





### Court Lauds Gem Lawyers At Ceremony

**BOISE, Jan. 9 (AP)—**The Idaho supreme court conducted memorial services Tuesday in honor of the late Justice of the State Bar who died during the past year.

Paul Emmers, Graniteville attorney, told those attending the ceremony that the gem lawyers "are charged with safeguarding the rights and privileges which our forefathers fought so bravely and vigorously to obtain."

Members of the bar who died during the past year were: A. L. Merrill, Pocatello; Thomas Williams, Idaho Falls; George Van Egan, Elmer; George Donnar, Shoshone; John F. ### Light Project Outlined for Blaine Areas

**HAYLEY, Jan. 9 (AP)—**Earl Haroldson, Blaine, division manager of the Idaho Power company, was guest speaker at the Blaine Chamber of Commerce meeting at the Star cafe Monday night.

Haroldson, guest of Lloyd E. Smith, manager of the local Idaho Power office, told the 22 members present that the Idaho Power company expects to invest \$1,000,000 in a new 110,000-volt line, plus two new substations to give the area better service.

The new line will start at the new substation at the lower Salmon valley and be built in a northwesterly direction, crossing the Rock creek canyon and entering the Blaine Wood River valley at Hayley.

The 110,000-volt line will be supported by two-pole "H" frame towers, which is the same type as that used in the Snake valley to serve Wells and Elko, Nev.

One and one-eighth inch diameter aluminum wire, which will carry the power load, the 110,000 volts will be cut down to 40,000 KV at a new substation at Hayley, and the line will continue on to Ketchum-Sun Valley, where a new substation will be built on a 200-foot hill far from the Sun Valley tables on Trail creek.

The improvements to be made in 1952 are expected to be made in 1953 and 1954.

Haroldson said "work will be started on the new line in the spring."

Chamber of Commerce members present voted overwhelmingly in favor of the improvements.

Haroldson also spoke to Rotary club members last week, and they expressed keen interest in the project.

Noel Pratt, Carey, chairman of the newly organized rural area development committee for Blaine county, also spoke briefly outlining the aims of the committee and asking cognate agencies to aid the committee.

The group voted to assist the committee in any way possible and appointed Oliver Adams and Arthur Eminger to represent Adams Pratt stated the committee desires members from all civic and community organizations.

He explained the department of agriculture has set up a technical panel which comprises all of the department of agriculture agencies to aid the committee.

In Blaine county there is Glenn Smith of the ASO office; Floyd Dolan of the SOB; Ralph Cimo of the Sawtooth national forest; Norman Warren, manager of the Idaho Power; and W. H. Olson, Shoshone, of the farm home administration.

Pratt stated the rural area development plan is a program set up by the government to help the rural areas help themselves and members of the committee will investigate the possibilities of improving the economic situation of the county. There are programs that the federal government has available, such as small business loans, which can be obtained through this committee.

### Spaceship Repair to Require Developing of Special Tool

**HUNTSVILLE, Ala., Jan. 9 (AP)—**A space mechanic working in zero-gravity could turn a flip simply by twisting a screwdriver, a monkey wrench could turn him for a loop.

"Weightlessness—in space—requires special tools that never being developed at the Marshall space flight center.

"To keep a space mechanic from having to handle ordinary tools, the space agency is experimenting with new push-button and quick squeeze hand tools.

In an orbital launching operation, separate stages of a manned space vehicle would be launched, assembled and possibly fueled while in a 300-mile-high orbit. All of this would take place on the second leg of a round-trip flight to the moon.

Space mechanics may have to connect these rocket stages.

In simulated space tests, an engineer wearing a pressurized space suit and standing on a frictionless platform riding on air-pressure, carries out maintenance jobs that a space mechanic might encounter.

Standing on the platform, a space mechanic tests the newly developed anti-torque tools that use space mechanics of the future may use.

One is a screwdriver that can be turned by squeezing rather than by twisting. Another is a combination of pliers and wrench, also operated by squeezing.

A third tool, called a spungler, is a wrench operated by a trigger.

