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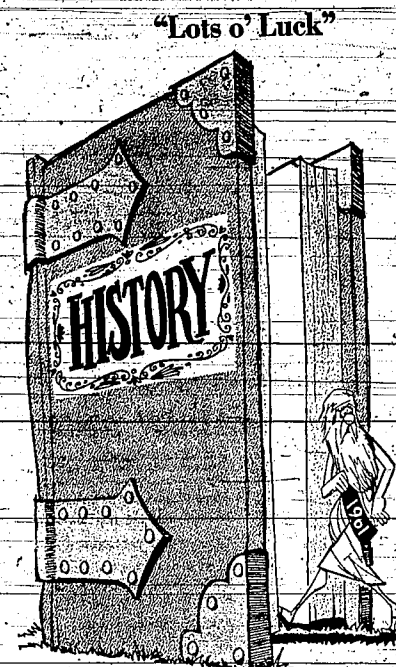

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Challenge

More emphasis on state and local government and less on federal authority is a touted article of Republican faith.

Former President Eisenhower, himself a staunch advocate of stronger state-local control of affairs, frankly declares that power gravitated to Washington because the states failed to deal with many major public problems.

If they wish to regain lost authority, he says, then they must face up to the multiplying needs which arise within their borders.

Actually, some governors sympathetic to the "less federal control" approach now see the problem in a different light.

One vigorous young governor says privately that the states today ought to concentrate on the things they are presently doing—and get ready for new problems arising—rather than try to grab functions back from Washington.

His view is that the whole range of governmental tasks is becoming so complex that without the most determined state efforts in current and developing state functions will pass to the federal government by default.

Already well documented is the tendency of U.S. urban areas to look to congress and the White House for help on such matters as housing, urban renewal, mass transit, stream pollution.

Officials versed in federal-state relations foresee the prospect of further federal moves in this field. They say pressures are mounting for enlarged federal effort, too, in the realms of highway safety and insurance regulation.

Chief Facing Tough Fight, Solon Claims

WASHINGTON, Jan. 1 (AP)—Senate Democratic Leader Mike Mansfield, Mont., said today President Kennedy is going to have to carry a heavy political load in the session of congress ahead.

Mansfield said in an interview he is preparing for a difficult session in which he expects a tough kind of battle over key administration programs. "We are going to miss Speaker Carl Albert, who did so much to get the administration program moving in the 1956 session," Mansfield said. "The burden on the President to help get his proposals approved is going to be heavier than ever."

Mansfield expressed confidence the Senate will approve a revised international trade program and a measure to provide medical care for the elderly through the social security system if it gets the chance to act on them.

He said it would be only a futile gesture for the Senate to consider any measure unless they first are passed by the House.

Mansfield indicated he thinks Kennedy is going to have to pull out all the stops to get House acceptance of his proposals in these controversial fields.

Red, Afro-Asian Pressures Push U.N. Executive Shifts

UNITED NATIONS, N. Y., Jan. 1 (AP)—Pressure from Asian, African and communist countries for more top-level jobs in the U. N. secretariat will be reflected in a series of executive shifts expected soon.

In a few weeks, diplomats report, a Czechoslovak communist will take over from a Chinese Nationalist as chief of a department. Two Africans will become heads of other departments, while a Panamanian shifts to another post and a key American official leaves the U. N. secretariat altogether.

The change will be acting Secretary-General U. Thant's first major staff reorganization since the Burma diplomat took office Nov. 1. His predecessor, Dag Hammarskjold, had been under increasing pressure to make adjustments and everything else needed to hold meetings. Supervising these operations is not regarded as a key policy job. The informants say that the other two new undersecretaries, Solicitor General Godfrey K. J. Amehre of Nigeria and Ambassador Oman Loufi of the United Arab Republic, also will become heads of departments.

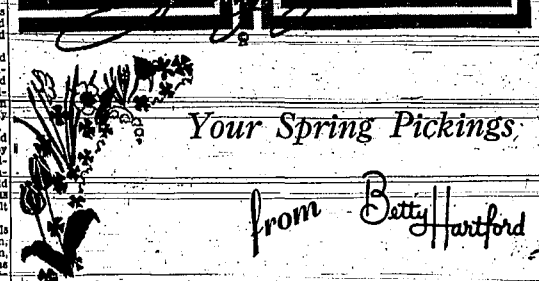

Cracking of Genetic Code Is Dangerous, Doctor Declares

DENVER, Colo., Jan. 1—A medical geneticist voiced concern here that the recent partial cracking of the genetic code might lead to "dangerous tampering with the human species."

Dr. A. G. Steinberg of Western Kentucky University said that U.S. public health service scientists "might well find in the foreseeable future to methods of directing mutations and changing genes at will."

He declared such a development could be of great potential benefit to man.

