Ex-Indonesia Rebel Offers Sukarno Aid

MAKASSAR, Indonesia, Jan. 10.—A former government army officer who has been in the country for 10 years has offered to help the government against the Dutch. It was reported today.

Col. Kahar Muzakkar, who led the Muslim (Moslem) extremist bands against government positions on Celebes Island for years, was quoted as saying his followers would help the government if needed for an invasion of Dutch New Guinea.

Col. M. Jusuf, the government commander here, said Muzakkar pledged the Moslems' support earlier in a signed statement.

Jusuf also announced the arrest of three more Dutch agents in connection with the recent assassination attempt against President Sukarno. He said one of the nine persons arrested is a former agent of Dutch naval intelligence.

In a letter development, authorities said they were trying to track down a signed statement by a man broadcasting intelligence information to the Dutch before dawn every morning for at least 18 months.

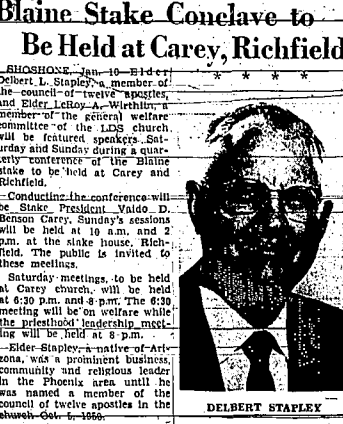

Time for Economy

For too many years, the federal debt has increased practically every year. But administration after administration, both Republican and Democrat, has added its bit to the mounting public debt until debt has become a way of life rather than a means of financing.

Now President Kennedy is asking congress to push the debt ceiling still higher, above the 300 billion dollar mark. The present legal limit is 298 billions, but the President apparently has no intention of spending more than he can accommodate by the old ceiling. So now we raise the roof a bit more.

The trend of spending more and more has to be reversed. Right now it's a toss-up which poses the greater menace for communism, the federal debt or world-wide communism.

Communist leaders have openly boasted they will goad the U. S. into spending itself into bankruptcy. With a public debt of 300 billion dollars, some Americans are beginning to wonder how close the communists have come to making good on their boasts.

Trus, a good deal of the enormous U. S. debt results from war and the threat of war, but a self-perpetuating bureaucracy is responsible for a much greater share. There can be no reversal in the spending until the American public calls a halt to the senseless spread of the bureaucracy that is running the nation today.

Traditionally, the time to pay off public debt is during periods of inflation when greater quantities of money with lower value are in circulation. It's just good economic sense to repay 100-cent dollars with 50-cent dollars if you can.

So periods of inflation are the time for economy in government. If tax rates can be maintained at a relatively high level, a good deal of the cheaper dollars are kept out of circulation, thereby serving to cushion somewhat the effects of inflation. At the same time, if government costs can be held to the lowest possible level, then the government can reduce the public debt.

Any government that finds it impossible to reduce the debt during periods of inflation is bound to find itself facing difficult times in the future.

Some day it will be refreshing to have some administration declare it intended to balance the budget, then go right ahead and actually balance it. It will be even more refreshing to find the U. S. reducing its debt rather than raising the legal debt ceiling to accommodate additional spending.

ECONOMICAL AT HEART.—Like most members of the congress, Senator Byrd is concerned over what these steps might do to American industries and to those in his own state, particularly Texas.

Food for Americans

By GAYNOR MADDOX

TEENIE SANDWICH

A third of a loaf of French bread, cubed beef, Swiss cheese, pickles and sweet onions—these are the makings of a sandwich to satisfy any teen-age appetite.

Put on a slice of Swiss cheese, onions, radishes, celery and potato chips just to be sure.

Put in Basket Sandwiches (Yield: 6 servings of 1/4 loaf per serving)

2 (1-pound) loaves long narrow French bread

24 (1-ounce) slices corned beef

24 (1-ounce) slices processed Swiss cheese

8 dill pickles, sliced into thirds

2 serrano or Spanish onions, medium-sized

Out loaf into alternate three-quarter inch vertical slices, all most to bottom crust. Start cutting one-half inch from end of loaf, making 24 slices in all. Remove narrow sections (three-quarter inch) in each loaf, but do not cut through crust. Cut each section into eight slices. Fold slices of Swiss cheese, placing one in each bread cavity so that fold is on bottom. Wrap a corned beef slice around a slice each of dill pickle and onion; insert between folded cheese slices. Cut each loaf into third place on shallow baking pan. Heat in a hot oven (400 degrees F.) for 10 minutes.

