# NATIONAL WHIRLWIG

WASHINGTON, Dec. 22—There is a persistent rumor that the Kennedy administration may take its hair-down next month through a bill that would require a 100 per cent program for the nation's farm products.

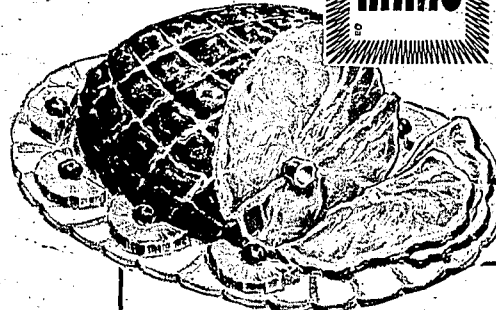

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### Action Filed For Pay on Seed Beans

A \$43,420 civil suit was filed Wednesday in district court by Irvin V. Haney and Richard J. Haney, co-owners of the Haney Seed company, seeking payment for 400 bags of Pinto beans allegedly sold to the Magic Valley Bean company.

Named as co-defendants are the Magic Valley Bean company, Western Warehouse company and Mountain States Wholesale company.

The petition states that during June, 1960, the Haney Seed company agreed to sell the Magic Valley Bean company 400 bags of No. 1 grade Pinto beans. The beans were stored in the Western Warehouse company facility at Gooding, were to be released from storage to the purchaser upon request, the petition stated.

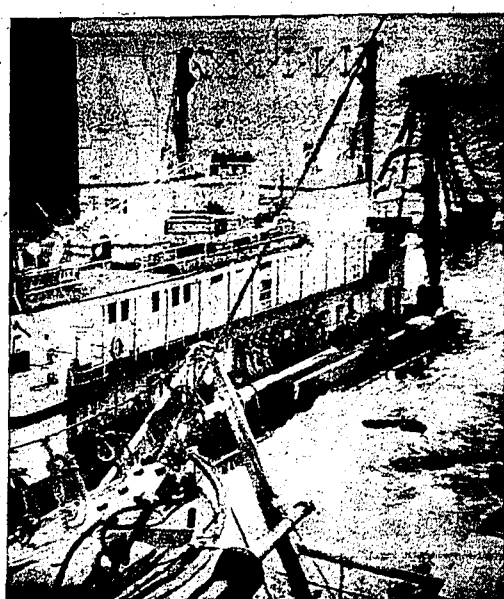
The Magic Valley Bean company asked the Haney Seed company to notify the warehouse to release the beans to the Mountain States Wholesale company, a carrier designated by the bean company.

The warehouse was instructed to do so by the seed company, but prior to the time the warehouse released the beans, the seed company reversed its decision and ordered the warehouse not to release the beans, the petition explained.

"Contrary to instruction," the warehouse released the beans to the Mountain States Wholesale company, the seed company contends.

According to the petition, the warehouse company claims to have delivered the beans to the Magic Valley Bean company, but the bean company maintains it has never received the beans and is willing to pay for them.

### Tugboat Skipper Battles Sea For Ship Abandoned in Gale

**BOSTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—**The skipper of a Canadian tugboat fought the sea today for a four million dollar prize—the drifting dredge Cartagena abandoned by her crew in a fierce Atlantic gale.

Capt. James Shear of the 800-gross ton Foundation Vigilant vowed to stand by the powerless dredge, wallowing in huge swells, usually 17 1/2 miles or 1 1/2 feet across a line.

Shear had his job cut out—something like trying to lasso a whale. The Cartagena is 170 feet long and 48 feet wide, and has an 80-ton crane on its aft deck. The crew swung dangerously in the wind, threatening to crash down and split the ship.

The coast guard reported early today that winds at the scene, 250 miles east of Nantucket Island, took a curious shift and were blowing from alternate directions. The effect, the coast guard explained, was to collar the sea a bit, giving Shear a better chance to secure the giant dredge.

In Halifax, Nova Scotia, a spokesman for Foundation Maritime Ltd., owner of the tug, said the attempt to put a line aboard the dredge would be made at daylight. He said four crewmen of the tug were put aboard the dredge at 4 p. m. yesterday—less than 24 hours after 19 crewmen abandoned the craft.

The crew of the Cartagena arrived here last night aboard the coast guard cutter Acushnet. They told a harrowing story of endurance and heroism while 40-foot waves and hurricane force gusts threatened to send the vessel to the bottom.

### New Russian Envoy Being Sent to U.S.

**WASHINGTON, Dec. 23 (AP)—**rising young expert on the Americas was designated Wednesday as the Soviet Union's new ambassador to the United States.

The change in ambassadors is not taken as a sign of any alteration in basic Moscow policy, but there is some speculation that the new man may take a wider diplomatic role than that played by the man he succeeded.

The state department disclosed it has given its approval to the appointment of Anatoly Fedorovich Dobrynin to succeed Mikhail A. Menshikov in the Soviet Union's most important ambassadorial post.

It has not yet been announced when the 42-year-old Dobrynin will take over the embassy. Menshikov said Tuesday he would be returning next month to Moscow after nearly four years in the Washington post.

It is standard diplomatic procedure to obtain the assent of the host nation before assigning an ambassador. Usually, approval is a routine formality but the practice does give the host government an opportunity to express itself. On rare occasions a prospective appointee is rejected.