But he added: "It also would raise dangerous possibilities because some scientists throughout the world—possibly some under political command and even others who might be well-intentioned—would try to control the genetic makeup of man at a time when we are not ready for it sociologically. We witnessed a somewhat similar 'try' when Hitler and his Nazis ordered the sterilization experiments."

He made the comments in an interview at the 122th meeting of the American Association for the Advancement of Science.

The recent research to which he referred was the work of the national institutes of health. They succeeded in partially unravelling the complex intracellular chemical code involved in the reproduction of all living matter—and in the transmission of genetic traits from generation to generation.

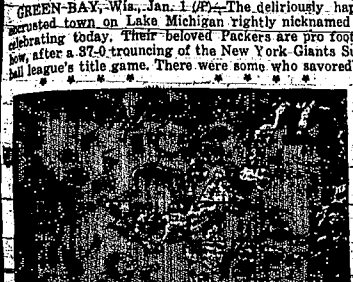

Wild Celebration Grips Green Bay After Packers Trounce N.Y. Giants 37-0



GREEN BAY, Wis., Jan. 1 (AP)—The deliriously happy population of this ice-encrusted town on Lake Michigan rightly nicknamed "Frogfoot U.S.A." was still celebrating today. Their beloved Packers are pro football's world champions, and now, after a 37-0 trouncing of the New York Giants Sunday in the National Football league's title game. There were some who savored the victory even more. One was Paul Hornung, the army private on leave from Ft. Riley, Kans., who knew his celebrating days were numbered as he prepared to return to duty.

Only five days after being crowned the NFL player of the year, the golden-haired star from Notre-Dame—in—over—and through the Giants in racking up a record consisting of a game total of 19 points on a six-yard touchdown, fieldgoals of 17, 22 and 19 yards and four extra points.

Bert Starr, the Alabama graduate, was another. He has never received the title of his New York counterpart, Y. A. Title and Charley Conerly, but proved to be the best quarterback Sunday. He passed for touchdowns of 14 and 13 yards to Ron Kramer and 13 to another army private, Boyd Dowler, who served this county in Wisconsin's 32nd national guard division at Ft. Lewis, Wash.

Then there were the members of another winning group of Packers, the defensive unit, which held the Giants—high-powered offense to only 150 yards. This alert group, led by line-man Henry Jordan and Willie Davis, and backs Jesse Wittleson and Hank Gremminger, caused Title to have four of his passes intercepted—and allowed the Giants inside Green Bay's 10-yard line only once.

"We have no excuses," said New York coach Alie Sherman. "This was a much better Packers team that went on 20-17 in Milwaukee and in an exhibition game. It was just one of those days. We made too many mistakes—some a good football team that knew how to take advantage of them."

"We didn't do anything special, but we were the greatest team in the league today," Green Bay coach Vince Lombardi said after the victory. His first-in-two games—interrupted as Packers' coach, the factory brought Green Bay its seventh title.

After a scoreless first quarter, Hornung scored on the first play of the second period, completing an 80-yard march. Three plays later, he ran for a 23-yard touchdown. The third Green-Bay touchdown followed Gremminger's interception of another pass and eight plays and a fumble later, Starr passed 15 yards to Kramer. Hornung's 47-yard field goal came just as the half closed with a 20-0 score.

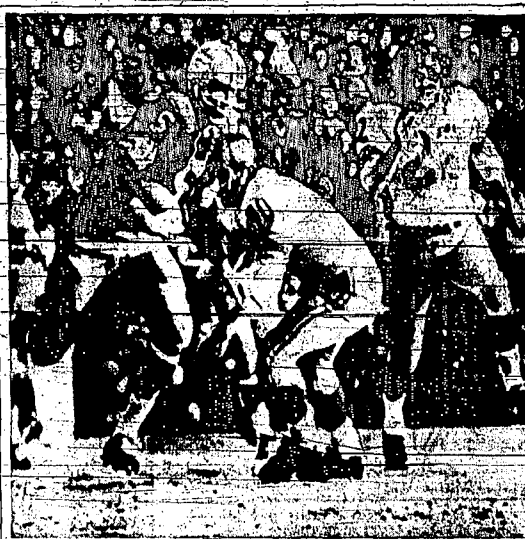
Hornung added his 22-yard field goal after a fumble, and then after the Giants again were spotted, the Packers went into Milwaukee with 16-0. Hornung wound up the scoring with his fourth-period field goal.

Chicago gained 92 yards in 20 rushing attempts and got 47 more on three pass completions. Jim Taylor, who wore apart the Giants in Milwaukee with 18 yards, got 60 in 14 tries.

Title, phenomenal in the championship all year for the Giants, completed only 49 of 114 passes. Charley Conerly fared better, getting four of eight for 64 yards. Alex Webster, the league's best passer this year, got only 19 yards in seven tries for New York.