To serve: Place in a long narrow wicker basket, arranging sandwiches and potato chips at end of basket. Another suggested way to serve would be to place 1/4 of loaf in flat wicker serving platter and use a sharp bread knife for slicing bread between filled sections to make sandwiches for easier eating.

Official Says U. S. Buildup Was Success

ST. HILEY, Kans., Jan. 10—Secretary of the Army Elvis A. Stahr, Jr. said the military buildup in Vietnam was a success. "It has accomplished a degree of readiness unparalleled in American peacetime history—a bloodless effort to win a war that must never come," Stahr said. Stahr attended the buildup Tuesday night at a dinner sponsored by the central Kansas chapter of the Association of the U. S. Army. "Should we succeed in our effort to preserve freedom without war," he said, "it will be because the enemies of freedom can see that our intention to stand firm is backed by the military ability to do so."

U.S. Helping Viet Nam to Boost Army

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—South Viet Nam is acting to increase its regular army from 170,000 to 200,000 with the help of U. S. military aid. U. S. officials said that the guerrilla war appears to be growing in intensity there, killing and wounding 400 non-communists a week.

State department officials in disclosing the army buildup to day said the additional costs would be borne by both South Viet Nam and the United States through a new financial reform program.

U. S. officials estimate that communists North Viet Nam has 300,000 to 350,000 men under arms.

In the past year guerrilla activity by the communists Viet Cong rebels more than doubled, according to W. Averell Harriman, assistant secretary of state. The number of Viet Cong operations in South Viet Nam is estimated at 18,000 or more. U. S. officials said there has been a sharp increase in violent incidents in recent months. A state department spokesman said that the United States is not sending combat troops to South Viet Nam except for training purposes—if you want to regard them as combat troops in that light.

Details of his activities came to light when he called the Columbus Dispatch asking for a picture photographer Bill Phley to take photos of him shaking hands with Kennedy. John W. Bush, a former Ohio official now an interior commissioner in Washington who came to Columbus with the President, confirmed that Meek sat at the speaker's table, bringing his own chair. Meek said he went to the fairgrounds building where Kennedy spoke at a dinner honoring Gov. Michael W. D'Salle hoping to get a ticket from a union official out never found him. Meek is president of the Greater Columbus United Auto Workers Citizens council. "I had decided to take some Kennedy buttons I had left from

the last campaign just in case," Meek said. "If anybody stopped me I was going to say I was told to bring the buttons." Meek said nobody stopped him until he got near the door through which the presidential party was to enter. A highway patrolman told him he would have to go out into the main hall with the other people. "I saw an empty chair at the speaker's table and sat down," Meek said. "I was among the first to stand up and meet the President when he came to the table, which the President did. Mismanagement Charged For Overbalance of Elk In Yellowstone Park

Years of mismanagement of the Yellowstone park elk herd have resulted in the "emergency" facing the interior department now and secretary of the interior Stewart Udall is seeking aid from the states to save the situation. These charges were leveled Tuesday night by Ray J. Holmes, Twin Falls, chairman of the Idaho fish and game commission, at the Southern Idaho Fish and Game association annual reorganization meeting.

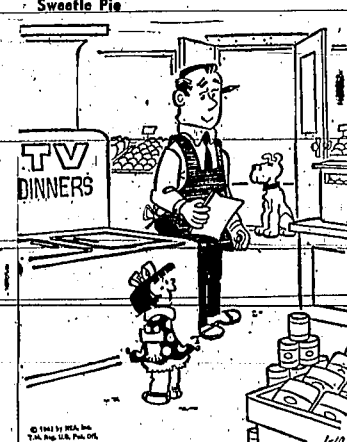

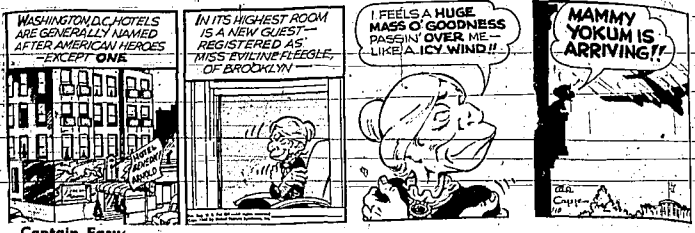

New Regulation Eyed on License

RUPERT, Jan. 10 — Minidoka county Sheriff Theo Johnson announced Monday that after Jan. 15, his office will comply with the directives received from the department of law enforcement concerning the sale of driver licenses.

He explained that all persons making application for new licenses will be required to turn in their old ones. If they are unable to do so, the vendor will accept the application and fee, and supply the applicant with a receipt.
