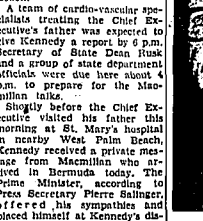

2 Demos Ask Nixon Reply About Congo

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—Two Democratic senators charged Richard M. Nixon today to offer an alternative to President Kennedy's "hard choice" of backing U. N. action in Katanga.

Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey of Minnesota, the assistant Democratic leader, said he accepts as "responsible opposition" the criticism made by Nixon the "hard choice" of backing U. N. action in Katanga.

"But what does Mr. Nixon offer as an alternative?" Humphrey asked. "If Katanga secedes from the Congo, it is the beginning of the end. The rest of that unhappy country will become a beseecher."

President Kennedy has made the hard choice—either the U. N. or the communists will prevail in the Congo.

Sen. John Sparkman of Alabama used similar words in a separate interview to describe the President's policy. He said it was all very well for Nixon to characterize as "an incoherent mess" the administration's decision to back U. N. efforts to force unification of the Congo.

"But what would Mr. Nixon do if the administration decided to back U. N. efforts to force unification of the Congo?" Sparkman asked.

Nixon said in a copyrighted article in the Los Angeles Times-Mirror that the United States had been put in the position of allying itself with the Soviet Union and against most of the North Atlantic organization allies in the Congo. He said the central Congo government was "infiltrated by communists and communist sympathizers."

Replying to this, Humphrey said that Congo Premier Cyrille Adoula can be regarded as just as anti-communist as Katanga President Moise Tshombe. He said if Tshombe and Adoula can reach an agreement he is confident they can repress communist influence in any resulting government.

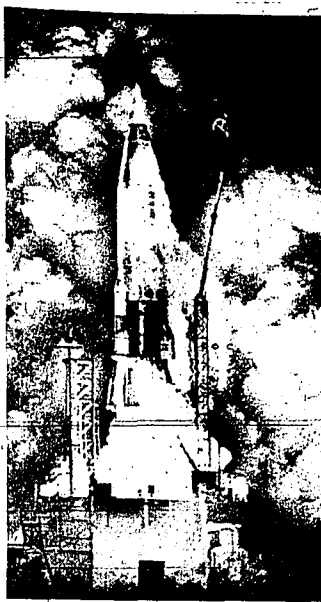

Executives to Seek Release Of Probation

PHILADELPHIA, Dec. 20 (AP)—Attorneys will present arguments in federal court today in behalf of 23 business executives placed on probation for periods up to five years last February in the government's anti-trust suit against 29 firms in the heavy electrical equipment industry.

The executives seek release from their probationary terms on grounds the sentences do not serve the ends of justice and that the individuals have observed the terms of probation.

Circuit Court Judge J. Cullen O'Day, who imposed the sentences after he convicted the firms and 44 individuals in the largest anti-trust suit ever prosecuted, will hear the arguments.

A justice department spokesman said Tuesday that the request would be opposed by the government.

Man Decides Boy's Mother To Get Fund

POCATELLO, Dec. 20 (AP)—Most of the money collected for the man who tried in vain to save a boy from an icy river will be turned over to the victim's mother.

That's the decision of 83-year-old Courtney Spencer, a car cleaner for the Union Pacific railroad.

Last Friday he jumped into the ice-clogged Portneuf river and grabbed 8-year-old Edward Denney III.

They went under the ice and the frigid water sapped Spencer's strength. He lost his grip.

The boy sank and Spencer was trapped beneath the ice. He broke through and men along the bank pulled him to safety with a tree branch.

He paid a call on Mrs. Darlene Vincent, mother of the boy, on Tuesday.

Admiring citizens have collected about \$500 for Spencer. But

he said he told Mrs. Vincent he would give her about \$200 and \$200 to pay for eye glasses he lost in the river, the \$89 in his wallet and the cost of hospitalization.

"I've been reimbursed for my financial loss," he told the mother. "But I realize you must have had quite a lot of expense."

"We feel you can't be paid enough," Mrs. Vincent replied. "I don't want pay for something like that," Spencer said.

The mother also thanked Spencer for signing at the boy's funeral Monday. She said the family heard Spencer was a singer and asked him to participate in the rite.

