### Atomic Blast Hazards Are Talk Subject

Hazards of nuclear blasts were discussed by Dr. Earl Graham, Idaho Falls, health physicist, at a meeting of the local chapter of the National Health Officers Association, held Tuesday evening at the Twin Falls Junior Club. Dr. Graham, who is also a member of the Idaho Falls chapter of the American Nuclear Energy Society, discussed the hazards of atomic blasts in a speech delivered Tuesday evening to the 175 persons at St. Edward's Catholic church auditorium. Dr. Graham emphasized the danger of radiation in case of atomic attack. The Catholic women's council hosted the program.

Dr. Graham pointed out that protection is like dust protection. Dr. Graham said, "Food and water not exposed to dust does not become polluted and when not exposed to fallout does not become radioactive," he explained.

The area affected by blast and fire is relatively small compared to the area affected by fallout," he asserted.

Dr. Graham compared the effect of fallout on a person remaining outside without cover as opposed to persons taking refuge inside a conventional home. The person inside a conventional home would receive half the radiation dose, he noted, adding that exposure would be reduced by about 80 percent if the person remained outside without cover as opposed to persons taking refuge inside a conventional home.

Dr. Graham illustrated his talk with slides. He was introduced by Mrs. Ralph McFarlane, program chairman.

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## Reporter Tours U.S. Capitol, Sees "Occidental Splendor"

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10 (AP)—Just before the beginning of a new congressional session, I like to make a tour of the U. S. Capitol, its wonders to behold.

On this year's tour, I beheld so many expensive improvements the wonder is that there was enough money in the treasury to pay for them.

Leaving the new senate office building, I proceeded in a southerly direction aboard one of the \$75,000 subway cars that went into service two years ago.

When the 4.3 million dollar subway system was opened, Senate Chaplain Frederick Brown Harris christened the cars as "swift chariots of democracy."

Sure enough, they did make the passengers feel a bit like Ben Hur.

The escalator and elevator I ascended to the ground floor, whose corridors have been brightly lit by new indirect lighting. This makes it easier to see the 100-year-old paintings on the walls and ceilings.

That can be either good or bad, depending on your taste in art.

From this point, I made my way into the new 24 million dollar east front of the capitol, which is now being furnished in what some observers have described as "oriental splendor."

Personally, I think that description is an exaggeration. "Occidental splendor" would be more accurate.

The furniture is mostly the low along variety that modern designers created to induce curvature of the spine. It basks in the sheen of hardwood paneling, marble and fine leathers.

At either end of the area is a restaurant, one for senators and the other for house members. Everything in them is new, too, except most of the diners and some of the food.

In short, our lawmakers have improved their surroundings to an extent that very few orientals potentates could afford, even with U. S. foreign aid.
