**Police Guard Churches in Midwest City**

**Chief Gives Pledge Prior To Takeover**

SANTO DOMINGO, Dominican Republic, Jan. 2 (AP)—Donnelly, president-to-be of the new Dominican council of state, promised Dominican citizens a period of calm and discussion Monday and warned the armed forces against interference in the affairs of the new anti-Trujillo government.

Donnelly, named to succeed President Joaquin Balaguer as head of the ruling military council at the swearing-in of the seven-member council that freedom to meet and discuss all issues will be observed "because truth can be achieved only through conscientious and dispassionate discussion."

He asserted that the council which assumed all legislative and executive powers until installation of an elected government early in 1962, would also "our decided endeavor to maintain unalterable" the armed forces in the hands of the military. He said, must restrict its activities "to the defense of the independence and integrity of the republic to protect the rights of man."

Mrs. Gen. Pedro Rodriguez Zayas, chief of the armed forces, who was vowed to support the council, stood behind Donnelly as he spoke. Rodriguez Zayas led a military revolt which crushed a coup planned by Trujillo diehards last October and paved the way for the return of the family of the late Dominican President.

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**Udall Decision May Affect Irrigators in West States**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—The effect of two far-reaching decisions on the application of federal reclamation laws made by Interior Secretary Stewart L. Udall as 1961 drew to a close will be felt for years throughout the 17 western states.

The decisions involved irrigation projects in California, but their significance extends far beyond the borders of that state.

Acting on a legal opinion prepared by department Solicitor Bruce W. Udall, Udall refused to sign a long-term repayment contract with water users in the Kings river and Kern river areas in California's Central Valley.

On the other hand, Udall approved an agreement between the federal government and the state of California for joint construction of the San Luis dam and reservoir in the San Joaquin valley project.

**Service Names New Monument Chief in Idaho**

WASHINGTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Merle E. Silt, chief park ranger at Lassen volcanic national park, Calif., has been named to succeed Floyd A. Henderson as superintendent of Graciers of the Moon national monument, the interior department announced today.

Henderson has been reassigned to the San Francisco regional office of the national park service as a supervisory park planner.

Silt, 41, has been chief ranger at Lassen since 1958.

Both decisions involved the application of the highly controversial 160-acre limitation.

Under federal reclamation laws dating back to 1902, irrigation water from a federal reclamation project cannot be supplied to more than 160 acres owned by any one person—320 acres in the case of a family.

In the San Luis decision, interior department attorneys decided that the 160-acre limitation did not apply to lands in the state's part of the project.

In the Kings-Kern decision, the decision was that lump-sum payment or advance payment by water users of their share of the construction costs of reservoirs did not relieve them from the acreage limitation.

But it was immediately apparent that Udall's decision was the final word.

Attorney General Robert F. Kennedy said he concurred with both decisions but then proceeded to cast doubt on the San Luis decision.

Kennedy said "strong arguments" could be advanced that Congress had not intended to lift

**Police Say Careless Smoking Caused Fire Deaths of Five**

BUFFALO, N. Y., Jan. 2 (AP)—Police today blamed careless smoking and a burning blanket tossed on a back porch for a fire that killed five children in a two-story half-story frame building here yesterday.

Police said the blaze was started by the children's aunt, Wilma Mae Mitchell, 29, who awakened around 8 a.m., discovered her blanket afire—apparently from a cigarette—and tossed the smoldering blanket onto a tiny back porch that opened onto the rear stairs.

Miss Mitchell was in the driveway beside the house, with a broken, unlit cigarette when she jumped from her second floor window.

Mrs. Mitchell has six children, holding in her arms her youngest, her only child, eight-month-old baby.

Mrs. Mitchell's five other children—Dolores, 8; Betty Jean, 6; Ronald, 5; Linda, 4; and Angela, 17 months—were clear.

And a fireman, looking across the street at the recent-painted building, said "They were gone by the time we got here. Anybody in there when we turned the corner just couldn't have been alive. It was impossible."

Mrs. Mitchell's eight-year-old husband lives in California, and left the smoldering blanket on the porch.

She said she did not realize a fire had started until she heard her four oldest children screaming in their bedroom at the back of the apartment.

Carrying the baby, she left her bedroom and saw the smoke. She ran downstairs to get the baby to safety; then was unable to get back to save her other children, witnesses reported.

**Current Law To Regulate Utah Firms**

SALT LAKE CITY, Jan. 2 (AP)—The Utah business corporation act is now in effect. Among other things, it takes jurisdiction over corporate business away from the county clerks and gives it to the secretary of state.

Such things as articles of incorporation, annual reports and business names must now be filed with the secretary of state's office. He is also empowered to initiate court action against corporations for violations of the act.

Passed by the 1961 legislature, the law sets several new standards for corporations. It went into effect Jan. 1.

It specifies the source from which any stock dividends must be made. It also requires that initial and annual filings include a current list of corporate stockholders, an estimate of its business volume and its roster of officers and directors.

The filing fee for articles of incorporation is increased from \$10 to \$20, and the state-licensing fee is raised from 25 cents to 50 cents on the face value of each \$1,000 in authorized stock.

Riley had served eight terms in congress and was first elected to the 59th congress in 1906. He served the late H. P. Sumner of Orangeburg. He served two terms before he was defeated by Hugo B. Sikes Jr., who lost to Riley in a bid to succeed himself in the next congressional election. Riley then was reelected six times.

### Feathers, Shells Once Valued As Precious Gems

NEW YORK, Jan. 2. — Today, they say, diamonds are a girl's best friend. But once it was feathers or shells, says an expert on the history of jewelry.