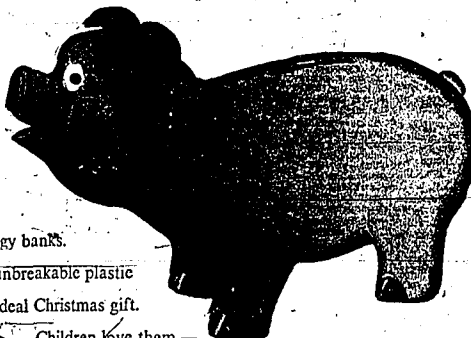

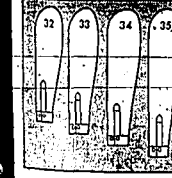

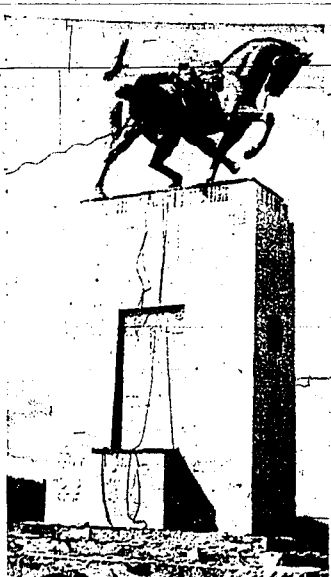

Anniversary of Atom Site Noted
 IDAHO FALLS, Dec. 20 (AP)—Ten years ago Wednesday the world's first usable electricity from atomic power was generated at the National Reactor Testing station in eastern Idaho.
 "The reactor which produced the power was built by Argonne National Laboratory and was the first to be put in operation at the Idaho test site near here. There are now 29 nuclear reactors at the station.
 As a result of information obtained from the initial experiments, a second reactor was constructed at a cost of 30 million dollars. It recently completed the first phase of low power tests. The new reactor is a prototype of a central power station that will generate 10 million watts of electricity.
 The Argonne National Laboratory is operated by the University of Chicago for the atomic energy commission.

Castro Used as Figurehead By Moscow-Run Cuba Reds
 By JOSE-MARIA ORIANDO, Associated Press Writer
 In the hectic first days of Fidel Castro's regime Cuba was depicted by a French writer as a circus with a bearded prime minister as ring master.
 Today the Caribbean island once known as the "Pearl of the Antilles" is fast becoming a circus but is becoming the first nation in the Western hemisphere to fall under the iron grip of international communism.
 Castro seems to be slowly losing his position as ring master. What Castro says will go on since the communist clique needs his popularity to stay on top. But the Reds have taken over control of government planning and are turning the former easy living in Cuba into a tightly organized communist state.
 Although there is some armed rebel activity the Castro regime's well-organized political-military machine makes improbable any internal uprising on a large scale at the present time.
 Anyone known to be out of sympathy with the government is either jailed or watched. The underground movement, smashed after April's abortive invasion, has not been able to reorganize itself, partly because of the differences among counterrevolutionary groups fighting one another for leadership.
 Castro himself is a paradox. Either sincerely persuaded or forced because he has no other way to turn for help, he is going

of a large part of the Cuban people even though his popularity is not as high as when he first took over.
 Food is scarce and there are other shortages in such key items as clothes, bathing soap, toothpaste, razor blades, brasieres.
 Castro's support comes largely from the interior where peasants—approximately 200,000 distributed in 600 collective farms—live under better conditions than they ever did before.
 But Cuba is an armed camp with 300,000 men and women out of a six million population in the militia or regular army.
 The big question mark in the all-out transformation of a Cuba known for gambling, drinking and dancing into a drab communist state is the Cuban people themselves.
 There are many who believe that the traditionally gay and hot-blooded Cubans will never accept the rigid discipline and austere life of a communist country.

Chinese Reds Halt Shelling For 100 Days

TAIPEI, Formosa, Dec. 20 (AP)—Today marked the 100th straight day in the Chinese mainland where no firing has taken place on the Quemoy islands, the longest period the Reds have kept their guns silent since the 1953 crisis.

Military observers on Formosa, however, doubted that the long silence on the part of the Reds had any real significance.

But no one would discount the possibility of a sudden renewal of Communist shelling of the island offshore islands.

There was much speculation that the Communists would launch a big protest bombardment following the recent U. N. assembly vote barring the admission of the Peiping regime.