### Western Atom Spy Named to Africa School

**LONDON, Jan. 9 (AP)—**Dr. Alan Nunn May, the western world's first atom spy, has been appointed special professor of physics at the University of Ghana.

Announcing this today, a Ghana spokesman said the 50-year-old British scientist is expected to take up the appointment shortly.

May worked on an atomic energy project in Canada during World War II. He was sentenced to 10 years imprisonment in 1950 for disclosing atomic secrets to the Soviet Union. He was released in 1952 after serving six years and eight months of the term.

### Czech Flees to West Germany

**MUNICH, Germany, Jan. 9 (AP)—**A Czechoslovakian soldier-fleeing to West Germany. He was feared he would be punished for the escape of a Czech family, Bavarian border authorities said today.

Officials said the soldier told them he was on duty near Kuchwartz on Christmas eve when a man and wife and their four children crossed into West Germany.

J. L. Carter, a former city policeman who had worked for Rhodes was among those who called the meeting. Blair said the chief's alleged "unauthorized use of the city police car" was one of the reasons.



### Council Asks Stern Moves On Pollution

**BOISE, Jan. 9 (AP)—**An agricultural chemical control council has recommended to the state agriculture department that certain measures be taken to prevent harmful application of farm chemicals.

The council presented its recommendations yesterday to Agriculture Commissioner Stanley I. Trenholm.

Trenholm said that several agricultural industries in the state were seriously affected last summer by indiscriminate and haphazard application of agricultural chemicals.

The council recommended that all commercial sprayers and distributors pass a written examination on materials and methods of application of insecticides, fungicides and herbicides prior to obtaining their license.

In an effort to take emergency measures against recurrences of improper chemical application, the council also recommended:

That the commissioners use more rigid standards, an Idaho code which gives him power after public hearing to prescribe maintenance methods to be used in spraying.

That the attorney general's office study legal procedures to prevent "suicide suits" in interstate transfer of possibly harmful agricultural products.

That the commissioner special permits be required for application of DDT, dust.