Even now—the most prized jewel among some people is not a diamond, but a shell or a feather. In some parts of the Philippine Islands, for instance, the teeth of puppies are considered a precious gem, said Charles Derby.

Derby is a gemologist—an expert on the history of stones as well as judging their value. He is with the firm of Harry Winston, Inc.

In an interview, Derby talked at fascinating length about the history of gems—how feathers, for instance, were jewels to some primitive peoples. Some tribes also pierced sea shells which first served as a primitive money and then became "money" for bartering.

Bilver coins were hammered into necklaces during the era of Rome. The Spanish explorers, who were the first to bring to the New World the precious gem of the South sea, polished porpoise into jewelry for their queens.

The story of the gem is as old as man. Before the dawn of civilization, man used to make jewelry from shells and feathers. 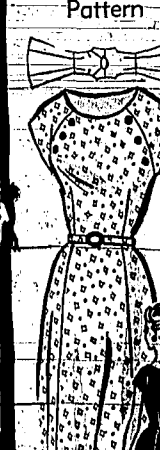

PASADENA, Calif., Jan. 2 (AP)—Minnesota's power running and strategic aerial strikes wrecked the Rose Bowl dream of the UCLA Bruins Monday and gave the Golden Gophers a redemptive 21-0 triumph in this post-season classic. All-America quarterback Sandy Stephens led the Big Ten team to touchdowns in the first and second quarters and sewed up the aggressive duel with another with less than three minutes to go into this 48th edition of the oldest of all bowl games. The 212-pound Stephens, a senior, scored two of the touchdowns before 98,241 spectators in helping to atone for Minnesota's 7-0 defeat of the Washington Huskies here a year ago.

### LSU Beats Colorado 25-7 in Orange Bowl

MIAMI, Fla., Jan. 2 (AP)—An alert Louisiana State defense throttled Colorado, except for a spectacular 69-yard pass interception return, and the Tigers, sparked by Wendell Hantz, reclaimed the Orange Bowl football victory Monday. The mistake-prone Louisianaans, perhaps playing their final game for coach Paul Dietzel, rumored headed for Army, blocked two Chuck McBride punts for a touchdown and a safety. A tremendous rush put on McBride at the start of the third quarter resulted in a hurried missile-shoot kick which got only 18 yards.

Alabama took a 10-0 season record and the No. 1 ranking into the game and proved both were genuine. A record of \$2,910 tickets were sold, but an unseasonable 41 degrees made for a few vacant seats. Alabama scored 14 points on 17 plays of play in a 37-minute game highlighted by Mike Francis's 43-yard dash to the rest of the way on a roll out. Francis was named the outstanding player of the game by press box vote, winning the annual Miller-Digby Award. He was the game's leading runner, gaining with 123 yards on 20 carries.

Once more the Buckeyes received the nation's vote of the year. Cincinnati (10-1), which dropped to 10-2, Kansas State and Wisconsin—101-71 in that order—in the New York 2000 Holiday festival play, was a solid choice for second with 37 points.

Then came Kentucky (8-1), Kansas State (10-1), Villanova (11-0), Southern California (9-2), Kansas (9-2), Duke (8-1), Mississippi State (9-0) and Bowling Green (8-1).

And dropping from the elite group were the second and West Virginia, who lost just in the widespread touring fling.

### Blaze Deaths Reach 7-Year High in 1961

BOSTON, Jan. 2 (AP)—Fire deaths in the United States during 1961 totaled 11,700—the highest in seven years, it was reported today.

The National Fire Protection Association, a non-profit fire safety organization, said property loss from fire hit a record high of 1.61 billion dollars.

Of the total dead, 6,100 including 1,600 children, perished in home fires. The 11,700 total was 250 more than in 1960.

The two largest fatal building fires were the San Francisco hotel fire of Jan. 6 which took 20 lives, and the Hartford, Conn., hospital fire of Dec. 8 in which 16 died.

U. S. CITIZEN PARDONED  
MANILA, Jan. 2 (AP)—William Pomeroy, an American pardoned after serving nine years in prison as a convicted leader of the communist Huk rebels, was held on an island in the Manila port area today, awaiting deportation as an undesirable alien.

### Indian Vessel Capsizes; Toll Placed at 100

BOMBAY, India, Jan. 2 (AP)—A coastal boat capsized and sank yesterday afternoon in the Savitri river, 100 miles south of Bombay. Unofficial estimates placed the death toll as high as 100.

Authorities said there were 100 passengers at the time of the accident, even though the boat has a capacity of only 50. By nightfall, 70 bodies had been recovered, according to unofficial reports. Official figures placed the death toll at 83.

The cause of the accident was not determined.

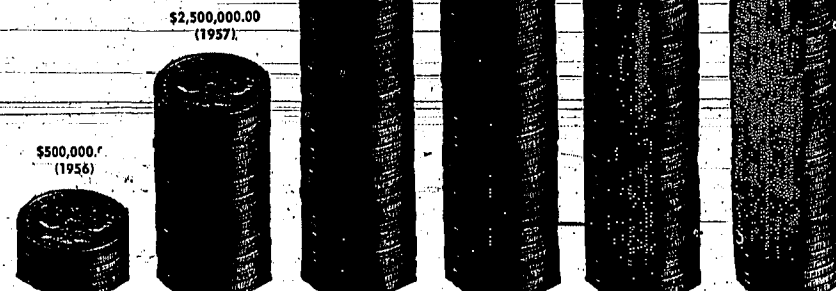