But the reds kept silent and military sources said they observed no unusual activity by the Chinese soldiers opposite Quemoy.

Only a few days ago, Vice-Admiral Roland Emmet, commander of the U. S. Third Fleet's 7th defense command, flew to Quemoy for several hours on a routine inspection trip. He estimated the job just a few weeks before the Communists opened up with a bombardment that killed 13 and wounded 10 in August of 1948. Since that time, the reds have hurled more than 35,000 shells on the Quemoy complex.

Economists Query if Upturn Indicates Boom for America

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (AP)—Is it a boom?

That was what economists wondered today about the latest business advance report in October and November.

Government experts hesitated to say fully that a boom had developed. They conceded that the lousy performance of the economy of the past two months may have been the beginning of one.

"It is certainly worthy to be called," one official said.

The view among President Kennedy's own advisers was that business had rebounded handily from its late summer lull and possibly is exceeding even their optimistic forecasts.

The White House aides pointed out, however, that the economy is operating about \$9 billion dollars below capacity and that unemployment is still fairly high—6.1 per cent of the labor force in November.

Commerce Secretary Luther H. Hodges said personal income climbed by \$4 billion dollars in a big rise in the past two months. It reached a record annual rate of 4.2 billion dollars in a bid of an annual high of \$4.1 billion dollars in October.

U. S. Soldiers Will Reply to Red Shooting

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20 (U. S. AP)—U. S. soldiers flying helicopters into South Viet Nam this week will shoot back if the communists fire at them, informed sources said Tuesday.

"If anybody shoots at them, they're going to shoot back, believe me," one official said. Along with other increased aid, the United States has sent 400 helicopters, manned by about 400 men, to embattled South Viet Nam.

Sources indicated these helicopters will be used to airlift supplies and South Vietnamese troops over jungle and other roadless country to points where they may attack communist Viet Cong units.

The helicopters will be flown by Americans and will remain under American control. The aircraft themselves are not armed but the Americans operating them will have hand weapons, such as sub-machine guns, rifles and pistols. U. S. officials are aware that Americans may be wounded or killed in such actions, even though their mission will be one of supporting the South Vietnamese military effort rather than fighting themselves.

One such official said he is afraid the risk is one "the country has to accept if the United States is to get into this kind of continuing effort to halt communist penetration" of pro-Western countries.

The two army helicopter companies which arrived in Saigon recently have not yet gone into action, sources indicated.

Benefits Are Reinstated in 'Jeans' Case

NASHVILLE, Tenn., Dec. 20 (U. S. AP)—A Nashville woman, dropped from unemployment compensation rolls because she wore blue jeans to claim her check, will receive the remainder of her jobless benefits, starting in about two weeks.

Mrs. Mary Bell Turner, a laid-off packing plant worker and mother of four children, will miss the \$28 payment she had anticipated before Christmas, however. She was informed Monday that the blue jeans she wore to claim her weekly check failed to meet requirements that claimants must be "suitably attired."

Mrs. Turner reopened her claim for 200 weeks, which still has 100 weeks to run, and said she would appear for the payments in suits and dresses. Her next check will be ready in about two weeks. "I had been told not to come back in jeans," Mrs. Turner said, "but I was in a hurry and it just slipped by mind because I had more blue jeans than dresses."

State Employment Security Commissioner L. B. Jennings said this woman's claim has been reinstated.

"We're not trying to work a hardship on anyone," Jennings said. "We're trying to do the right thing with the largest sum of money and we're trying to find Mrs. Turner a job. But she stands a little chance of employment in many jobs of she is wearing blue jeans when she goes for an interview."

Her husband, W. O. Turner, works for the city street cleaning department.

