and doesn't take care of the New Yorker, for instance, who mails Uncle Herbert in Chicago a necktie on Saturday. No deliveries will be made Sunday, Christmas eve, or Monday, Christmas day.

To handle this biggest Christmas spurt ever in the mails, the postoffice is using a new system, which it estimates will save five million dollars over the old system. It means adding about 240,000 extra workers to the regular 500,000-man work force, compared with 220,000 extras last year and using experienced employees on overtime. It also means one-day deliveries. "This year's 'all-in-one' home delivery will mean an end to the costly arrangements of previous years in which residential neighborhoods would have inexperienced youngsters running over their lawns several times a day delivering a few cards at a time," postal officials said.

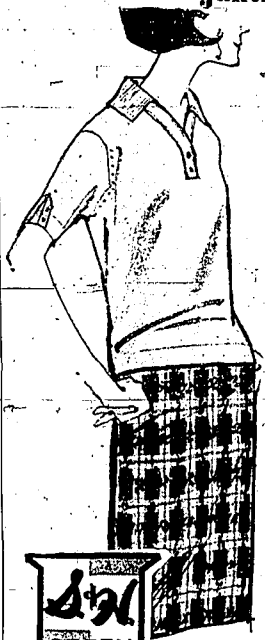

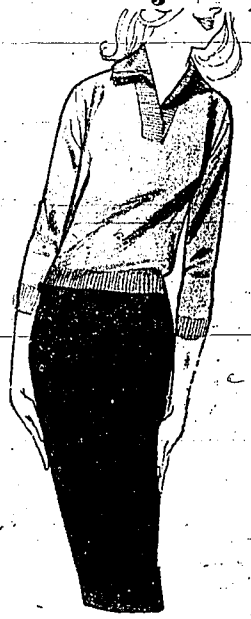

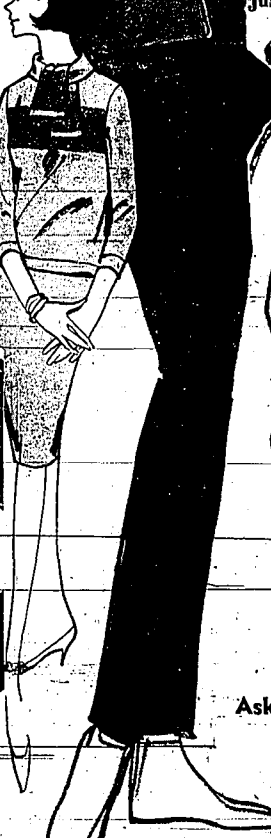

Eichmann is being held in the prison at Ramat Hashikma, 10 miles east of Tel Aviv. He has no contact with any other prisoner and is shackled and handcuffed when he walks in the prison yard.

Officials at the prison said they were constantly on guard to prevent an attempt on Eichmann's life by other prisoners.

WICHITA FALLS, Tex., Dec. 18 (AP)—Democratic Chairman E. Purcell, top vote-getter in Saturday's special election to fill the 13th district seat in the U. S. House, begins campaigning anew today.

So does Republican Joe Bailey Metzner, who will face Purcell in a runoff election to be held sometime between Jan. 2 and Jan. 5. Metzner, who was defeated by Purcell in the election, will set the date.

Ballot for Purcell about 120 votes showed Purcell with 8,933 votes to Metzner's 8,704. Three others were eliminated vacated by Democrat Frank Ikard, who resigned to become executive vice president of the American Petroleum Institute.

Both Purcell, 42, and Metzner, 36, said they would not accept a Democratic win in the runoff.

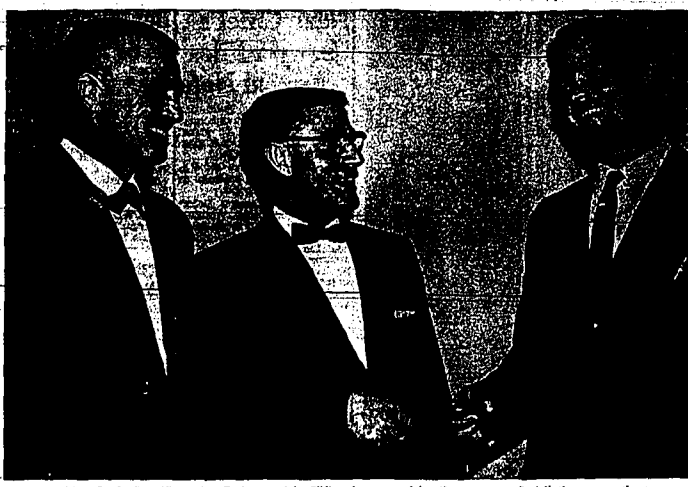
Opponent of Budget Plan

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—The chief economist of the National Planning Association has said President Kennedy's insistence on a balanced budget next year might prevent the economy from reaching maximum production and full employment.

