"Cou" Games Fleece Local People Again

The gullible public continues to pay through the nose for fantastic schemes of all kinds, "double-crossing" William Grange, secretary-manager of the Twin Falls Chamber of Commerce.

The past year has been as bad as any I have seen in Twin Falls for attempts to fleece the public in literally hundreds of high-sounding schemes by fast-talking con men of one kind or another," he says, adding that the local chamber's affiliation with the National Better Business Bureau makes it possible to check on most of the "con games" in short order.

"But often they have taken in a number of innocent people before we are aware they are operating in our area," Grange notes.

"We would like to emphasize again that whenever you are contacted by any type of sales person whom you do not know, or about a product you do not know, the Chamber of Commerce will be glad to check up on it," he said.

He mentioned that "fly-by-night" roofing and siding companies again "made a kill" and the area through city police and the Chamber of Commerce collaborated to "clip the wings" of one such con man.

Unethical practices were reported to the chamber this year on picture-copying outfits, several correspondence schools and some magazine solicitation as well as a number of other single reports.

Grange says, "If I do not already have a report on the company or person in question, we will be happy to get one. We do have a listing of licensed schools, insurance men, and other professions and many other items."

He urged persons to do business with local firms with established reputations, rather than with traveling crews or through mailed advertising promotions.

"We have cases pending in our files now of instances where checks mailed to the goods have never been received," Grange says.

Grange notes that if the work is done locally, any unsatisfactory transactions can be mediated. "Consumer is not only partially in the right, a local merchant will give him the benefit of the doubt rather than antagonize him. An operator a thousand miles away doesn't care if he loses a customer. Even a letter to his local bank, where business bureau may not make an adjustment."

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Airlift Moves Principals of Laos Meeting

VIENTIANE, Laos, Dec. 26 (AP).—The international control commission today began an airlift of 225 neutralist and pro-communist troops to Vietnam for the long-awaited meeting Wednesday of Laos' three political princes.

The princes—pro-western Boun Oum, neutralist Souvanna Phouma, and pro-communist Souphannouvong—are to discuss allocation of posts in a coalition government headed by Souvanna Phouma. The three-day meeting is expected to be only the first of several that must be held before agreement is reached.

The first of five scheduled plane-flights arrived with 45 soldiers to guard Souvanna Phouma, all clad in French-style paratrooper fatigues and armed with Soviet and U. S. weapons. A second flight landed with 45 Pathet Lao troops assigned to Souphannouvong.

The two princes agreed Sunday to meet with Boun Oum, premier of the Vientiane royal government, after security arrangements for the talks were set up by their military representatives.

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Baylor's Ply Completes 14 Passes to Lead Rebels to 35-10 Win Against North

MIAMI, Fla., Dec. 26 (AP)—The South again has conquered the North in the Shrine's annual college all-star series, and the latest hero of this football civil war is Baylor's strong-armed quarterback, Bobby Ply. The swift Texan pulled a slow-moving Yankee offense with 14 successful passes to three talented receivers Monday night and the Rebels, favored by only a point, rolled to an easy 35-10 victory.

Glen Glass of Tennessee was the catcher on a 46-yard touchdown aerial pass, and Miami's top end, Larry Wilson and Altona Bill Miller, snaged two other fly scoring throws for 10 and 7 yards.

Ply also sneaked a yard for a fourth touchdown in winning the press box vote as the most valuable player of this series which the South now leads, eight wins to six.

The game is played for the benefit of the Shrine's hospitals for crippled children, but the financial return was the lowest in the series' history. Only 10,000 fans turned out in cold weather that dropped the temperature into the 40s during the game.

In completing 14 of 20 passes, ply overshadowed the North's quarterback, Eddie Wilson, of Arizona, who had an off night with 15 out of 30 throws.

For line defensive work against the South's overwhelming attack, center Larry Orest of Northwestern was picked as the outstanding player for the North.

MELBOURNE, Australia, Dec. 26 (AP)—Emerson and Rod Laver, ignominious a brilliant swimmer, sent the temperature over the 100-degree mark, gave Australia a 3-0 lead over Italy in the Davis cup tennis tournament by winning their opening singles matches.

Emerson, who won the American championship at Forest Hills, N.Y., last September by downing Laver in the final, needed only 10 minutes to whip Wilson, 6-1, 6-0, 6-0. Then Laver, the Wimbledon champion, chased the Britisher, 6-4, 6-0, 6-0.

Ohio State Is Choice as Top Team in U.S.

NEW YORK, Dec. 26 (AP)—Ohio State, for the first time this season, was the unanimous choice today as college basketball's No. 1 team and if it continues to finish its work unbeaten no one is going to argue with that rating.

For the Buckeyes, who received the first place vote of every one of the 25 outstanding coaches in the nation, and third-place vote of the United Press International rating board for a perfect score of 60 points, start play Wednesday night in the Los Angeles classic, which drew three other teams in the top 10 in the nation's field.