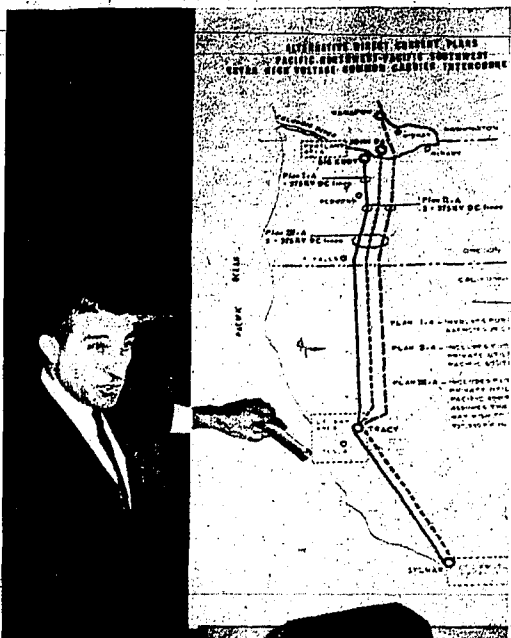

He regrets, however, that this sport has been downgraded in the United States because of previous gangster connections and because of misconceptions about the number of deaths and injuries it causes.

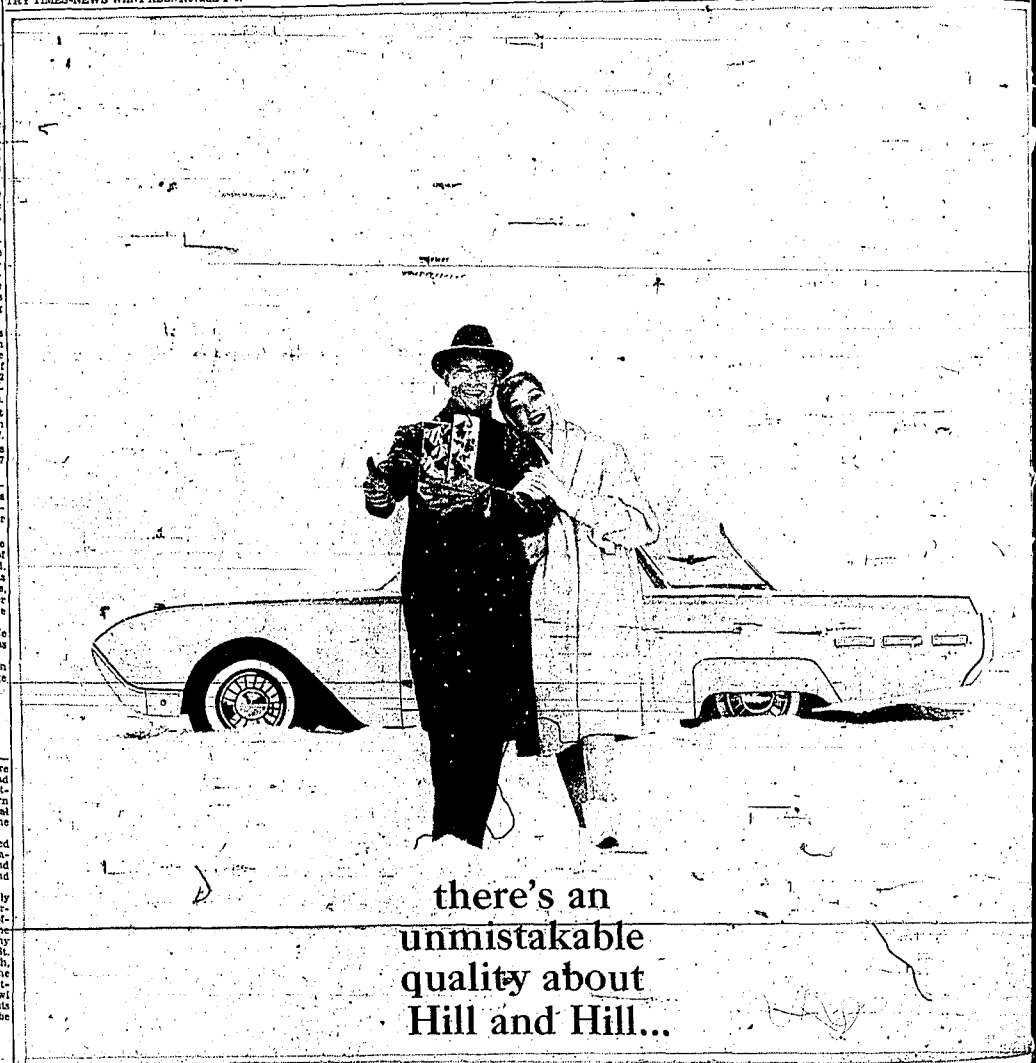