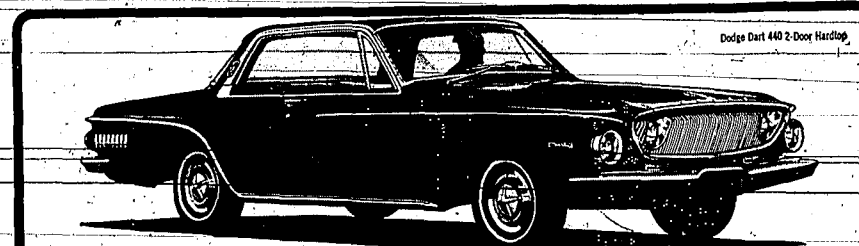

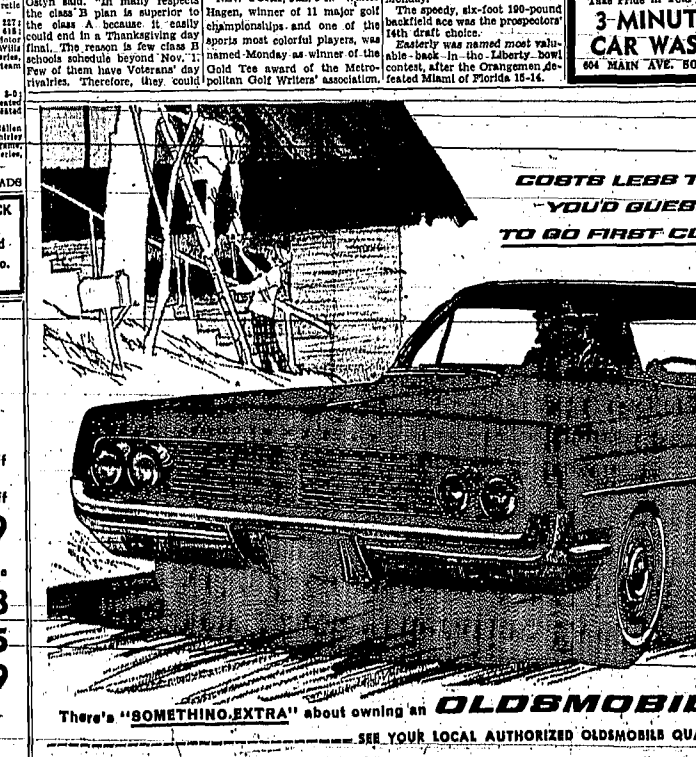

### Defector From Cuba Reports Guevara Army

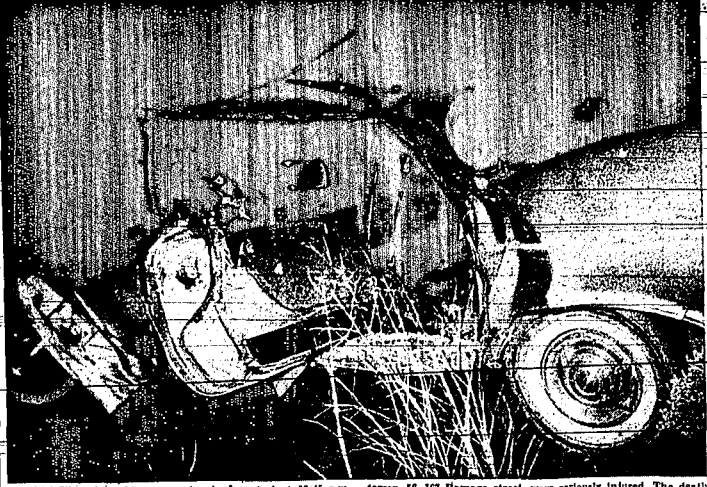

### Move Begins Among Demos To Scuttle Frank L. Benson

BOISE, Jan. 9 (AP)—There's a move afoot among Idaho's Democratic professionals to put the political skills under controversy of Atty. Gen. Frank L. Benson.

Those who disagree with his policies of the past three years and, in particular, his running feud with Gov. Robert E. Smylie and several state agencies would like to dump him from the party handwagon.

Last week-end's Boise meeting of a number of freshman Democratic legislators brought forth one portion of the move—but it was not the only activity. There was a lot of behind-the-scenes maneuvering as well.

At least one Democrat holding elective state office—Auditor Joe R. Williams—has split openly with Benson. He took exception recently to the attorney general's stand both on the children's commission and the insurance fund legal case.

Others will tell you privately they are less than enchanted with Benson but so far they have not said it out in the open. One said the other day he finally would vote to appear on any campaign platform with him.

Benson's own political plans as yet are unknown and this has caused some "consideration" among the pros. They don't know just where they should aim their fire.

However, a usually reliable source reports that he has been urging Secretary of State Arnold Williams—a former Idaho governor—to run for the gubernatorial nomination. He feels, said this source, that only he or the secretary of state could beat Smylie in a general election.

All the secretary of state will say is that he has been urged by several persons to seek the Democratic nomination for governor and that he has this under consideration. He adds that he would seek reelection to his present office if the "right candidate" turns up for governor.

Whether Arnold Williams would support Benson is debatable. He has sided with the attorney-general in a number of disputes with increasing frequency of the past few months and Benson has referred to him as "my political adviser" when talking with newsmen.

Worry that Benson might win a berth in the runoff election should he enter a large field of gubernatorial hopefuls has prompted some elements in the party to try to reduce the number of candidates. At present there are 10- or more potential candidates.

Should Benson decide to run for reelection as attorney general, no doubts will have opposition in the primary. At least four possibilities have been mentioned.

### Leader Restores Some Liberties Of Venezuelans

CARACAS, Venezuela, Jan. 9 (AP)—President Romulo Betancourt last night restored some of the civil liberties suspended in November, 1960, because of leftist-led student disorders.

The rights restored included freedom of movement, freedom of strike, guarantees of personal freedom and security and guarantees protecting Venezuelan homes against unwarranted search and seizure.

The government retained the right to restrict the freedom of speech, the press and public assembly, but it was not expected to exercise this authority except in "extreme cases."

Other officials installed at the time of the student disorders include State Sen. William Dec. Orangeville, Atty. Allen R. Derr, police Atty. Robert Fanning Kellogg, and Atty. James Ingalls, Cour d'Alene.