Dobrynin is not a top communist party figure but has been a career diplomat since 1945 and for more than a year has been chief of the American countries division of the Soviet ministry of foreign affairs.

He speaks English and French fluently and knows this country well, having served about eight years in the embassy here and at the United Nations in New York. From 1957 to 1960 he was an undersecretary in the U.N. secretariat.

### 2 Solons Report U. S. Funds for Idaho Hospital

**IDaho FALLS, Dec. 23 (AP)—**A federal grant of \$277,040 has been approved by the U. S. public health service for a nursing home remodeling project at the Idaho Falls LDS hospital, according to Sen. Frank Church and Rep. Ralph Harding, Idaho Democrats.

The grant will make possible a remodeling project which will add 50 more beds to the building at a total cost of \$445,800. The structure now has 20 beds.

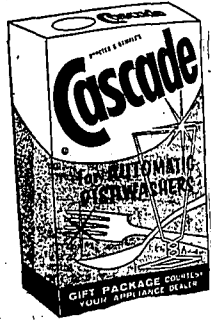

**Doctor Gives Hefty Airmen Dieting Plan**

LONDON, Dec. 28 (AP)—Four American airmen at two U. S. air bases in Britain have been ordered to slim down. The order has gone out to more than 100 flight crews and about 2,000 ground crewmen to reduce to 10 pounds below the maximum permitted weight. "If you stick to the figures in the book and take a man off a diet as soon as he reaches the permitted maximum, he'll be five pounds overweight again in a couple of weeks," said Lieut. Col. James Asher, flight surgeon at Bentwaters Base in Suffolk. Asher said the reducing drive was a precaution against coronary heart disease. "We've had one man 28 suffering from the disease and he was overweight," the doctor explained. The average day's menu at the bases serves a man about 3,000 calories, but "where necessary we'll put men on a diet which will cut the calorie intake by half," Asher said. As a start, the fatter have been told to cut out bread, potatoes, candy and liquor.

**Shocks Trouble Peruvian Town**

LIMA, Dec. 28 (AP)—Townfolk alarmed by persistent earth shocks fleeing their homes in the tiny community of Acos in southeastern Peru, it was reported today. Dozens of families have fled to the ancient Inca capital of Cuzco, nearest city to Acos, while others are camping out in the hills overlooking the town. The tiny farm community has been rocked by seven or eight earthquakes a day for the past two weeks. The quakes have caused considerable damage, but there has been no report of casualties.

A wide variety of pork cuts will be offered at many American dining tables this week-end to help usher in a happy new year.  
Pork will be the top attraction in many supermarkets in the Northeast, Southeast and Midwest, although traditional regional favorites also play a part in pork's popularity. Fresh ham, for example, is an old favorite in the Northeast, but in the Southeast it's hog jowls and blackeye peas.

Other pork items on sale include fresh picnic shoulders, smoked ham, sausage and bacon. All this gives the housewife who produced a turkey for Christmas dinner a chance to vary the holiday menu a bit. For those who chose ham a week ago, turkeys remain an outstanding bargain in many areas. The biggest birds are the biggest bargain in the Southwest, Arizona and Texas. Young chickens also are a top buy in the Southwest, but are higher in the Midwest and Southern California.

Other outstanding buys among vegetables include carrots, onions, potatoes, celery, squash and lettuce. Good buys in some sections are broccoli, eggplant, green onions, spinach, green beans, corn, cucumbers, radishes and sweet potatoes.  
Fruit counters boast of apples, avocados, grapefruit, oranges and cranberries, while the good buy list includes limes, coconuts, bananas, lemons, pears and tangerines.  
Pecans remain plentiful, while almonds, filberts and walnuts also are reported to be good buys in many areas.

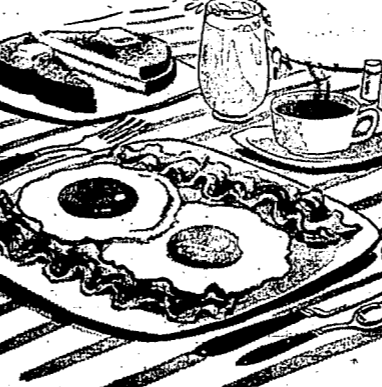

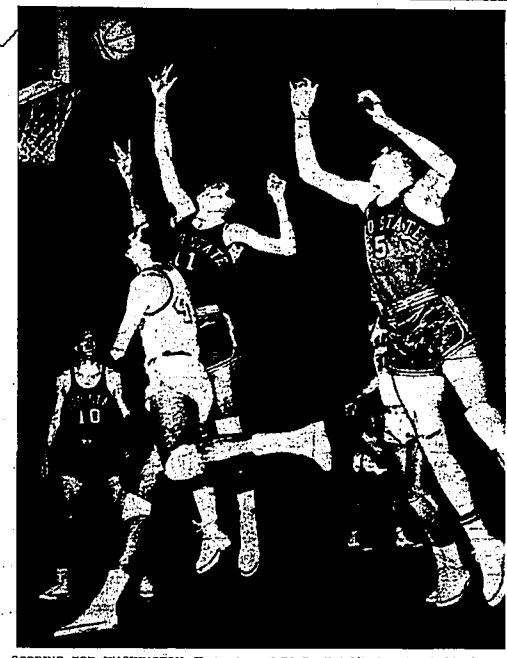
