Auto Mishap Is Basis for Damage Suit

Mr. and Mrs. Floyd Dorius filed a \$10,850 damage suit in district court Tuesday against the White Top Cab company and Frederick H. Catron for injuries Mrs. Dorius allegedly received in a traffic accident July 28, 1960, at Fifth Street and Second Avenue north, Twin Falls.

Mrs. Dorius was a passenger in a car driven by her husband. The car was struck by a White Top Cab driven by Catron at the intersection, the petition states.

Mr. and Mrs. Dorius claim that Catron "negligently drove" the cab into the side of the Dorius vehicle.

Mrs. Dorius states the accident caused an impairment of her right shoulder, laceration of her right elbow and contusions and abrasions of the right lower leg.

"The injuries have caused her, and will continue to cause, severe pain, suffering, weakness and inconvenience," she notes.

They ask \$10,000 general damages, \$148 doctor expenses, \$500 for damage to their car, \$50 for damage to her wardrobe, \$8 damage to her dress, \$3 for cost of cleaning clothes, \$33.30 car towing costs and \$150 for lost earnings.

Retraining of Labor Asked At City Level

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 3—Dr. Clark Kerr, president of the University of California, said today: community level retraining programs are needed to help unskilled workers meet the challenge of automation.

Kerr told a press conference that the presidential labor-management committee, of which he is a member, will recommend the retraining program to President Kennedy next week.

Kerr, however, said the retraining plan is not the responsibility of the federal government but a local responsibility for school districts and unions.

"The Los Angeles area, according to Kerr, has the particular problem of displacing unskilled labor because it "meets labor skills for the 21st century."

"One solution," Kerr said, "is to transport unskilled laborers to other areas."

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U2 Crashes in South Swamp After Flight

PICAVUNE, Miss., Jan. 3—A U2 jet aircraft—the same type which was downed over the Soviet Union in 1960—crashed in the Picaavune Pearl river swamps Tuesday night.

The pilot, Capt. Charles J. Stenlund, 42, was reported safe early today by authorities at Keeler air force base, Miss.

Capt. William M. Orr, deputy public information officer at Keeler, said Stenlund was perched in a tree and "he's okay."

Stenlund's home is in Detroit, Mich. but he, his wife and two children live at Laughlin air force base, Del Rio, Tex.

Rescue parties from the air force and the coast guard entered the swampy area at daybreak.

Orr said the U2 was attached to the 408th strategic wing at Laughlin air force base. It was on a flight from Del Rio to Birmingham, Ala. and return.

"The plane, in flames, crashed about 1:30 p.m. Witnesses reported seeing the fiery craft from as far away as New Orleans—76 miles south-southwest of Picaavune."

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Dietzel Might Take Army Job Thursday

WEST POINT, N.Y., Jan. 3 (AP)—Paul Dietzel is expected to sign as head coach at Army this week with a five-year contract calling for \$20,000. The announcement probably will be made Thursday, allowing time for the 38-year-old former West Point aide to make an amicable break with Louisiana State, where his \$15,000 contract has four years to run.

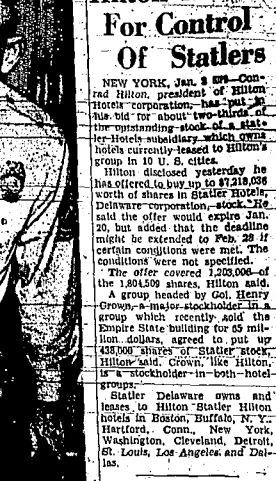

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (AP)—Control of Hilton, president of Hilton Hotels Corporation, has been bid for by a group of stockholders of the outstanding stock of a state-employee subsidiary which owns the currently leased to Hilton Hotel in U.S. cities.

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Spud Bleach Product Said To Be Unsafe

WASHINGTON, Jan. 3 (AP)—The food and drug administration advised all restaurant operators Tuesday to stop immediately all use of a potato bleaching compound known as "Whitex."

The agency said some of this product is contaminated by a poison—sodium fluosulfate. "It is not known how widely the toxic product has been distributed," FDA's announcement said. "Illnesses, not fatal, have so far been reported from Williston, N.D., and Horseheads, N.Y."

"Small shipments are known to be widely scattered throughout the United States."

FDA said "Whitex is manufactured by the American Potash and Chemical Corp., Kingsport, Tenn. It said the product is used in solution by restaurants as a dip to preserve the fresh color of peeled potatoes such as those used for French fries."

"There is no sale of the product for home use and no other manufacturer of potato dips is involved," FDA said, adding that "accidental substitution of the poison 'sodium fluosulfate' in place of sodium bisulfite apparently caused the contamination."

At Kingsport, J. MackRay, who operates a cafeteria and catering business, said he heads the company. He said, adding that drug agency representative analyzed samples of all "Whitex" ingredients and found no sodium fluosulfate was found, and he was given the go-ahead on production. He said he agreed to shut down shipments found contaminated.

About one million people ate French fries with "Whitex" during the period when about 10 got sick, Ray said, and no other complaints were reported. He said he sells to a variety store chain which uses his product at lunch counters across the country.

Court Checks U2 Telegram Teacher Case

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 3 (AP)—The case of the former Bremerton school teacher who sent a telegram to the President urging an apology for the U.S. flight over Russia is under scrutiny by Superior Judge Charles Wright.

West Hoping Berlin Battle 'Less Likely'

BERLIN, Jan. 3 (AP)—East-West war over Berlin appears less likely than a year ago but took for new periods of crisis and tension ahead.

That seems to be the feeling of both Berliners and some Western officials. "Two reasons are heard why war seems more remote than in 1961. One is that Soviet Premier Khrushchev apparently has become more seriously than he did a year ago 'Western' determination to defend West Berlin and its access routes. Khrushchev has withdrawn his deadline for signing a peace treaty with communist East Germany and has not rattled his missiles recently.

The other reason is that the status quo in Berlin is more bearable to the communists than the situation that existed a year ago. Then thousands of refugees each month, including many technicians, teachers and students, were pouring out of East

Germany through West Berlin. The satellite regime was threatened with collapse. The communists feared that border wall through the heart of the city in August. That dashed the idea of refugees to a trickle, solving their most critical problem.

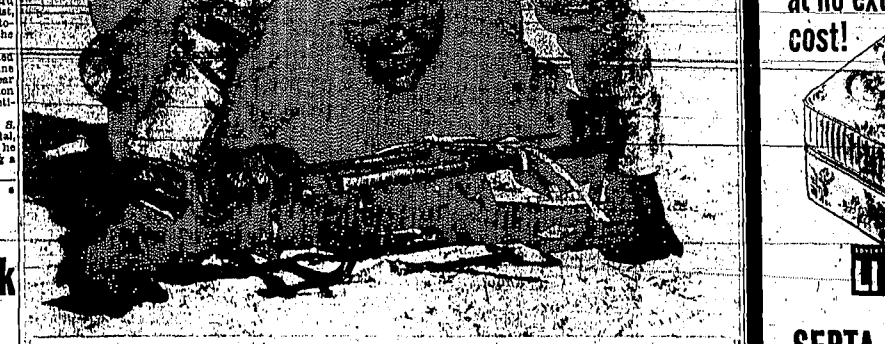
U. S. Forecasts China Food Lack