Gerhard Colm said yesterday in a release by the private research organization that balancing the fiscal 1963 budget could cause the same kind of "abrupt recovery" which occurred in 1959-1960. Fiscal 1963 starts next July 1.

Many business experts believe the sharp swing in one year from a 124 billion dollar deficit to a 12 billion dollar surplus contributed to the 1960 recession.

Authoritative government officials have disclosed that Kennedy plans to send congress Jan. 18 a 1963 budget which anticipates spending close to \$8 billion dollars and slightly higher revenues. It was understood that a preliminary prediction of less than \$2 billion dollars revenue might be revised upward in light of the strong performance of the economy in the past three years.

Railroads Ending Bad Year, Predict Improvement in '62

WASHINGTON, Dec. 18 (AP)—Although Congress in 1961 took no action on railroad problems, Loomis expressed high hope that the session starting in January will provide some curbs for the ailing industry.

The paradox was set forth and explained today in a year-end review by Daniel P. Loomis, president of the Association of American Railroads.

Loomis reported cloudy 1961 brought the carriers their lowest net income since 1948 and the lowest return on investment since 1938. But he saw the silver lining like this:

"One heartening development has been the great increase in public understanding of the railroad's difficulties and in public demand for remedial action by congress . . .

"Another encouraging sign is the concern being shown by the administration in the growing railroad crisis . . ."

Rate of return on investment — 1.57 per cent, lowest since 1938, and at the bottom of the list of major industries.

In addition to anticipated help from Uncle Sam, Loomis indicated mergers also held hope for improving the industry's overall position.

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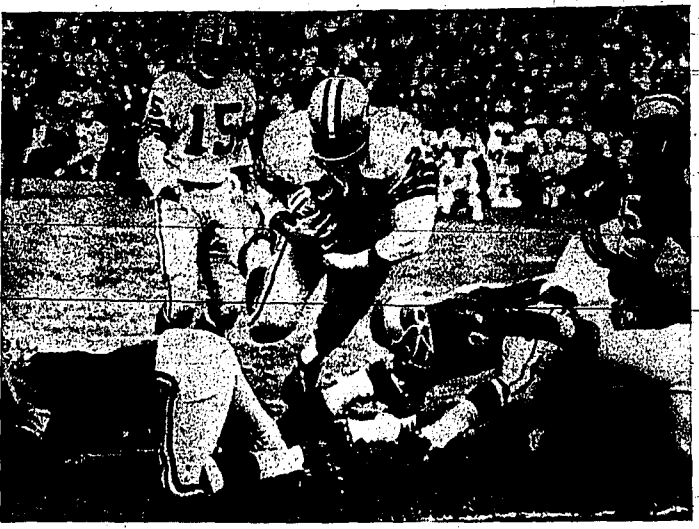

Ping Bodie Dies Sunday At Age of 74

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 18 (AP)—Ping Bodie, 74, one of major league baseball's colorful characters, died Sunday.

Bodie was an American League outfielder for nine seasons, with the Chicago White Sox 1911-14, Philadelphia Athletics 1915-1917, and the New York Yankees 1918-21. He was a roommate of Babe Ruth while playing for the Yankees.

Bodie, a slugger of the dead ball era, was christened Francisco Pezallo. He derived his baseball name from the "ping" of his bat when it met the ball and a ghostly malingering tone he once lived in, Boston.

Bodie inspired Bugs Barr's line about an unsuccessful attempt to steal a base—"Ping had recently in his heart, but his feet were honest"—and furnished material for Ring Lardner's famous baseball fiction series, "You Know Me, Al."

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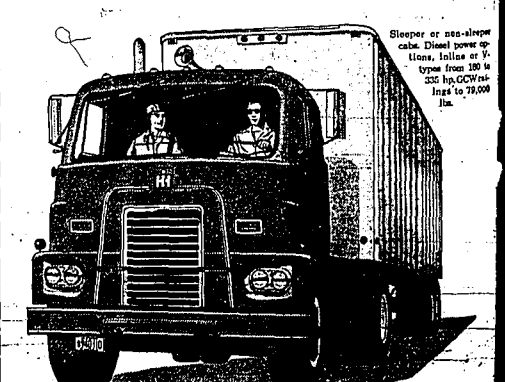

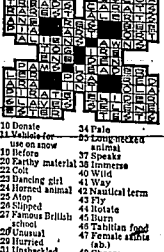

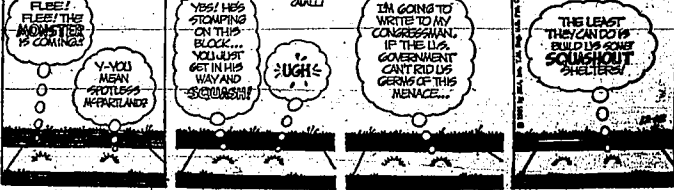
